Soviets Prepare To Intervene in Hot Suez Crisis

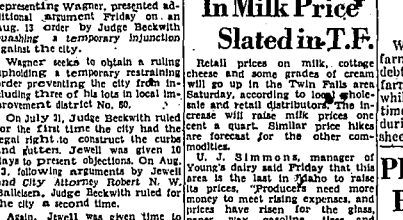

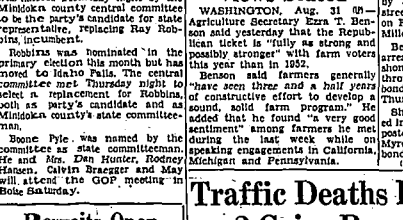

Research Emphasis Gives Reds Edge On U.S. in Agricultural Development

Complete, intensive and continuing research gives Russia the edge over the United States in rapid growth of agricultural development, according to Dr. F. V. Savitsky, who was "forced" to leave his country in 1925.

Dr. Savitsky, who left Russia as a member of the leading experts on sugar beets, was in Twin Falls for five days to record experiments made in this area on sugar beet seed. He was the scientist who discovered the monogerm for American agriculture.

Head of the monogerm research department of the Sugar Beet Experiment Station, sponsored by American sugar companies through the operation of the department of agriculture, Dr. Savitsky arrived in this country in 1924. At that time U. S. beet growers were using seed with multiple embryos.

Each of these embryos could grow and most did, but they required tedious and careful thinning, in order to eventually convert to machine harvesting. American farmers knew a monogerm type must be perfected.

Dr. Savitsky began examining all types of beets from throughout the country within eight months he had discovered the seed, Michigan 11.

(Although he didn't say so, Dr. Savitsky said the impression finding the seed was relatively easy.)

Beginning with only 100 plants of the mono-seed, Dr. Savitsky and his staff have developed it to a point where 25 per cent of the total sugar beet acreage in this country will be planted with it next year.

However, Marie Valley beet growers will not benefit from next year's amount because only top resistance has not been satisfactorily inbred in the seed.

A sugar beet disease incubator, Marie Valley has no peer in the world, according to Dr. Savitsky. He says the area has practically every beet affliction known.

Progress on the project is termed "astonishing" by Dr. Savitsky. Although he would not predict when the resistance would be perfected, he added it should be soon. (Dr. Savitsky says 25 to 50 years is usually the amount of time needed to inbreed this resistance, but says the current project will not nearly approximate this length of time.)

Dr. Savitsky was born in southern Russia. He progressed through the research and education profession in the United States, becoming a professor at the University of Kiev.

In addition to heading up of the beet research headquarters with five major stations under his control, he also taught evolution, genetics and statistics at the university.

After leaving Russia, he settled in Poland becoming a professor at Poznan University. Later he moved to Germany.

His coming to America in 1924 was arranged by the foundation because of the world wide notoriety he had received in the sugar beet industry. He and Mrs. Savitsky maintain their residence in Salt Lake City upon arrival to this country and have lived here since.

Currently he has more than 1,000 strains of sugar beets in this area. The plants are raised by the Marvin Aslett and sons Aslett ranch north of Jerome and on the farm of J. S. Felshauer and son, Kimberly.

He is not only perfecting satisfactory species for this area but is trying to perfect disease resistant types for other major beet raising centers in this country.

To the layman who is not aware of the ruthless effect caused by current the Amalgamated Sugar Company files show that in 1924 the average yield in this area was a little less than five tons per acre. The following year, using the newly perfected resistant strains, the average yielded 18 tons, reports Albert M. Murphy, company agronomist.

Authorities Keep Check Upon Sleeping Sickness Outbreaks

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31 (AP)—Public health officials are watching with concern but without great alarm, spotty outbreaks of sleeping sickness among humans and animals across the country.

The concern comes from the fact that sleeping sickness, a form of encephalitis, is often fatal. But the number of cases reported so far in 1936 was cleared by specialists as about average, although there are disturbing concentrations in some places.

The New York state racing commission has prohibited shipment of race horses into the state from anywhere in New England because of a reported outbreak of sleeping sickness there.

Dr. Robert D. Courter, interviewed by telephone at the U. S. public health service communicable disease center at Atlanta, said, "There is no unusual epidemic. We have pretty much the same thing every summer."

Dr. Courter and several of his associates were asked about the results of an associated Press survey this week, which showed sleeping sickness among humans and animals both reported this year in 20 states.

Church Will Ask Advice on Issues

BOISE, Aug. 31 (AP)—Democratic senate candidate Frank Church announced he planned to call on Alvin McCormack, Lewiston, for advice and assistance, particularly with respect to the problem of depressed farm income and rising costs.

McCormack was one of three candidates whom Church defeated for the Democratic nomination for the senate in Idaho's Aug. 24 primary election. McCormack yesterday congratulated Church on his victory and pledged his support to Church for the November general election.

Church commented in a wired acknowledgment to McCormack that he considered the Lewiston farmer "the most qualified man in Idaho on farm matters, and I know your help will prove invaluable in our common cause this November."

TURKEYS RAISED

BOISE, Aug. 31 (AP)—Idaho poultrymen this year are raising an estimated 16,000 turkeys of various breeds, the U. S. agriculture department's crop reporting service said today.

Business Has New Views in Solid Physics

NEW YORK, Aug. 31 (AP)—Curiosity about what goes on inside a solid lump of matter is costing some corporations plenty. It's likely to cost them more because expensive research facilities are being expanded.

The reason? What scientists call solid state physics has been rewarding many companies with profitable products they couldn't make 10 years ago. One example is the transistor, the little rod that can replace some radio tubes.

The study of solids, however, that within the next 10 years the major share of many businesses will come from products not now in production.

Laboratory Set National Carbon next month will open a multimillion-dollar laboratory in Parma, O., to concentrate on chemical and solid state physics.

Bell Telephone laboratories' work in that field brought about the solar battery operated by the rays of the sun.

U. S. Steel opened a research center a few months ago in the Pittsburgh area, where solid state physics is applied particularly to metals.

The study of solids, however, is concerned more with development of materials and processes for the mechanical, electronic, power, chemical and electro-chemical industries.

Perhaps 100 scientists worked on solid state physics 20 years ago. Now that research field attracts between 3,000 and 4,000.

The Labor day holiday this year is a special one. Memorial day and the Fourth of July came in the middle of the week-end of the summer.

As dawn breaks there are few lakes and streams which aren't being dimpled by the fast lures of fishermen.

The strangest of the most impressive navy ever has been seen is trundling its boats along the highways on trailers heading for the nearest launching ramp.

Unnumbered millions of men who, on week-ends are the muscles and sinews of U. S. industry, are wrestling with bulky picnic baskets, jamming recreation sites.

An army of equal numbers is in back yards across the country, blowing on suburban charcoal embers. They'll be slapping big steaks, pork chops or hamburgers around on their fireplaces or portable grills while hungry small fry look on in anticipation.

Thousands of their children are swimming on guardposts of beaches. Some are watching and others exploring underwater muck through skin-diving masks.

Their wives and daughters are sporting the latest in shorts, slacks or playclothes, looking as much like the pictures of leisure in the women's magazines as their husbands might not like the idea of the boys at the plant knowing about it, are cutting quite a few figures in their Bermuda shorts.

Other hundreds of thousands of workmen are taking the opportunity of the week-end to get their cars checked by mechanics, to have their lawnmowers repaired or repainting at their homes. An ocean of paint is going onto the sidings of these homes.

A similar ocean of gasoline is being popped into the atmosphere from the exhausts of others' power lawn mowers.

Highways, amply packed with automobiles, haul everything and anything from riding academies and archery ranges have queued-up volumes today.

INVADER OF DIPLOMATIC DOMAIN - Dulles, however, has a more reasonable basis for demanding Stassen's ouster as diplomatic representative.

Japan's Lack Of Navy Cited By U. S. Chief

TOKYO, Aug. 31 (AP)—Vice Adm. C. G. Callaghan told the Japanese people in a farewell speech today that their naval expansion program is "woefully inadequate."

"I would like to see Japan as a world power," he said. "The United States is prepared to guard the coastline for as long as that of the United States—or starve."

Callaghan, former naval commander in the United States, has been greatly alarmed at the tendency in Japan to relegate the maritime self defense force to third place—a very poor third place—in the national planning and the national appropriations," he said to the Japanese press.

"I do remind you that not far distant from Japan's northwest coast, there are forces of submarines and minelayers larger than either the United States or Germany could muster in 1939. If it should be some day that they should be used against you, these forces could be the Japanese sea line of communication promptly and efficiently."

"The vice admiral said the problem was one of simple logistics. He said: 1. The United States must defend a coastline of 4,800 miles, but must defend 16,214 miles of coastline. 2. Without proper coastal defense Japanese people would starve. 3. Japan moves from 24 million to 50 million tons of materials in inter-island shipping each year, requiring 300 to 400 ships entering and leaving Japanese ports each month. 4. Japan's six-year defense plan calls for a total warship tonnage at the end of six years of 110,000 tons, including 60,000 tons of aircraft carriers and aircraft already under construction."

Official States Pension Union Is 'Red Front'

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31 (AP)—For Sen. Harry F. Cain, in the last of a series of attacks on the labor movement, today he charged that the Washington State Pension Union is a communist front.

The Washington Republican, who has down from the SABC (formerly the Washington State Teachers' Association) recommended that the full board rule that the group is manipulated by Moscow and order it to merge with the attorney general.

Cain's ruling closed a strange political drama highlighted by two previous first by Cain himself, when by Attorney General Herbert Brownell, Jr.

During his scenic term, Cain was regarded as an ultra-conservative, and as such, was challenged by the pension union on the ground that he would not give it a fair hearing. Brownell rushed to Cain's defense, and the SABC threw out the union motion that Cain be disqualified.

But shortly after, Cain turned into a liberal and took credit for the work of the administration's loyalty-security program.

For this he aroused the enmity of powerful administration figures, including Brownell, and was not re-elected to the SABC by the President. According to Cain, he received "unsolicited help" from President Assistant Sherman Adams for his criticisms of the security program.

While later hearings on the Pension Union still were in progress in Seattle, the attorney general's representative asked in private "what evidence" that Cain should be disqualified because of bias.

The Pension Union this time made its defense and accused Brownell's action was "hypocritical." Counsel for the union added that the union was satisfied it would receive a fair hearing from Cain.

Again the SABC refused to remove Cain from the case.

In his decision today, Cain said that the aims of the union were in the beginning, but that in its evidence it was sufficient to be the Communist party."

He said the result was that the union is "managed, directed and supervised by leaders, the majority of whom are functionaries and representatives of the Communist party."

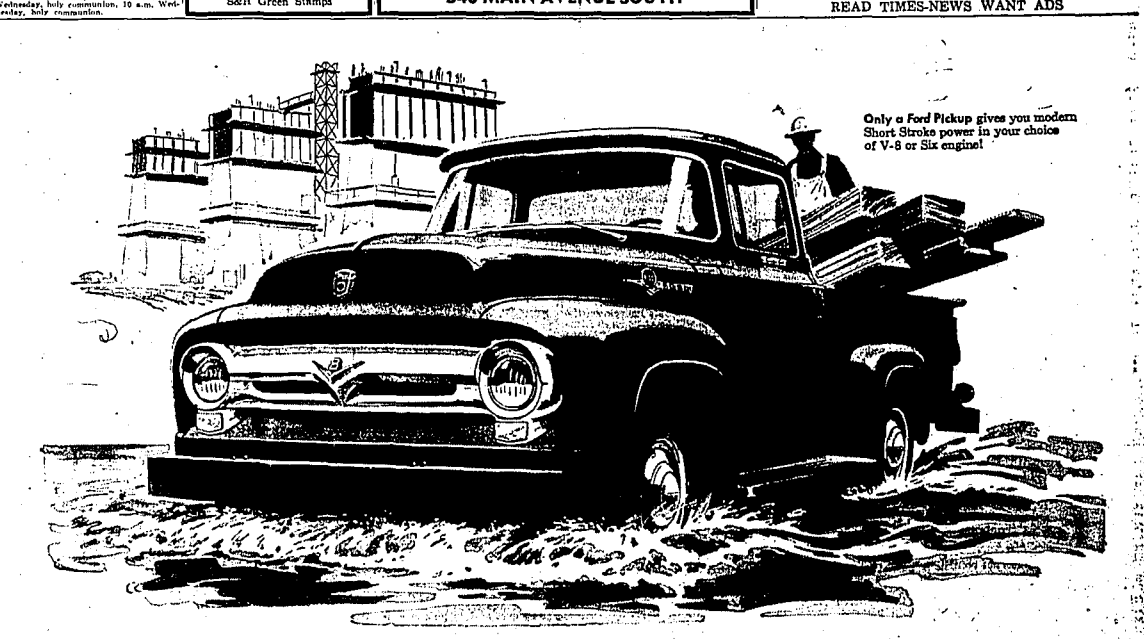

Care of Your Children

Every mother worth the name should be asked to attend school for children, to be and coming and just a little of other children. She would not for the world and all push them too hard, but she does want to get them along one way or another so that they shine out among the others. Sometimes this means trouble, because children grow best and in better quality of mind when given opportunity without pressure. One mother says to another, "Doesn't he sit up long? I'm surprised. My son sat up long ago." This leaves a mother at a loss. If she is not a sensible, well-informed mother, she will worry about that and be in deriding ways of getting Davy to come along faster. She begins to scold him. This pushing idea can be very harmful. You may get a child into school before his body and mind are ready for the change in environment. The tender body has not been prepared to take hours in a classroom, sitting on a hard chair for a long time, being kept in silence for a time, asked to follow directions for set periods—these are all new and very trying experiences for a little child. Only when he is physically and mentally developed to where he can take them without too much fatigue should he be asked to attend school. This is regardless of his age and the accomplishments of the neighborhood child or a relative's little one. When a child is allowed to be himself, he will be his best self, allowed to develop at his own rate according to the pattern of his gifts and his handiwork, he will do a far better job of growing, learning and living than if he is pushed and hurried ahead of himself according to another's pattern. A baby ought to be as good a baby as possible, a child as good a child as possible, and the adolescent allowed to be the good adolescent. The good-natured I am referring to is not behavior, but quality of being. It is not supposed to have the best-quality child if his growth is forced or dumbed in directions alien to him. Nature allowed children 21 years or more of growing time. There is no arguing with that old Lady, She is never pushed willingly and takes a mean revenge on those who do it. Give the children time. Guide them with patience. Direct them with firmness. Check them when necessary. But let each be the child, the peculiar child, nature ordained for the child should be. Stop pushing. 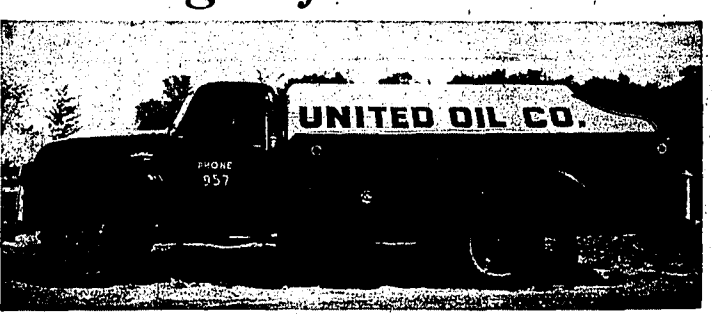

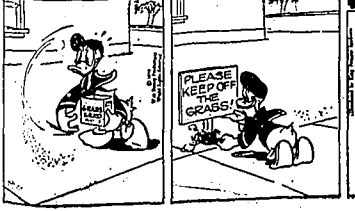

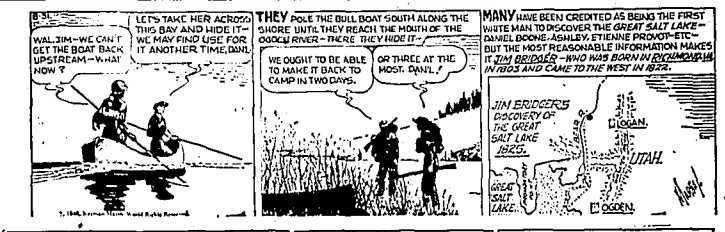

The new structure will link Castro Point in Richmond with Point San Quentin in Marin county. It was opened to pedestrians only for five hours today, but tomorrow the bridge will be opened to autos at a toll of 15 cents per car.

The opening of the new bridge marks an end of an era, however. The picturesque ferry boats which have plied between the two points for the past 41 years will cease operation.

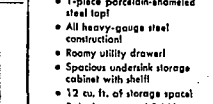

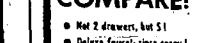
