Siberian Land Yielding Well, Harvest Slow

(AP Correspondent Stanley Johnson is one of a group of western reporters from Moscow who has been in a tour of Siberia following a number of his dispatches from Moscow.)

ORDINSKY DISTRICT, Siberia (Delayed) Aug. 29—Siberian virgin lands have had sensationally good crops this year but Soviet officials fear much may be lost through dilatory harvesting.

Moscow officials complained Monday that on Aug. 29, only 16 per cent of the wheat crop in this area had been harvested. However, Ivan Vasylyevich Khromov, deputy chief of state farms in the Novosibirsk district, told this correspondent:

"The harvest has only just begun. We already have 18 per cent in mind will finish before Sept. 10, when we expect the first frost."

Khromov said he was sure the entire crop would reach government warehouses but said "our greatest drawback is a lack of trucks for hauling."

On this remote state farm plowed out of virgin lands on the border of Siberian Kazakhstan, 50,000 acres are planted in wheat. The crop is being harvested around the clock by 10 combines. Some of the individual farms in the big acreage have 500 employees each.

But Moscow is far from satisfied. Complaints received here say that the efficiency of combines and rapers "must be improved" and when motor transport is improved in order to avoid last year's experience.

Then great grain losses were sustained in this area, owing to what was called "procrastinated reaping."

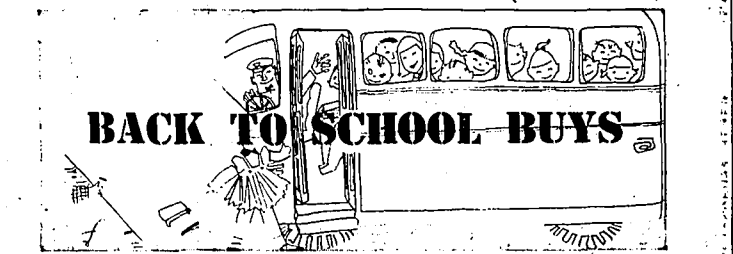

Space Flight Is Predicted In 2 Decades

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 20 (AP)—An aviation medicine expert at Ohio State university believes the first space flight will be made within 20 years.

Dr. Earl T. Carter, an aviation medicine instructor, says physiologists and engineers are working together to prepare men and machines for travel into outer space.

"Man is not created for space travel," explains Dr. Carter, who spent six years doing research in the effect on humans of breathing under abnormal conditions.

"The human cannot live without his natural environment," he says, "so we must create a portable natural environment."

Dr. Carter cites Dr. T. M. Levitt, director of Fels Planetarium in Philadelphia, and Dr. H. H. Koelle, a German rocket expert, as predicting the first man-carrying satellite will be launched about 1966.

They say the first trip to the moon will come about 2000.

Man's inability to exist in the "hostile environment" of outer space is proof positive that no human beings as we know them inhabit the planets, Dr. Carter adds.

Dr. Carter explains that conditions of jet flight are similar to those of rocket flight. In either case, man must exist in a sealed cabin and research now is concerned primarily with how long man can tolerate such conditions.

Small diamonds sometimes are found in meteorites, such as in the iron from Meteor crater in Arizona.

Senator Is "Amazed" at Progress and Work in Russia, Lauds Red Industries

NEW DELHI, India, Aug. 20 (AP)—Sen. Allen Ellender, D., La., said today he was "amazed" at what he saw during his recent three-week tour of the Soviet Union.

The Louisiana senator arrived in India last week to begin his one-day investigation of the U. S. information service and international cooperation administration programs here, in Ceylon and other countries of southeast Asia.

Ellender, who also visited Russia last year, said the Russian people were working hard and reminded him of America's "pioneer workers."

"The senator spent most of his time touring and seeing things he missed last year."

The Soviet Union's agricultural workers and equipment impressed him, but he said the Russians are 20 years behind us in agriculture.

He said that although Russia this year has a magnificent crop, it will lose 25 to 30 per cent of its efficient handling.

Describing his trip, Ellender said

he traveled by road from Moscow to Delhi and visited the manufacturing center of Kharkov.

"I visited manufacturing plants, automobile plants and tractor factories," he said. "I also visited the new city of Stalingrad, which is being built a few miles from the old city. They are going ahead with building a really fine city."

The senator said he saw water turbines for dams being built, some as large as 56 feet in diameter. He said the largest in the United States ran only 38 to 42 feet.

"At Kharkov I saw some of the largest lathes I have ever seen," he said.

Ellender added that his overall impression was one of people "working, working, working."

"I saw women carpenters and women bricklayers," he said. "It appalled me that the Russians are working and getting harder. We seem to be getting softer in the United States."

After visiting western Russia, Ellender flew over the Ural moun-

tains to Alma Ata in central Asia where the Soviets are building a new manufacturing center.

Alma Ata also is in the region where the Soviets do much testing of nuclear weapons. However, Ellender said he did not wish to see any atomic plants, although he was allowed to see anything he asked about.

He said that near Alma Ata there are huge new farms which are irrigated, as well as new industries.

"There was a big crop of beautiful grapes," Ellender said. "About 200,000 University students were there helping to save it—it was so big. They came from Moscow and other cities in the east, and live in tents and work in the open fields. It reminded me of my own college days when I worked on farms during the summer."

Asked whether he had flown in any new Russian jets, Ellender said "no."

"I saw only four jets in all the time I was there," he said. "All my flights were in Russian DC-3s."

When I flew to Alma Ata only two of the eight airports I landed at had cement strips. The rest were just fields."

Ellender said he found the Russian people very friendly and very curious.

"They are hungry for news," he said. "I am going to tell (Theodore) Strecher (head of USIS) to keep up his plans for USIS offices in London and Paris. We don't need them there. We could do more good giving news to the Russians."

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Huge Toll Set On Holiday by Safety Council

CHICAGO, Aug. 23—The National Safety Council today estimated 480 persons may die in traffic accidents during the Labor day week-end, the last holiday of summer.

The council hoped, however, that the three-day toll could be held to no more than 40—the normal traffic toll for a non-holiday Saturday, Sunday and Monday at this time of year.

Cities and states made final plans and preparations for efforts to hold down the number of accidents and deaths in their areas. Labor day is usually rated by the council as the second deadliest day on the highways—Christmas being the first—since it signals the end of summer vacations, the use of cottages and the opening of schools and colleges.

Team play by the "man behind the wheel" and the "man behind the badge" was urged by the council to keep the death toll at a minimum and well below its estimate.

Many states have cancelled leave for state policemen during the holiday. In some states, national guardsmen will join police efforts in patrolling highways and dangerous intersections.

In Ohio, the state highway patrol is mobilizing an auxiliary to man its radios and desks to allow more patrolmen to cruise highways. Some members of the auxiliary also will accompany the state troopers.

At Chicago, some 25,000 lights of police squad cars will be working continuously during the week-end. Authorities feel the flashing lights cut down speeding and reckless driving and point out that the idea reduced fatalities on a previous holiday.

Special precautions for the holiday were even being taken in neighboring Canada.

Authorities said the biggest campaign was centered in the Canadian province of Quebec, where thousands of American tourists were expected along the highway. Unmarked cars were to patrol all main highways. In the province of Ontario, bumper-to-bumper traffic was expected on Queen Elizabeth Way.

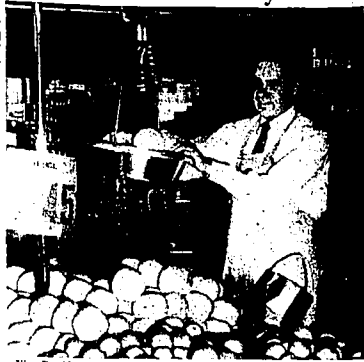

New Hazards Are Reported In Poison Ivy

STORRS, Conn., Aug. 29 (AP)—Some new tips on poison ivy hazards were given today by a woman plant scientist.

Dr. Harriet Creighton, professor of botany at Wellesley college, and president of the American Botanical Society, showed up at a scientific meeting here, with ivy poisoning of both arms.

She said she was poisoned while playing golf—by rubbing her arms against a golf bag she had placed on the ground where, she found out later, there were "dried-up, chipped-up ivy leaves that had been mowed from the rough" and kicked out into the fairway by a rotary lawnmower.

"The chipped-up leaves weren't immediately recognizable, but when the developed her poisoning, she went back and found the leaves."

She told about these other possibilities of ivy poisoning in strange ways:

1. From smoke given off by backyard burning of brush and leaves that might contain poison ivy.
2. From prematurely handling poison ivy vines that have been killed with chemical weedkillers, especially designed for attacking poison ivy.
3. Walking through a plowed-up field that may have contained poison ivy.

Integration Not Yet Accepted By South After Court's Rule

ATLANTA, Aug. 29 (AP)—More it is almost September, more when Johnny goes marching off to school again and, throughout the Deep South, the white boy will go to his school and the Negro to his as they have done for generations.

This September of 1956—two summers after the supreme court ruling on segregation—was to have been a historic date. People working for quick compliance with the ruling had set it as the goal for removal of racial barriers in the public schools.

Let's see how close they have come to the target.

The integrationists have a solid record of accomplishment in some areas, mostly the states bordering the Old South. But there is no mistaking their failure in the heart of Dixie.

On May 17, 1954, when the court made its ruling, there were 21 states and the District of Columbia with segregation laws.

Almost 600 school districts in those states have been integrated in whole or in part during the past year. Don Roper, executive secretary of the Southern Education Reporting Service, says some 300,000 Negroes will attend integrated schools for the first time next month.

But two million others will return to segregated classes.

A pin-studded map of the South shows a thicket of integration in Maryland, Virginia, Kentucky, Missouri, Oklahoma and Texas. That thins out to three spots in Arkansas and two in Tennessee.

But there is not yet the slightest crack at public school level in the segregation wall in Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana.

Those are the states most likely to hear out predictions that generations of litigation over the race issue are in prospect. If anything, segregation feeling there is more determined than ever.

Already this year Florida and North Carolina legislatures held special sessions and strengthened segregation laws. Virginia and Louisiana are in extra session this week.

Charlottesville, Va., is under court order to integrate this fall but that is likely to be postponed by appeal.

Gov. Thomas B. Stanley will ask the assembly to permit closing of white schools forced to admit Negroes.

In Tennessee, where Gov. Frank

Clement's influence has held down an all-out pro-segregation drive, it is reported that the issue will hit the 1957 legislative full force. With election year politics out of the way, Clement may go along with strenuous segregation measures.

In Memphis, the old Crump organization backed a "volunteers for progress" group that won with a segregation platform over a local good government league.

School integration is virtually an accomplished fact in the metropolis of St. Louis which is 20 per cent Negro.

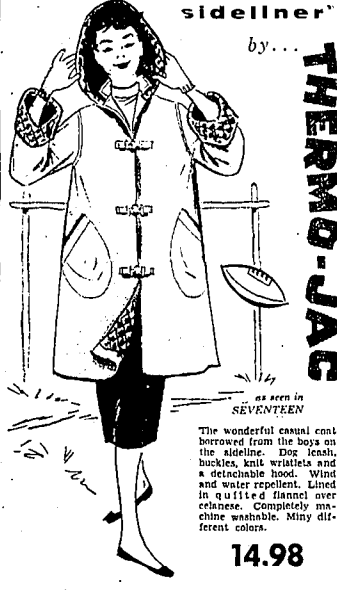

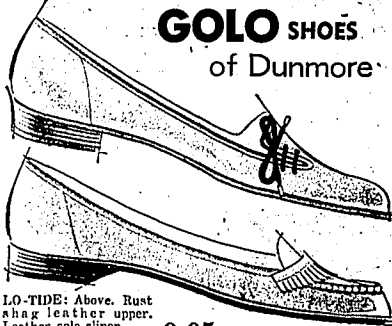

Radioactivity Used to Check Clots in Blood

BOSTON, Aug. 29 (AP)—Radioactive blood clots promise to lead to better ways of preventing coronary heart attacks such as President Eisenhower suffers.

The radioactive clots are produced in animals. Drugs are administered that can be tested to see how well they dissolve the clots and prevent dangerous new ones from forming.

The study finds one natural component of human blood, known as plasmin, works well in dissolving clots and preventing heart damage in animals.

The new technique was described yesterday to the sixth congress of the International Society of Hematology by Drs. Julian L. Ambrose and Dr. Nathan Beck and J. W. Byron, Buffalo, N. Y.

Coronary attacks are usually caused by blood clots lodging in the arteries feeding the heart.

The blockage causes part of the heart muscle to die. New clots form because the heart cannot pump enough blood to the rest of the body.

The Buffalo researchers produce clots containing radioactive iodine in the heart, lung or other arteries of animals. The iodine gives off rays showing where the clot is, and how fast it dissolves within the body when drugs are given.

10 Psychiatrists Sought for Iowa

DES MOINES, Aug. 29 (AP)—Plans were forged today by the Iowa refugee committee for the entry of 10 European psychiatrists into Iowa although state laws would limit their practice of medicine.

Several months ago Gov. Leo A. Hoegh appointed the committee to achieve two goals—one of them to assist private agencies and individuals in sponsoring refugees in displaced persons in the state.

But secrecy surrounded the other objective for a while because Gov. Hoegh said, "It's no use telling other states about plans so they'll be competing with us."

The plan was to find 10 psychiatrists among refugees and displaced persons in Europe who were willing to practice in Iowa.

Japanese Minister May Resign Office

TOKYO, Aug. 29 (AP)—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles' press conference remarks about permanent American possession of Okinawa may force the resignation of Foreign Minister Mamoru Shigemitsu, political observers said today.

Shigemitsu arrives in New York today on route from the Buenos Aires conference in London and negotiations in Moscow where he failed to reach terms with the Soviet Union on a peace treaty. He is due in Japan Sept. 3.

Dulles indicated at the conference that the U. S. considers it could demand permanent possession of Okinawa if the Japanese recognize Soviet sovereignty over the Russian-occupied South Sakhalin and the Kurile Islands.

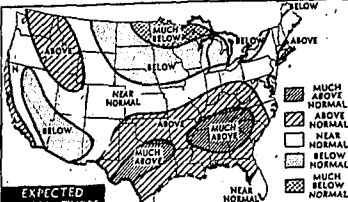

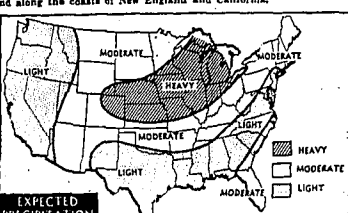
The last stretch of Salvadoran highway to be paved runs from Siraana to the Honduran border at Copacapan.

New Drug Can Aid Control of Noise at State Hospital South

BLACKFOOT, Aug. 29 (AP)—A drug derived from Indian snakeroot has all but erased the last trace of bedlam at State Hospital South.

Chlorpromazine, discovered by French chemists five years ago, has been used to calm mental patients here since January, 1954.

A more complete study of the drug is now under way, with some 100 patients receiving large doses.

The subjects were selected from the disturbed wards. Many were classed as "hopeless" mental patients. The study will be concluded about September.

But nurses, attendants and other ward employees are already sold on chlorpromazine. Patients who once filled hospital with screaming are now soft-spoken.

Attendants say there has been virtually an end to patients throwing their food about and eating off the floor. Use of restraints for violent cases has been almost eliminated. The patients are easier and easier to get along with.

Chlorpromazine is not a cure for mental disorders, says Dr. E. W. Smith, superintendent. But it is credited with making cures possible.

The idea is to calm the patients so that other forms of therapy can be put to work. Sometimes, says Smith, the patients can work out their own problems once they are calmed.

Some patients once considered hopeless have been released from the hospital since doctors began giving the chlorpromazine.

The drug appears in some cases to have broken barriers between mental patients and the world outside themselves. There was one patient with whom no one could communicate. She laughed and talked to herself but remained "withdrawn" when others were about.

Creed has been watching his vegetable garden for the past two weeks and "babying" some prize-winning specimens he plans to enter in the vegetable exhibits.

Specializing in turnips and squash, Creed has a special variety of turnips he has developed as well as the better known business and hub-bard squash. Vegetables grown by Creed's garden four miles southwest of Twin Falls this year occupies one and one-half acres. He uses a saddle broke single horse to cultivate his garden.

He has eight varieties of corn plus a hybrid popcorn growing as well as celery, eggplants, melons, tomatoes, onions, potatoes, beets and about every other vegetable grown in Idaho.

He pointed out that he doesn't pull or hoe all the weeds out of the garden. "My wife takes an interest in it, too, and she does a lot of the work," Creed said.

He says that when planting his garden he always consults the previous year's fair book to determine which vegetables he will plant.

Arab Slavery Is Dying Out, Expert Avers

GENEVA, Aug. 29 (U.P.)—The practice of slavery in Saudi Arabia is gradually disappearing under the impact of modern economic development, a Saudi Arabian observer to the United Nations slavery conference said today.

Classical slavery as known in the West is non-existent in Saudi Arabia, Saudi observer Y. Baroudy declared, but there are still some persons in slave status in that oil-rich nation.

The U.N. slavery conference was called to draft an international agreement to outlaw slavery in all lands, including such ancient practices as the sale of young girls as brides and into servitude for debt. Baroudy said westerners think of slaves, especially in the Middle East, as stereotyped "Arabs" learned from old tales, such as the whip-driven galley slaves of the Barbary pirates, or the tolling masses who built the pyramids in Egypt.

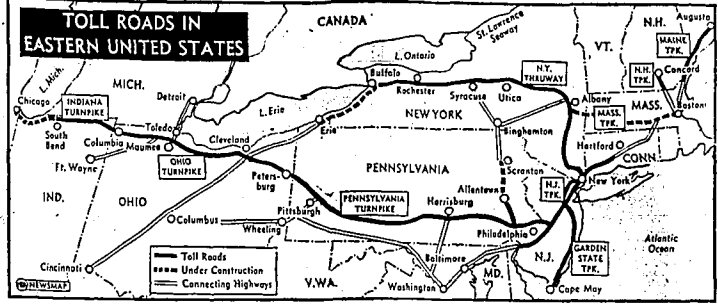
Saudi Arabia's few remaining slaves "are not the old-fashioned kind you are apt to think of," Baroudy said. "It would be more exact to call them stewards or servants, not slaves."

"The 'servants,' he said, are completely dependent on their masters, and the masters in turn consider it a moral duty to take complete care of them. A master and his family who turned out such a servant, without providing a living for him would have a 'blot on their conscience forever,'" the U.N. observer said.

Baroudy said the importing of slaves is strictly forbidden in Saudi Arabia, and that there have been numerous court cases in recent years condemning slave traders.

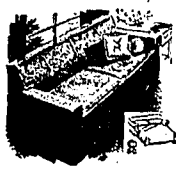

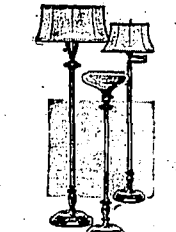

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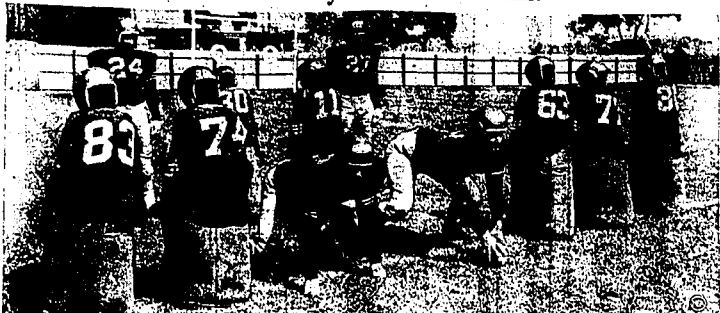

Smith said the major companies were encouraging the price war by cutting gas prices at their stations to a level below the price of gas sold to farmers remaining in the second district.

"On behalf of the people of the state of Idaho, I hereby demand that you immediately discontinue this price-cutting tactic," Smith said.

Sharp Decline Noted in Farm Draft Animals

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—Could it be that old Dobbin, the horse, and Maude, the mule, soon will be as rare as the dodo? The U.S. Bureau of Animal Industry says so.

"I look like this way," the census bureau has reported that the Dobbins and the Maudes definitely are on the decline—and will be soon.

A new count of noses shows there were 454 per cent fewer horses and mules in the United States in 1957 than in 1924.

"For the horse, the decline has been in progress since 1910. The mule was a little harder, but not until the late 1920s or the early '30s did the mule begin going the way of the dodo."

Buhl Firm Sued

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (Special)—Idaho's state and local government agencies received \$2,256,847 from the federal government in fiscal 1935 under the grants in aid program.

Idaho citizens receive more money per capita than they pay for the maintenance of the financing of this program.

This is generally true for the western states.

The fiscal 1935 grants in aid program for Idaho include highway construction, \$2,204,284; aid to dependent children, \$1,237,833; unemployment compensation and emergency relief, \$705,257; agricultural experiment stations, \$240,291; cooperative agricultural extension work, \$117,254; school lunch program, \$387,172.

National forests fund, \$974,432; submarginal land program \$709; cooperative projects in marketing, \$5,500; state and federal forestry cooperation, \$125,245; commodity credit corporation (value of commodities donated), \$217,792; removal of surplus agricultural commodities, \$88,265.

CIAA federal airport program, \$15,382; army lease of flood control lands, \$1261; colleges for agricultural and mechanical arts, \$16,672; cooperative vocational education, \$181,622; school construction (emergency grants), \$737,110; school maintenance and operation (emergency grants), \$433,517; White House conference on education, \$5,000; venereal disease control, \$2,938.

Draft Change For Class Select

BOISE, Aug. 20—Idaho selective service registrants in the future will be classified instead of shortly before reaching the age being called to fill the local quotas, announces Maj.-Gen. John E. Walsh, state director of selective service.

The policy change was made in connection with the new reserve program under which young men have several options for fulfilling their military service obligations, Walsh said. He pointed out that most plans require registrants to make their choice before the age of 18.

"Immediate classification will give registrants a definite selective service status when entering a reserve, national guard or active unit," he said.

"It is our experience that military service is less of an inconvenience if performed early," Walsh said, urging young men to select the option "best suited to their individual circumstances and begin their service immediately."
