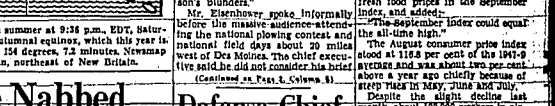

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Kefauver Hits His Rival, Says Apologies Due

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21 (AP)—Richard M. Kefauver said today that Sen. Charles McNamara should give "deep thought" to what would happen to their country if McNamara were elected to the presidency.

The Democratic vice presidential nominee who rejected a demand of McNamara to apologize to Kefauver for a recent campaign statement that the chief executive candidate had been wronging hard-pressed farmers, said for "the special case people" and for "the special interests."

Kefauver renewed a demand that McNamara apologize to "my fellow citizens he has hurt . . . by previous unexcused actions."

In a press conference and a speech before a political rally here, the Missouri Democratic candidate hammered McNamara on a theme of whether there really is "a new Nixon of awesomeness and hubris and conceit or whether he has just put on a new face for the purpose of the campaign."

Kefauver charged that McNamara is the darling of every reactionary in the Republican party from Leonard Hall down.

The Democratic nominee asked whether McNamara who "care neither whether his party can be a modern and responsible instrument of government . . . can be sure that McNamara is a Republicanism in the real thing."

"Nothing reveals a man's character more fully than to give him power," Kefauver said.

CHAMPION OF TRUTH
 The death of Homer S. Cummings at the age of 47 brought reminders of his long, distinguished legal career capped by service as U. S. attorney general under Franklin D. Roosevelt from 1933 to 1939.

But his memory will perhaps be most deeply etched in history because of a murder case he handled as a Connecticut state's attorney in 1924.
 The case is required reading for justice department lawyers. Law schools throughout the land point his moral. Courtless legal genius.

On May 27, 1924, State's Attorney Cummings rose in court to begin the murder prosecution of one Harold Israel; then a penniless man, who was accused of shooting down a priest, on that Friday night on the steps of Bridgeport.

Methodically, Cummings laid out the damning evidence against the defendant.
 He had confessed. He had led police over his route of flight from the murder scene, designating a bullet mentioned.

When asked, Israel wore a cap and a dark overcoat with velvet collar. Seven witnesses said the murderer was so garbed. Five positively identified Israel as being "at, near, or some distance from the murder scene."

One witness, a waitress friend, said she looked through her restaurant window near the scene and saw him wave to her moments before the crime. This killed his alibi—that he was at a movie.

Cummings told the court there was no indication violence or duress had been used against Israel by police. But this was added: "But it goes without saying that it is just as important for a state's attorney to use the great powers of his office to protect the innocent as it is to convict the guilty."

"Thereupon, without a single note to guide him, he proceeded to demolish the entire case against the defendant, until he walked from the courtroom a free man."

Physicians he selected told Cummings Israel's confession was made when he was flayed, and he was allowed to sleep in his witness. After a deep sleep he repudiated it.

His trip over the route of flight was meaningless. He had added no new facts but, as in his confession, merely repeated what he knew and believed.

Cummings showed that several witnesses only recalled the murderer's cap and the velvet-collared coat after reading of it in papers. In fact, Israel's was known.

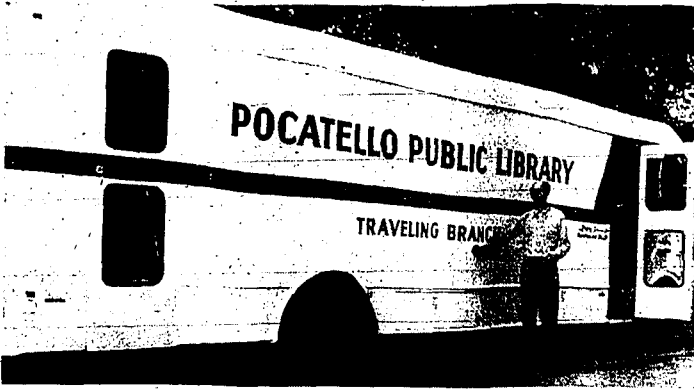

"SPRING GREEN, Wis., Sept. 21.—The modern ranch house. Actually, Wright has designed and supervised the construction of a two-cantilever skyscraper, which would "rise like a rapier in the sky" above Chicago's lakefront.

"It would be the eighth wonder of the world," he said. "But it would be as simple as ABC."

The controversial, 87-year-old architect was interviewed at Taliesin, his rambling, weather-beaten home on a wooded hill in the Wisconsin countryside.

Wright said his skyscraper would be built of stainless steel and glass. Elevators would have their own individual motors powered by nuclear energy. They would rise on coiled tracks at a mile a minute.

"The building would be a complete structure with a 'topsoil' foundation extending 1,000 feet beneath the surface. The floors would extend outward from a central steel and concrete core, like limbs from a tree trunk."

Thus, Wright said, the building would be extremely light in weight and low in cost, for there would be no foundation, rectangular steel skeleton.

He said the challenging concept of a skyscraper built like a Christmas tree on the cantilever principle is "nothing new."

"It's a shot I've had in my locker for 35 years," said the father of

Housing Plan Given Praise And Criticism

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (AP)—The government's top-part action to boost home building today drew praise and abuse from housing and mortgage circles.

Some called the federal move to help the lagging home-building industry meaningless or too small. But others hailed it as an important sign that the Eisenhower administration recognizes a crisis in housing and is fighting it.

A number of home builders said it would not help them. A private mortgage finance official here said the action does nothing to make money more available for lending, and it will not boost anything but the demand for homes.

On the other hand, a saving and loan association spokesman and a congressional housing expert said the housing market will be stimulated psychologically and its volume boosted. They said the move is important because it marks a reversal in government restrictions on housing credit.

The least complicated of the four steps reduces the down payment required for a low-cost house—\$3,000 or less—with a mortgage insured by the federal housing administration. This means the buyer will have to put down about \$150 less to buy a \$3,000 home.

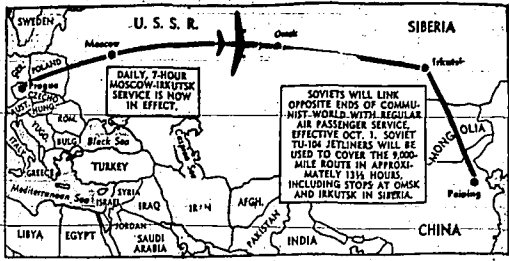
Two other steps make it less expensive for a lender to sell a government-backed mortgage to the federal national mortgage association—so the lender may lend the money again. The fourth step permits savings and loan institutions to borrow more money from the federal home loan bank board—something which the institutions would then lend on home financing.

Bureau Starts Press Runs of Taxing Forms

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21—The government's printing presses are now engaged on their biggest job of the year—turning out about one billion forms to be used in collecting federal income taxes.

The time to square up with the government for your 1956 tax still is seven months away—next April 15. But between now and early December millions of forms and instructions having to do with individual taxpayer returns alone must be ready for distribution.

The internal revenue service said that from 250 to 275 carloads of paper will be consumed in the gigantic task.

The whole operation will cost the government more than four million dollars, including distribution by mail. That, of course, is a small sum compared with the record \$4,100,000,000 the treasury expects to net this year from individual taxpayers.

Overall the budget bureau has estimated \$7 1/2 billion dollars will be paid in, but refunds are expected to reduce that amount.

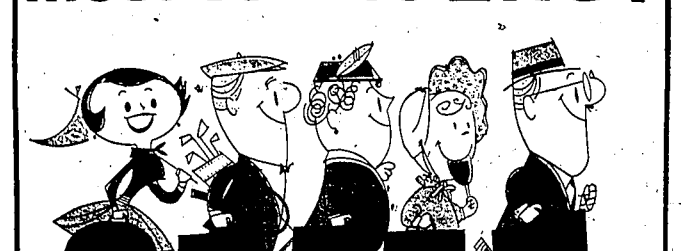
