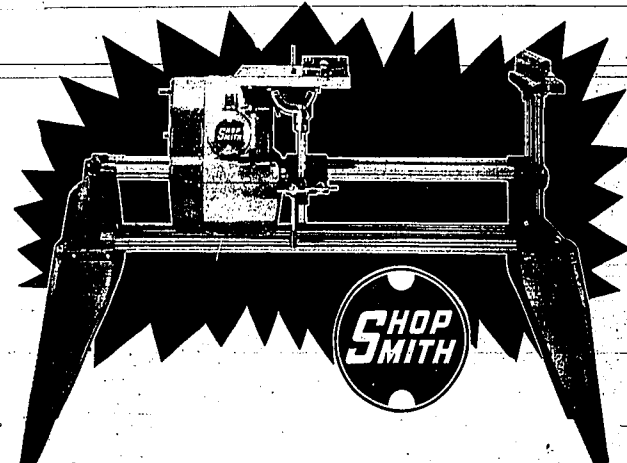

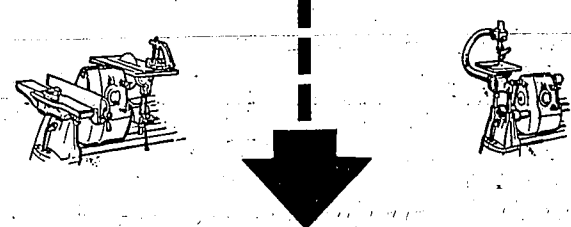

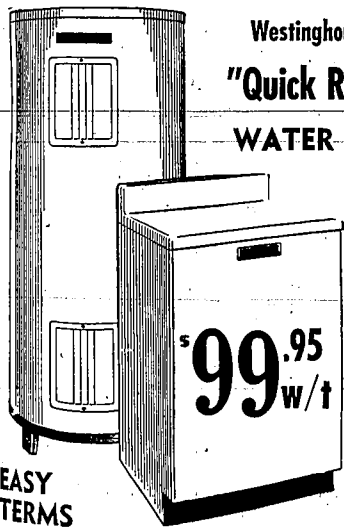

Now that the children are going to school, a host of them for the first time, we may well ask what it is that parents hope to get from the schools. What is it they would have their children get from the teachers that will fulfill their hopes?

There are parents who look at their children, see things they would like changed in them and say, "When they get to school, things will be different." They mean that the child will be changed by some measure of education only a teacher can create.

Sometimes that happens. More often it does not. The child a parent sends to the school in the child he gets back again, his traits modified somewhat, his skills accentuated and his knowledge broadened to some degree. The degree depends upon the original quality of the child.

This original quality of the child is his fundamental character of mind and body. The school builds on these, but it cannot create them. It is important for parents to consider as they plan for their children so that they will not set their hopes for a scholar on a child who cannot accept science instruction, nor expect a football hero in a boy who dislikes physical activity and lives happily in books.

Each boy and girl is a unique person. Here again, it is extremely important, but it cannot always be counted upon because it does have odd ways with children now and again.

Untested Sooners Named Nation's Top Grid Squad

Before they have even played a game, Oklahoma's Sooners are named one of the leading contenders for the No. 1 spot in college football. But two more dangerous rivals have come along and indications are that others will show up this week-end.

Oklahoma, picked as the top college team in the Associated Press pre-season poll of sports writers and broadcasters, didn't play last Saturday and, naturally, had no cause for sorrow. But two other top teams, Notre Dame and Maryland, did.

As a result, the first weekly poll of the season's play began last week. Oklahoma, on top, but Notre Dame had dropped to 14th place after a 19-0 setback to Southern Methodist and Maryland was clear out of sight after a 20-12 beating by Syracuse. It took just one week to give the pre-season selection a thorough shuffling.

Oklahoma received first place votes from 91 of the 150 writers and broadcasters participating in the first weekly poll and enough high placings from the others to give the Sooners 150 points, compared to 100 for Maryland and 80 for Notre Dame.

The rest of the first ten lined up were: Texas Christian, Southern Methodist, Southern California, Baylor, and Washington State. They all won rather impressively. To make room for the Sooners, Texas A and M, a winner over Villanova, and Michigan, tied like the other Big Ten teams, were dropped to 11th and 12th places.

It will be a great game to watch, for a poor one on which to bet any money.

Injury Threat Hangs Over Mantle As World Series Nears Once More

NEW YORK, Sept. 26 (AP)—The 1956 season will be remembered as the one which "made" Mickey Mantle but indications are that the Oldenbaw Kid still has his personal world series annual trip to the post season classic, something gone wrong with master Mickey. Four times he has been there and only once was he at near top efficiency. This year the threat hangs over him once again.

"I'm going to be all right," Mantle said as the nurse on aggravated muscle in his upper thigh and lower groin today. "That's a long statement for Mantle, a reticent and uncommunicative young man. But deep inside the wheels must be whirling frantically. He looks back on his misfortune in three of the four world series in which he previously appeared.

In the very first, in 1951, he was "scared to death" when his knee buckled under him in the second game and he dropped to the Yankee stadium turf as if he had been shot through the head. It was the second game of that series and Mickey and Joe DiMaggio raced and Mickey was belted by Willie Mays.

"I got it," DiMaggio called. Mantle tried to pull up short. "I could feel my leg snap," he recalled. "It was too scared to move. I thought my leg had fallen off at the knee."

The next year he had his one good game, batting .315 with 10 for 20 and walloping a pair of homers. Yet in the Mantle was hobbling again when they went into the classic and batted a meager .208. After the season he had two operations on his knee for removal of cartilage. It was the worst work he has ever had.

In the closing days of the season he tried to beat out a hint against Boston and pulled a thigh muscle. The leg was swathed in bandages and the limping Mantle was available for duty in only three games. He hit a home run.

Which means that in four world series Mickey has an overall average of only .263.

There was a great deal written during the season that it would be Mantle's year of decision. After the season he had two operations on his knee for removal of cartilage. It was the worst work he has ever had.

Mantle must have read some of those things but the answer had to be himself. With a maturity came added confidence and now is no question but what Mickey poses the cross-rails triumphantly and today is the game's brightest star.
