Crowds Jam Jerome and Cassia Grounds Today as Both Counties Open Fairs

Crowds of spectators and exhibitors swarmed over the Jerome and Cassia county fairsgrounds Thursday morning as the two exhibitions opened their gates on the 1956 agricultural efforts of the residents of the two counties. Officials at both fairs at Jerome and Burley reported the crowds were among the largest ever to attend first days at the fairs.

The temperature at both fairsgrounds stood in the 90's and the sun beat down from a nearly cloudless sky. On schedule, the judges at both exhibitions bent to the task of appraising champions and reserve champions and reserve champions had been selected by noon.

In the 4-H show fitting and showing contest, Karen Lanning, Jerome, was named grand champion and Kay Bryan, Jerome, reserve champion. In the 4-H horse and colt fitting and showing contest, Loy Overman, Jerome, was declared champion and Diane Mattson, Nampa, reserve champion. Danny Byers, Elice, was champion in the 4-H pig fitting and showing contest and Burton Schutte, Jerome, was reserve champion.

John Paulson, Fairfield, was awine judge. Clarence Bechtold, Canyon county, was beef judge and Clarence Wheeler, Hulett, judged the horses and poultry.

While both fairsgrounds were jammed with spectators, there actually was little activity. Most of the spectators were grouped around the various judging arena, carefully watching the judges as ribbons were awarded.

Food and concession booths were in operation in deference to the high temperatures, those serving cooling drinks received a big play. The carnivals at both exhibitions were in full swing Thursday morning.

Officials at the Jerome fair said there were more entries this year than in any previous years. For example, entries in the sheep division were up by 50 per cent, they said.

At Burley, the 4-H style review was the primary morning event and the afternoon 4-H girls projects were featured.

GOP Foreign Policy Planks Under Attack

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23 (AP)—Senators Mansfield, D. Wood, and McNamara, in separate resolutions committee, today attacked GOP foreign policy ideas proposed for the national convention as unworkable.

Red China Fires On Nava Plane; 16 Men Missing

TAIPEI, Formosa, Aug. 23 (AP)—Peiping radio said today that Communist Chinese fighter planes "downed" an aircraft in the same area where a U. S. Navy Martin Mercator plane is missing off the China coast with 16 men aboard.

The U. S. air force sent F-86 Sabrejets from Formosa to fly cover for the search group and a spokesman said the plane crashed in the sea. "We've got a business out there," he said. "No communist air force planes were sighted. The navy ordered search intensified" after the plane crashed. U. S. Will Halt Stream of Aid in Egypt Row

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23 (AP)—The United States has halted the normal flow of foreign aid technicians to Egypt and has taken steps to hold up delivery of some 20 million dollars worth of heavy transportation equipment.

Railroads Eye Rate Hikes to Help Business

NEW YORK, Aug. 23 (AP)—Freight and passenger rate hikes are just two of the many things the railroads look to today to help them make their share of the transportation business pay.

Competition with the trucks, buses, auto barges and planes has opened new ideas in trains, tracks and services. This is partly to cut costs, partly to win or hold customers, and partly to prepare for the expected major increase in transportation demands in the next few years.

James M. Symes, president of the Pennsylvania railroad, predicts that freight traffic between the nation's cities will increase by 40 per cent in ten years. If the rails hold their present percentage of the freight trade, they'll be hauling 100 billion tons more of freight a year.

Public interest has been caught by new styles in trains: New York Central's all aluminum streamliners; Pennsylvania's tubular steel train, 40 per cent lighter than old style ones; Santa Fe's two-level train with passengers sitting four feet higher than in conventional coaches; Southern Pacific's and Burlington's two-level commuter coaches; Pullman company's interchangeable "slumbercoaches" which carry 62 coach passengers or can be converted quickly into sleeper accommodations for 31.

Freight cars are being changed, too. Chesapeake and Ohio has a combination truck and box car with two sets of wheels—one for use on highways, the other for use on railway tracks.

A radioactive box car is planned. Foods to be preserved through irradiation would be rolled through it on a conveyor belt and then loaded in other cars.

Yards have been redesigned and mechanized for speedier movement. Pullman, Morse of Chicago has a new railroad truck load scale which will handle up to 400 tons, using the job electronically.

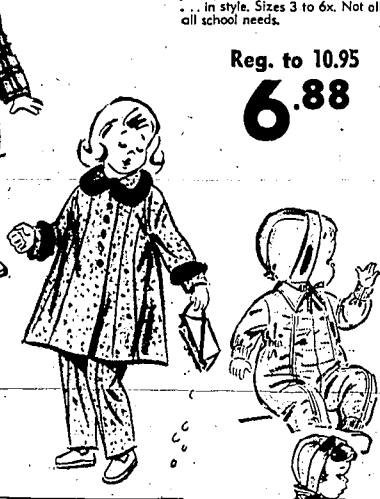

New Radiation Aids in Saving Food and Meat

UNIVERSITY, Park, Pa., Aug. 23 (AP)—An army doctor forecast yesterday that housewives will soon be able to store fresh meat and other perishables at room temperature on open shelves—thanks to atomic energy.

Dr. Herman F. Kraybill, director of the medical nutrition laboratory of the Pennsylvania Army hospital, Denver, Colo., said food exposed to certain types of atomic radiation can be sterilized and preserved for long periods of time.

He told the fifth annual Pennsylvania health conference at Pennsylvania State university the atomic rays do not harm the food. He said the foods have a nutritive value equal to, or sometimes better than, those given conventional heat processing.

Dr. Kraybill said the defense department since 1954 has been coordinating the over-all effort in research in "radiation-protection."

He hailed the studies as "an important advance in the penetrating use of atomic energy and will introduce revolutionary and important changes in food technological development."

The delegates laughed again.

Reporters swarmed toward Carpenter in the Nebraska delegation. Martin didn't know Joe Smith from Adam Smith, but he knew a disturbing influence when it reared its ugly head. He told the sergeant-at-arms to break up the traffic jam.

"Get Joe Smith out of here, we've got to get on with this convention," he said.

Reporters did get to Carpenter, however. He told them a number of things:

Joe Smith was a "very prominent citizen of Terrytown. He was a Republican in good standing." He was "believed because he is 'used'."

Carpenter even gave the guy's telephone number.

"This," said Carpenter, "is going to come as a real surprise to Joe."

But in the actual balloting Carpenter deserted his creation. He didn't vote against him—he just passed. When the roll call was over, however, he had the vote recorded for Nixon, making it unanimous for the vice president.

None of all this amused Martin—who has refused to let Joe's name go before the convention—or Mrs. Abel. She said she expected something like this from Carpenter because "he's unpredictable."

Carpenter went on reporting why he had wanted to nominate Joe Smith. He said "the least we can do is to create in the minds of the people that this is a free and open convention."

"If this is an open convention," he said, "I'll have an opportunity to nominate Joe Smith."

Enterprising reporters who called the number given by Carpenter got Carpenter's wife in Scottbluff. She said she was proud of her husband—"of everything he does."

Enterprising reporters who scoured Terrytown for Joe Smith couldn't find him.

But Joe Smith supporters were rallying. As he sat there in the midst of his unending colleagues of the Nebraska delegation, Carpenter got a flock of telegrams from TV viewers and listeners.

At the time, he said "we are for Joe Smith. . . nomination finest thing you ever did."

As the delegation left, a lawyer named Joe Smith accepted the nomination with thanks. A New Yorker

wired that Carpenter should have nominated himself—now for vice president but for president.

After Martin had canvassed Republican party bigwigs sitting back—asked to find out if there was such a person—at least a nominatable person—as Joe Smith, Carpenter got around to admitting:

"There is no Joe Smith. Joe Smith is a symbol. I was out to prove whether this was an open or closed convention."

After Joe's 1,232-10-0 defeat, a reporter asked Carpenter what he would do next.

"I think," he said, "that I will now retire with Joe Smith."

Arizona State To Close Case In River Fight

ST. FRANCISCO, Aug. 23 (AP)—The state of Arizona revealed today that it has closed its case in the Colorado river water suit after 10 weeks of presenting evidence.

Arizona Attorney John P. Frank said he needed only a few minutes this morning to "knock up" on a few points before formally resting.

The trial began 12 weeks ago in Phoenix. Arizona's case was heard by U.S. Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas, who is presiding over the case. However, Rife had recused himself for a total of two weeks because of his close relationship with the U. S. supreme court in a move to establish title to 3,000,000 annual acre feet of Colorado river water.

California countered with a claim for 5,263,000 acre feet. There is not enough water in the river to satisfy the claims of both states.

The supreme court ordered Rife to file his case and to recommend a verdict.

After Arizona rested its case, California was expected to present arguments on motions to strike some of the documents presented by Arizona.

The documents included the "blue book," a report on the Colorado river water project by the U. S. bureau of reclamation.

Norfolk City, California attorney, told Rife that California would not seek to dismiss Arizona's suit. He said the reason is the state has the chance to present "its side of the story."

However, he said he would move to have the United States government, also a party to the suit, present its case before California. If Rife should deny that motion, he said he is prepared to open California's case Monday.

In yesterday's session, Arizona recalled to the stand Roger Trippe, a mechanical water engineer and one of its principal witnesses.

Arizona Attorney Theodor Kienast said he has further direct questioning on computations he had made regarding the water supply of the Colorado river.

California declined to cross-examine him, but David R. Arner, an attorney for the U. S. government, cross-examined Trippe briefly to clarify technical points.

Cyclist Not Hurt In Vehicle Crash

A Twin Falls resident escaped serious injury Wednesday despite a collision with his motorcycle which was traveling east on the main highway west of Twin Falls.

The car driven by Duane E. Boltons, route one, Kimberly, and motorcycle driven by Sidney W. Ruppel, route one, Twin Falls, collided in the 300 block of Addison avenue west at 8 p.m. Wednesday.

Police said the Boltons car, going west, was turning left into the Bob Green Five Points west service station when it collided with the motorcycle which was traveling east.

Ruppel was thrown over the hood of the car, striking his elbow when he landed. He got up and around the car in time to stop his runaway motorcycle which was circling with the motor on and the throttle partially open.

Damage to the front bumper, right fender, hood, grill and aerial of the car was estimated at \$75 while damage to the motorcycle seat, gas tank, front fender, front tire and fork was set at \$175.

But the vice president's main concern was not over his nomination but for his 77-year-old father, Frank Nixon, who lay near death in a dimly lighted room of the family home.

Shortly after learning of his nomination, Nixon received news that his father, although still critical, was "much better."

Reynolds defeated P. M. Stuefgen of Pocatello for nomination to the seat now held by Rep. Hamer Budget, Jr., Ida.

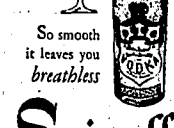
Mercury Switches Discussed at Meet

Huge Backlog For Power on File With U.S.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23 (AP)—Applications on file with the federal power commission would bring an additional 3,700,000 kilowatts of energy to about 15 times the output of Grand Coulee dam.

A check of the commission's files showed that many of the projects involved in pending proposals for projects in or bordering Oregon and Washington.

The proposals are in various forms. Some are applications for preliminary permits, which merely give the holder priority to a site while making engineering and financial studies. Others are in preliminary permits already granted, which some have reached the stage of construction.

The overall power potential involved is of about 12,740 kilowatts represented by similar requests on the books last October. The difference, however, is offset largely by construction licenses issued by the commission in the last 10 months.

Stassen Tries To Repair His Party Career

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23 (AP)—Harold G. Stassen today tried to repair his political career after the wrecked "dump Nixon" campaign of the Republican national convention. Stassen appeared confident he could put himself back in the good graces of the party even though his fight against the renomination of Vice President Richard M. Nixon was a total failure and drew criticism and even ridicule from GOP leaders. He said he would be back in his White House post as Mr. Eisenhower's ambassador to the United Kingdom on Monday to resume his three-year leave of absence from the job before the GOP convention began to have a free hand in pushing his "dump Nixon" move.

There had been speculation that Stassen would voluntarily resign or be requested to go so if he failed to prevent Nixon's renomination. But he told reporters yesterday, "I have never divorced myself from the job."

Mr. Eisenhower backed him up on this point.

"He has never left it, except to take leave," Mr. Eisenhower told a press conference when asked if Stassen would be allowed to resume his position.

While House Republicans were wavering, the question remained: Would Stassen be allowed to remain high and secure in the President's official family after bucking Nixon?

From the very start of his drive against Nixon, there were reports from administration sources that even if Stassen did remain in his cabinet-level job, he would be considered political isolation by having his authority reduced and being given less and less to do.

Stassen started his efforts to get back in line with the party by formally abandoning his fight against Nixon and then going before the convention yesterday to accept Nixon's nomination "with humility and fortuitousness."

Cost of Living Goes Upward In Coast Area

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23 (AP)—The cost of living continued to upward trend during July in the major cities on the Pacific coast, reaching new highs in Los Angeles and Portland, according to the U. S. department of labor.

In Los Angeles, the retail price level climbed to an all-time peak of 118.1, 0.6 per cent higher than the month before and 1.9 per cent above the July a year ago. The price level has been rising slowly but steadily since last February.

Retail prices in Portland reached a new high of 118.6, 1.9 per cent above that for April 1956. When the index was last priced, and 2.4 per cent above that for July of last year.

San Francisco food prices, which have been on the increase since last February, rose by 0.7 per cent to 113—the highest since June 1954 when it also was 113. The all-time peak was 117.0 in April 1952.

Battle housewives also paid more for identical food purchases last July than at any time since September 1952. At 115.0, the index of food prices in July was 1.2 per cent above that for June and 1.4 per cent above that for July a year ago.

Idahoan Is Killed By Road Mishap

CALDWELL, Aug. 23 (AP)—A 31-year-old Caldwell laborer, Alfredo Morin, was killed in an auto accident west of here last night boosting the county's 1956 highway fatality toll to four within two days. The death raised the total 1956 county toll to 11 and brought to 157 the number of persons killed on all public highways in Idaho this year.

There were 106 deaths on the state's roads through Aug. 23 of last year.

Officers said Morin, a resident of the Caldwell labor camp, was killed instantaneously his convertible slid off to the left side of state highway 25 and plunged into a borrow pit. County Coroner John Alvin said the victim died of a broken neck.

Edward Gonzalez, 26, Nampa, a passenger in the car, was uninjured.

"They had no special gimmicks like some of the states, but as each man was nominated, the delegation produced the proper signs and pictures and whooped it up with the delegates from other states.

"It was like New Year's eve," one of the Idaho delegates said.

Gov. Robert E. Smylie, chairman of the delegation, cast the state's 14 votes for Eisenhower and Nixon.

Republican Avers Tax Cuts Coming

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23 (AP)—Former Gov. Dan Thornton of Colorado told the Republican convention today that "all" Americans can look forward to tax cuts during the next four years.

Thornton made the prediction in an address prepared for delivery to the Republican national convention in which he answered charges made at the Democratic convention last week.

He said the Democrats claimed that "Republicans deny tax relief to middle and low income families."

"The truth is our people—all of our people—not just a few, have

lower taxes across the board, and they're going to be lowered some more in the next four Republican years," he said.

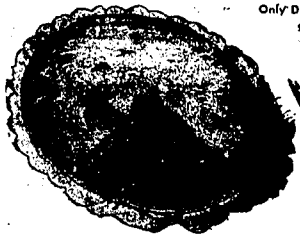

Mining Laws Changes Are Given Praise

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22 (AP)—A law passed by the 84th congress carries the most significant change in the mining laws since the first general mining law of 1872, Representative Engle, D. Calif., said yesterday.

The law is the multiple surface-use act. Engle said in a report on activities of the house interior committee, of which he is chairman.

"Put succinctly," he said, "it operates to amend historic law so as to permit the use of the surface and the subsurface of the same tracts of public lands for pre-patent prospecting and mining activity at the same time management and utilization of forestry products, forage crops, grazing, fish and wildlife, wilderness, water, scenic and related resources go forward."

"His provisions," he added, "will also insure that existence of a mining claim cannot, prior to patenting, be used to block access to adjacent lands—all without limiting or interfering with prospecting and mining activities on the claim proper."

Among other important mineral legislation passed by the 84th congress, Engle noted the mining claim restoration act. This opens to entry approximately seven million acres of public land, all in the West which had been withdrawn for power development.

"His enactment is one more legislative step in the drive to encourage search for, and development of, the strategic and critical domestic minerals and materials resources so vital to our economy," Engle said.

Librarian Puzzled Over Missing Volumes

Librarian Decides Local Patrons Are Stealing Wholesale From Themselves

"People are stealing from themselves, wholesale," is the conclusion reached by City Librarian Arthur DeVolder after completing only a fraction of an inventory of the Twin Falls public library.

So far DeVolder and his staff are only to the 2's in fiction shelves but exactly 200 books are missing. At this rate, DeVolder says he can expect the loss of 1,100 books from all the library collections in fiction, non-fiction and reference material.

The average price paid by the library for each book is \$3. DeVolder computed to replace all missing would approximate \$420, which is \$700 less than this year's budget for purchasing.

This loss is recorded in a little more than one year, DeVolder pointed out. The last inventory was taken in April and May, 1955.

DeVolder planned to begin his inventory toward the first of the year and keep it on a year to year basis. But when the city directory was taken DeVolder decided to see just how far the public had gone.

Impetus was added on Aug. 11 when a small cloth-bound mystery book was received from the Oregon highway department. An accompanying letter reported the book was recovered by a maintenance crew which was "cleaning debris" along a highway near Eugene.

Another adverse jolt was received when a family left Twin Falls, taking 13 duly withdrawn books with them. Investigation turned up the fact several appliance and furniture dealers also were left "holding the bag."

"It's hard to understand why people would take books when they have 28 days in which to read and return all withdrawals without fine."

DeVolder said, "But," he added, "I don't believe all these books were lost but are lying on someone's shelf forgotten. I would like to ask everyone who has used the library to check their private book collections and see if they haven't overlooked a library book."

DeVolder also noted it is the "shoot-em-up" and mystery books which are taken most often. More than half the library's Max Brand westerns are missing.

However, many of the articles taken are classics such as Cooper's "The Pioneers" and others. Some are not replaceable. This is especially true in the reference collection.

"The library can't afford to replace these books and still keep buying the latest editions of new-comers to the best seller list," DeVolder said. "Many of these books must be replaced, but so far I haven't been able to locate a few of the more important ones."

"I again ask everyone to check their private libraries for public books. Especially those found by occupants of houses that have been left behind by former occupants."

DeVolder also made a special appeal to the person who took the city directory. "A directory is a must in any library, both for the public and staff."

"It is impossible for the library staff to keep the collections in dress and give service to patrons and still keep an eye on everyone going out the door. We have to keep the public on its honor," he dubiously concluded.

New Brochure Is Completed to Answer Tourist, Other Queries on Twin Falls

Final press runs have been completed on the new Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce brochure which will be used to answer tourist and other inquiries reports Clifford H. Smith, chamber president.

The brochure, printed in three colors, are smaller and more compact than ones used previously, but contain more pictures, Secretary-Manager Kenneth W. Montgomery termed the new booklet "the most important missing piece to go out of a chamber office."

One of the largest single advances, he said, is that they may be mailed in regular business envelopes. Past brochures have required the use of larger manila envelopes.

The booklet was written and laid out by George Bever and his 12-member committee, Bever credits Hugh Farmer with the overall design. "It represents six months of work," said Bever.

He explained that well over 300 pictures were submitted for the brochure, plus 80,000 words of copy. "After careful study," he said, "those contributions were cut down to 43 pictures and enough copy to fill the remaining holes in the 16-page booklet."

"There were so many good pictures submitted," said Farmer, "that we had a difficult time selecting which ones to use. We received pictures from all over Magic Valley and as far away as San Francisco."

He added that every statistic used in the brochure was checked and rechecked. "We found upon re-checking some figures that they had changed in just a few months," said Farmer. "The brochure is, however, current as of right now."

Montgomery estimated that the 25,000 copies printed would last approximately a year. Bever said that a reprint is already being contemplated.

Because of the comparatively low cost, Montgomery said his office will distribute the brochure generally.

Fire Destroys Six Buildings At Stockyard

CHICAGO, Aug. 23.—Chicago's stockyards conducted "business as usual" today amid the smoldering ruins of a wind-swept blaze that consumed six buildings, damaged two others and brought out 500 firemen.

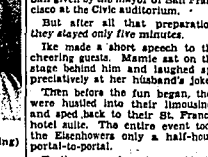

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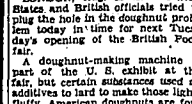

Care of Your Children

A pair of healthy feet are at once a pleasing and a benediction. The odd side of the matter is that we do not realize this until the pain of a blighted foot about cripples us. Many of the foot afflictions, grown people suffer from, callous, ingrown nails, and the like—might have been prevented if the health and comfort of their feet had been guarded by their parents when the sufferers were children. To start with, a child's shoes have to be carefully fitted to his feet. Children like getting new shoes and they will not complain about pinching or rubbing, for they miss getting them. "How do they feel?" "All right" is the usual answer. "Anything, indeed, to get this shining pair of shoes. A good, sensible, careful of his customer's satisfaction and welfare, feels, prods, questions in hope of making certain the shoe fits the foot that it is meant to fit. Sneakers are beloved of childhood and youth, but in seasons of their feet, they are a most delightful relief from leather shoes. Let youngsters have their fun, but in seasons of their feet, they should not be worn as steady, every day footgear. Change off now and then. This is a time for a slippers, but it is not all the time. 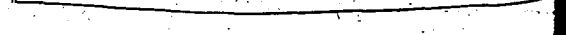

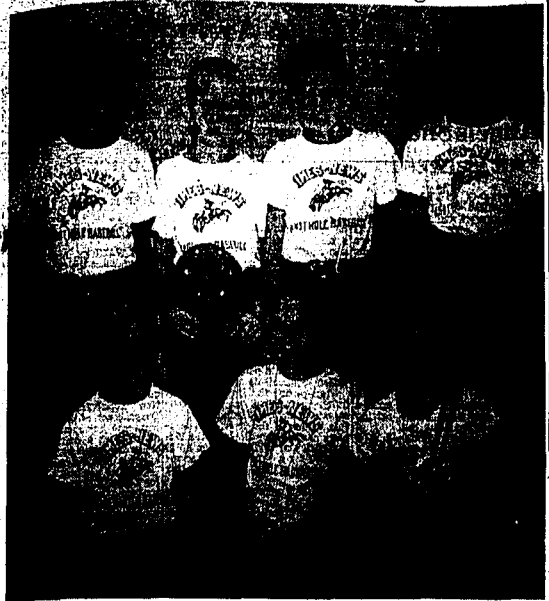

Tranquil Pill Can Depress; Expert Avers

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23 (UP)—The U. S. food and drug administration says so-called "happiness" pills for tranquilizers in some cases have just the opposite effect—they depress a person. "The administration last night advised drug manufacturers and physicians to cut down on dosage of the pills. A spokesman said the drugs were very valuable if used conservatively in treating high blood pressure and psychiatric conditions. But Dr. Ralph D. Smith, chief of the new drug branch of the agency's bureau of medicine, said tranquilizing drugs if used to excess may have an adverse effect on the mental state of patients and cause peptic ulcers or ulcerating colitis. "The agency's warning was contained in a letter to drug manufacturers signed by Smith, urging them to change their literature and labels, and reduce the dosage they recommended to physicians. An agency spokesman said excessive use of the drugs induces depression. There have been some depressive cases so severe, he said, that they led to suicidal attempts—some of them successful."

Salmon to Get Free Ride Around Dam Site

WEISER, Aug. 23—Migratory fish will "ride in style" around the Brownlee hydroelectric development construction area on their way up the Snake river north of here.

Idaho Power company has equipped two tank trucks, each of 1,000-gallon capacity, with circulation, scrubbing and cooling equipment. Each is designed to carry up to 50 adult fish.

Fish arriving at the awft water soon to emerge from the outlet channel of the diversion tunnel will be guided into the channel by a trap by electrical impulses. Diesel generators producing direct current have been set up at the channel to create the electrical barrier.

Fish moving downstream will take a fast ride through the tunnel and will need no help as a conservation measure.

The truck service for anadromous fish will begin when the river is diverted into the tunnel, and will be continued during the construction of the dam until permanent conservation requirements are determined.

Transporting the fish around the development is but one of the conservation measures being taken on this stretch of the river. The company has made available to the federal fish and wildlife service up to \$250,000 for a three-year conservation study of fish, low and other wildlife.

With this appropriation, wildlife agencies are surveying the number and time of migration of anadromous species through this reach of the river. They are studying the feasibility of fish passage, hatcheries, relocation of fish runs and other methods of protecting the fish population.

In addition, they will study resident game fish and other wildlife units brought about by the dam construction.

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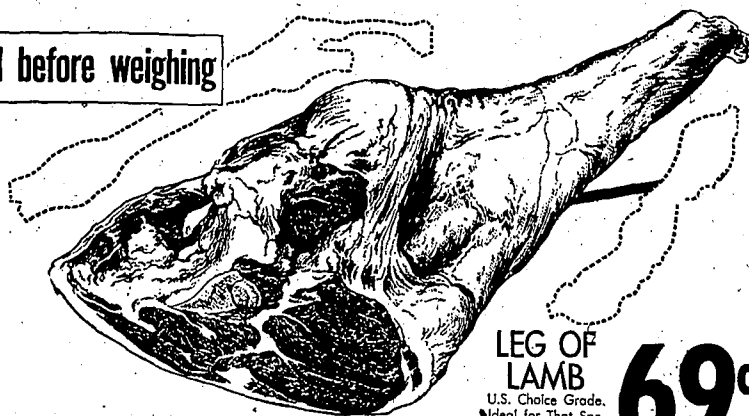

Meat Variety Is Offered on Special Buys

Housewives looking around for a bargain in the nation's supermarkets and corner groceries this week-end will find a variety of meats on sale: broiled chicken, veal, lamb and ham.

Conspicuously absent from the large type in newspaper advertisements and the big signs in most stores are sirloin steak and rib roast. This is because both are up three to five cents a pound in many stores, quickly reflecting record high wholesale prices for beef cattle.

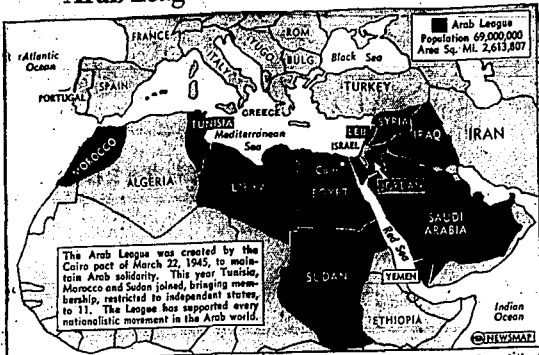
To balance the beef increase, however, pulled eggs are available at steep savings in many areas.

One nationwide chain is selling pulled eggs at 23 cents a dozen and large eggs at 47 cents in the New York area. That's too much of a bargain for most shoppers to miss.

Meat varieties also are in record supply this week, with beans, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower and onions all priced at good buys. Salad staples such as lettuce, celery, cucumbers also have low price tags.

Peaches were reported a little high in price in some areas this week, but blueberries, cantaloupe and watermelons are good buys at most fruit counters.

Arab League Rallies Behind Nasser



The Arab League was created by the Cairo pact of March 22, 1945, to maintain Arab solidarity. This year Tunisia, Morocco and Sudan joined, bringing membership, restricted to independent states, to 11. The League has supported every nationalistic movement in the Arab world.

As representatives of 22 powers in London sought a solution of the Suez canal crisis, leaders of the 11-state Arab League worked furiously to rally their millions of Arabs to the banner of Egypt's President Gamal Abdel Nasser. Egypt believes that the friendship and support of its Arab neighbors is its greatest source of strength in international affairs. The League, shown on map above, could be the core to which other Arab states might adhere, bringing into existence a long-time Arab dream—a United Arab States of the Middle East. In Cairo, the semi-official Middle East News agency declared a new anti-Western union of Arab states. In Beirut, with connections throughout the Arab world, its members are pledged to sabotage Western oil facilities "when the signal is given." (NEA)

Few Signs Found For Demo Revolt By "Solid South"

ATLANTA, Aug. 23 (AP)—While recognized leaders of southern Democrats do not average out as wildly enthusiastic about their party's 1956 presidential ticket and platform, there are few signs Wednesday that they'll join any bolt.

If there is any defection from the A. Lee Stevenson-Zeak McFatter ticket among working Democrats, it's unlikely to be in the direction of the Republicans. Instead, it would be a move to name presidential electors either unaffiliated or pledged to some obscure candidate.

This strategy is being advanced, without support of top party leaders, in Mississippi and Louisiana by Democrats who entertain a seemingly far-fetched hope that they thus can deprive both Stevenson and Eisenhower of the required majority of electoral college votes and throw the election into the house of representatives.

Grass Roots Job Urged for Nixon

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23 (AP)—Presidential Assistant Sherman Adams told 43 Republican state leaders Wednesday that Vice President Richard Nixon can be as popular with voters as President Eisenhower if Republicans work at the grass roots.

He said Nixon is one of the most effective campaigners in the party and has established a great record during his first three and a half years as vice president "both in ceremonial and constitutional duties."

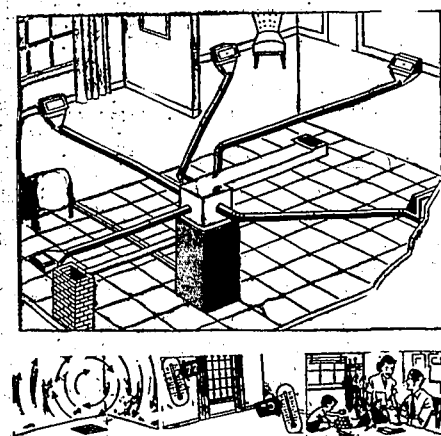

NEW YORK, Aug. 23 (AP)—The American housewife, who has many virtues, also leads the nation in one sort of crime—shoplifting.

Recently Max Hres, owner of an Allentown, Pa., department store, gave a training course in shoplifting techniques to 1,000 employees.

Then, to put them to the test, Mr. Congeni, who was unknown to them, went through the store to see what she could shoplift.

In an hour and a half I filled three shopping bags with more than \$400 worth of merchandise," she recalled. "I had lifted everything from ash trays to expensive dresses."

"Wearing a mask over her head to hide her identity, Mrs. Congeni then confronted the sales personnel at a specially called meeting and showed them the results of her foray through the store."

"Salespeople themselves don't appreciate the extent of shoplifting until you actually show them what can be done," she said, and cited the case of one 24-year-old girl who stole a sportscar valued at \$25,000 from one store in a single session.

One other odd fact about shoplifting: "It reaches its peak around the two greatest religious holidays—Christmas and Easter," said Mrs. Congeni.
