Demos Banting to Find Running Mate To Assist Stevenson

CHICAGO, Aug. 17 (AP)—The Democrats tore with surging enthusiasm today into the job of picking a running mate for Adlai Stevenson, overwhelmingly chosen as the party's presidential nominee. But the roll call of states on the first ballot was completed without picking a candidate. There were at least four candidates in serious contention, and no one was close to the 68 2/3 votes needed to win. Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee, who until two weeks ago was a contender for the presidential nomination, wound up the leader with 483 1/2.

Oregon's Vote Almost Landed Spot for Adlai

CHICAGO, Aug. 17 (AP)—Oregon delegates to the Democratic convention were disappointed to find their votes barely failed to bring Adlai Stevenson's total for the presidential nomination up to the 685 votes he needs to be assured of the bid.

Rep. Hugh Green, D., Ore., a delegate, found some consolation, however, in the fact that Pennsylvania's direct total, she pointed out, that Pennsylvania is the home state of James P. Haney, Stevenson's campaign manager.

The former Illinois governor's total is 245 out of the 685, necessary when Oregon's vote was added to it.

Mr. Green said it would have been particularly pleasing if Oregon had put Stevenson over the top since that state was most strongly pledged to him. Delegates could be prosecuted for violating their primary pledge.

The same law applied to a pledge for votes for Kefauver for vice president so that there was question as to where the state's votes go today.

Mr. Green said that if Idaho had voted when called upon Oregon would have had the honor of nominating Stevenson. Idaho passed out later cast 12 votes for Stevenson.

Mr. Green said he was "elated" by the Stevenson victory.

Since the Pennsylvania primary, which Stevenson lost to Sen. Don Kefauver, D. Tenn., she had been "waiting" for his eventual nomination, she said.

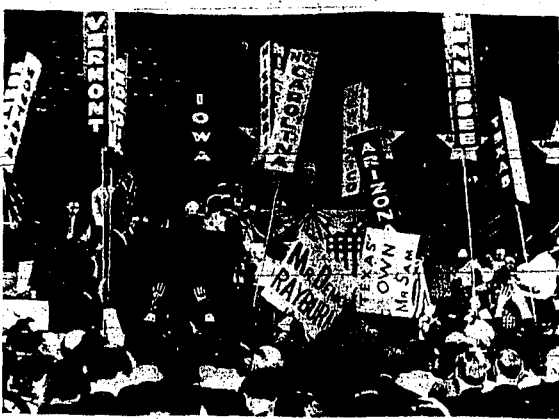

Harriman and 'Friend' Battle To Last Count

CHICAGO, Aug. 17 (AP)—Riots up to the last, Averell Harriman clung desperately last night to a hope that he might win the Democratic presidential nomination.

Smiling and outwardly cheerful, the New York governor took up the big convention hall to follow the nominating speeches and the balloting.

Sharing his grim determination not to give up the fight, despite Adlai Stevenson's command of a nominating majority long before the voting began, was former President Harry S. Truman.

Truman, who has been pleading for Harriman since last Saturday, went before the convention and sat with firmness and distinction.

Harriman said these words from the former President "made me mightily humble and mighty proud." He told reporters that Truman knew from experience the qualities needed for the White House.

Before the voting began, Harriman was asked what he planned to do if he failed to win.

"I think I'll win the nomination for the presidency," he said. "But if I do not I am going to spend many more years as governor."

Asked if this could be taken as an announcement that he would seek reelection to his Albany job, Harriman replied that it could. His present four-year term has two more years to go.

Men in and out of politics will be talking a long time about the motives that lay behind former President Truman's performance on the Democratic convention scene at Chicago.

Some of his friends and a great many observers believe that the chief reason for his resignation was personal loyalty to an old and proven friend.

Mr. Truman puts the highest store by loyalty. He expects it from those who associate with him, and he gives it in return.

Harriman earned his through faithful service to the new deal-fair deal regimes and firm espousal of the Roosevelt-Truman political philosophies.

It is probably little doubt that this was a prime factor in Mr. Truman's announcement. Most likely, too, he is genuinely convinced that so militant a proponent of his party outlook as Harriman is the kind of man who can carry the Democratic banner in an election campaign.

Beyond these things there would be less agreement. Did, for instance, vanity play a part? Some would say "no," arguing that Harry Truman is still the humble man of old.

Others would say "yes" and point to language in his Harriman announcement for support. He said he "knew all along" he would "have" to make his choice known.

Why? There are no rules written or otherwise which compel ex-Presidents to voice their views on subsequent candidates. Perhaps it is arguable as well whether a party's elder statesman has a duty to speak out.

It could be that he simply wanted to make a declaration, that it fit not only his natural wishes but his personal version of the role an ex-President should play in his party.

Certain it is that Mr. Truman loves the drama of politics and enjoys being in the wings. He believes ex-Presidents should be listened to.

In the case of this particular convention, he may have sensed, moreover, that the party proceedings in Chicago would be a far less important event than the Democratic convention had caused interest to troop.

One observer saw it this way: Harry Truman blew into town, realized a dull show was shaping up and so he had a dull show for the city for a couple of days. He changed the whole aspect of the convention.

What of the effect of his Harriman move on the convention decision and upon his future in the Democratic party? This is a subject in itself deserving later treatment.

Anyhow, whatever the effect, Mr. Truman's Chicago performance should be reassuring to those Americans who like a certain sense of permanence. He hasn't changed.

FRANK CLEMENT'S KEYNOTE Kennedy speeches are supposed of course to set down a party's concept of a policy of faith as well as afford it opportunity to whiplash the opposition.

It is understandable, however, that keynoters often find the business of indicating their views the more exciting part of their assignment.

So it was this time with the Democrats' chosen bellringer, Gov. Frank Clement of Tennessee.

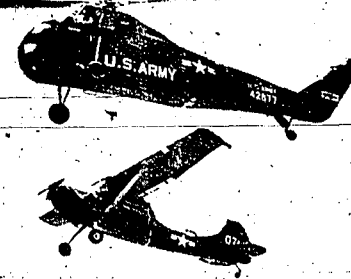

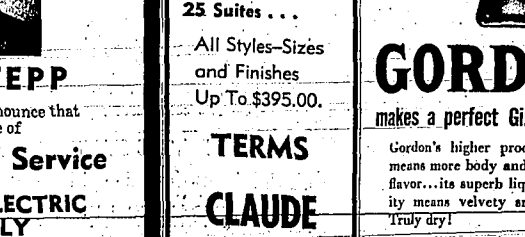

High Butterfat Record Noted For T. F. Herd

An average yield of 566 pounds of butterfat produced by eight registered Holstein cows owned by L. J. Tencknick, Twin Falls, led the reports of the Twin Falls County Dairy Herd Improvement association, reports C. W. Dashi, county agent.

This figure is twice that of the Idaho average, Dashi said, meaning it would take 10 average cows to produce the same amount of butterfat as the eight registered cows of Tencknick has long used records for selecting foundation cattle.

The 1884 cows in the 70 herds of the association averaged about one pound of butterfat a day during July.

In unit one, the high herd is owned by Rudolph Peterson and sons, averaged 49 pounds of butterfat. The eight registered Holsteins of which two were 49, averaged 49 pounds. An average of 49.6 pounds of butterfat was reported by Soren and Gera Jensen from 54 milking cows out of a herd of 60. Jack's 24 registered Holsteins averaged 39.8 pounds of butterfat. Two were dry.

The high cow, owned by Rudolph Peterson and sons, averaged 55 pounds of butterfat from 2,500 pounds of milk.

Following Tencknick in unit two was the milked herd owned by Sam Ruten, Hansen, whose nine cows, with two dry, averaged 39.2. Oren Boone had 19 grade Holsteins, with two dry, averaging 35.9. Tencknick also had the high cow in the unit that yielded 49.2 pounds of butterfat from 2,510 pounds of milk.

In unit three, the high herd of Guernsey owned by R. C. Cothran, yielded an average of 37.9 pounds. He had 27 of 32 heat milking. With 22 Jerseys out of 24 milking, Ed Wright reported an average of 33.1 pounds of butterfat. The high cow of the unit, owned by E. D. Mager, made 84.1 pounds of butterfat from 2,000 pounds of milk.

TOKYO, Aug. 17 (AP)—A former Japanese army captain who recently returned from 10 years captivity by the Russians in Siberia said he saw Japanese prisoners in one camp cut off their arms and blow off their legs with dynamite to escape forced labor in a Soviet gold mine.

Shiro Yamada, captured by the Reds in the northern Kuril Islands at the end of World War II, said in an interview with the Japan News that he was sentenced to 10 years as a "war criminal" and sent to a camp at Neru in Siberia.

Political Foes May Be Same As 1952 Fight

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17 (AP)—The Democratic nomination of Adlai E. Stevenson and the Republican expected renomination of President Eisenhower next week will provide a second running of the 1952 race for the presidency.

But though the top candidates will be the same, there will be significant changes in the Nov. 6 election over which will come out on top this time—and by how much.

Here's the way they finished in 1952: Eisenhower captured 443 electoral votes, Stevenson 98.

Eisenhower won 39 states, Stevenson nine — Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina and West Virginia.

The total popular vote was Eisenhower 33,935,255, Stevenson 27,314,922.

The vote for Eisenhower set a new record, but Stevenson's losing vote would have been enough to win any previous election except that in 1928, when Franklin D. Roosevelt rolled up 27,476,873 votes in his lachrymose victory over Alf M. Landon.

Stevenson's Speech Throwing Vice Presidency Open Quoted

CHICAGO, Aug. 17 (AP)—Text of Adlai E. Stevenson's speech to the Democratic national convention last night throwing the vice presidential nomination wide open: "My heart is full. I am deeply grateful. But I did not come here tonight to speak of the action you have just taken. That I shall do tomorrow night after you have chosen a vice president."

Now it is in connection with that choice that I have taken this unusual step of asking to be heard briefly tonight.

"The American people have a solemn obligation to consider with the utmost care who will be their President if the elected President is prevented by a higher will from serving his full term. It is a sober reminder that seven out of 34 Presidents have served as the result of such an indirect selection.

The responsibility of the presidency has grown so great that the nation's attention has become focused as never before on the office of the vice presidency. The choice for that office has become almost as important as the choice for the presidency.

Each political party has therefore the solemn obligation to offer the

country as its choice for the vice presidency a person fully equipped first, to assist in the discharge of the duties of the most exacting job in the world, and second, to himself assume, if need be, this highest responsibility.

Historically, the presidential candidate has often designated the nominee for vice president. Sometimes the choice has been due to personal predilection or political expediency.

But I respect beyond measure a convention and a party which has chosen upon me its highest honor without there being asked of me a specific commitment except faith in the program and principles of our party.

In these circumstances I have concluded to depart from the precedent of the past. I have decided that the selection of the vice presidential nominee should be made through the free processes of this convention—so that the Democratic party's candidate for this office may join me before the nation not as one man's selection but as one chosen by our great party even as I have been chosen.

I would add only this: In taking this step I am expressing my confidence in your choice and in the many fine men whose prominence
