# Idaho Potato King Flays Proposal for Change to U.S. Controls of Spuds

A proposed amendment to the potato marketing order which would give federal authorities the complete and exclusive right to control the transportation, handling and processing of all potatoes grown in Idaho and Malheur county, Ore., drew sharp opposition Saturday from Joe Marshall, Twin Falls, Idaho Potato King.

The amendment has been placed on a ballot and sent to Idaho potato growers for their approval or disapproval by August 21.

"The \$100 per cent against it, said Marshall, who has led the growers' fight against the establishment of a potato control, the stopping of exports of Idaho potatoes, and compulsory stamping of potato tubers.

"If this goes through," he predicted, "Idaho growers will be out of business. The potato grower would have too many expenses to make any money."

He called on the state growers' committee to amend that amendment off to Idaho.

# Church Still in Lead; Demos to Delay Platform

BOISE, Aug. 18 (AP)—Democratic State Chairman George Greenfield ordered a two-week postponement of the party's state platform convention today because of doubt over the outcome of Tuesday's Democratic senate primary.

Frank Church, Boise, held a 135-vote lead over former Sen. Glen Taylor, Pocatello, a slight gain in the past few hours. Unofficial returns, corrected, showed official canvases in about half of the state's 44 counties, gave Church 27,919 votes and Taylor 27,784. "It is obvious time will be needed to determine the winner," Greenfield said.

He put off the meeting from Sept. 1 to Sept. 15 in Pocatello. The Republican state platform convention is scheduled for Sept. 1 in Boise.

Greenfield said it is customary for senatorial and congressional nominees to make their preference known for the party officials to be chosen at the meeting as well as having something to say about the platform itself.

He said no convention speakers had been chosen yet and the selection would await the return of the National Committee Chairman Harry Wall, Lewiston, from Chicago.

He said he was attending the Democratic national convention there. State law calls for canvases to be submitted to the office secretary of State James H. Young by Monday. The state board of canvassers is expected to go over Aug. 21.

Both candidates have said the winner will not be determined until the official canvases are in. The canvases will be held on a margin of about 11,000 votes over his opponent.

# GOP Blast at Demo Warriers Fires up Convention Steam

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 18 (AP)—A sharp GOP blast at the new standard bearers of the Democratic party tonight cheered Republican lions streaming into the Golden Gate city for their 26th national convention. But discussion within the delegation to the Cow Palace tonight gets under way as a big question of the convention: Will Harold Stassen and Dwight D. Eisenhower?

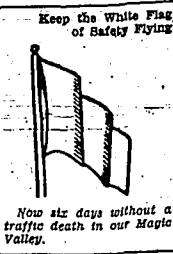

## Magic Valley Hobbies No. 34

### Ancient Art Is Practiced by Women in Valley as Modern Homemaking Hobby

Textile painting, an art which has been traced nearly 4,000 years, is the hobby of two Hagerman area women, Mrs. Dan Niefenegger, West Point, and Mrs. Gerald Martin, Hagerman. About five years ago, Mrs. Niefenegger began teaching classes in the art, and since then many of her former pupils have taken up textile painting as a hobby.

Mrs. Martin is not one of her pupils, however. She came to Hagerman after Mrs. Niefenegger had moved from there to West Point. Mrs. Niefenegger, who has taught the art to "about 50 or 60," reported that a few of her pupils in Magic Valley who now do textile painting as a hobby include Mrs. Homer Martin, Castelford; Mrs. Allen Wiscell, Wendell, and Mrs. Clyde Gough. Mrs. Gerald Martin terms this hobby an easy one. "All you have to do is buy a set of textile colors and read the enclosed instruction book," she said. When buying paints, she prefers those which are pre-mixed to the kind which have to be mixed by the buyer.

Using fine quality unbleached muslin, Mrs. Martin has done the majority of her work on the drapes in her home. In her living room, she designed a red-tan-brown floral pattern with lifelike ivy vines up the side and bottom of the drape. In one of her bedrooms she has painted an arrangement of oriental poppies on the drapes, while in another bedroom she has a Chinese coin pattern.

"Mastery of the art," said Mrs. Niefenegger, "involves a knowledge of form, design, perspective, color, light and shade." She explained that textile painting differs from oil painting in that the paint is applied lightly, rather than dabbed on heavily. When done properly, she said, the paint penetrates the material, although the pattern is duller on one side. She compared this to oil painting where lin-paint "does not penetrate the canvas, but instead covers one side."

"A person could start this hobby for less than \$10," she estimated, adding that as far as she knew, any material could be painted. "You can paint with a brush on smooth material," she said, "but rough material requires the use of a stencil. I've tried nearly every material with the possible exception of

corduroy, but it should work, too, since I've painted on chenille." In painting, she lays the material on a flat surface with a blotter underneath to absorb any excess paint. When using a brush, she first draws or traces the desired design with a pencil, then paints it on. When using a stencil, she lays it on the material and starts painting.

There are many types of painting, including water color, tempera, egg yolk, encaustic or wax, and enamel, but the most common since the Renaissance has been oil painting. That the hobby is an ancient one is evidenced from early archeological finds. Ruins at Thebes have walls decorated with paintings and sculptures. The prophet Ezekiel mentions the Babylonian and Chaldean styles of painting which were adopted in Jerusalem before 500 B. C.

When asked for a display of their textile painting, both Mrs. Martin and Mrs. Niefenegger reported that they had given most of it to friends and relatives.

Mrs. Niefenegger, a winner in the previous Goodwin county fairs, plans to enter exhibits again this year if she can take time from her schedule of being a 4-H clothing club leader, member of the West Point Community club, teacher of upholstery and textile painting classes, and an African violet raiser.

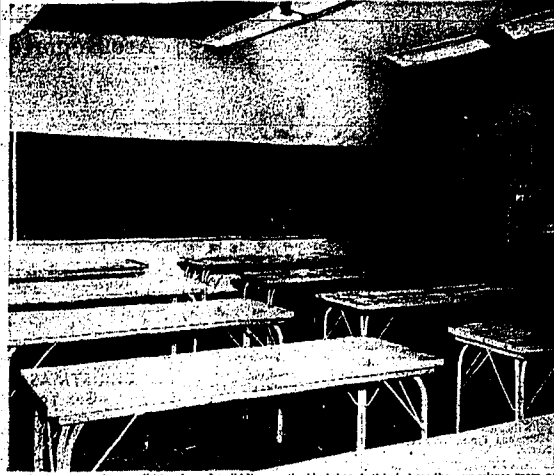

The neighbor, having all dogs, had set several of the double-spring coyote traps around his incinerator and on by his side. Of course, our dog had to get out of her pen and be the one that was caught.

It was related to us that he had planned on leaving the dog in the trap, suffering, until morning to show us but was afraid of waking the neighbors.

Anyone who would torture a dog in this fashion, regardless of whether he likes dogs or not, must be the most inhuman. It's a wonder he didn't have her shot right there as he has had others, leaving the tiny pups to starve.

Surely there is a law, even an unnumbered one, against this kind of inhuman thing.

Plans for the road must still be approved by the U. S. bureau of public roads, and Johnson said they probably would not be completed for several years.

### Idaho's GOP Units Eyeing Water Plank

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 18 (AP) — The Idaho delegation to the Republican National convention arrived here today to keep an eye on the water resources plank that goes into the party platform.

Gov. Robert E. Smylie, delegation chairman, said the Idaho group is in agreement with congressional action disapproving federal construction of a high-level dam at Hells canyon on the Snake river.

He said they will watch the water resources plank carefully to make certain it does not deviate.

The Idaho governor said an informal caucus of the delegation showed strong support for renomination of Richard Nixon for vice president.

Smylie said the people of Idaho are not deeply concerned with the furor over the civil rights plank, as the schools in Idaho already are totally integrated. But, he added, "I think the people of Idaho will go along with a plank that follows the law of the land as the supreme court announced it."

### Yeggs Work Hard In Stealing \$1,300

LANSING, Mich., Aug. 18 (AP) — Thieves who forced open a store safe worked hard for their \$1,200 take last night.

Ingham county sheriff's officers said tests showed the criminals used 18 different tools in their efforts to open the safe in a five and ten cent store.

### Liner Hits Ship

QUEBEC, Aug. 18 (AP) — The 18,132-ton liner *Homeric*, packed with 1,000 passengers from Europe, collided in dense fog with a moored vessel, the 9,000-ton *Columbia*, in Quebec harbor today. No injuries were reported.

The *Homeric*, under tow to her berth, ripped a gash in the *Columbia's* side and crushed some lifeboats.

### U.S. Incomes Climb to New Record in '35

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18 (AP) — Almost everywhere in the United States last year, the commerce department reported today.

It said the personal income of Americans rose to new records in all regions and in most states in 1935. North Dakota had the highest percentage gain over 1934—16 per cent.

In only four state did personal income last year dip below 1934. These were Iowa, down 8 per cent; South Dakota, down 10 per cent; Nebraska, down 4 per cent; and Kansas, down less than one per cent.

The department said these losses were "traceable to a reduced volume of farm income."

For the country as a whole, the 305 billion dollars in personal income for 1935 was 1 per cent above the 1934 total.

North Dakota's spectacular advance was attributed to a strong recovery in the state's farm income following several years of decline.

Over the country as a whole, per capita income amounted to \$1,847 in 1935, a 5 per cent increase from the previous year.

The range of per capita income was wide, however. Delaware led with \$2,213 and Mississippi trailed with \$846. Idaho's was \$1,460 in 1934 and \$1,465 in 1935, a per cent gain.

### Auto Theft Gives Clue to Escapes

Theft of a 1932 Ford coupe at 12:30 a.m. Saturday by three men was the clue to the escape of the search for three Idaho state prison escapees in the desert country of Coyote county, according to reports received here.

The black vehicle with a built-in box in the rear was stolen in Mailla, a small town 18 miles south of Hampan. Two of the escapees, Robert Eugene Cleiton, 19, Buhl, and Harold O. Brown, 25, were sentenced to the penitentiary from Twin Falls county in 1934. The third, Corral, was identified as Leonard Ortega, serving a sentence from Owyhee county for assault to commit rape.

### Vision Clinic for All Grade Students Planned at Buhl Tuesday, Wednesday

BUHL, Aug. 18—A free, public service "back-to-school" vision screening clinic for students of all grades in Magic Valley has been scheduled for Tuesday and Wednesday, Aug. 21 and 22, in the P. I. Buhl school auditorium.

The clinic is sponsored by the Buhl Lions club and area members of the Vision Conservation Institute of the Northwest, a non-profit organization devoted to public education in the care and preservation of vision.

Objective of the clinic, says Dr. Roland D. Brubaker, Buhl, VCI chairman in this area, is to inform parents whether or not their children's eyes are "ready for school."

He said the testing method used is one developed over the course of years by the Massachusetts department of health and just released for public use in the last 12 months.

"Seven simple tests are given for visual efficiency at all distances," Dr. Brubaker declared. "If a child fails to pass one of them, a visual problem is indicated and his or her eyes should be examined thoroughly by a vision specialist of the parents' choice."

He declared the clinic has a dual purpose.

"Our first objective," explained Dr. Brubaker, "is to help parents make certain that a child will not be handicapped in reading and learning ability by defective vision. In a study of 5,000 case histories conducted last year by the institute, 9 out of 10 students showed an immediate improvement in reading and learning ability following proper vision care."

"The second objective is to expand our body of knowledge about the visual efficiency of students in Idaho, Oregon and Washington. No last names will be taken but detailed results of each test will be forwarded to the institute's headquarters in Tacoma for comparison and analysis."

The clinic will be open to all residents of the area between 9 a.m. and noon and 1:30 and 3 p.m. on both Tuesday and Wednesday. Examining doctors, all members of the VCI, will include Dr. Brubaker, Dr. E. G. Ryan, Gooding; Dr. Charles Parkers, Jerome, and Dr. Orville A. Fuller, Twin Falls.

The Lions club is cooperating as part of its nationwide program to prevent blindness and to promote good vision.

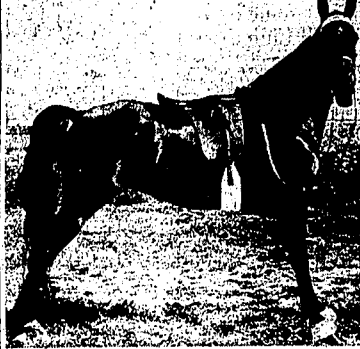

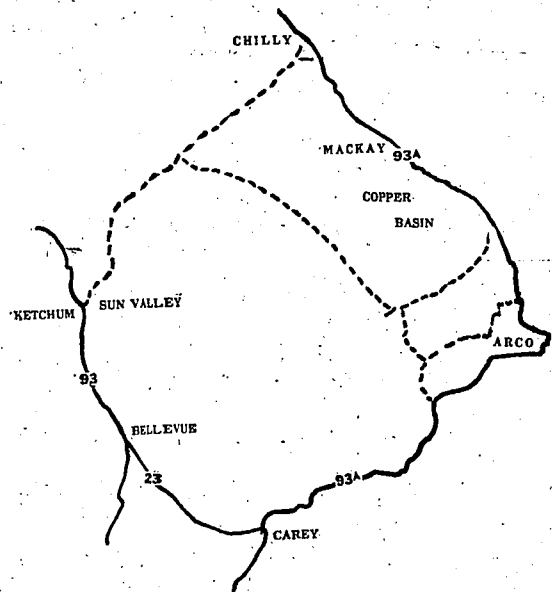

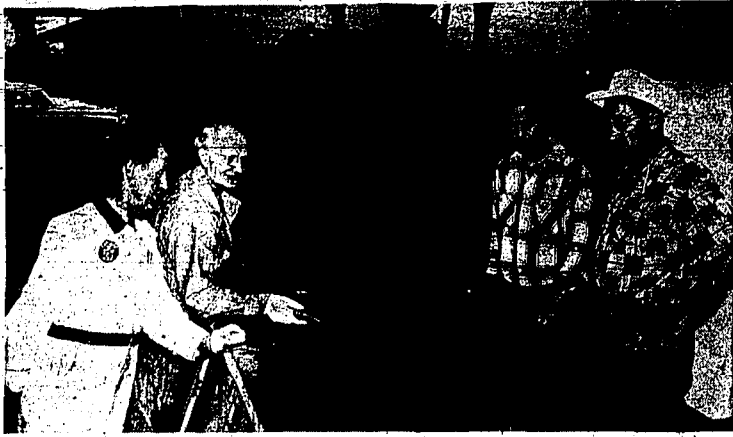

### Survivor of Ship Crash Gives Vivid Description to Parents

The old people... were on their backs, helpless as bugs, clutching each other as they lay. These were the words of Robert J. Holt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Holt, who, along with his wife and two sons, was aboard the Andrea Doria when it sank July 27. The following are excerpts from a letter Holt wrote to his parents during the crash.

"The first collision was almost painless, then one much harder and then the terrible scraping and grinding all the way down the ship and past our room. The ship started listing over immediately. Luckily, all port holes were covered.

"No alarm was given but you could hear doors banging and people rearing as they ran down the stairs. Many poor devils were killed. I saw several others who were still alive couldn't get their doors open and are still there. Had the cabin arrived one-half second later, it would have split our hull right down the middle.

"There were so many old people—old and so many of them so terribly fat. They fell with horrible noise all around. The doors were tightly waxed and it was just like trying to walk up the side of a barn.

"When the old people fell they are helpless as bugs on their backs, clinging and waving at you. One extremely fat woman grabbed old in a 'death grip' as he was going to lead his family out of the sea. By no effort could he free himself and he was forced to literally drag the woman up two flights of stairs. Meanwhile, his wife, fat and old, screamed and Dick, a 'Foster-old,' bladed, 'Don't die, ommie, don't die ommie!' over and over.

"At last I thought the ship would stop over until it found its level and so we would proceed into port under our own power like the block-ship did. It was so sure, I locked our bin door to keep scavengers out. I still have the key, cabin 510 deck.

The crew was just like they said.

### Immediate Medical Attention, 30 Pints of Red Cross Blood Save Tourist's Life

A bleeding ulcer cost Mrs. William Crutchfield, Dayton, O., two weeks of her vacation, but 30 pints of Red Cross blood and expert medical attention assured her she will have another vacation next year. Returning home after visiting relatives in Portland, Ore., Mr. and Mrs. Crutchfield, their son, William Crutchfield, Jr., and Helen Crowe, daughter of Mrs. Crutchfield, stopped in Twin Falls the night of Aug. 7. Mrs. Crutchfield says she did not feel well that evening but as her husband had been removed several years ago, she thought a fatty liver may have caused an upset stomach. Through the night the pain and nausea became worse and after taking the next morning, she lost consciousness. Louise Watson, owner of the E-Z-Dee-How motel, where the Crutchfields were staying, urged Crutchfield to take his wife to the hospital.

All quarters in the motel have been distributed by the Twin Falls Red Cross Medical Association. The doctor gave instructions for emergency medical aid and urged people to "Don't try to amuse a doctor. Get to the hospital as soon as possible." Doctors in Twin Falls quickly distributed the cards to the patients at Magic Valley Memorial hospital. Doctors in Twin Falls are the best way to insure immediate, expert medical aid.

Doctors diagnosed the trouble as a bleeding ulcer, which was the first of her kind. Crutchfield had that she had ulcers. By the time she reached the hospital there was no pulse or blood pressure," reports her husband. Her blood pressure was so low it was impossible for technicians to get a blood sample for type analysis. Eight pints of type O blood were transfused immediately, followed by nine more within the hour. In all Mrs. Crutchfield received 30 pints of blood. However, the internal bleeding continued and doctors advised immediate surgery. At 8:30 a.m. Aug. 8, Mrs. Crutchfield went into surgery and the operation wasn't completed until 4 o'clock that afternoon. Four-fifths of her stomach was removed.

Mrs. Crutchfield, who works in the motor division of General Motors in Dayton, expressed his thanks to the Red Cross, the hospital, medical staff, nurses and everyone who has assisted them here. "Twin Falls is fortunate in having a modern hospital and a group of outstanding doctors," he said. "Idahoans have accepted and helped us like our own people." Mrs. Crutchfield also thanked "everyone who contributed the blood." "I can't tell them how appreciative my husband and I are," she continued. Both thanked in particular Watson and his sister, Pauline Taylor, who have taken care of her son

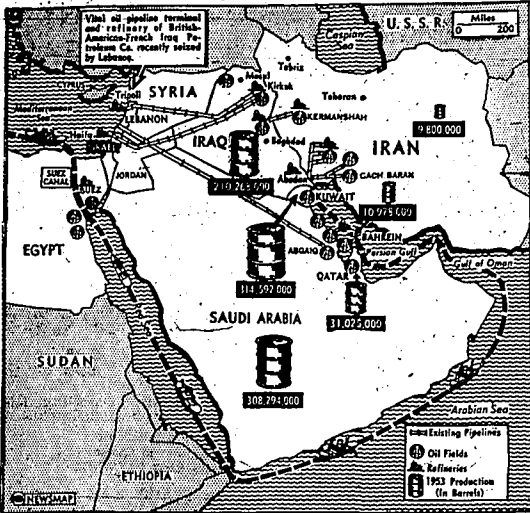

### Key to Suez Canal Crisis Is Oil

Behind all the international uproar sparked by Egyptian President Gamal Nasser's nationalization of the Suez canal is one key word: OIL. Sixty-seven per cent of all shipping transiting the canal consists of oil tankers. Pipelines shown on newspaper carry some 4,000 barrels a day, less than a quarter of the total production. The United States imports (mostly through the Suez canal) some 1.4 million barrels a day. This is 1.5 million barrels more than we export. If the Suez canal were closed to Middle East oil tankers, they could reach European and American ports by going around Africa. But it would take twice as long, enormously increasing the expense. (NEA)

### Fund Not Set Yet for State

BOISE, Aug. 10—Idaho's share of the \$400 million being made available to the state employment security agencies by Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell as a result of special studies has not been determined, reports the Boise office of the state agency.

The study showed the need for immediate strengthening and expansion of job counseling and placement service for older workers. The money will be used to hire older workers in each state central employment office and in local offices in 12 major American cities.

H. P. Garrett, executive director of the IREBA, has announced that Idaho is making the necessary plans to utilize older workers throughout the state wherever possible.

### America's Armed Might Ready To Meet Enemy, Writer Avers

BY HEWBY McLEMORE

HELD BREATH—From the hills to the Neckar in half a day. A few hours ago I was in Cairo, where Americans aren't liked, and where I would have been a pretty lonesome soul had any shooting started.

Now I'm in Heidelberg, where Americans are liked, and which is the headquarters for the United States army in Europe. Let trouble break out in these parts and I'll be happily surrounded by a million American soldiers.

No one can accuse me of being a man of half measures.

In Cairo, I doubt if the handful of Americans had a pistol between them.

Here, all around me, is admittedly the most powerful army, man for man, the world has ever seen. This is the United States Army, and it is known to its members as USAREUR—United States Army, Europe—and it is on 24-hour guard duty along a 435-mile frontier in Western Germany.

It exists to deter aggression, and the mission, in event of attack, is to defend Western Europe. And May and me, too, I trust.

I haven't been here long, but with what I have seen, and from the briefing I have had, I have the idea that it could pretty well fulfill its mission. In the days to come I'll tell you more about this "shield" that keeps the iron curtain, because I am going to visit all areas of the seventh army, the shield's ribs and transverse.

I am leaving for the field tomorrow, for this is a field army, not one that lounges around in garrison producing ping-pong champions and collectors of first-edition comic books. The 250,000 soldiers of USAREUR are ready, day and night, to carry out their assignments. Their tanks and other combat vehicles are gassed up and ready to roll. Ammunition racks in every fighting machine are full.

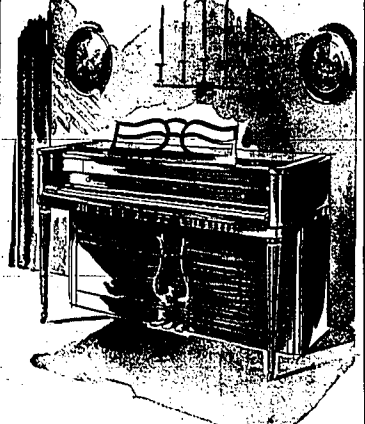

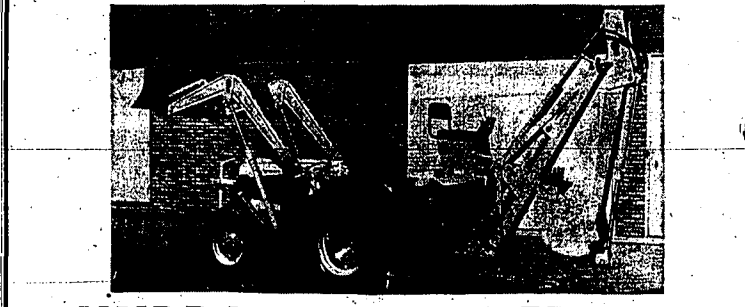

# Life in MAGIC VALLEY

When dealing with chicken feathers, most people think only of the easiest way to get rid of them. Not so with Mrs. Dale Smith, SHOSHONE, if she had her choice between the feathers and the bird, she'd take the feathers. She makes earrings from them and she has a collection of them. Mrs. Smith doesn't restrict herself to chicken feathers, she finds they are more adaptable to dying and are easier to handle in the delicate process of carrying, mounting, pinning, and displaying. Plain feathers, white feathers dyed to delicate pinks, yellows, blues, oranges, etc. are used. The feathers must be washed before they can be used. Mrs. Smith says that by putting them in a bag and then washing them in a tub, she makes them clean. She dries them under a screen and then begins the task of making earrings with scissors, glue, cork, bakelite and carrying beads.

For decoration, she uses either a contrasting color feather or rhinestones, glitter and pearls. The size of the earrings she makes varies from as large as four inches across, to as small as a half-dualar to an inch.

## Last Payment Made on City Hall, Other Projects Financed by 1946 Bond Issue

Payment of \$25,794 from the city of Twin Falls bond redemption fund, 1946 series, completed the last payment on the city hall, airport administration building and waterworks extension and sewer trunk line.

Construction of the city hall was completed in the fall of 1951 at a cost of \$155,284.

Landscape, sidewalks, air conditioning system and furnishings were additional. The airport administration building was completed in the spring of 1949 at a cost of \$80,545. The building alone, landscaping and furnishing the building added to the cost.

Twenty-year bonds totaling \$750,000 were set up to pay for the various projects. Money to redeem the bonds, plus interest, was raised through a mill levy that was 13 mills in 1947. During the following years the mill levy was reduced until it was seven mills during the city's 1955-56 fiscal year.

The seven mill levy was not needed in the 1956-57 fiscal year. The interest fund, however, a five mill levy was added to the 20-mill general fund levy, making 25 mills for the 1956-57 fiscal year. Two mills were added to the result was the same levy as last year by the city.

In increasing the 20-mill general levy to 25 mills, the city commission indicated the additional five mills were needed to pay for the increase in salary for the majority of city employees and to make up the difference of cash on hand and investments. Since 1947 the general mill levy had been 20 mills.

City Manager Joseph Lattimore says approximately half of the additional five-mill levy is needed to pay the 4.7 per cent increase in city employees. The wage increase was granted in view of rising living costs, Lattimore said.

The remaining one-half mill will be used to bring the 1956-57 cash on-hand at the start of the year up to the \$80,414 on hand at the start of the 1954-55 fiscal year.

Lattimore explained that cash on-hand at the start of the year is \$80,414.

Grain Figures Livestock
Show Hike in Week's Trade
CHICAGO, Aug. 18 (AP)—Most grains moved a little higher on the board of trade this week with soybeans showing a definite advance.

September corn and September soybeans scored gains running to more than three cents and the first of a series of gains for smaller grains. Oats firmed and a couple of new seasonal highs were made this week.

Wheat closed the week unchanged to higher, corn 1/2-3/4 higher, oats 1/4-1/2 higher, soybeans 1/2-3/4 higher, and cotton 1/2-3/4 higher.

In soybeans the short covering stemmed from worry over the amount now available for delivery in September. While the crop outlook is magnificent, it is still too early to say whether the crop will be a record.

Wheat production this year is estimated by the agriculture department at 41,000,000 bushels, an increase of 1,500,000 bushels from last year's 39,500,000 bushels.

Stock Market Edging Down In Last Week
NEW YORK, Aug. 18 (AP)—For the second straight week the stock market edged downward this week, thus placing a definite period between the previous run of high consecutive weekly advances.

### Demo Senate Hopefuls Get More Ballots

MOUNTAIN HOME, Aug. 18.—Clara Taylor picked up 45 votes and the opponent, Frank Church, add 38 from Elmore county's previously uncounted four precincts, according to unofficial figures released Friday by the office of James A. O'Neill, county auditor.

The other Democratic senatorial hopefuls, Claude Burrenshaw and Alvin McCormack, added only 19 and 4 votes, respectively. Church led in the unofficial county tabulations, 882 to 800 for Taylor.

On the Republican side, incumbent Herman Walker gained 12 votes while his opponent received none from the four precincts.

Other additional votes in the Democratic primary include: P. M. Birdline, 26, and John Reynolds, 24, D. S. representatives; B. W. Weathers, 81, state senator; Helen J. Miller, 87, state representative; Samuel Blackwell, 78, 2nd district county commissioner; Charles Sprittles, 23, John O'Daniel, 70, and Ernest Magliden, 2, 3rd district county commissioners; and W. Laumore, 23, probate judge.

Pilar Oyarzabal Brodshaw, 56, and Barbara Montrose, 17, county treasurer; Robert F. McLoughlin, 54, and Pearce Hall, 35, prosecuting attorney; and Val Berthelot, 85, county assessor.

James Budge gained 3 votes in his unopposed run for U. S. representative. Earl Winters, running for sheriff, added 4 votes, and Stanton Park, county surveyor, picked up 35 votes. All are Republicans.

There are still no available unofficial results for the non-partisan judicial election because of failure by the majority of precinct judges to tabulate the returns, according to the auditor's office. Results will not be available until after the official canvass.
