Nicaraguan Chief Shot by Assailant; Condition "Good"

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Sept. 22 (AP)—President Anastasio Somoza was shot in the chest Friday night by an assailant in the city of Leon. The president's arm and shoulder were fractured by bullets. The 60-year-old president was taken to a hospital immediately. His condition was reported as not serious. The Nicaraguan embassy in Washington reported that a medical team of U. S. army doctors from the Panama canal zone had reached Managua. The embassy said Somoza's condition was found to be as good as could be expected. A U. S. medical team decided to await the arrival later Saturday of three top specialists from the United States.

Firm Is Given Pact in Phone Project Here

The Brecken Construction Co., Portland, was awarded the contract to build a telephone exchange in Managua, Nicaragua, under a plan of the U. S. Army. The project will be financed by the U. S. Army and the Nicaraguan government. The contract calls for the construction of an addition to the existing exchange and the installation of 100 new lines. The project is expected to be completed by the end of the year. The exchange will be used by the government and the military. The project is part of a larger program to improve telecommunications in Nicaragua.

Many Valley farmers will begin harvesting an estimated 550,000 tons of sugar beets Oct. 8, reports Harry Kloock, Idaho district manager for the Sugar Beet Growers' Assn. Harvesting will begin at 8 a. m. Oct. 8, and continue through Oct. 25. The harvest is expected to be a record for the state. The beets will be used for sugar production. The weather is expected to be favorable for the harvest.

BOISE, Sept. 22 (AP)—The Idaho public utilities commission today ordered two Twin Falls trucking companies and one in Boise to cease operations for 10 days in Idaho after charging them with charging rates higher than their legal and lawful published rates. The commission found that the companies had charged excessive rates for trucking services. The companies were fined for the violation.

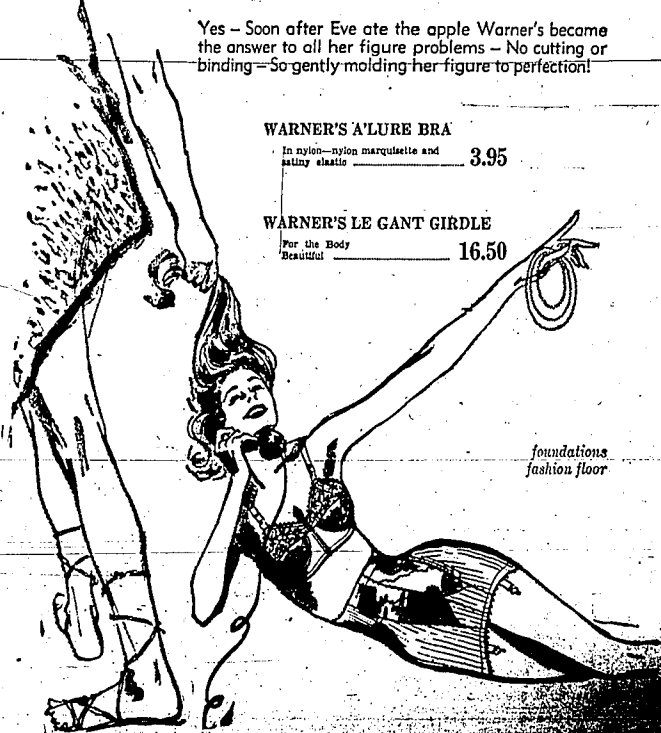

Nurse Work In Service to Be Described

Major Valley women interested in nursing careers in the armed forces will meet informally Tuesday to discuss opportunities Tuesday to Thursday in the branch offices—their first step.

Those recruiters for the navy, army and air force will be in their respective offices in the downtown Twin Falls recruiting office on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

Miss E. Gilmore, navy nurse recruiter, will be in the navy station at 10 a.m. on Tuesday.

Miss E. Gilmore says the navy offers graduate, registered nurses a "rewarding" career on land or at sea. Educational and training expenses are offered at naval hospitals. Special allowances are offered for transportation, administrative and degree programs.

Starting pay is \$49.42 a month with a 10 percent increase. Also offered is a 30-day vacation each year and free housing.

Miss Paula Rosenberger, nurse recruiter for the army, will be in the army recruiting office at 10 a.m. on Tuesday.

She is offering scholarships to student nurses in training who graduate from the army student nurse program. Student nurses enlisting under the program receive full pay and allowances while continuing their education. Following graduation, the students are commissioned as nurses.

The only program that nurses must not receive more than 24 months of schooling before graduation.

Representing the air force will be Capt. Joe H. Freedman, 423 Main avenue, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Captain Freedman offers a direct commission as second lieutenant or higher, depending upon experience. There is no experience requirement for those enrolling in post graduate work.

To qualify, a nurse must be between 20 and 40 years of age and be so active in her field as to receive recognition in at least one of the following categories: a graduate of a state accredited nursing school and meet other physical and educational qualifications.

A high percentage of nurses have the opportunity to attend flight schools where they receive a pilot's license. They may be assigned to work at the 20 base hospitals both at home and abroad.

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Life in MAGIC VALLEY

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Dick Pope, HAGERMAN, has been the scene of an exciting event. A night blooming Cereus plant with seven buds in the cause. These blossoms usually open between midnight and 1 a. m. but the first two opened around 11 p. m. on one night and the last two more began to open at 11 p. m. The following night only three blossoms opened.

Mr. Pope acquired the plant in a small town in Mexico. He had three other plants in his home. One was a cactus, one was a cactus and one was a cactus. The plants are all in the same family and all bloom at the same time.

That contains sand and well decomposed humus and providing them with abundant moisture during the growing and flowering seasons. Just as important is a resting period when the plants are kept practically dry following the normal flowering time. The plants require filtered sunlight in summer and will take full sun during short days in winter. A trellis or support in the pot usually is essential after the plants gain size. They are tropical plants and prefer warm conditions. Sudden changes of temperature or improper watering just prior to blooming time may cause the buds to drop.

The plants usually must reach several years of age before they bloom. However, Mrs. Pope's is just 2 years old this month. The stems have leaf-like branches with deep waves in the margins. The width of a leaf is up to four inches. Sometimes the branches will tend to be three-sided instead of flat for a short distance. Spines are lacking on mature plants but young stems have brittle.

The flowers bloom at indentation in the leaves. They are large—up to 10 inches long, and are funnel shaped. The petals are white, while the outer petals may be tinged with reddish pink or brown. Long stamens in the center are topped with yellow.

One legend has it that the plant is symbolic of God. The long graceful white torch stands for Mary. The flowers on the swanlike neck are turned sideways, as a hand bent upward. In the middle can be seen a cross representing the Christ child. The soft, fragile petals that seem to be kneeling around the candle are angels while the larger petals are symbolic of the wise men. A long, slender staminal tube from the throat and on the end curling directly over the manager, is a large white star, the Star of Bethlehem. The outer petals represent the straw of the manger. The deep lingering fragrance reminds one of the frankincense and myrror.

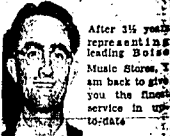

The president, Mrs. Harris, will make the necessary applications.

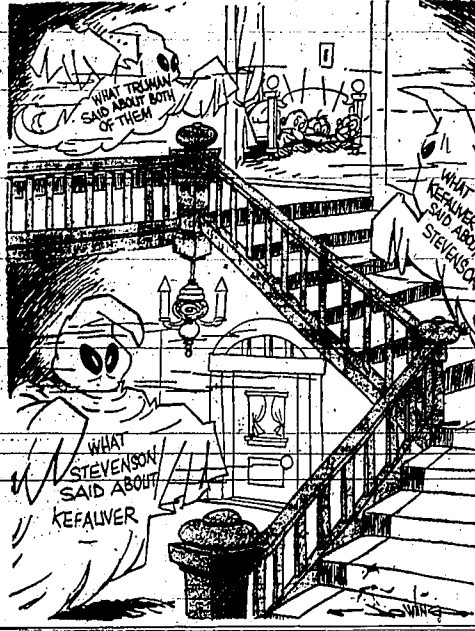

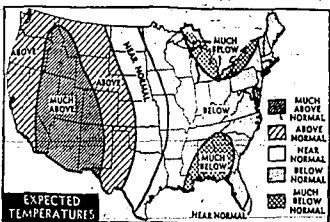

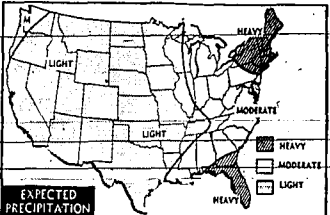

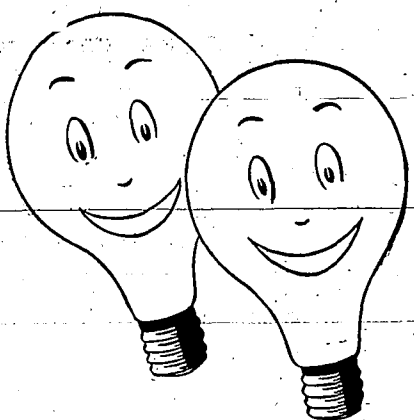

For a tranquil few hours in the afternoon, visit Sawtooth City. While there you may find friends or even relatives, but if you do, don't be like yourself—only visitors—since there is no Sawtooth City population.

There hasn't been a Sawtooth city for many years. Even memory is fast growing thin. Yet, walking there to greet you and basking in the afternoon sun, will be a tiny cabin—all that remains of one of the most prosperous cities in Stanley basin. The cabin is located a little distance from the actual site of Sawtooth City but it has lived a lot longer than some of the more fashionable buildings in the city limits.

Makes no mistake about it, Sawtooth City once was a large community. In addition to its many dwellings were three general stores, a postoffice, tailor shop, two meat markets, three restaurants, five saloons and a livery stable.

Sawtooth City is now as depending on viewpoints—just four miles off highway 81, six miles beyond the foot of Galena summit on the Stanley basin side. Turn left off the highway up Beaver creek on a 200-ft. service road.

Scarcely five years ago Sawtooth City really was a sizable community, the base operations for the Filigree, Columbia and Beaver Mining companies. It lived for only 18 short years but in that time, thousands of men, women and children made their homes there. The mines in the vicinity were large producers in the early days.

Prospectors located the rich veins in the mountains by coming down from the north. After reaching the "basin," they worked their way up the Galena river to discover the mines.

Sawtooth City was not the only community in the region in the boom days. Vienna, which was the base of operations for the Vienna mine, was the largest mining town in the entire area. Its last resident left in 1892.

After flourishing until the late 1890s, the city rapidly went down hill. In 1900, after wastering one more winter in the mountains, the last five remaining residents of the city departed, leaving the community to a slow and lonely death.

The one remaining cabin, even though well built, would not have accomplished its herculean feat of survival had it not been for the assistance it has received from two pine trees. Years ago, while the cabin was alone, the two trees sprang up, one on each side of the building.

As the structure weakened with age and neglect, the two trees grew strong and now hold the building in a tight embrace.

In its day, Sawtooth City had four main streets. The outlines of them may still be seen. Flanking one is the roof of a large building, probably the postoffice, which now sprawls upon the ground. Beside another street is the skeleton of a cabin that died a more violent death. The mighty force of winter laid a hand upon it and, instead of slowly crumbling in its tracks, the entire building was forced off its foundation.

Look closely as you pass the mountains and see the ruins were the remains of bottles and glasses. Most of the unbroken bottles and glasses have long since disappeared, carried away by souvenir hunters. Some probably still remain, however, perched in the mountain sun.

A little to one side of the village proper are the few remaining posts of a corral and further up Beaver creek are the remains of the "Columbia mill."

And on your way back through Sawtooth City on your return trip, see the lone cabin standing by itself for. In the spring, it, too, may have disappeared into oblivion.

Dissatisfaction Leads to Practice of Reloading for Hunting and Shooting

Men's dissatisfaction with available implements has led to the majority of his intentions. Tired of pulling or dragging heavy objects, he invented the wheel to help him move such objects. Since that invention there have been thousands, perhaps millions, of others growing from his dissatisfaction.

Hunters and target shooters alike long have been dissatisfied with results obtained from factory-made ammunition. In a search for an answer to their individual needs, they have turned to loading their own shells.

Gordon Cochran, Twin Falls, is one of many men in Magic Valley

who load their own shells. Although he does some varmint hunting, usually using some of the best, his main contact with guns is match shooting with pistols.

"I had been a little dissatisfied with the results of my firing with manufactured ammunition," he said, "but until I was unable to obtain it during World War II, I hadn't attempted to make my own. Since I started, though, I have bought very little factory ammunition."

Cochran reported that in match shooting "just about everyone loads his own. There's not too much difference between the shells used by one man and the next, but they

have all experimented until they've found exactly what they think they are looking for."

In most cases this reloading involves only the amount of powder
