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French Troops Go to Bolster British Forces Near Suez

LONDON, Aug. 30 (U.P.)—France was reported assembling a 30-skip task force in the Mediterranean today for joint Anglo-French military moves against Egypt should the Suez crisis deteriorate further. Hopes for a peaceful settlement were low. France and Britain announced jointly that French troops would be sent to Cyprus, easy striking distance of the canal zone, and unofficial reports said French paratroopers were already en route to the British base from Algeria.

The Times of Cyprus reported today in Nicosia that 100 French troops landed near Limassol. British authorities refused to confirm or deny the report.

Other reports from Gibraltar said a battalion of Scots Highlanders, veterans of desert fighting, would join the Anglo-French expeditionary force of Malta next week. Some sources spoke of "a new determination of relations between Britain and Egypt, but the foreign office refused to comment on the situation. British newspapers accused Egypt of imposing a "reign of terror" on British living there.

All dispatches from Egypt indicated that Nasser would not budge from his stand that the Suez canal was and must remain Egyptian soil. Egyptian government sources said it was anxious to discuss a compromise settlement.

British troops in Cairo decried the Anglo-French decision to move troops to Cyprus as "a grave mistake" and said it would have the effect of driving the British out of the Suez canal.

Organized Labor to Oust Crime Element

FOREST PARK, Pa., Aug. 30 (U.P.)—Organized labor appeared today to be embarked on a new attempt to chase racketeers out of the labor movement. On the heels of action against three unions charged with welfare fund irregularities, the AFL-CIO executive council yesterday ordered its 140 union localities to begin trying to extort money from employers by threatening violence. It directed all unions to avoid indiscriminate issuing of charters that "can be used to shake down" employers.

George Meany, AFL-CIO president, said he felt sure the new chartering policy would have a positive effect on workers who had been under the influence of labor racketeers.

This was the second step taken by the AFL-CIO to clean up the labor movement. Two days ago the council threatened to suspend unions which refused to oust two others for union welfare fund frauds as exposed by a grand jury in New York.

The council, concluding a four-day meeting, turns today to a closed-door review of organizing plans for the AFL-CIO stands for racial equality.

Denver Strike Delays Trains, Causes Havoc

DENVER, Aug. 30 (U.P.)—Railroad passengers arriving in Denver today had to wait for hours because of the inconveniences at the strike of 500 employees at Denver Union station. Supervisory personnel at the six railroads that use the station attempted to eliminate confusion that surrounded yesterday in train operations.

Trains serving the city were operating reasonably close to schedule yesterday, with their delays running from 30 minutes to an hour or more.

Engine and train crews would not cross picket lines set up by the striking members of the Federation of Railway and Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers, Express and Station Employees.

They went on strike shortly after midnight yesterday against the Denver Union Terminal Railway company which was organized by six railroads serving Denver to operate the depot.

At issue are the working hours of mail and baggage employees, many of whom work "split shifts."

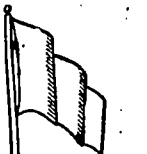

traveled in the crashes. Last year, 11 of this was, and eight of 12 deaths in Missouri involved no other cars.

What happened? Mechanical faults—inattention—drinking—speed—falling asleep. So the police say.

But there is a big element of chance in this game. Often, people die through no fault of their own.

Near Elko, Nev., on a flat stretch of desert, two automobiles approached each other from opposite directions. One

right through a brick and concrete wall. Or sheer a man's legs off, like a cyclone.

So in New Jersey, a woman driver shattered not one but two iron utility poles and died instantly.

In Colorado, a car hit a truck and killed five children, two teenage girls and their brother, and two infants, 2 months old and 12 days old.

A great many mishaps are "one-car accidents," that is, no collision, no other vehicle seems to have fig-

What happened to the two couples near Abbotsford, Wis., that night last year? In one car were two brothers, both in their twenties. In the other, a young man was driving with his wife, an expectant mother.

On a straight stretch of highway, they approached. In an instant, in the time it takes to snap your fingers, all four young people were dead. They crashed head-on. There were no witnesses.

No human witnesses, that is. Police said the speeds of the two cars were so great that the impact practically fused them together.

Or what happened to Floyd Crumby, Chicago? He started out to join some friends on a hunting expedition.

He didn't appear. Time passed. They began looking for him and searched for 10 hours. Then they found his body beneath his car in the bottom of a ravine near Oregon.

Again, no witnesses, what happened?

From Chicago, the shabby statistics piled up. By Sunday morning, with more than a full day left and the heavy crush of people returning to their homes still ahead, the message read—

"2:30 a. m.—Traffic deaths for the nation—294."

Strange coincidences snuff out the lives of people.

In Arizona, a 15-year-old youth died just three miles from the spot where his father was killed five days before. Near Yukon, Okla., Hugh Rogers was seriously injured when his car overturned close to the place

where his twin brother was killed in an automobile accident in 1924. So many children die.

In Maryland, a car ran over a 7-month-old baby girl as she lay on a blanket in a park in West Virginia. A 4-year-old boy darted out from behind a truck into the path of a car. In Ohio an 18-month-old child was playing in the driveway when the brakes failed on an automobile.

So many people die horribly.

In California, Ohio and West Virginia, people were pinned beneath their automobiles and death. Near Pulaski, Ind., a car carrying seven people hit an iron pole and was literally torn in half.

Whole families are wiped out. In California, on a freeway near Pasadena, a couple and their son

died in a head-on crash. A tractor (what of fate made the dead wife's sister, riding in another car, a witness).

Late in the week-end: "2:30 a. m.—Traffic deaths for the nation—414."

California, with 47, had the worst record last year. Said Highway Commissioner Bernard Caldwell despairingly, "all appeals to the hazards and perils of this holiday have fallen on deaf ears."

The final total—438. It was only 23 below the all-time high set in 1931.

Can nothing be done? Maine, Montana, North Dakota, Vermont and the District of Columbia had apocryphal records for the holiday. Minnesota, New Mexico, New Jersey and Oklahoma did better than

officials anticipated. All the New England states were bright spots on the map. So was the high speed Pennsylvania turnpike.

Maybe it was extra police vigilance. In Massachusetts, officials stopped 10,667 cars. Bus Capt. Singleton Sheaffer, head of the Pennsylvania turnpike detail, said it was because most of the drivers there were "safety conscious."

That's American roulette. Want in the game? Death will wheel you a number.

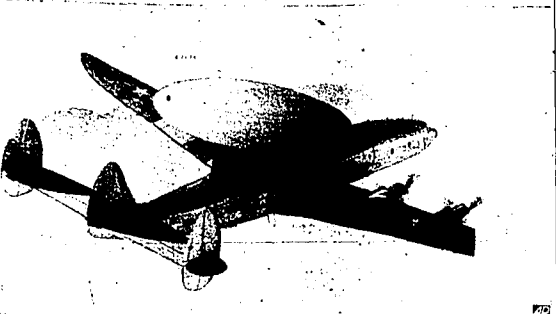

Auto Industry Presents Thrill Show to Stress Safety Factor

DETROIT, Aug. 30 (AP)—The "big three" of the auto industry are putting on a week-long thrill show to convince an audience of five they are building safety, not death, into their vehicles.

The audience is a subcommittee of the house interests and foreign commerce committee looking for means to cut drastically the nation's highway death toll that mounted to 29,000 last year. It is headed by Rep. Kenneth A. Roberts, D., Ala.

The general areas of the subcommittee investigation are vehicle design, the human factor, legislation, highway and law enforcement.

General Motors, Ford and Chrysler each had wrecked thousands of dollars worth of automobiles to prove advertised safety features.

All three have pulled all stops to show the so-called "horsepower race" doesn't have speed as its aim, but quick acceleration and passing ability.

Executives have told the congressmen they're building in safety features about as fast as the public will buy them.

L. L. Colbert, Chrysler president, conceded in welcoming the congressmen today: "As far as we have come in vehicle safety design, we still have a great deal further to go, just as we have."

Weird Edifice Is Built to Aid Rocket Thrust

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif., Aug. 30 (AP)—The U. S. air force is building a weird structure that will eventually lead to launching of rockets and guided missiles twice the size of anything currently possible.

The structure is being constructed, high on a rocky cliff in the Mojave desert. It is a giant concrete test stand designed to hold in harness rockets having up to nine million pounds thrust.

Previous test stands built by the air force only have been able to handle rocket engines up to 500,000 pounds in thrust.

The new stand looks like something created by a science fiction writer. The test stand itself juts from the top of the cliff like an unfastened concrete cantilever bridge that the builders abandoned and left jutting into space. The concrete is 30 stories high.

The air force said the stand must be able to withstand tremendous upward strains as well as to bear the dead weight of huge rockets. The project will be completed soon at this southern California missile base.

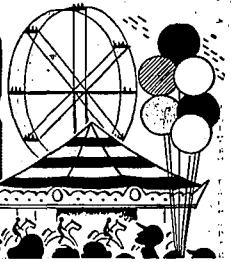

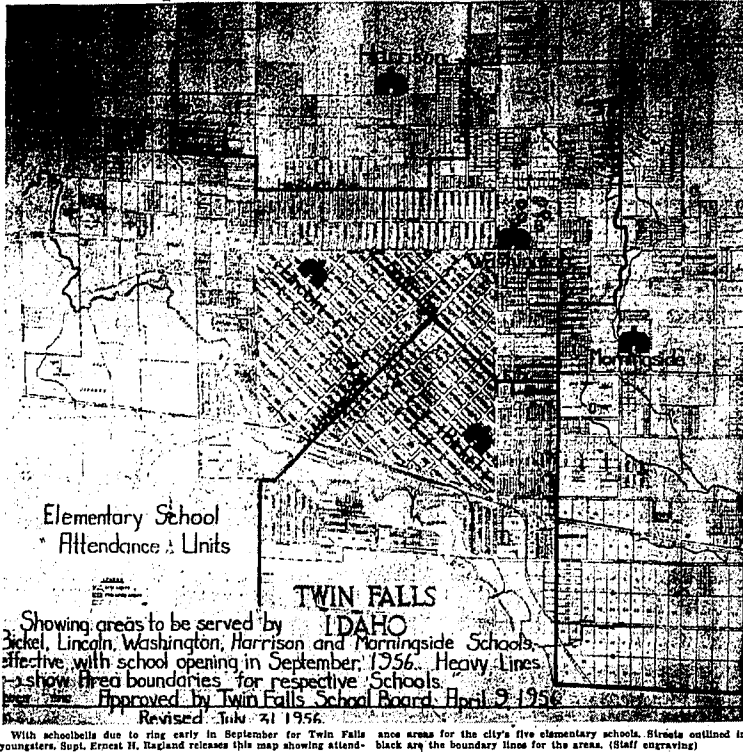

End for Polio Epidemic Set By 1957 Date

NEW YORK, Aug. 30 (AP)—Epidemic poliomyelitis can be eliminated from the United States by the end of 1957 through use of the Salk vaccine, Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, said today.

Successful development of the vaccine was a "miracled miracle," O'Connor said in his foreword to the foundation's annual report for 1955.

"Here, for the first time in medical history, was a preventive created by millions of people through a voluntary health organization," he said. "None of us dare to believe in less than a century."

The foundation reported a continuing need for funds, however, especially to provide care and rehabilitation for victims of the disease.

Patient aid accounted for \$27,724,000 or 84.4 per cent of total expenses during the year.

Grants and appropriations for research, professional education and purchase of vaccine and gamma globulin totaled \$13,641,000, or 32 per cent of money appropriated.

Funds raised during the year totaled \$32,475,000, of which 11.1 per cent went for fundraising expenses, leaving a net of \$26,653,000.

South Polar's Worth Noted

SHEFFIELD, England, Aug. 30 (AP)—A century nation with atomic bases in the Antarctic could control world shipping in event of atomic war because the Suez and Panama canals would be destroyed, a leading British scientist said last night.

This is one of the reasons the world's leading powers are becoming increasingly interested in the great polar continent, Sir Raymond Priestley said in his presidential address to the British Association for the Advancement of Science.

"The strategic value of Antarctica, should world atomic war break out, with the consequent likelihood of the destruction of the Suez and Panama canals, will stem from the fact that all inter-continental sea-borne traffic and much coastal traffic, as well, must then proceed to the Cape of Good Hope and Cape Horn," he said.

Priestley, a member of two expeditions to the Antarctic, said that man may yet find a way to turn the southern polar regions into a seventh habitable continent.

The firemen didn't even need to take time for a scolding. An adult accompanying the child had things well in hand in the correction department when the firemen arrived.

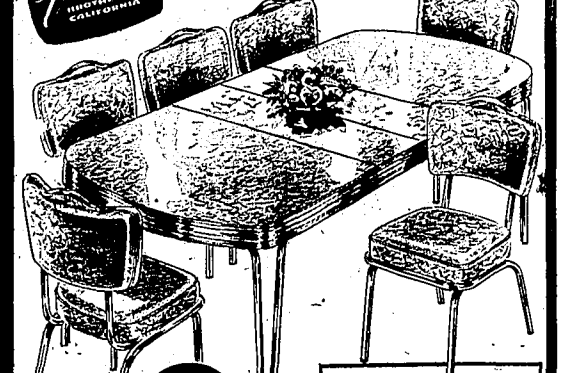

Heidelberg Students Can Still Duel and Obtain Facial Scars

HEIDELBERG—Just what I want to do is add a Heidelberg dueling scar to my already dismal countenance. I do know, but I do, and I'm determined not to leave this old university city without one.

I have a college days scar—an appendicitis scar—the result of an attack in my sophomore year. But thousands of people have a scar in Heidelberg, you know. Student dueling was outlawed many years ago, but it still flourishes among the university's famed fighting fraternities, which had their origin in the Crusader Order of Teutonic Knights.

The fraternities are: Alumnus (light red cap); Praxinos (dark red); Vint (blue); Rheinias (violet); Stormal (white). When a fighting student has to be sewed up, he reports it as a "motor mishap" to the surgeons and authorities.

I discovered all of this, and a lot more, in Quail MacCowan's "Heidelberg Confidential," a pocket guide that sells for less than two Deutsche marks. MacCowan, an old New York Sun man, and now a Heidelberg resident, sent a reporter on a hush-hush mission to the university and the investigation turned up some revealing facts.

The meetings of the fraternities are in medieval style houses, and each has a favorite tavern and club house for dining and singing. Dueling is not taken lightly by the members of the fraternities, and proof of that is the Stormal's Code, which is rigidly adhered to. Here it is, in part:

Weapons: Double-edged, razor-sharp swords with long, thin blades and heavy hilt. Not to be confused with fencing foil.

Dress: Bare heads; eyes protected by goggles; necks wound with thick wrappings, body padded against injury from chin to ankle. . . . No masks. Attack is against the skull and face.

Rules: Seconds with swords to strike up blades as required; neutral umpire; time and record kept; argument for second bouts; members of the same corps do not fight each other.

Least: The duelist may step forward from his stance. To step backward is considered cowardly and crafty and entails dishonor from the corps.

Fights: Fights end when one swordman is too seriously wounded to continue. They are held in basements with falling windows to escape police intervention.

Courage: If under the sudden onslaught of a blow, or during surgical treatment, a swordman grimaces or cries out, his corps are ashamed of him and dub him "hare-foot." This is the German equivalent of "chicken."

On rereading the code, I'll have to admit that I feel a tinge "hare-foot." I like part of the code, but at certain points it is not all-embracing enough to suit me. With plaster of Paris as cheap as it is these days, I see no reason in not making the dress of the duelist more invulnerable. And why just goggles? Why not a bullet-proof fish bowl that fits securely over the swordman's head, affording protection to his ears as well as his eyes? I wouldn't call a missing ear as a souvenir.

That part about not yelling your head off when you get sliced, or when the doctor starts prodding your cheek, makes me hesitate. I cry when a doctor takes my temperature, and go into a frenzy when I have to take a shot in the arm. I am sure

I would be ridden-out of my corps on a rail.

I will probably settle for a duel with Mary, using manicure scissors at 15 yards, each contestant to wear a feather mattress, and cry of "Here, stop poking those scissors in my direction," to be perfectly okay.

Come to think of it, I have a real pretty appendicitis scar—sort of half-moonish. Maybe I'll be satisfied with it, and not risk slapping a Heidelberg student across the whiskers with my glove.

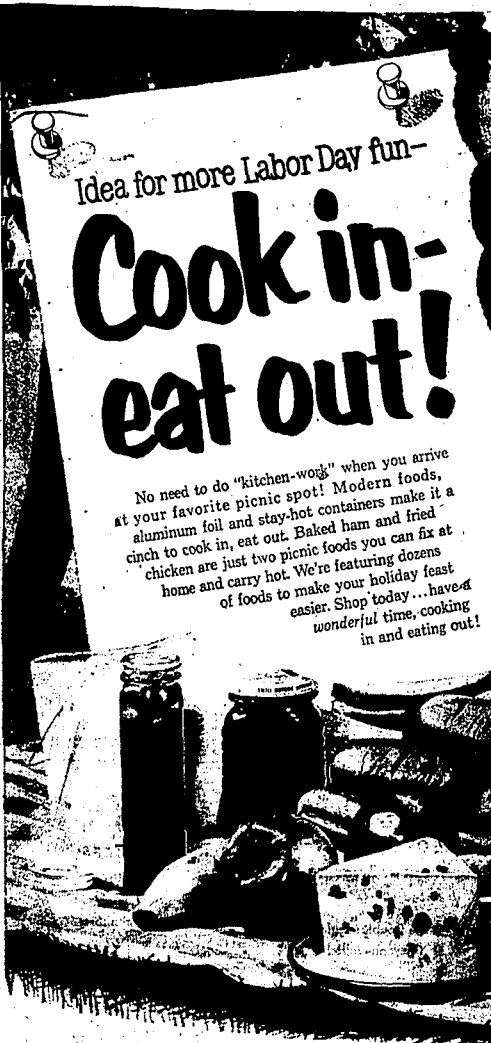

Hike Is Noted On Taxes for Farming Land

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (AP)—The agriculture department said yesterday state and local taxes on farming real estate went up 6.4 per cent in 1955 over 1954.

The department called the rise a "continuing increase."

Tax levies for 1955 totaled about \$27 million dollars compared with \$25 million dollars for 1954, the department said.

The 1955 taxes were about 25 per cent higher than 1950 and almost double 1947's. The 1955 levies were barely payable in 1950.

Farm real estate taxes were higher in 1955 in all states except Iowa, Missouri and Oklahoma.

The changes from 1954 to 1955 ranged from an increase of 21.3 per cent in Michigan to a decrease of 1.5 per cent in Iowa.

Taxes per acre of farm real estate averaged 57 cents in 1955 compared with 52 cents in 1954. The average tax per \$100 of assessed value was 12 cents in 1955, an increase of 3.4 per cent over 1954.

The highest tax per acre in 1955 was \$5.05 in New Jersey. The lowest was nine cents in New Mexico.

Taxes on farm real estate in California, Illinois, and Iowa accounted for 27.6 per cent of the total for all states.

Pets Enrolled By Owners in Canine Shield

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 30 (AP)—Dog owners in the hundreds are enrolling their pooches in "Canine Shield," a hot new item in the insurance business.

The plan is a national scope device developed exclusively for non-human animals.

The project was launched only five months ago by two veteran Kansas City insurance men, Richard M. Nelson and Gordon J. Henning.

Now, they reported today, "Canine Shield" boasts 3,000 agents and 75,000 insured dogs.

"The influx is just beginning. The response has been fantastic and not only in this country. We've had inquiries from as far away as New Zealand," they said.

"There being no actuarial tables on dogs, cats and birds, it was necessary to start somewhat in the dark. But the policies as originally formulated are working well," they said.

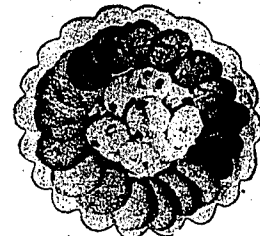

Walter said in a statement, "The American people will then be able to answer the question which I posed some months ago, 'is the Fund for the Republic friend or foe in our death struggle with Soviet communism?'"

His statement referred to one issued in New York Tuesday by the Fund's public information committee, accusing Walter of engaging in "a deliberate scheme to discredit the fund and its objectives in the eyes of the American people," and suggesting that he apologize.

Walter said neither he nor the committee on un-American activities is constrained to apologize to the Fund for the Republic for discharging our duty in investigating this multimillion dollar propaganda machine which enjoys tax exemption.

Doctor for Ike Is Visiting Moscow

MOSCOW, Aug. 30—Dr. Paul Dudley White, Boston, President Eisenhower's heart specialist, has arrived here on an European tour.

He said he planned to stay about 10 days and added: "We don't want to visit a lot of institutes. We want to talk with people who are specialists in our field."

He told his Russian greeters that he is also a correspondent for the Associated Press and will write an article for AP on his experiences here.

Stevenson Takes Swing at Benson

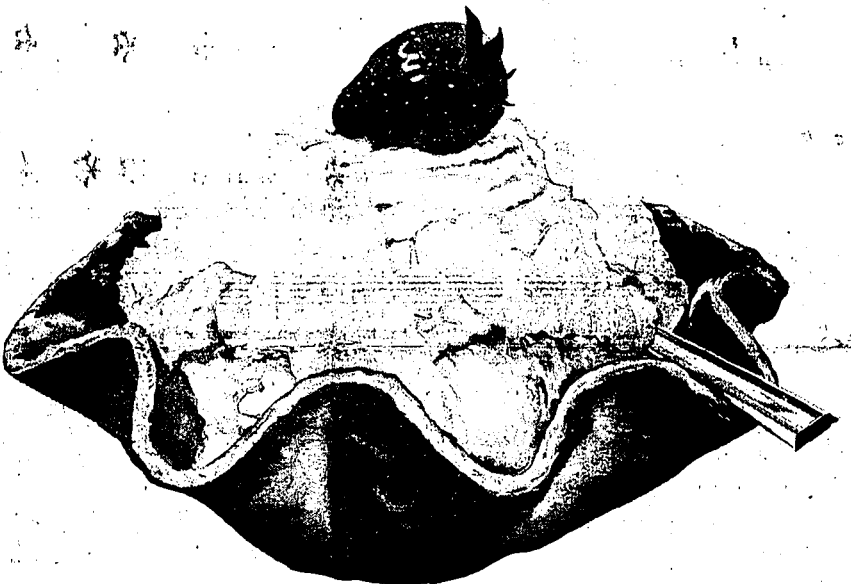

GOPs Try to Change Name Of Opponent

NEW YORK, Aug. 30 (AP)—The Republican party has launched a "fundamental policy" campaign to change the name of the Democratic party, a spokesman disclosed today.

L. Richard Guylay, director of public relations at the Republican national committee, said it "will be a matter of policy for Republicans to refer to the opposition as the 'democratic party.'"

The GOP convention in San Francisco last week was the first full-scale try-out of the new policy. It omitted the word "Democratic" in all party utterances.

Guylay said the GOP feels that "democratic as an adjective is not descriptive of the party as it exists today."

He said Republicans feel that the party of the Democrats should be more properly called the "democratic party" because of the "diverse viewpoints" within it.

Guylay was one of those responsible for editing Republican speeches at San Francisco to see that "no 'D' got through the teleprinter."

In press copies of Thomas E. Dewey's speech there were two blank spaces after each "Democrat" where industrious staffers had smudged out the "d."

Guylay claims the origin of the smudged name is "obscure." But smugger Democrats recall most vividly that it was used repeatedly by Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, R. Wis., during the army-McCarthy feud hearings. Other Republicans adopted it and now the committee has made it official.

With most Democratic big-wigs out of town or campaigning with Adlai E. Stevenson, the only Democratic national committee comment immediately available was outraged outcries from secretaries and the like.

Most of these embraced wholeheartedly suggestions in "letters to the editor" columns here calling for a countermove to shorten the GOP name to "Republican party" or "Republican party."

In the Bible the word "publican" is usually followed by "sinners."

Guylay noted such suggestions but said: "It doesn't seem to clock like ours."

Well aware that the strategem is working like a poison ivy attack on the Democrats, Guylay said with a chuckle, "what's happened to the 'd.'" that is the question.

Truman has two political speeches already scheduled, one Saturday at Ottumwa, Ia., before a party rally for Herschel Loveless, Democratic nominee for governor of Iowa.

His other one will be at Labor day gathering in Milwaukee next Monday.

Truman described both of them as "full-fledged campaign speeches," in which he will discuss the Republican platform's labor and farm planks.

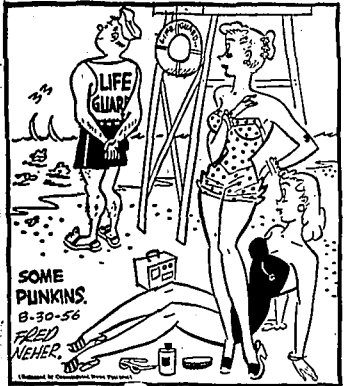

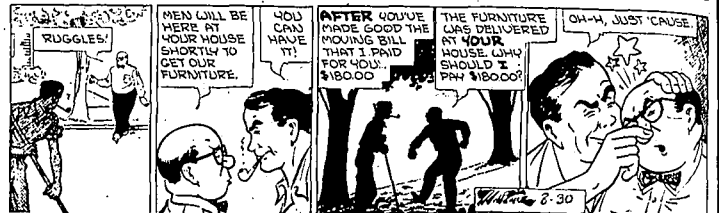
