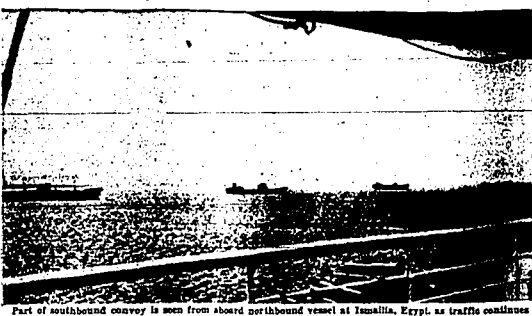
WASHINGTON, N. C., Sept. 20 (AP)—The House today announced the recommendations of the House committee on ways and means to reduce federal taxes. A Washington economist said here yesterday.

### Many Experts Forecast New Inflation Bid

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP)—A growing number of economists believe that the outside-the-government, low-profile inflationary groundswell is not unannounced. Some expect 1957 to bring back a stable economy, but the economy has advanced in the wake of price mark-ups which hit consumers this summer and will continue.

But many points with concern to the steadily rising cost of doing business, and especially to the year-around cost of wage increases—the annual pay boosts for three to five percent productivity—the output per hour—were rising as fast as the cost of other costs are rising. The savings would balance the cost increases. Price boosts would not be necessary.

Unfortunately, government analysis shows, productivity has been falling behind. The cost increases have been absorbed by many firms which had considerable profit margins but recently more and more have punched holes in the retail price structure.

### "Anti-Matter" Is Charged on Odd Behavior

SEATTLE, Sept. 20 (AP)—Some newly discovered strange behavior of particles inside the nucleus of atoms may be due to the mysterious workings of a recently found "anti-matter," a scientist from Soviet Russia reported here.

Observation of the behavior of protons and neutrons in the nucleus, made recently at Stanford University, disclosed that they are either larger than atomic theory says they should be, or are pushed into a smaller region than expected.

This has led to conclusions by some experts, said Dr. Donald Yennie of Stanford, that there may be something wrong with the long-standing theory of quantum electrodynamics which has been built up to describe their properties and movement.

Coming up with a different opinion, Dr. S. N. Bogolubov said the discrepancy may be accounted for by the way the particles act on each other when squeezed very closely together in the atomic nucleus.

Dr. Bogolubov referred to the possible workings of the anti-proton and anti-neutron, discovered by separate research groups at the University of California.

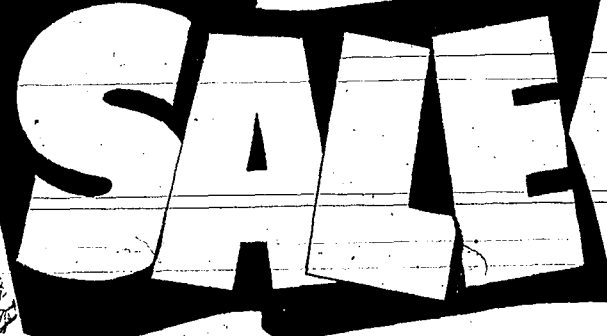

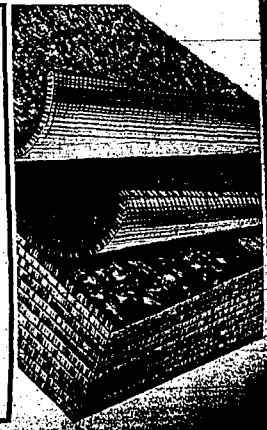

### Warning Told: Be Careful for APO Numbers

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—The army has a warning for servicemen, sweethearts and kinfolks: Get that APO corrected. APO of course, is short for "army post office," and is always followed by a number.

According to the army, a good bit of mail is going astray, because of carelessness. And that's a shame because we have a lot of boys overseas waiting for mail.

It is estimated by the Pentagon that some 10,000 pieces of mail are held up for a considerable length of time each month. That sends many thousands of boys to the tent or barracks wondering if they have lost a sweetheart, or if the mail is over his shoulder.

Anytime a letter-writer puts the wrong APO number on the envelope of a letter, that piece of mail can go half way round the world to the wrong place. It may be a couple of months before it gets to the intended recipient.

The mail is important to the morale of a soldier or sailor overseas.

That works from the other end of the line, too.

A kid is standing there in line waiting for the sound of his name, when the mail clerk discovers a package of home-baked cookies or set of new underpants. Mom, on the other hand, likely is waiting for the approach of the postman on his appointed route to arrive with a letter saying that son Johnny is well and happy with his lot.

According to the Pentagon, only about five per cent of mail is addressed where it is returned to the sender. There are APO directors in New York, San Francisco, Seattle, and New Orleans.

When all of the tracing of an address can now be done in a matter of minutes, it is a shame that so many letters are not addressed to the correct address in front of them when they are sent.

Over Stewart, acting postal officer at Ft. Mason, Calif., put it down "right will when he says."

And still there is trouble. Plain carabattinas!

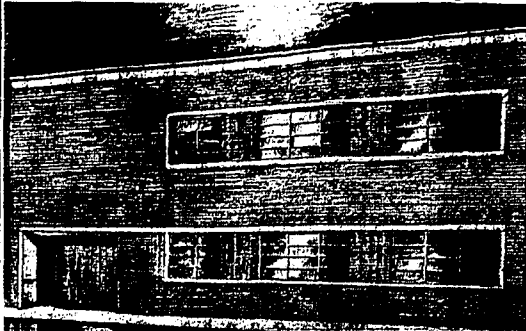

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29—Attorney General Brownell has called for comprehensive long-range studies to "avoid a real crisis in the federal courts." Brownell, speaking before the annual judicial conference of the United States, said the "crisis" needs of the federal judiciary, caused in part by mounting litigation, should be tackled in a study of anticipated needs for the next 10 to 20 years. "If we are not to be bogged down in the future, we must be ready with something more than patchwork plans," he said.

### Former Solon Asserts Nixon Used Red Lie

NEW YORK, Sept. 20 (AP)—Former Rep. Helen Gahagan Douglas, D., said today that she had learned Vice President Richard M. Nixon's 1960 California senatorial campaign was a "red lie."

Earlier yesterday, in news conferences at Milwaukee and Madison, Wis., Scherer read a statement in which Kefauver called the Nixon-Yates contract "one of the most liberal" than the Nixon-Yates contract.

"I don't doubt that he was much too wild to have called me a communist in so many words," Mrs. Douglas said.

"But at the same time there was no question in my mind or in the mind of those who supported me that the entire Nixon campaign was deliberately designed to create the impression I was a communist or at least 'communist-like.'"

Mrs. Douglas was defeated by Nixon in a 1960 election for a California seat in the senate.

Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, appearing on a "meet the press" television program, said last Sunday she believed Nixon won the election by "misleading the people."

Mrs. Douglas made her charge against Nixon last night in a telegram sent to Peter Edson, of the White House staff, and the Howard newspaper's editor.

Edson referred to "the now famous pink sheet used by Nixon in the 1960 senatorial campaign."

Mrs. Douglas said she was a five-year printer on pink paper which told of "the Douglas-Marcantonio deal" and said she had voted with Marcantonio 354 times in the house of representatives.

"The Wilo Marcantonio was a New York congressman and a spokesman for the American Labor party."

Mrs. Douglas said "the pink sheet gave the impression to the reader that the Nixon-Yates contract was the work of congress that there was a Marcantonio program presented in the house of representatives which I supported 354 times."

"There never was such a program, as you know. The suggestion that there was and that I supported it adds up to what I ask you. I served in the congress for 16 years. Marcantonio controlled congress for four of those years."



## Campbell Sets Speedboat Mark in Terrifying Run on British Lake

(CONISTON, England, Sept. 20 (AP)—Donald Campbell Wednesday poored his lobster-like hydroplane Bluebird on a new world water speed record of 225.36 miles an hour in a death-defying burst over the waters of Lake Coniston. The 36-year-old Briton broke his own record of 216.02 miles per hour set in his jet-propelled Bluebird on Lake Mead, Nev., last Nov. 16.

He screamed through the flying speed at a speed of 226 miles per hour on his first run over the measured kilometer and came back at just over 160 miles per hour. The record is the average for ten successive runs completed within an hour.

But the son of the late Sir Stirling Campbell—one-time world king of speed on land and water—set the new record only after a terrifying ordeal that shattered even his iron nerves.

"She rolled like mad," he said as he climbed from his waterbed. "I have never heard such a roar in my life. I nearly passed out. I doubt I ever want to experience it again."

Currently he has won six in a row the "two" over the "three" who are battling Brooklyn for the flag on the route in Baltimore.

Wanda, 21, and Barbara, 17, have been in the Republic of Korea for the past month looking after the mixed blood orphans who were selected for adoption by American families.

The Holt sisters flew to America with 12 boys and 13 girls, all under 15.

### Project Aims At Measuring Heart Power

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 (U.S.)—The U. S. public health service reports it may soon be possible to calculate the power output of the human heart.

Such information, it said, would be of great value to doctors in determining the physical fitness and limitations of heart patients. The heart power measurements would also be a valuable guide in holding the risks of strenuous operations.

The public health service announcement described the way three of its scientists have devised a means for measuring in animals the velocity with which blood is ejected at a given instant from the heart into the aorta.

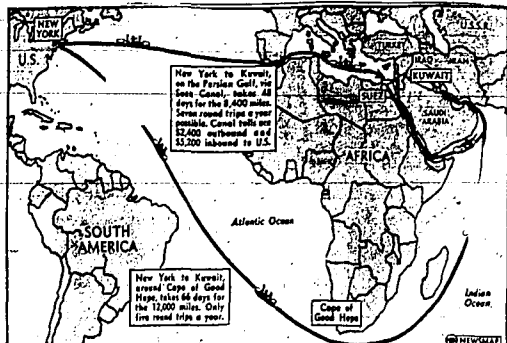
The aorta is the great artery which arches from the top of the heart to supply blood to the entire body.

The advance will soon be applied to humans, the announcement said.

The method involves measuring blood velocity in the aorta itself. It is known as a catheter tip method.

For the measurement of instantaneous aortic blood velocity, Dr. Alexander L. Noe, Alfred D. Casper and Dr. Donald L. Fry at the National Heart Institute, Bethesda, Md., is described in detail in the September issue of the technical journal *Circulation Research*.

### Tax Laws Held Invalid in Case

BELLEVILLE, Mont., Sept. 23 (U.S.)—Montana's 1931 tax legislative law Wednesday was an effect ruled invalid by the Montana supreme court.

The high tribunal denied Victor Chemical—Worla—appeal from River Bow county district court decision which dismissed the phosphate firm's request for lower industrial rates. The company made elemental phosphorus at its plant near Buhl.

"Victor contends the property should be taxed at 7 per cent of its assessed value of \$1,827,400 under a 1931 session law."

"In the same state, in Lake City, a sick and a holler from Fort Pierce, carrier Joe T. McCormick was honored for saving some kids from another flaming home. After that his role performance, Postmaster Grady A. Warren said: "He was so modest we didn't know anything about it until the fire chief told me."

"Typical of the spontaneous service to a mailman's love of his "customers," most of whom he never sees, was the remark that Jesse N. Hawkins of the Washington, D. C. postoffice made after he had saved
