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Halt Expected In Decline for Farm Incomes

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (AP)—The agriculture department has reported that the downward drift in farm incomes is expected to be checked this year for the first time since 1931.

The D. Moore announced that on the basis of figures for the first half of the year and estimates for the remainder, farm operators will realize net income somewhat higher than in 1935.

Higher prices in the second half of the year and approximately 300 million bushels of grain and approximately 200 million pounds of wool programs will be the main factors in the agriculture department said in its latest report.

The department said the farmers in July received 10 per cent above a year earlier and 10 per cent above last 1935 period. Prices for the first half of the year were 10 per cent above the period of last year, it said.

While overall farm production is expected to be smaller than last year, the farmers net gain will come from the higher prices for his produce, the department said.

Union Leader Asks Support For 2 Demos

ALBANY, N.Y., Aug. 25 (AP)—A labor leader who described in a Republican national convention as a friendly to the Eisenhower administration urged labor today to vote for the Democratic banner of Wendell Willkie and E. A. Tamm.

Hubert E. Potofsky, president of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, charged that the present administration had reserved the right to big business and to the welcome sign to anti-labor employers and reactionaries in the party.

Potofsky was one of three labor leaders who Colorado's former governor, Dan Thornton, said in a commission speech Thursday night would be counted on to comment adversely on the Republican administration.

Speaking before the annual meeting of the New York state G.O. committee, Potofsky uttered no such kind words. He especially attacked Vice President Charles McNary, who he said, "more than any other individual, symbolizes the anti-labor and anti actions of our government."

"This is the man who stands by his heart-beat away from the president of our nation," Potofsky said. "Can we afford him?"

Potofsky said the presidential election this year is a "crucial test" for organized labor.

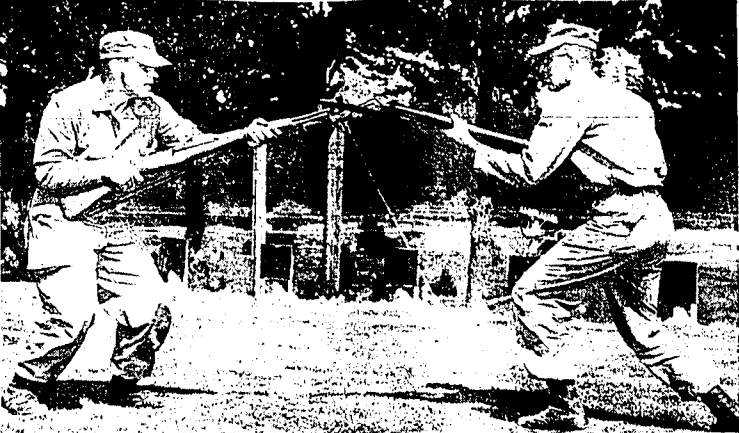

Idaho's Police Will Check All Sheep Trucks

BOISE, Aug. 25 (AP)—Dr. Scott Brown, head of the Idaho sheep commission, today asked state police to check "any and all trucks carrying sheep into Idaho" to prevent spread of sheep diseases from surrounding states.

"Because of trouble with sheep diseases in surrounding states we are compelled to protect the sheep industry of Idaho," he said.

The state police were requested to check incoming sheep at ports of entry and to require health certificates from the state of origin and special permits from inspectors.

State Police Superintendent L. C. Perkins said a truck load of sheep from Nevada was stopped at Ho-foster this morning and was being checked by an inspector.

Perkins said about 700 sheep came into Idaho last week from a blue tongue-infected area of lower Nevada before the state police started their checks at Brown's request.

\$457,288 Sum Taken to Help Smaller Firms

CHICAGO, Aug. 25 (AP)—A "splitter" bookkeeper with an attractive "heart" today faced arraignment on charges of embezzling \$457,288 to help out struggling small business firms.

Resnie E. Roth, 40, suburban Berwyn, Ill., was jailed yesterday following an audit of her accounts at the Lawrence National bank while she was away on vacation.

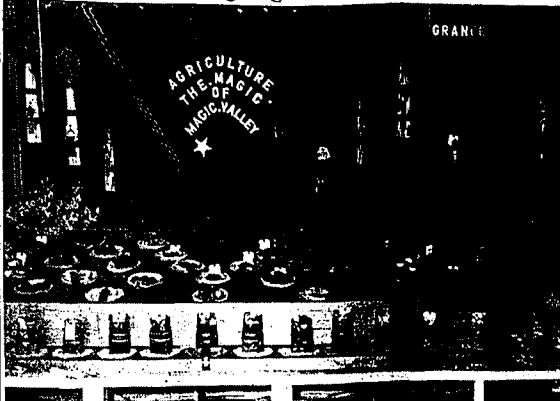

American Officials Laud Fast U. N. Actions for Ousting Spy

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Aug. 25 (AP)—American officials expressed pleasure today at Secretary General's language and meetings section of Dag Hammarskjold's prompt action in firing a would-be Soviet spy who tried to get U. S. military aircraft secrets.

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Wage Boosts, Benefits Eyed By Mine Firm

KEELOOG, Aug. 25 (AP)—The Kiewit Co. company announced today that it has offered its 2,500 employees wage increases and other benefits which will total more than 7 cents an hour over the next three years.

Charles E. Schwab, manager of employ and public relations for the mining firm, said the offer was proposed at a negotiating session Thursday with the Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers' union. He said it would be presented again at another meeting Tuesday.

Schwab said the company also offered economic fringe benefits, including increased holiday pay and shift premium pay, and paid-up life insurance, which would total about 24 cents an hour.

W. H. Waller, spokesman for the so-called "16 operators" in the Coeur d'Alene mining region, said the group probably would resume negotiations with the union next week.

Picture-Phone Is Relayed in Tests; Might Be Commercial

NEW YORK, Aug. 25 (AP)—Scientists of the Bell Telephone system have been "relaying" each other over the phone" since July 20 on the picture-phone invention revealed last night by Bell Telephone laboratories.

Winston E. Kock, the scientist who devised and developed the picture-phone in the Bell labs at Berkeley Heights, N. J., said he was convinced the picture-phone would be improved to a point where it could be installed in every home and office as separate, optional equipment at a reasonable cost.

He said it would be impossible to predict how soon the equipment would be made compact enough and cheap enough for general distribution.

Bell system executives said picture-phones probably would be installed on a rental basis for a monthly fee similar to telephones.

The new invention requires only one telephone wire in addition to the regular voice wire. Thus, long distance picture-phone calls probably would cost about twice the present rate for long distance voice calls.

The picture on current model picture-phones ranges up to two by three inches and appears as a miniature TV screen in a metal box-like apparatus which also contains the camera which takes the caller's picture for transmission to the person with whom he is talking.

Only the head and shoulders of the persons connected by picture-phone can be seen but facial expressions are clear and there is good black and white contrast.

In addition to the size of the "screen" the most apparent difference between the picture on a picture-phone and TV set is a slight flicker brought on by the fact that a new image is seen only once every two seconds rather than 30 each second as on a TV screen.

Kock said the picture transmission rate could be increased but would present a number of engineering and scientific problems which may be worked out in future development.

One of the factors which makes movement on a TV screen smoother than on a picture-phone screen is the use of the coaxial cable which can carry only three TV programs

Russia Makes First Move to Vatican Area

VATICAN CITY, Aug. 25 (AP)—The Soviet Union has made its first approach to the Vatican through diplomatic channels, Vatican officials said today.

The officials said Soviet chargé d'affaires in Rome, D. P. Pogodnyev, paid a visit a few days ago to the papal nuncio to Italy, Msgr. Giuseppe Pletta.

They said it was the first time a Soviet diplomat had paid a visit to a papal nuncio.

Pogodnyev requested the meeting as a simple courtesy call but during the visit he handed Pletta a copy of the Soviet appeal to the partitioning of the world for disarmament.

Vatican sources said delivery of the appeal was of little importance since Russia had given copies of it to other embassies in Rome but the fact the Soviet should suddenly announce its policy of inviting Vatican representatives was considered highly significant.

Relations of the communist countries, except the tiny republic of San Marino has diplomatic relations with the Vatican.

Vatican policy has been to seek diplomatic relations with as many nations as possible.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 25 (AP)—The court martial of P. J. Brucker, a sergeant who can't get down in accordance with a Pentagon physical fitness directive, was a mile from the Army headquarters of Wilbur M. Brucker and yesterday on a tour of the Colorado army post.

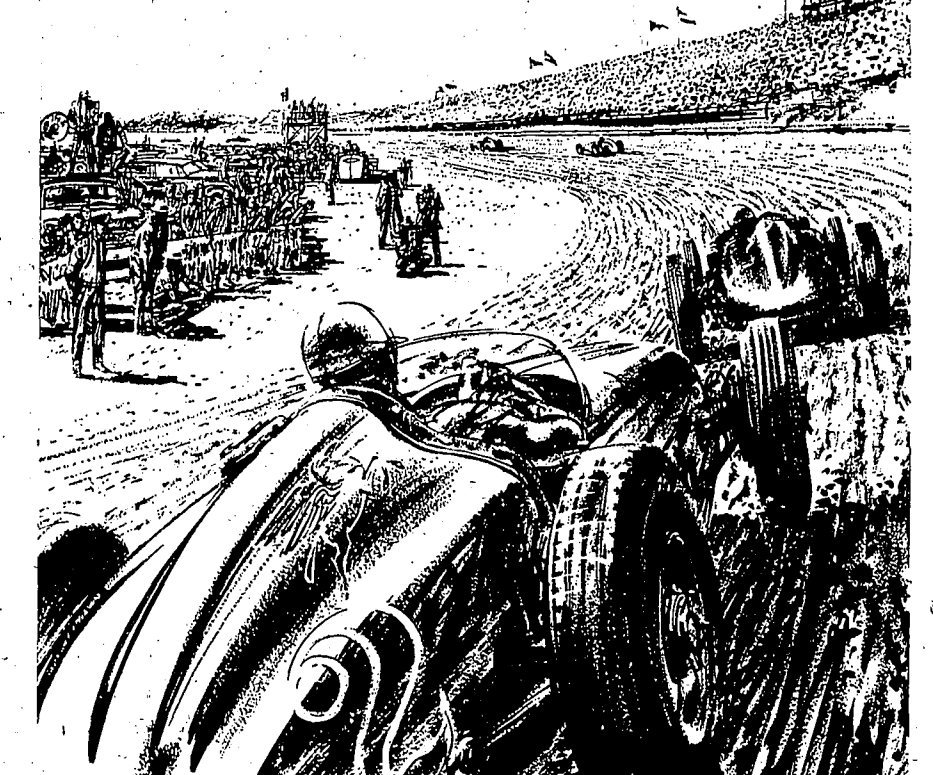

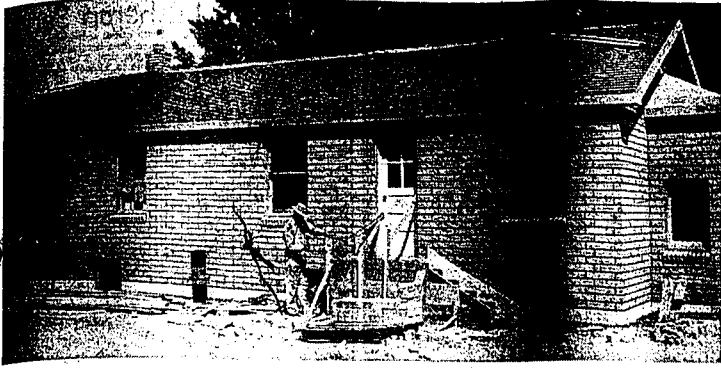

Child Care Becomes Big Business for Teen-Ager

Some mothers are fortunate. When they have a date with the girls for a date with their husband for dinner out, they can call on Grandma to care for Junior. Others have a list of available (sometimes) girls for baby sitting. And baby sitting has become big business.

Some towns have organized agencies where you can call, make an appointment and are assured of a reliable person to "sit" for you. These organizations often are run by an enterprising teen-ager who enlists the aid of other teen-agers.

But no matter how you obtain a sitter there are problems. Most of them are competent and some are "jewels," but they are rare. However, there are some things that both employer and employee should consider.

Parents, on the whole, strenuously object to the girl having company, either male or female; to long telephone conversations, and to willing food designed for tomorrow's menu.

The parent pays, and usually well, for a comparatively easy chore, especially when most of the time the child, or children, is either in bed or ready for it when the sitter arrives. They want to be able to enjoy the time away from home without worrying about their pride and joy being neglected, scared to death by frightening tales or allowed to run loose.

Mrs. Douglas Trail, mother of two daughters, Stephanie, 3, and Cynthia, 8, says she had been pretty lucky. She feels that the most important thing is to take care of her two girls and so far her sitters have always done that. She said she didn't ask a sitter to do any additional work unless it was to get the girls' dinner and perhaps wash the dishes. She didn't think that the sitter should be required to entertain the children constantly but she should see that the children had something to do. She asks, too, that the sitter not leave the house in a mess with scattered toys that were not there when she arrived.

Mrs. Trail also said she would prefer the girl didn't have company and felt that 14 years and older was the best age, although she has had younger ones who were competent.

She stressed that the sitter should tell her if the girls misbehaved because she felt she might be able to correct the situation in the future.

Mrs. Joe Hickey asks a baby sitter expert authority and make her children misbehave. She also prefers no company, especially boy friends, because she says it also added to her responsibility—for the behavior of the sitter.

Mrs. Hackney stated: "If parents are particular about the sitter they hire for their children, there wouldn't be any problems."

Oddly enough, an experienced baby sitter, Marilyn Harper, mentions most of the things brought up by the two mothers and agrees with them wholeheartedly.

Marilyn said she felt she could do a better job if the parents prepared the child for their absence so they wouldn't "accream their lungs out" when they leave. She also suggested that parents instruct the children on the question of obedience and what is expected of them before the sitter even gets there. She also asked that parents leave a written telephone number, or other instructions, in case of an emergency.

However, Marilyn doesn't feel that the sitter should exert too much authority. She says she did her best to carry out parents' instructions without becoming too heavy-handed.

She doesn't think that the "no company" request is wrong and she doesn't think the sitter should eat all the food in the house. "If they tell her there's a cake in the kitchen and she can have a piece, that's okay, but leave the rest alone."

Marilyn says, too, she likes to have the parents tell her the child's bedtime and any other part of the schedule the child is used to, such as a light in the bedroom and the door open.

Marilyn has two main grips—children who simply won't mind and people who don't pay her. She says once in a while parents won't have the change and she just never get around to paying her.

She says she doesn't mind doing extra work, such as dishes, if requested, but did feel that she should be paid more for it.

The average rate for sitting in Twin Falls seems to be 35 cents an hour, usually more if the parents are very late and extra for extra work. Most girls request, and should get, transportation home.

The building must be fireproof, must be easy to vacate in time of danger. It must provide light and air and be must than clean. There must be play space indoors and out so that no matter what the weather, the children can play as children should play. The equipment should be simple but it should be complete. The kitchen, bathrooms, dormitory, play room, should have the essentials in good order. Furniture should have nonpoisonous paint; even runabout children have been known to try their teeth on the back of a chair. There should be rounded corners wherever possible. Children of nursery-school age need protection from the children, one of the reasons that mothers have required the services of the nursery school. Magic Valley Hobbies No. 35 Minister Uses Wrought Iron Skill to Create Utilitarian Objects for Church

The Rev. Donald B. Blackstone, whose hobby is wrought iron work, says the real enjoyment comes not from the actual making of iron objects but from the creativity he expresses in designing them.

The Rev. Mr. Blackstone, pastor of the Twin Falls First Presbyterian church, comes up with many designs while at work and jobs them down. At home he transfers the ideas to graph paper.

As in the case with many creators, the Rev. Mr. Blackstone's work was mothered by necessity. Everything he has made has been for his own use, for his church or for his friends.

His handcraft for the church has been so small contributing to a portable lectern, for use in any part of the building for meetings, was built from an iron framework and decorative motifs with a red velvet cloth background.

"I wish I had built it sooner," said the Rev. Mr. Blackstone. "Before got the idea, we had to use the stand from the chair left every time we had a program in any room in the church. It was quite a chore to carry the stand to the room and then return it each time."

In addition to the lectern, which can be folded up to occupy a minimum of space, he has made a complete set of andirons, poker and other tools for the fireplace in his study, lamps, a stair railing in the church's new addition and outside lanterns. Presently he is finishing a sign which will be erected outside the new addition to direct strangers to the small chapel used for weddings.

Although he didn't make anything of iron for the chapel, the Rev. Mr. Blackstone designed the entire room. Utilizing another of his hobbies, he made a few of the wooden ornaments in the chapel.

On the whole, however, the Rev. Mr. Blackstone describes himself as a spasmodic hobbyist. "I only work when there is a need for something," he said, "and then only if I have the time."

He became interested in working with iron when he was a Boy Scout. "As I began earning merit badges," he explained, "I came to one for metal working. As I recall, we only had to make a chain of just a few links and something else, but I was a city boy and didn't know anything about it. I went to a blacksmith shop and soon picked up enough

knowledge that I believed I could do metal work."

In his home he has one of his most prized possessions, a wooden grandfather clock which he made himself. Woodworking and metal working are related hobbies, he believes. "For instance, although most of the clock is of wood, the hands and face were made from metal."

The Rev. Mr. Blackstone obtains most of his metal from machine and hardware stores and junk yards. Although some of the metal can be worked into the desired shapes with only manual effort, he usually uses metal from an oxyacetylene torch to make the iron more pliable.

Once the desired object is made, there are several ways to put a finish on it. The traditional finish for wrought iron is to paint it with a flat black enamel, but a silvery effect may be obtained by sanding the

metal and applying a coat of lacquer. On his fireplace set he used no finish. "The flames would make quick work of destroying either the lacquer or paint," he explained.

"Anyone can do wrought iron work," he said. "The only reason for failure would be an 'I can't' attitude. Naturally there are few Rembrandts in the world, but everyone has the skills for the common crafts."

He listed a hammer, vise, jig, scribers, torch, rule, and hacksaw as the only tools really essential for starting the hobby, although he admitted that through the years he has built up a far more extensive workshop of his own.
