Co-Ops to Face Second Test in Idaho Courts in Idaho

Southern Idaho's natural gas cooperative movement came up for a second test in district court Wednesday and prepared for another legal battle which will soon be joined in the state supreme court. Judge M. Oliver Koelsch opened the trial in Boise of a suit by InterMountain Gas company against the Meridian Cooperative Gas association—one of a dozen co-ops that have been formed to distribute gas on a non-profit basis. The supreme court prepared to hear arguments Monday on a decision by Judge Henry McQuinn upholding the validity of a 30-year franchise granted by Idaho law to the Idaho Falls gas co-op. Still to be tried in district court is a similar suit filed by InterMountain against the Weiser gas co-op. InterMountain has a certificate from the state public utilities commission for local distribution of gas from a pipeline now being laid through the Idaho Falls gas co-op. The co-ops are set up earlier this year by the state supreme court. R. E. Schweser company and Washburn-Bender corporation eventually they would be municipally owned utilities. InterMountain contends the cities have no power to lease franchises to the co-ops. It filed the suit Tuesday in a brief filed as a "friend of the court" in the Idaho Falls case. The co-ops are "dummy" corporations set up by the bondsmen for quick profits. It said the Idaho Falls co-op would not have the right to power to distribute gas in building a necessary 50-mile line to bring gas to Idaho Falls from the main pipeline at Pocatello. The attorneys for the nine public utilities in Weiser suit also filed a brief as friends of the court against the Idaho Falls co-op.

Strong Oppositions Are Raised Against Dulles' Canal Plan

LONDON, Sept. 19 (AP)—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles today urged the London Stock exchange to establish the proposed United States canal with a traffic control body. But his move ran into strong opposition from other nations present. Pakistan Foreign Minister Malik Feroz Khan Noon flatly rejected the Dulles plan and said the association should be used only to seek negotiations with Egypt. Danish Premier H. C. PUC Move Protested By Gas Cooperatives

BURLEY, Sept. 19.—Representatives of the Idaho Association of Natural Gas Cooperatives today afternoon sent a strongly worded resolution to the Idaho public utilities commission, demanding that the PUC withdraw its petition of intervention with the federal power commission. Attorneys and representatives of natural gas cooperatives in 10 of the 12 southern Idaho communities which have such representation as well as many of a number of chambers of commerce, were present at the meeting. Jerome and Rupert were the only two communities not represented. Those with representation at the meeting were Alameda, Preston, Weiser, Meridian, Caldwell, Mountain Home, Idaho Falls, Montpelier, Pocatello, Blackfoot and Burley. InterMountain Gas company now the PUC had representatives at the meeting. The resolution, after reviewing the natural gas situation up to the present, recommended that the PUC in intervening with the PUC as "study and advise and report on the situation and proposed action" and to calculate and produce the interests of recipients of natural gas to the "best advantage" of the community. Fundamental Facts Reviewed to Show Importance of Suez, Chances for War

(A poll taken this week by the Wall Street Journal showed that only 43 of 10 Americans read news stories of the Suez canal, but 70 percent of these people had heard the news because it had been so important.)

Why all the shouting—and maybe shooting—over the Suez canal? Why is one waterway so important it has become a world crisis? What difference whether Egypt operates it as an international authority?

Let's take a look at some fundamental facts about the Suez canal: It is 101 miles long. The Panama canal is 50. The Suez runs at sea level—without locks, from the Mediterranean to the Red sea. It links Europe with Asia and with the oil fields of the Middle East.

On any given day 40 to 50 ships traverse the canal. They are carrying one-sixth of the entire maritime cargo of the world and 80 percent of the oil going to or from Europe. The Suez tonnage last year was 115 million on 14,866 ships—most three times that of the Panama.

Europe consumes 2,500,000 barrels of oil a day. About 1,200,000 of it passes daily through the Suez. Some 800,000 comes through pipelines to the Mediterranean—the remainder from North and South America.

Should the Suez flow be stopped, Europe would get only half as much oil products for its automobiles, factories, factories.

The alternative for getting Middle East oil would be for tankers to go around the Cape of Good Hope—that's about 5,000 miles longer in London. The company charged a tanker carrying 100,000 barrels of oil \$12,000 to use the canal. It costs about \$10,000 a day to keep a tanker at sea. So in four days on the cape voyage the \$12,000 would have been spent.

Polar Region Attracts Men; Study Is Eyed

DAVEVILLE, R. I., Sept. 18 (AP)—You wouldn't think there'd be many volunteers for a mission to a frigid, unexplored region where the only guarantee is four months of being snowed out and local Eskimos at bay.

The Navy didn't think so either when it asked for men willing to spend 18 months in the Antarctic, roaming seven American research stations.

But the response was overwhelming. Several thousand brave men offered to aid the vast scientific investigation in a little known area that might be of great strategic value in event of an atomic war.

131 Selected
Selected were 18 officers and 132 enlisted men. They were chosen on the basis of professional capability, maturity and physical fitness. Dubbed "Operation Bravo," the detachment is winding up special training at the Atlantic fleet commandant's headquarters here.

The basic mission of "Bravo" is to support American civilian scientists who will study secrets of nature at the bottom of the world. Some of the men have done geologic research. Eight members of the group, with nine scientists, will spend the winter at a station at the South Pole, where only nine men have ever set foot.

Some of the men were volunteered for such a hazardous adventure and why?

Reasons Vary
Almost as varied as typical family men; the rest, career bachelors. Their reasons, as told to the Times News, vary.

Lieut. John K. Zoller, Shelby, Mont., Protestant chaplain, said he volunteered "because it is a challenge."

Radioanalyst Donald L. Bradford, Miss. Airtel, plans to study for a college degree. "The Antarctic will be full of evenings with nothing to do and no place to go," he said.

TOKYO, Sept. 18 (AP)—A retired Japanese military leader just back from Peking told today of a proposal by Mao Tse-tung that Red China and Japan unite to "beat the United States, our common enemy," from Asia.

"We only laughed in his face, so loud that the meeting was suspended for awhile," reported former Lieut. Gen. Akio Doi.

Duo Envisions Firing Rocket, Striking Moon

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19 (AP)—Two navy scientists have said it may have become possible to send a rocket to the moon.

The rocket probably would deliver to moon land a "four-pound payload" to the moon, said Kurt R. Stelling, chief of propulsion at the naval research laboratory here, and Richard Foster, a member of the laboratory propulsion staff.

Could Be Done
For that reason, they said, the initial payload might consist of nothing but a charge of metallic dust. They said that if it were fired at a new moon and if it landed on the darkened surface, the impact might be witnessed from the earth as a large bright flash.

Stelling and Foster expressed their views in an article prepared for a new magazine, *Milestones and Rockets*. The article is based on a paper scheduled to be read at the International Astronautical Federation Congress in Rome today.

Own Opinions
They stressed that the opinions expressed were not to be construed as reflecting the views of the navy department.

Stelling and Foster said that when carried aloft by a huge four-million-cubic-foot skyrock balloon, a solid-propellant step rocket will be capable of bringing a four-pound payload to the moon.

Cluster Required
They noted that small rockets frequently have been carried aloft and launched from balloons, but added that a lunar rocket might require a cluster of smaller balloons for greater stability. The rocket would be launched straight up, through the balloon or balloons, they said.

The navy scientists proposed a three-stage rocket vehicle which they said should hurl the payload toward the moon. The distance between the moon and the earth varies from 21,662 to 252,710 miles as the moon moves along its orbit.

Idaho Farmer Income Stays Almost Steady

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19 (Special)—Idaho farmers have almost the same income from cash receipts from farm marketings for January through July of 1956 that they had for the same period last year, the department of agriculture reports.

Cash receipts from livestock and products up to August for 1956 were \$31,669,000 as compared to \$31,747,000 for the same period last year. Crop receipts were \$70,823,000 this year and \$71,010,000 last year.

Realized net farm income per farm in Idaho was above the national average in 1955, according to department figures.

The Idaho average was \$2,421 per farm; the national average, \$2,268 per farm. This was the lowest figure for Idaho farmers since 1949. In 1949 the average for Idaho farms was \$3,153; 1950—\$2,831; 1951—\$3,435; 1952—\$3,745; 1953—\$3,501; 1954—\$2,701.

Realized gross farm income for Idaho farmers in 1955 was \$266,900,000. This broke down into: Cash receipts from marketings—\$233,200,000; governmental payments—\$4,500,000; value of home consumption—\$11,100,000; gross rental value of farm dwellings—\$18,200,000.

Farm production expenses came to \$265,700,000. Realized net farm income was \$90,200,000. But net change in farm inventories came to \$9,500,000. This made total net farm income \$109,800,000.

Father Asking Stiff Penalties On Kidnaping

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 19 (AP)—Maurice, a man who has been in the business of kidnaping for years, said today that a penalty of 10 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine should be levied on anyone who kidnaps a child for ransom.

Maurice was arrested last year after he had kidnapped a 10-year-old boy from the home of a woman in the city. Nine days later the boy was returned to his father, but Maurice was sentenced to 30 days in jail.

"I just wanted a baby to take home," Maurice said. "I was committed to a hospital but a few days later I was released. I pleaded guilty to the kidnaping and was sentenced to the county jail. With time off for good behavior, I could be free in 10 days."

Maurice said that while the woman did not steal the child, the fact remained that her suffering was not reduced when she learned the child was missing.

"Kidnaping is the most heinous of all crimes because it tortures the victim," he said.

Maurice obviously is not satisfied with the penalties levied on members of his profession. He said that the law should be made so stiff that anyone who kidnaps a child would be deterred from doing so.

Nation's Canine Population Increasing; Dogs Healthier

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—If the average man never had it so good in America—well, the average dog is having it even better.

Dogs in this country are increasing faster than people, percentage-wise," said Wallace Kendall, 45, of 500 South Main street, is president of the National Dog Welfare guild. The organization sponsors the 29th annual National Dog week, which opens Sunday.

The theme this year is Rover's role in creating a safe home.

"Some 17 million American families now own a total of 23 million dogs," said Kendall. "The growth of the suburbs is causing a tremendous increase in the dog population."

"But you don't need a police dog or a mastiff to protect your home. Burglars aren't scared off so much by dogs that attack them as by dogs that alert the household by barking."

"For this purpose the smaller dogs—terriers, miniature bulldozers and toy poodles—are often best, because they are more nervous."

Kendall gave this tip for training watchdogs:

"If you want the dog to guard your house at night, feed him in the morning. Then he'll be alert and hungry by nightfall, and won't fall asleep."

"If you want him to be alert during the day, feed him at night."

Kendall is a strutting encyclopedia of canine statistics, such as:

"Americans spent 284 million dollars for dog food last year and the nation's pet shops grossed 50 million dollars from the sale of dogs."

"The average dog weighs 50 pounds, eats 500 calories a day, costs \$50 a year to feed and lives to be 10 years old."

"The larger the breed the shorter the life. A Great Dane ordinarily lives to be 7 or 8, a chinchihuahua will survive 15 years."

"I heard of one dog—I forget the breed—that lived to be 26. Since a dog lives seven times as fast as a person, that's equivalent to a man living to be 182. Very remarkable."

"Some parents now worry because their young children prefer dog biscuits to cookie. No reason to. They won't hurt a child and have more real food elements than most cookies."

"Both California has more dogs, in comparison to the number of people, than any other state. But dogs in California are better fed and live longer."

It seems that Rover, like his master, likes varying flavors in his food. His favorites: Meats, vegetable, cheese, ginger and charcoal. Not even a talking dog has ever been known to murrmur, "make nice vegetables."

The dog, like man, often becomes a victim of man's civilization. Just like his owner he is prey to a host of ailments arising from toxemia and halitosis to hepatitis and a seemingly increasing amount of cancer. Cancer in dogs usually, however, is external, but this may be simply because internal cancers in pets are rarely diagnosed.

"People should beware of feeding their dogs candy and the wrong kind of table scraps," said Kendall. "They have a poor tolerance for sugar. Throws 'em dermatitis."

Kendall gets real cross over owners who think it cute to feed their dogs alcoholic drinks. Booze can turn the milkiest side into an uproarious cop-biter.

"Dogs tend to act like the people who own them," said Kendall. "If a person who gets aggressive when he takes aboard too much liquor starts shoving his drink with his dog, the dog is likely to develop an aggressive personality."

"It is inhuman to teach discipline to an animal whose only real joy in life lies in loving you."

Witness Tells of Losing Share of Cash in Robbery

BOSTON, Sept. 18 (AP)—The prosecution's star witness, Joseph J. O'Keefe, gave a detailed account yesterday of how he said he was relieved of his \$100,000 share in the \$1,210,000 Brink's robbery by all partners in the crime.

O'Keefe is not on trial, having previously pleaded guilty, but says that the originally-indicted defendants—in the Suffolk superior court trial, two others are dead.

After giving the all-male jury a day-by-day story of the actual perpetration of the world's largest cash robbery, O'Keefe said he was short-changed after he turned over \$50,000 to Adolph (Jas) Maffie, one of those on trial, for safekeeping.

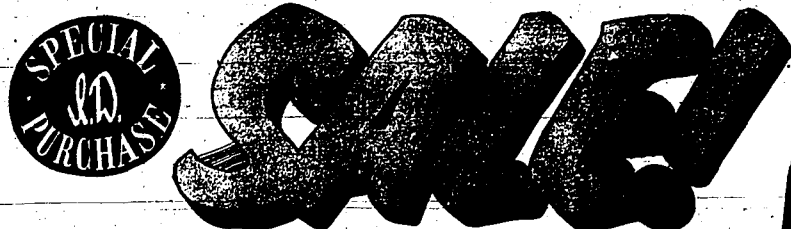
