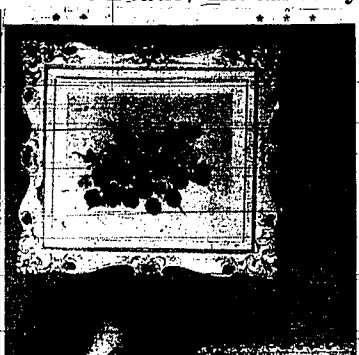

Filer Woman Likes Flowers, so Devised Means to Preserve Beauty Indefinitely

Mrs. Ralph Dean, Filer, a woman who enjoys flowers, has a hobby which allows her to have seemingly fresh flowers around her home throughout the year without any of the inconveniences or expense of buying and caring for fresh ones.



Using freshly cut flowers, Mrs. Dean has come up with a way to remove all the moisture and still leave them in nearly the same shape and color as when picked. In brief, the method she uses is to cover them with sand and bake them in her oven.



When the flowers are dried, she arranges them in bouquets, then mounts and frames them. The living room of her home has several of these flower pictures hanging from the wall in the drawers of an old desk cabinet she has hundreds of dried specimens waiting to be put together into floral arrangements.

Although she prefers using real flowers, Mrs. Dean has made floral pictures from such things as tiny sea shells, fish bones and scales and other items from the sea. Flowers also have proved to be her favorite design on ceramic objects which she has made.

In her work Mrs. Dean has used delphiniums, lilies, larkspur, roses, California poppies, sweet peas, bachelor buttons and pansies. She reports "pretty good" success with all but roses and California poppies. "Pansies are my favorite," she reports, "but I've had more had ones than good ones." She added that she gets her best results by drying single-petal flowers.

After experimenting with different types of sand, Mrs. Dean now uses sterilized white sand only. She dries the flowers in her oven one day at a 300-degree temperature. To start her preservative operation, Mrs. Dean puts a one-inch layer of sand in the bottom of a small cardboard box. Then, leaving small stems, she lays a freshly-picked flower face down in the box. After covering the flower with about an inch of sand, she puts the box in her electric oven at a low heat for about 24 hours.

The heat must be quite low, she emphasized. "For women with gas stoves, I would recommend just using the pilot light." After removing the flower and box from the oven, she allows them to cool for about 12 hours. When the sand is cool, she pours it off and the flower is ready for mounting.

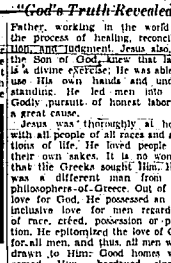
Most of Mrs. Dean's flowers are mounted on a small-covered piece of cardboard. First, she arranges the foliage on the background, usually using asparagus fern, which she buys from the dime store. Then, after breaking off the stem, she applies the flower to the cardboard. She then holds it in place on the background. Once the entire bouquet is attached to the background, she glues the cardboard to the back of the picture frame, sealing the cracks with masking tape to keep out dust.

Determined T. F. Man Finally Demonstrates Figs Will Grow

Claude King, 1184 Gem avenue, wouldn't listen to his friends three years ago when they told him that figs couldn't grow in the Twin Falls climate—and his determination to prove them wrong has finally paid off. Each winter King vacations in Louisiana, and in 1953 he brought back a fig tree cutting to plant in a garden beside his home. "People here and in Louisiana told me I was wasting my time," he said, "but I was pretty sure I could prove them wrong since I had grown figs in Kansas several years ago. The temperature there got down to 25 degrees below zero sometimes. . . . Since planting the original cutting, King has taken two other cuttings from it. This year all three have small green figs growing from their branches. "If the frost holds off until the green turns to brown—and the figs can ripen, I won't have to worry about the cold," he said. Last year the figs were near-ly killed by an early frost, but they are now about four feet tall. King says that when full grown, fig trees might be between 10 and 15 feet in height.

Prospects for reaching a settlement to Cynthia Ann and her white children's claims will be discussed. Quanah Park was born to Cynthia Ann and she was living with a Comanche riding party near Mexico, Tex., near Ft. Parker, when a year old she refused to return to her family but later was recaptured by Gen. Lawrence Sullivan Ross near Crowell, Tex. She died in 1870 and was buried near Poplar, Tex. Her body was reburied at Fort Oak cemetery in 1910. Quanah was one of two sons captured in the battle in which Cynthia was captured. He eventually won the rank of chief and finally surrendered his tribe to the white man after waiting continually war. At Ft. Bell he assumed his mother's name and became a champion of peace. He died in 1911.

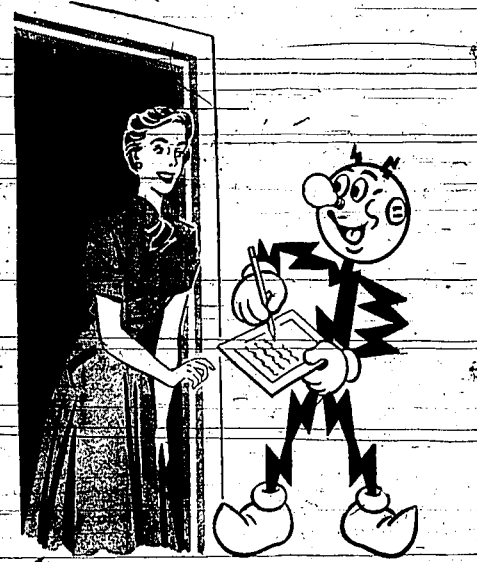

Magic Valley Tours Man-Made-Desert Lake Was Created for Power, Now Known Best for Recreation

Most desert lakes are man-made, such as the C. J. Strike reservoir 23 miles southeast of Mountain Home. The lake is now better known for its recreational features. The lake is somewhat far from Magic Valley but is among the places in the area which should be visited.

One way to the lake, the Three Island crossing of the Snake river by early emigrants at Glenna Ferry can be visited. By taking the road to the lake from Hammett, rather than following highway 20 to Mountain Home and then turning south, the Sahara desert-like sand dunes may be viewed.

And if one starts early enough in the morning, the trip can be completed in one day even if a person wishes to drive 70 miles farther to Silver City which is perhaps Idaho's most famous ghost town.

Idaho Power company completed the dam for the reservoir and the 20,000 kilowatt power plant in 1952 and named the reservoir in honor of C. J. Strike, who was president of the company when the project was started.

In 1953 the company made the shoreline of the lake available to the public under the supervision of the state fish and game department. The 3,000-foot-dam across Snake river backs up water 32 miles along the Snake and seven and one-half miles along the Bruneau river. The reservoir has 73 miles of shoreline including approximately 600 acres of irrigated land on the south side of the Bruneau river. This land is used by the state fish and game department to raise wild life feed.

The state fish and game department feels the warm waters of the Bruneau river are excellent for the propagation of bass and crappie and these fish, as well as kokanee and trout, have been planted in the reservoir. Bass fishing has been good at times and fair catches of trout have been taken near the dam.

Fish specialists claim it is too early to tell just how good the reservoir will become for fishing.

Waterfall frequent, the reservoir uties it both as a rafting and modern picnic area for water.

Boaters, water skiers and swimmers also make good use of the reservoir. Idaho Power company has a concrete ramp for public use and a boat dock for use by men at the base of the dam.

A picnic park, patterned after the park at Twin Falls, has been built in the company north of the dam. The facilities of the park, including outdoor electric grills, are for public use. Trees have been planted in the park, but since the entire area is new, the trees have not yet reached any great size.

For those who like the outdoors, a trip to the C. J. Strike reservoir is worthwhile. The trip can combine visits to historic and scenic sites with fishing, boating and swimming and a picnic in one of the most modern picnic areas in the state.

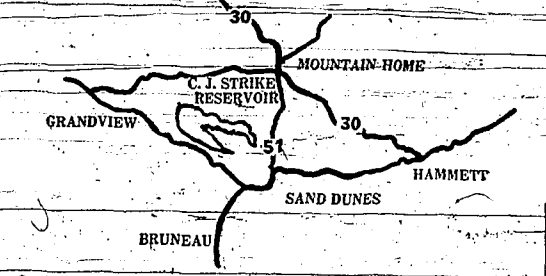

Radio Astronomy Supports Theory for Evolving and Not Static Solar Universe

SHEFFIELD, England, Sept. 1 (AP)—Radio astronomy, one of the newest of the sciences, has produced evidence to support the theory that the universe is not in a fixed state but is evolving with time. It was disclosed today.

Two scientists discussed the new technique whereby radio telescopes are able to listen to the secrets of outer space without the drawbacks of the optical telescopes. They spoke before the British Association for the Advancement of Science.

Dr. J. O. Davies of Manchester university, while building the world's largest radio telescope—a radar-like bowl almost the size of a football field suspended on 100-foot towers—told of research into meteor.

Visual observers can see perhaps 10 meters an hour if fog, cloud or other atmospheric conditions do not interfere.

"But the number of radio echoes detected can run into thousands per hour," he said.

Using this ability to hear far more than the eye can see, radio astronomers have had checked 100 meters to determine the "wind" theory about the world which meteorites take through space and the solar system.

If wind had taken visual observations many years of observation and photography to assess the same evidence.

Dr. J. R. Shakeshaft of Cambridge pointed out that as American

engineer offered the theory of radio astronomy in 1952. But already many dark spots, indistinguishable to the optical telescopes, are being charged and sources of emission or radio waves in outer space are also being located.

One of these sources is the remnant of the explosion of a star reported by Chinese astronomers in the year 1054 A. D. Another source is 300 million light years from earth and apparently is the result of the colossal collision of two galaxies at the very extreme limit of observable space.

"Mr. Shakeshaft said that about 2,000 sources of radio waves from outer space have been found—most of them beyond the limits of even the largest optical telescopes.

"There are more of these sources than would be expected if they were distributed uniformly through space and this tends to support the theory that the universe is still evolving."

Snavelly Says Split-T Not Making Points

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 1 (AP)—Carl Snavelly, the gray fox of coaching circles, says that the split-T wing operated as a scoring punch in college football.
The Washington University coach, using 116 college teams, compiled an average scoring figure for the 1935 season and found three wings outscored the split-T for 1935. "Using a single wing with unbalanced lines" was the best, Snavelly says. "The split-T, with multiple wings since I began keeping scores averages in 1929."

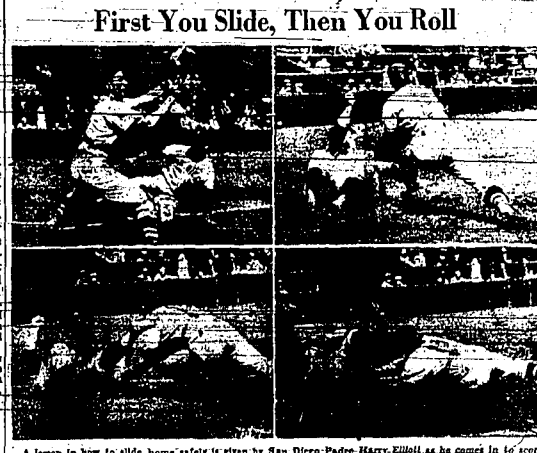

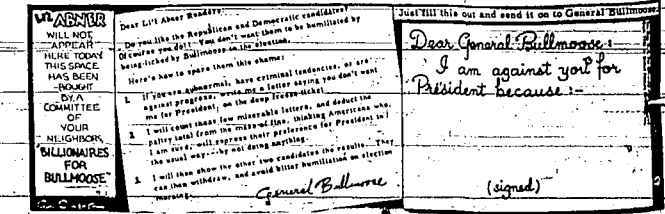
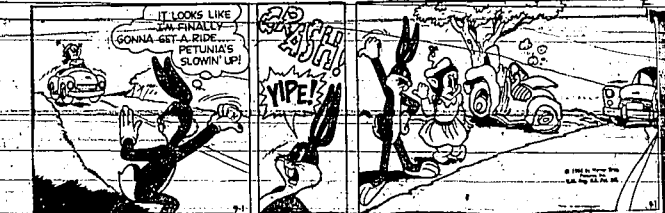

Wheat Prices Surge to New Season Highs

CHICAGO, Sept. 1.—Buyers today wanted wheat, and particularly wheat for delivery next fall, on the Board of Trade this morning.

Wheat bounced up to 84 cents in active dealings, all futures in season wheat setting new season high for July wheat, as did the deferred cash futures.

Traders were not so happy for the bulls in corn and soybeans. While July corn gained, all other corn futures as well as all soybeans, marked up small losses.

Wheat closed 3 to 8 1/2 higher, corn 1/2 to 1/4 higher, soybeans 1/2 to 1/4 lower and 1/2 to 1/4 to a cent higher, marked up small losses.

Demand for wheat was stimulated in part by the fact this was the last week for exporters to obtain all their wheat requirements from the government. Higher wheat will have a large portion in the free market, getting the rest as a subsidy from government stocks.

It was July wheat, rather than the 1936 crop months, which scored the biggest gain. At the close, July wheat was 64 cents above the price of July wheat a year ago.

Major lure for the buyers in July wheat was the prospect of a sharp drop in 1937 wheat production.

Market Rally Follows Drop During Week

NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—The stock market has ground again this week with a major Friday rally. It was the fourth straight week that the market has declined on a major after an eight-week rise in early summer.

Brokers were encouraged, however, by the market's strong showing on Friday when the average of 30 stocks made its biggest climb in 2 1/2 months.

This was accomplished, they pointed out, on the traditionally dull final session before the three-day labor day week-end. The Friday gains were enough to recoup almost one-half of the loss the average had absorbed as it declined the first four days of the week.

Brokers had felt that a technical overbought condition had been reached and they expected a pull back until after the holiday week-end.

The Associated Press index closed 12.30 on the week to 118.30. This compares with the all-time high in the history of the index of 123.00 when Standard Oil New Jersey was the market's active stock on the "big day" with volume of 1,000,000 shares.

Standard was unchanged on the week at 55 1/2.


