## Motion Made at Hearing to Deny Application for Use of Water From 2 Springs

### State PUC Notes Intervention for Co-Ops Gas Plan

WENDELL, Sept. 7 (AP)—A motion to deny the application of the Crystal Springs Irrigation Company, Bull, for water from Crystal and Niagara springs, Salmon Falls creek and Rock creek was taken under advisement by Mark Culp, state reclamation engineer, at the hearing on the application which opened here Friday morning.

The hearing was presided over by Frank Rettig, Jerome attorney who is representing the Crystal Springs Irrigation Company.

BOISE, Sept. 7 (AP)—The Idaho public utilities commission gave notice yesterday it is intervening against the efforts of Idaho's natural gas co-ops to obtain a gas allocation from the federal power commission.

Don R. Korth, commission secretary, said Intermountain Gas company had asked the commission to take action. Intermountain holds a certificate from the commission to distribute gas throughout southern Idaho. "The commission has always been in favor of an integrated system," Korth declared. "There is no law providing for safety regulation of the co-ops or establishing jurisdiction over them. Also, there would probably be economies as a result of having a large system."

Korth said the PUC had not set hearing dates on the applications of the co-ops for delivery of gas from the Pacific Northwest Pipeline corporation plant.

The applicants are co-operative gas associations in Alameda, Blackfoot, Burley, Caldwell, Idaho Falls, Jerome, Mars, Montpelier, Pocatello, Boise, and Weiser.

Intermountain has brought an action challenging the legality of the Korth plan, which is set up in the Idaho Gas Act. The action was scheduled for Sept. 13 in district court at Boise.

## 10,520 Throng Fair To Hit Near-Record Attendance Record

A trace of rain with a threat of more to come held down attendance Friday morning on the third day of the 1935 Twin Falls county fair, but gatemen predicted a large crowd for the last day of afternoon and evening entertainment. Some 10,520 persons paid their way into the fairgrounds Thursday for East End day, barely missing the 1933 attendance record by only 17 persons. A slightly smaller crowd is predicted for Friday. Gatekeepers pointed out that the figures represented paid attendance only; adding that no record exists of the number of exhibitors and concertgoers or of the number of persons who enter the grounds each day.

FFA livestock fitting and showing contests started at 10 a. m. followed by a judging contest. A livestock parade, held at 1:30, preceded the afternoon of horse racing.

Following the livestock parade, six races, ranging in length from one-fourth to three-fourths of a mile in length, were held. Prizes for the winners ran from \$120 for the three-fourth mile race to \$15 for the one-fourth mile race for children under 15 years of age.

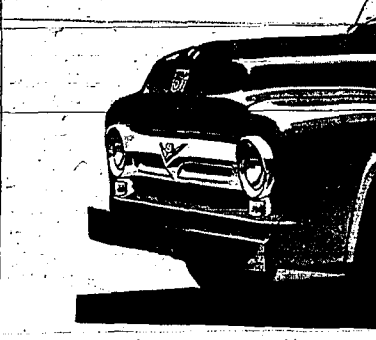

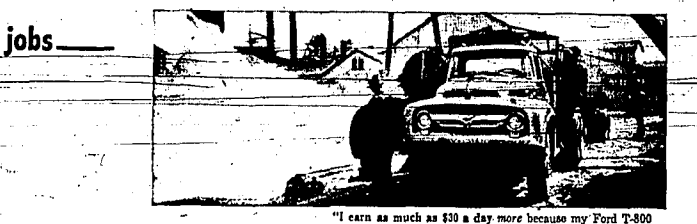

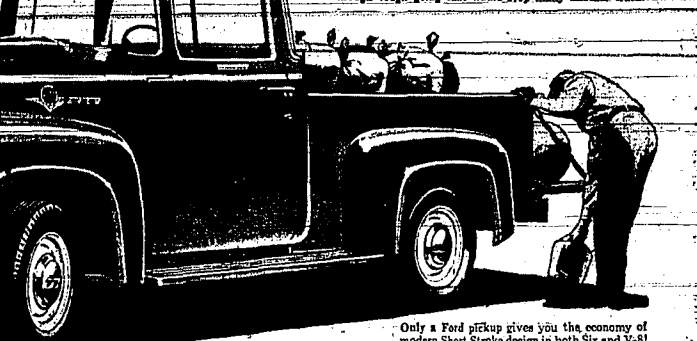

Education for Fighting Reds Now Required

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7 (AP)—A Harvard dean today proposed a nationwide program of schoolroom education on the communist menace to meet "one of the greatest and most urgent needs" in the United States.

Dr. William Vandell Elliott, dean of the Harvard summer school, made the proposal at the American Political Education association convention as it opened its second day-long session. Presidential Assistant Howard Fyfe was also scheduled to speak.

The youth of America, Elliott said, are growing up ignorant of the cold war, and he said that about 100 million communists live in the world today. He said that about 10 million of these are in the United States.

He proposed a nationwide committee to be set up to survey present high school college and adult education courses and prepare education material on communism.

Establish pilot programs in selected schools and pilot workshops for high school teachers.

Harold D. Leavitt, professor of law at Yale university and outgoing association president, said that the "introduction" of the atomic bomb during World War II in a way "that contributed unnecessarily to world insecurity."

Former President Truman's decision to use the atomic bomb without first sharing it with this country's allies reduced "immunities" toward effective international control after the war, Leavitt said.

He said he did not want to hold a "warfare court" on Mr. Truman's decision, but "in the light of hindsight" Leavitt added that he wanted to define that probability that in the war was introduced in a manner that was "unintentionally" and "unwisely."

Andrew Hacker, assistant professor of government at the University of Chicago, said that the "corporation" of the United States is "not free" from the influence of the "corporation" of the United States.

Polio Hits Harder In Southeast Part

POCATELLO, Sept. 7 (AP)—More than a third of the polio cases reported in Idaho so far this year have occurred in the southeastern portion of the state.

Dr. J. W. Wyatt, district health department director, said yesterday that 21 of the 61 cases have occurred in southeastern Idaho — "an area with about one-eighth of the state's population."

The heaviest concentration has been in a belt from Pocatello south toward the Utah line. Wyatt said, adding that it is unusual for one portion of the state to have a heavier concentration than others.

Wyatt and none of the cases has occurred among persons who have received bulk anti-polio vaccine, estimated at about 11,000.

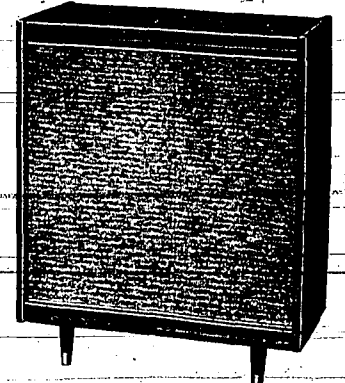

### Pair Located On Mountain After Search

MT. RAINDER NATIONAL PARK, Wash., Sept. 7 (AP)—Two children who slipped high up on the side of 14,410-foot Mt. Rainier without permits were found by a day-long search precipitated by a series of distress signals.

The pair, identified as Don Richardson and Earle Johnson, Victoria, B. C., was found on a steep 4,800-foot ledge by a party of mountaineers. They immediately were taken to headquarters and a fine of \$25 each.

Presence of the couple on the dangerous mountain heights first was learned Wednesday night when lights were seen from a distance about 10 miles from the 15,000-foot level. Rescuers yesterday reached the 12,000-foot level before being forced to bed down after exchanging shots with the pair.

Another rescue party led by Wally Brown, a Tacoma mountaineer, later encountered the pair at 8,800-foot level. They were hiking down toward Paradise Inn, which, at the 5,500-foot level.

It is not known when the pair started out on the climb, permission for which must be obtained from park officials after about a day's waiting. The search, according to officials of the park who announced findings of the pair, said the children were a valuable nur could be say when they would arrive at park headquarters.

### Dentists Hear Of Menace to Public Health

SUN VALLEY, Sept. 7 (AP)—An authority on dental legislation said Thursday the activities of an "unscrupulous minority" of the dental laboratory industry pose "a threat to the health of the public."

Bernard J. Conway, Chicago, secretary of the council on legislation of the American Dental Association, addressed at its annual convention here.

The use of illegal dentistry is confined almost exclusively to those persons who operate a commercial dental laboratory as a front behind which they attempt to perform dental services for the public, Conway said. He called for clear legal definition of dental practice, stiff penalties for unauthorized practice or "padding" and funds and personnel for investigation of such practice.
