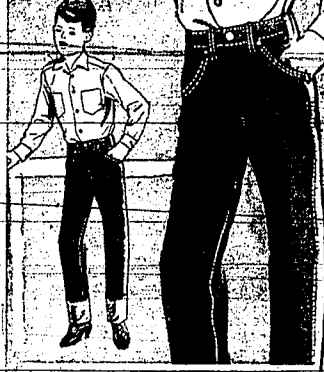

Science Finds Tadpoles Fine In Experiment

CHICAGO, Sept. 6 (AP)—"Scalpel," called Dr. John Chikakula. And with that he proceeded to remove the gall bladder from a sleeping tadpole.

Some time later the tadpole came out from under the anesthetic in a bowl of water, the little critter swam around in blissful ignorance of the fact it was making a contribution to medical science.

Chikakula, an anatomy instructor at Chicago Medical school, is trying to learn whether the gall bladder can make itself whole again if part of it is removed.

Takes Portion

The question has remained unanswered because when a surgeon removes a human gall bladder he takes it all. So Chikakula takes a portion of gall bladder from one tadpole and implants it in the tail fin of another, where he can watch its development.

Chikakula, a tall, thin, experimental embryologist with dark-rimmed glasses and a scientific aura, is up to his ears in tadpoles. He's also conducting research on tadpole livers and "galls," as he calls them.

"It's a good, scientific term," he said. "It means any part of the digestive tract."

Control Range Sought

Chikakula said it's common knowledge that the liver has powers of regeneration, but he wants to know whether it has some way of controlling its own regrowth and retaining its own texture after it's been removed. At the outset of all this basic research, Chikakula found himself surrounded by 2,000 salamanders in a tank. The number has dwindled, naturally, as the research has progressed.

Hoarding Problems

"Hoarding the eggs was a problem. Each required an individual finger bowl filled with water, which added up to 2,000 finger bowls.

"You can't put a bunch of tadpoles in one finger bowl," Chikakula explained, "because their dietary habits are cannibalistic."

Chikakula went to a suburban pond just sitting in quest of salamander eggs, and when he found them he was about to let the young tadpoles devour each other.

Food Was Problem

Fredling the tiny creatures was another problem. They eat baby worms, live. So Chikakula had to raise worms. He breeds them in pans of moist dirt, on top of which he sprinkles their food—soft meat, baby cereal and bread crumbs.

"There's no scientific explanation for the diet," he said. "It's just what baby worms like."

Removing a tadpole's gall bladder is a nice feat of micro-surgery, but under a microscope that magnifies ten times.

Put to Sleep

Chikakula puts his patients to sleep by letting them swim in a bowl of tricaine methanesulfonate, a narcotic even for a cannibalistic tadpole.

Berthen puts the tadpole flat on its back, a miniature operating table, wraps it down with strips of orange gauze. With a tiny instrument he makes the incision, and with a jeweler's forceps he removes the gallbladder, pinhead size.

Technically the operation is called a "cholecystotomy."

"The tadpoles don't mind it," Chikakula said. "They heal fast."

Idaho School Reorganization Program 96.5 Per Cent Complete, Official Says

BOISE, Sept. 6 (AP)—School reorganization started in Idaho in 1955 and set to be completed by the end of the year, according to the state superintendent of education, George E. Demman. He said that fact in the fall bulletin of the state department of education, which has been sent to all school administrators in the state.

Plan Asked to Meet Russia's Offensive Bid

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6 (AP)—The Eisenhower administration is searching for a safe course between congressional demands that the foreign aid program be ended and the administration's plan to meet Russia's new economic offensive in underdeveloped areas of the world.

The United States already has loaned out in the past 11 years a grand total of more than \$1 billion in grants and loans to foreign countries. But the new economic offensive started by Russia probably will cost billions more.

To study the question of where to go next in the foreign aid field, President Eisenhower yesterday announced formation of a citizens advisory committee. The committee, known as the President's Citizens Advisory Committee on the National Security Program, will be headed by Benjamin V. Pridemore, former chairman of the Board of U. S. Sipler.

The group will review the present foreign aid program and come up with tentative recommendations "as to the future policy of the government with respect to military, economic and technical programs in the light of the future policy of the government in the United States."

This is to say, the administration has worried about Moscow's new economic and military offensive in Egypt, Afghanistan, India, Indonesia and other important cold war areas.

At the time, it must take note of recent congressional action in foreign aid and the demands of some lawmakers that it be ended entirely.

Red Germany Has No Signs Of Prosperity

LEIPZIG, East Germany, Sept. 6.—Pretty girls and French puddles, two sure signs of prosperity in Germany, are absent in the Soviet zone.

East Germany is still rationing heavily along with meat, fat, potatoes, sugar and milk.

Visitors from the West to the 1956 fall trade fair here are struck immediately by the contrast between life in Communist East Germany and the West.

East Germany is another world—a drab, colorless stilted place instead of the colorful, busy life of the West. People are not allowed to buy appliances like washing machines. People are not allowed to buy a car.

Cold statistics disclose that an East German has to work 778 hours to buy a television set, compared to 200 hours in West Germany and about 75 in the United States. It takes 60 hours work to buy a pair of shoes here compared with 15 in West Germany.

Pretty girls and puddles are not contained in the economic labels, but they particularly strike a visitor from Berlin. Germans love animals and in West Berlin there are almost as many dogs as people. Most of them are French Poodles.

“I believe there is no need for a dog catcher. You can wander for hours and never see a pooch. There just isn't food enough to feed them.

Also, Berlin has some of the prettiest and best dressed women in Europe in the cafes and boulevards of the western section. In East Germany they don't exist. Clothes are so scarce that a secretary more than a week's salary.

It is said the rule is that at the end of the war, after 11 years of peace, the secret army divisions are still everywhere. But in Germany and you would never know a war had hit them.

Legends Kept Alive by Busy Business Firm

LONDON, Sept. 6.—John Greaves is a sentimental British businessman, dedicated to keeping alive the legend of Sherlock Holmes.

Voting Records of Nixon and Kefauver Compared in New Report of AFL-CIO

By LYLE C. WILSON

Washington, Sept. 6.—A smart fellow can prove almost anything with figures, and that goes for congressional voting records in a campaign year.

For example, take the men who won this year's major party nominations for vice president. The nominees in Congress together—191—were at least 200 million dollars in favor of Nixon's record.

On 31 substantial matters of public policy among those which came to a vote during those years, Nixon and Kefauver voted alike on 15 occasions. They were opposed on Kefauver who was recorded—18 times.

Legislators who vote alike about an issue as they are opposed surely cannot be so far apart in their political positions as to be leaders of their respective parties, each dedicated to the interests of the other. Can they?

The organization known as Americans for Democratic Action (ADA) attempts to measure the merits of politicians and parties. ADA finds almost nothing that is good about Vice President Nixon. It urged Senator Kefauver with an enthusiastic approval long before the Democratic party finds along with ADA on that. The left wing of the Democratic party finds along with a liberal and Nixon a reactionary and conservative. It arrives at its conclusions like this:

In 1947 Kefauver voted to support President Truman's veto of the Taft-Hartley bill. Nixon voted to override. Nixon voted for Kefauver against a resolution calling on Mr. Truman to use Taft-Hartley powers in the 1949 steel strike.

In 1950 Kefauver voted for a state amendment which would have increased and lengthened weekly unemployment benefits. The AFL-CIO political pamphlet compares that vote with Nixon's of 1950 in the house to discontinue federal regulation of unemployment compensation laws and to permit states to withhold compensation under some circumstances from persons who refused jobs in plants undergoing strikes.

Kefauver opposed and Nixon supported April 1, 1951, as the starting

date for new corporation taxes in preference to Jan. 1, 1951. Labor finds that this was unfair because corporations would have paid another 200 million dollars in taxes had the earlier date been imposed.

The foregoing are examples of about this man's qualities. . . I have taken from the political pamphlet distributed by the AFL-CIO an inclusive grasp of the fundamental premises on which our European recovery program was built. . . In a wide range of issues, Kefauver and Nixon have been far apart. They were more often agreed on matters of foreign than on domestic policy. They were in disagreement on matters relating to communist infiltration of American institutions.

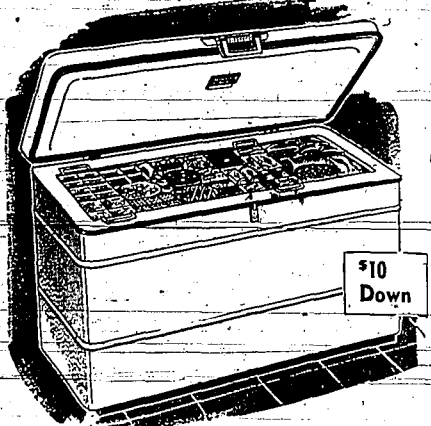
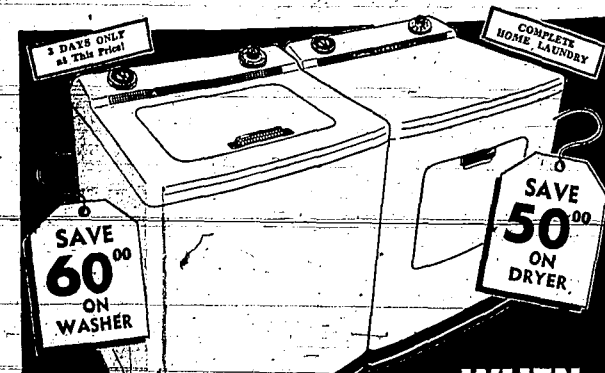

Rule on Race Orders to Be Given Review

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—President Eisenhower plans to review the federal court order which stipulates that the public schools of Mansfield, Tex. be integrated—an order which led to mob action by whites to prevent Negroes from registering.

A reporter told Mr. Eisenhower at his news conference yesterday that Texas Gov. Allan Shivers had voiced defiance of the court's integration decree and ordered Negro students trying to enroll at Mansfield transferred.

The reporter asked whether the President had discussed this situation with the justice department.

"I have not discussed it because you are quoting both an order that I have not ordered and a statement (Shivers') that I have not seen," the President answered.

But he added that he had sent for the district court order "to know what it says."

Another reporter asked whether Mr. Shivers considered Shivers' order to remove Negro students from the Mansfield school in the face of mob threats as a surrender to mob rule.

Status Unknown

The President replied that he did not know whether the governor had ordered the permanent transfer of these people or until the situation is under control.

The President then went on to say that the federal government should not act to put down riots against school integration unless local law enforcement breaks down. So far, he said, there has not been any case of a state failing to grasp "with this question" for riot property.

Mr. Eisenhower also pleaded again for patience and moderation in the school segregation dispute.

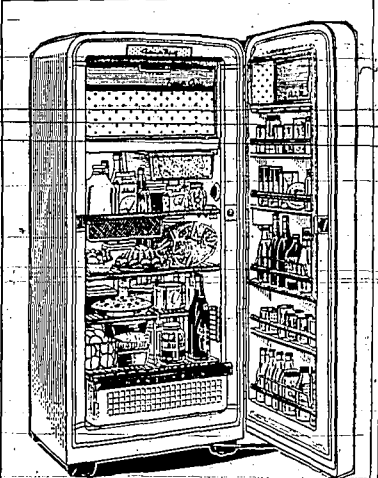
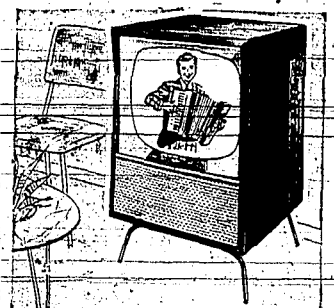

Demo Claims Ike Realizes Farmer Hurt

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6 (AP)—Senator Douglas, D. Ill., said today that President Roosevelt's projected farm policies indicate that the President realizes his farm program has not worked and has hurt most of the farmers.

Senator Humphrey, D. Minn., another opponent of the Republican farm policies, agreed with Douglas that the Midwest farm belt "will certainly be a major battleground in this year's campaign."

Plans Farm Talk.

Roosevelt told his news conference yesterday he plans to discuss the farm situation Sept. 21 at one of the "national field days" at New York, N. Y., and make a major nationally televised farm speech a week later.

Adlai Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee, agreed previously to make a farm speech at New York Sept. 22.

Remember 1938 Vote

Both parties apparently realize the importance of the 1938 vote in which President Truman surprised the GOP by carrying Iowa and other Midwestern states, both states and winning reelection.

Republicans got a better feeling this year when average farm prices rose up about 12 percent from a 14-year low in mid-December. They recently only partly recovered that gain and mid-August level dropped another three per cent.

Secretary of Agriculture Benson credited those declines to a seasonal downturn at harvest time but Democrats are certain to use the drop as campaign ammunition throughout the farm belt.

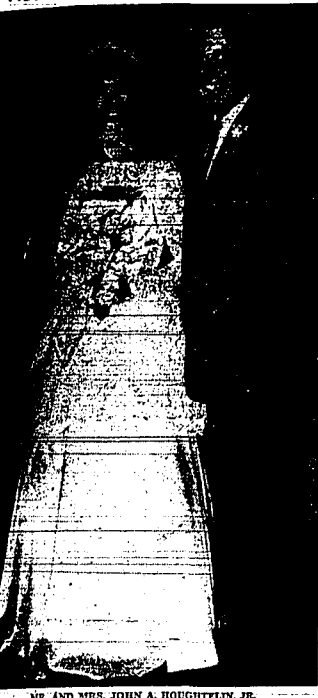

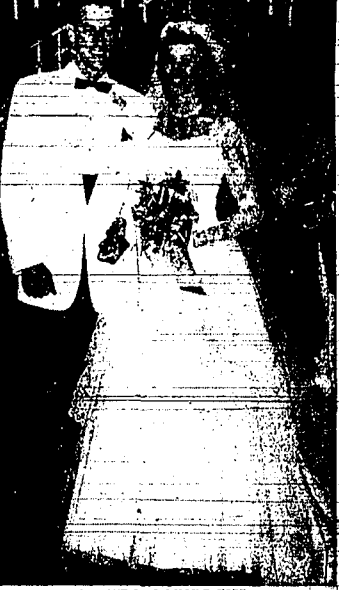

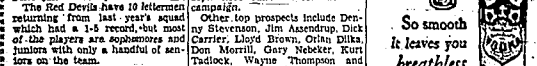

Baltimore Hospital Experimenting for Way to Cut Critical Shortage of Nurses

BALTIMORE, Sept. 6 (AP)—A Baltimore hospital set out last April to experiment with a plan to cut the critical shortage of nurses.

The hospital's brainchild is now five months old and a little more than half grown, and nurse La Verne says "it's beautiful."

Morris Thorne, administrator of the hospital, says, "We're enthusiastic."

Assistant Administrator Sol Gladstein, who is running the experiment, says, "It is progressing very nicely."

Dr. William H. Hamill, who disagrees with the fundamental principle of the plan, says, "It's a mistake."

"The plan," simply, is to free the

nurses from the linen closets, cleaning details and food trays and let them concentrate all their time to the patients.

"To do this," Gladstein says:

1. Employ a "floor manager" for each nursing unit, or floor, who assumes administrative duties under the general supervision of the head nurse.
2. Trained floor maids to serve the food trays and to do the housekeeping and cleaning.
3. Both add up to better service to the patients.

The plan, backed to the tune of \$25,000 by the U. S. public health service, is being tested in two of the hospital's 12 nursing units. One is a 25-bed private maternity unit, and

the other is a 31-bed semi-private surgical and medical unit.

If the scheme proves itself, the plan will be distributed by the public health service to other hospitals who wish to try it.

Gladstein has six managers and 18 maids in training.

Gladstein said the program "has sidestepped administrative problems away from the nurses."

And Gladstein said it is much easier to call the floor manager away from a floor when something goes wrong administratively than to take the nurse away.

Hamill, whose dissent from belief in the plan is entirely friendly, acknowledges that the floors are cleaner in the experimental units.

"But Mr. Gladstein has brought order where there was anarchy," he said, "I want to bring order, too, but in a different way."

In short, Hamill is opposed to decentralization. He believes the present plan where food is served to patients by maids from a central dietary department, and the hospital is cleaned by staff working out of a central housekeeping department, are made to work just as well or better than the floor manager plan.

The fund is financed by a 40-cent royalty on each ton of coal produced from mines which account for about 80 per cent of total U. S. production.

A grandmother looked against all the foibles and said it belonged to Janet Griffiths, 7, and her sister Sandra, 5. The worried grandmother had reported to police the girls had not come home from school for their lunch, she learned why.

The children, with other lower grades, were walking along the fence surrounding the play yard of their North Side elementary school, at the end of the morning session.

An car driven by 16-year-old Richard Dombek made a sharp, fast turn and hit a lamp post. Bouncing off the post, it swept across the sidewalk and plunged into the children.

The girls' bodies were pinned between the iron pickets of the fence. A third girl was cut and scalded by water spewing from the forced car radiator.

Solon Urging Development Of Oil Shale

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6 (AP)—Senator O'Mahoney, D-Wyo., said Wednesday the "oil shale" crisis points up the need for development of oil shale reserves in Wyoming, Colorado and Utah.

"The availability of oil supplies from the Middle East is jeopardized, he said, by the dispute over the Suez canal. The Bureau of Mines, O'Mahoney said, should intensify research in the production of liquid fuels from shale deposits in the three western states. Geologists believe, he said, there is more recoverable available in the deposits than in all of the Middle East.

"If this is true," O'Mahoney said, "these three western states have almost four times as much recoverable oil as is to be found in the whole of Arabia."

"Research to determine how best to recover and use this invaluable oil deposit," he said, "is a responsibility of the government. The oil companies will not undertake the research unless they see a present prospect of profit."

"Since most of these lands are in the public domain, it has always seemed clear to me that the U. S. Bureau of Mines, which is thoroughly competent to do the job, should be permitted to resume the activities so recently abandoned."

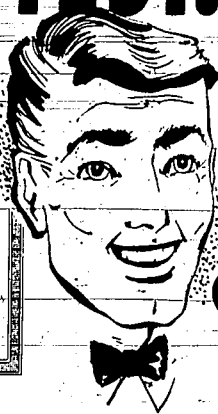
