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# Jury Indicts Firm In Work Start on Dam for Canyon

Idaho Power Company was indicted by an Oregon grand jury Tuesday for starting construction of Brownlee dam without a license from Oregon hydroelectric commission. Al Grant, attorney for Idaho Power company, immediately asked that the company be discharged. Circuit Judge F. L. Hubbard said he might decide the case this week.

The indictment, issued in Baker, Ore., was dated July 27 and returned against the utility in the same case. The first, dated May 24, was returned to the jury for robbing at the request of Atty. Gen. Robert V. Thorpe.

J. E. Roach, president of Idaho Power, said in Boise the firm's attorney believes it is "adhering strictly to laws affecting interstate, navigable streams such as the Snake river." He said the company would proceed with construction of the dam, the first of the country, and has been authorized to build in the Idaho canyon reach of the Snake river by the federal power commission.

Roach said the Baker county action was "openly instigated" by the small group of hard-core advocates of federal power, who are "contagiously" spreading their dam in the same stretch of the river. "He said these elements were attempting to delay or prevent any further major hydroelectric development in the northwest except by a federal government."

The maximum penalty under the charge against the company is a fine of \$100,000 and six months in jail. "The company has done everything in its power voluntarily to comply with all requirements by applying for a state license, and we believe the company has done nothing to conflict with any applicable provisions of Oregon law," Roach said.

The application has been pending before the Oregon hydroelectric commission for several years, and public hearings on the dam were held on Jan. 20, 1956, in Baker.

All view of a present power shortage in the company's own service area and a threatened one throughout the Pacific northwest, Roach said. He said the dam would be built in the state of Idaho, and he has postponed the completion of the project an additional year or more.

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# Stassen Abandons Anti-Nixon Drive, Nomination Is Set

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 22 (U.P.)—President Eisenhower today clinched renomination for Vice President Nixon with a dramatic announcement that Harold G. Stassen had abandoned his drive for "Eisenhower" from the Republican ticket. Eisenhower said Stassen personally had told him he now is convinced "the great mass of the delegates" at the GOP national convention want Nixon as the vice presidential nominee. The President gave this word to a precedent-shattering, nationally televised news conference held in San Francisco 12 hours before the convention moved into the formalities of naming him and Nixon as the GOP ticket.

The news met the newsmen at the "temporary White House" set up in the plush St. Francis hotel. The President's press secretary, Paul Taylor, said he had just received a visit from Stassen.

Eisenhower recalled that he previously had called for an open convention with the delegates free to fill the No. 2 spot. He added that both he and Nixon still feel that way about it.

His position, Eisenhower added, is that anyone of "national stature" would be acceptable to him. He said he had no objection to the President's two major nominees during the past year, he said he had hoped all would be elected. He said he was sure that a younger man than he is. # Church Is Winner in Official Ballots Count

BOISE, Aug. 22 (U.P.)—Boise Frank Church won what appeared doomed to be a disputed victory over former Sen. Glen Taylor yesterday in their race for the Democratic senatorial nomination. Official canvasses from all 44 of the state's counties, as tabulated by the Associated Press, gave Church a margin of 170 votes. The totals: Church 7,347; Taylor 27,777. Taylor said he would concede nothing until after the state board of canvassers goes over the county canvasses on Saturday. If he is the loser, he said, he will ask for a recount.

The state will face Sen. Herman Walker in the November general election. The race had been between the two candidates for the early hours of last Wednesday night. Church forced into an early count of about 1,000 votes Tuesday night but Taylor passed him and was ahead when the last of the unofficial returns came in.

Discovery last Friday of errors in Canyon county in southwestern Idaho gave Church his biggest boost among the official canvasses, letting him 168 votes. Others gave him smaller gains and some helped Taylor.

George Greenfield, Boise, state Democratic chairman, has asked if he would step up to the candidates if a recount was to be held. Church carried 80 counties including many of those in the northern panhandle and all but one in southwestern Idaho, where Taylor was defeated.

Chapman, who acted in the senate from 1944-46, was defeated for re-nomination in 1950 by the late Dr. Worth Clark. He won the nomination in 1954 over Taylor, who was defeated in 1954 general election by Ben. Henry G. Dreyfus.

# Trio Is Killed, 3 Are Hurt by Craft Crackup

PALM BEACH AIR FORCE BASE, Fla., Aug. 22 (U.P.)—Three crewmen were killed and three critically injured last night when a C-124 troop transport crashed and burned while attempting an emergency landing.

Air force officials were not certain how three of the crew members survived the crash, but they said the plane was "almost miraculously" landed.

Apparently they were hurled free of the fuselage, then smashed into a field, then rushed to a hospital by an unidentified civilian, one official said.

Two of the other bodies were recovered from the wreckage and a third was found in a field near the crash scene. The identity of the crewmen was withheld pending notification of next kin.

Three injured, all suffering from severe burns, were flown to Brooke Army medical center at San Antonio. One of the injured was in critical condition. An army burn specialist accompanied the flight.

Statistics from Chicago indicate that the polio vaccine amazingly protected those who received doses. Of the city's 476,000 residents under age 20 who had at least one shot, only 71, only one out of every 31,687 was stricken by the paralytic polio.

There was a whispered echo, too, of a world and a way of life gone as surely as though in some great convulsion. Of all about him, only the old man had not changed and was not yet gone. His farewell address, the old man called it, as his eyes rested over the chosen of the party he once had led.

The many younger among them started. They knew the name but not the man. The old-timers smiled and encouragement. Veterans who had known him when claimed rank by comparing on this or that occasion when the old man had stood before them in the past.

"Safeguard human freedom," the old man was saying, and from down the years the whispered echoes came in many tongues. The soft, American accents of a mother whose infant had been warmed and fed.

### Hoover Notes U.S. Freedom As Main Issue

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 22 (AP)—Former President Herbert Hoover warned cheering Republicans last night that the biggest issue in America today is the encroachment of government against the freedom of men.

He urged adoption of a new Republican declaration of principles, a "full tone," pledging safeguards for freedom against the threats not only of alien philosophies but also of the government.

The old man of the grand old party at 82 was making his third "farewell" appearance before a Republican national convention. His appearance touched off thunderous applause and brought the convention roaring to life.

The delegates not only cheered but promptly obliged it. They incorporated in the preamble to the party's 1936 platform just such a pledge as he sought.

Mr. Hoover warned both Republicans and Democrats against party excesses. He said loyalty to America must always be the great of loyalty to party. He said the two party system is one of the great defenses of freedom.

He even conceded that Democrats in some time have served freedom's cause. And he said he did not despair of the future.

"My faith arises from the genius of our people, their devotion to personal liberty and their sustaining religious beliefs," Mr. Hoover asserted. "If the American are shielded, there will be no decline and fall in American civilization."

After three involving divine guidance, the old man was through. And the convention, which had given him a six-minute ovation when he stepped from the podium, applauded and cheered, this time for four minutes.

# Monday Is Deadline to Cast Ballots on Spud Referendum

Potato growers in Idaho are reminded that ballots in the referendum on the proposed amendment to the federal marketing agreement and order program must be received at the Portland office of the department of agriculture by Aug. 21.

County agent C. W. Dalgh said that voters in the Snake River valley have been mailed to all potato producers of record along with self-addressed envelopes for mailing ballot. Those failing to receive ballots may obtain them at the county extension office.

All producers who harvested and marketed potatoes from July 1, 1955, to June 30, 1956, are eligible to vote. Owners, operators, renters and landlords who receive potatoes as rent are entitled as producers.

Partnerships, estates, corporations and other multiple ownerships are allowed one vote.

Dalgh reviewed the major amendments. The first will extend authority to cover shipment of potatoes within the production area while the present authority is limited to shipments from the production area to outside points.

The second would authorize regulation of potatoes differently for different areas and types of containers. Another would increase the membership of the committee by adding a grower and a handler member to the upper Snake River valley which is a grower to district three, and a handler to district four.

The fourth would authorize establishment of "regional" and "maximum" assessment remains unchanged. Dugh said. The last major amendment would terminate the time an inspection certificate may be considered valid.

The other amendments are concerned with definitions, nominations, procedures, accounting and other changes designed to improve the operation of the marketing order.

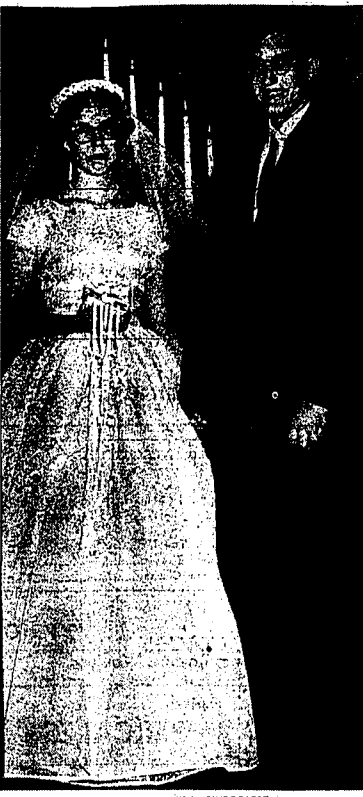

**Care of Your Children By ANGELO PATRI**

"It is yours? For what? No fooling? Gee. What did I give to have something that was mine, nobody's? In my house everybody owns everything, even your sweater!"

"But doesn't your mother say anything?"

"No. If you squawk she says, 'Now he's your brother, or your sister, and that's that. You never know if you have anything. And you got a whole kit of tools with your name on it!'"

Once a boy or girl reaches his or her early teens, he begins to feel he is "One" a part of the family but "One" by himself, to add to his feeling of important personality, he wants to own things. Anything, so long as it is something he likes and wants for his own. It may be a dog, a coat (these are line pets and very useful if one has the place for them); it may be a bookshelf bearing his name and his own books. Maybe it is a toy, maybe a tool. Whatever it may be, he needs to own it and his ownership is to be respected.

Respect for the property of others is rooted in respect for one's own. The child who has never owned anything personally, but who shared all his possessions with the family in common, is not likely to respect his neighbors' belongings, but use them as he has been in the habit of using those of the family. Thereby trouble is born.

To instill a respect for the belongings of others in a child, give him a chance to own something and respect his ownership. That means do not take his things without asking permission, returning them with a "thank you," when finished with them. That pleases a child, adds to his feeling of importance to the family and to himself, and it teaches him to respect the belongings of others.

Once a visiting child took a look out of my hand and began using it herself.

"That wasn't just the thing to do. Duany. You should have asked me to lend you my tool for a minute and said 'Please.'"

"My mother never asks me. She just takes my carpet sweeper and uses it."

"Well, don't say, 'Gimme that thing,' and snatch it as you just did. Say 'Please, may I have your scratcher tool?' and 'Thank you.' Certainly. With pleasure." and hand it to you. You will use it and return it and say, 'Thank you.'"

So we went through this performance over and over, to her great delight, until I was willing to forget the whole thing.

Years afterward, when this child had grown to be a young woman, she told me that she never forgot that game and that she was teaching her children the same lesson. Good manners breed good morals.

All children develop annoying habits from time to time, but they can be overcome by substituting a good habit instead. Let's illustrate how to do this in his bedtime. "Now, how many times do you read a story and go to bed?"

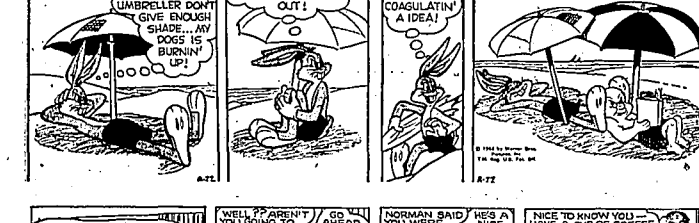
