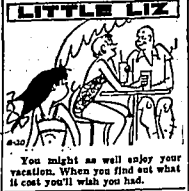

Tight Control Predicted for Loan Credits

NEW YORK, Aug. 20 (AP)—Business borrowing today is bumping the ceiling of the banks' ability to lend, and many Washington money managers are ready to see borrowing curbed rather than eased.

Some clamor for an easing of restrictions on funds to finance its record expansion program or to carry into effect its plan for making more loans. They contend that expansion will discourage the investment boom that has been going on since the war.

Other interest charges have started up again. Yields are up on government bonds, which are the benchmark for all other securities.

Yields have gone up on commercial paper, term notes of top ranking firms, and on bankers' acceptances, which are also the benchmark for all other securities.

Money managers' fears of new inflation aborning are being expressed in a variety of ways. Some are predicting a rise in the price of money, and others are predicting a rise in the price of goods.

Bachelor Avers Seven-Hour Workday Is Sufficient to Keep House for Family

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 20 (AP)—A bachelor schoolteacher claims he has proved that it requires only a seven-hour workday to care for a family of four children and do all the washing, ironing, cooking, baking, housecleaning, bathing and disciplining.

Maurice K. Engshausen, 36, a man of great courage, took a dare and found out what it is like to run a home.

His tale came about after Engshausen, who teaches at Sau Rapids, Minn., read a Minneapolis Tribune story of a young mother who wrote a letter to the paper, saying, "any woman who is in that many hours is awfully plain inefficient."

He offered to prove his point by keeping house for a family. The Tribune arranged for him to take over for three days at the Minneapolis home of the Robert Daltons, both of the original story.

So, armed with nothing more than his theories and bravery, Engshausen moved into the Dalton house and told the parents to take it easy, that he was there to do all the housework and child tending.

When the stint was over, Engshausen chuckled victoriously. "I still with teaching is a surfer were as easy as handling four children and a house."

Mrs. Dalton, previously more than a little skeptical, praised him. "I'm cooking, he did better than I do," she commented with a gleam in her eye.

Some of that is unnecessary. He certainly fit beautifully in our family, and the kids were sorry to see him go. He's so methodical. The only thing he forgot was to wind his watch.

"And he knew just where to find everything—the soap in the basement and the pliers on the rear of the refrigerator top."

Engshausen finished his work load in 20 hours over the three days. Here is a part of what he did just the first day:

Washed three loads of clothes and hung them outdoors to dry.

Cleaned all the laundry, including underwear and sheets, which Mrs. Dalton got from him.

Baked two cakes, neither from commercial mix.

Prepared two salads to be eaten the next day.

Fixed a soup and sandwich lunch and a big supper which he served in the back yard.

Bathed Mary, 6, Mary, 3, and Robbie, 2, at the same time. Timmy, 7, escaped when he heard water running low.

Washed the woodwork.

Undressed the children for their naps, and dressed them again when they awakened.

Borrowed socks for the cokes from a next door neighbor "who heeds as though she thought she had better humor me."

Disciplined the children mildly.

Scrubbed the kitchen floor—at a p. m.

Believe in letting things go until tomorrow.

Believe in the laundry, including Timmy's hair, 10 pennies for a gift.

Mary told him, "I really love you," as she climbed onto his lap.

And Robbie let him do everything for him, from feeding to a diaper change.

Engshausen says his efficiency stems from the fact he has kept house himself for seven years and did housework to earn money while a college senior.

"My mind works like a clock and is full of pigeon holes like a desk, in which planned thoughts are filed, to be used later," he says.

The Daltons considered his stay "wonderful."

So he was. A lot of hog houses are air conditioned these days. And so are a lot of cow barns, and even chicken coops, according to the Conditioning and Refrigeration Institute.

The University of Missouri made some notes not long back and found that air-conditioned cows give about two to four times more milk a day than their sisters suffering from the heat.

A cartoon in one paper "quoted" one cow saying to another: "What we need is bigger buckets," meaning "there will we put all the extra milk."

According to the air coolers, bacterial play-a-long soon will have air-conditioned dairies. The original cool off a few high-headed managers, also.

In some places in the South, side-walks are being air conditioned. A lot of things has not yet come to humid Washington. When July and August are over, the humidity will be in place to hit is the White House—open five mornings a week for us hot tourists.

Why We Call It... Kootenai

Editor's Note: This is one of a series of stories on the origin of the colorful and sometimes unusual names of places and things in Idaho and Utah.

The name Kootenai is a familiar one in northern Idaho. It has been given to a river which flows south from Canada, where the stream's name is spelled Kootenay. It has been given to a small community north of Sandpoint in Bonner county, to the county of which Coeur d'Alene is the seat.

Kootenai is the name of an Indian tribe which lived in the area now part of British Columbia north of the Idaho boundary. Some historians give its original spelling as "Kootenai."

The name means "water people" and was given to the Indians because they virtually lived on the water.

The original Kootenai county embraced an area now split into four counties—Kootenai, Boundary, Bonner and Blaine.

The town of Kootenai once was a farming community of 1,000. It was a supply point to areas to the north. But in 1932 the Great Northern railroad moved on to Bonner County and townspeople and businesses followed.

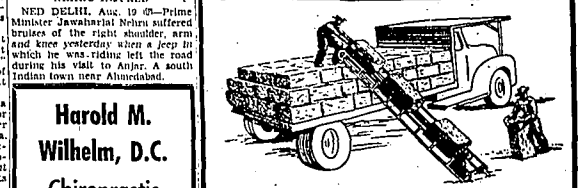

STEVENS' VICTORY

Adlai Stevenson's successful quest for a second Democratic nomination... 1956 both major parties will present the face of moderation to the American people.

All the solid indications of the nation's mood today suggest that this is the way the people want to be. Nominating conventions may be cumbersome, confusing, talky and often painfully dragged out affairs.

Beginning with his series of late spring trips to Oregon, Florida and California, Stevenson demonstrated unmistakably that he was the choice of his party for a second try at the White House.

On top of this, from the politician's viewpoint, Stevenson had the virtue of being a unifying factor in his party. His moderation on many counts makes him acceptable to both the southern and northern wings.

Gov. Averell Harriman of New York, the only major contender still in the field at convention time, had no such acceptability. As an exponent of militant neo-fair deal programs, an advocate of more drastic action on civil rights, it was believed he could not carry his party.

Despite arguments by former President Truman and others that Mr. Eisenhower has now emptied the middle of the road and left Democrats no choice but to move to other zones, the delegates at Chicago decided their party should contest the President in the center.

Eisenhower's DARING... The word "daring" is apt to apply to the two presidential voters, one to end costly subsidies to private and public power interests negotiated during the Truman administration and the other to kill the public works bill.

HOPEFUL SIGN... Washington is gratified that the men at Moscow seem unwilling to precipitate what might flare into a World War III over the Suez canal. Indeed, the present situation is expected to remain basic Russian policy for many, many years.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The reasons given by Harry B. Tucker in supporting Gov. Averell Harriman as the Democratic presidential nominee have been bemoaned in favor of the former.

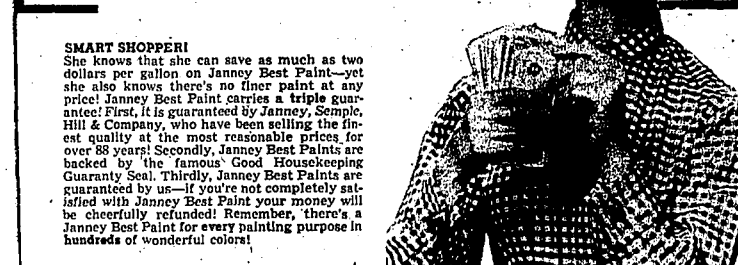

San Francisco, Aug. 20 (AP)—Gov. J. Bracken Lee of Utah, chief of the administration's foreign policy and school aid program, climbed aboard the Eisenhower bandwagon today.

Lee, in a statement for Eisenhower's re-nomination, he told newsmen, "who also is 'diok'."

"I disagree with some of the things that have been done, but I'm certainly going to support the party," he said.

He said the Utah delegation was almost solid for Eisenhower and that President Nixon, whom he described as the party's strongest candidate.

The delegates endorsed both party leaders at their first conference caucus yesterday.

Lee said there was no difference between the Republican's foreign aid program and the Democrat's. He stated that the administration is giving away money in economic aid and interfering with the nations that are being helped.

The outspoken Utah governor has asked the supreme court to declare the foreign aid program unconstitutional. He refused to pay a portion of his 1955 income tax on the grounds some of it went out for foreign aid. The government got the money, anyway—from his tax.

"I came in without a trial and took the money," he declared. "I was guilty before any chance to prove I was innocent."

He explained that federal agents seized up his assets.

Lee also took a stand against federal aid for schools, maintaining that it would lead to eventual control of the school system by the federal government.

At the Utah delegates' caucus, they voted against operating under the unit rule, leaving each delegate to cast his ballot on candidates and issues as he wished.

As a result, a motion to bind the delegation to Eisenhower was modified to an endorsement of both Eisenhower and Nixon. The motion was offered by Golden Buttes, Logan and Murphy by George Jefferson, Milford, who said the group should "pin Harold Stassen's ears down."

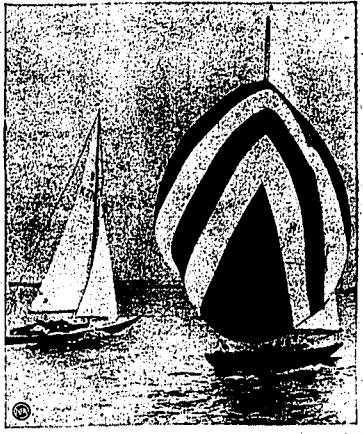

According to a military spokesman, Mau Mau guerrillas were broken up and their ranks are chopped down almost daily as they surrender or are becoming wearied of forest life," the spokesman said. "Many are captured while on route to their hideout jobs."

12 More Killed

Last month 12 Mau Mau guerrillas were killed, 31 captured and 97 surrendered.

Stassen's Poll Shows Nixon Is Loss to Ike

ISLANDIA, Aug. 20 (AP)—Making public the results of his promised new, nationwide poll, Harold Stassen said Saturday it showed President Eisenhower would lose 4,500,000 votes in November with Vice President Richard Nixon on the Republican ticket.

The presidential aide, on leave for his "dump Nixon" drive, spoke at a crowded news conference at the Fairmont hotel just a few minutes after Nixon received a tumultuous traffic-stopping reception at the Mark Hopkins hotel, across the street.

The Fairmont will be headquarters for the Republican National convention which opens here today.

Stassen said the new survey was conducted during the period Aug. 10-13 and was predicated on an assumed 60 million vote turnout in the November election. Stassen said it showed:

1. Disregarding any vice presidential nominee, Eisenhower would get 29,000,000 votes or 49.8 per cent and Democratic candidate Adlai Stevenson, 21,900,000, or 36.6 per cent.
2. With Nixon as the vice presidential nominee, Eisenhower would get 27,000,000 or 45.7 of the vote and Stevenson 23,800,000 or 39.3 per cent.
3. With "some Republican other than Nixon" holding the No. 2 spot, Eisenhower would receive 26,800,000 and Stevenson 20,640,000.
4. With 8 per cent of the Eisenhower vote nationwide is lost when the name is combined with Vice President Nixon's name—a total of 2,340,000 votes," Stassen said.

Death Shroud Will Be Cape Of 'Dracula'

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 20 (AP)—Bela Lugosi will go to his grave wrapped in the black cape of "Dracula," the horror character in which he scored the greatest triumph of his long motion picture career.

The 73-year-old stage and screen actor, whose weird roles brought shudders to theater-goers for more than 30 years, was found dead in his home Thursday night.

After making a name for himself as a romantic actor in his native Hungary, Lugosi came to the United States in 1921.

His success in the two-year Broadway run of "Dracula" marked him for the rest of his career as a purveyor of evil characters.

He began his movie career in 1931, appearing in such pictures as "White Zombie," "The Black Cat," "The Son of Frankenstein" and, of course, "Dracula."

Only last year he estranged himself from a web as horrible as any of his movie plots—narcotics addiction.

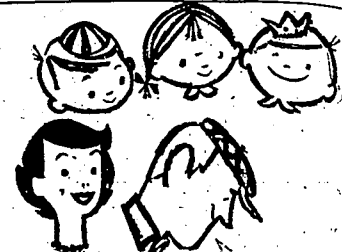

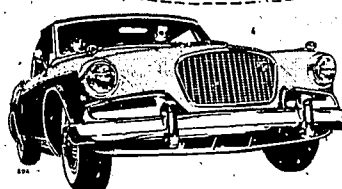
