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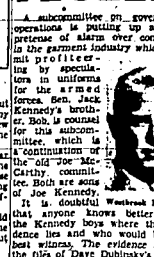

THE "WORLD PLAN"
President Eisenhower proposed a vast, world-wide rearmament program, to be carried out of savings from disarmament, in an unnoted passage of his first TV speech in his campaign for reelection.

While House sources point out that this was really the big issue in the President's speech, it is not clear that he intended it to be so. This world-idea is being emphasized today as the key to Eisenhower's world peace planning. It is regarded as the incentive to speed disarmament.

THE IDEA IS REALLY NEW. One sentence in the TV campaign speech has lifted word for word from the talk which President Eisenhower made to the American Society of Newspaper Editors April 16, 1953—three and a half years ago.

"This government is ready to ask its people to join with all nations in devoting a substantial percentage of the savings achieved by disarmament to a fund for world aid and reconstruction."

SEVERAL OTHER SENTENCES in the later speech were picked up with only minor changes from the speech which he made in the same deal. This is the way they read earlier:

"The purpose of this great work would be to help other peoples develop the undeveloped areas of the world—to stimulate profitable and fair world trade, to assist all peoples to know the blessings of world freedom, to see the monuments of this new war would be these: Roads and schools, hospitals and homes, food and health."

"WE ARE READY, in short, to dedicate our strength to serving the needs, rather than the fears of the world."

"We are ready, with these and all such actions, to make the United Nations an institution that can effectively guard the peace and security of all peoples."

"I know of nothing I can add to make plain the sincere purposes of the United States."

STATES OF THE ADMINISTRATION will have plenty of precedent for opposing the President's world-aid plan.

In the first place, it is pegged entirely on the attainment of world disarmament. Arms reduction now is considered almost unattainable.

By both Republican and Democratic opponents of all foreign aid spending, the Eisenhower peace plan is being tagged a "GOP global WPA."

FROM THE DEMOCRATIC-INTERNATIONALIST POINT OF VIEW, it is recalled that the late Sen. Brian McMahon, D. Cal., proposed in 1950 a \$500,000,000-a-year, \$50-billion-dollar "global Marshall plan" in exchange for atomic disarmament.

What has happened now amounts to an almost complete reversal of Republican and Democratic leadership roles.

The foreign aid concept was first advanced by the Marshall plan and President Truman's "Point Four."

IN THE FIRST PLACE, when foreign aid was cut by a billion dollars, many Democrats were as outspoken as Republicans in their demands for an aid program to be ended.

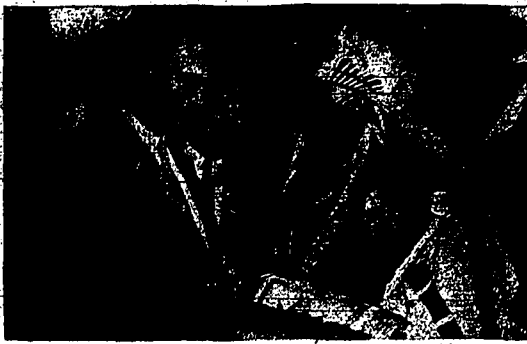

Kefauver Hits Ike, Nixon for 'Big Business'

"And these people have conspired to run our economy against the national interest," he added.

Small business profits are down more than 60 per cent while corporate profits have gone up under the Eisenhower administration, Kefauver said.

Expert Notes 4-Days Work Week Danger

WELLESLEY, Mass., Sept. 27.—Economist Robert W. Babbson has said that the proposed four-day work week would be "suicidal" for America.

"In a campaign speech in Colorado, Vice President Richard M. Nixon said Republicans 'see the time not too far distant when we can have a four-day work and family life will be even more fully enjoyed'—by Americans."

"If there now were a surplus of labor as in the early '30's there might be some logic in reducing the week's working hours," said Babbson. "But to do it today would be suicidal for all people. Any such move would reduce wages temporarily, and wages which could be met by increased prices. Hence, the wage cutters would not gain much, if anything, from this inflationary move."

Babbson said that in normal times especially in prosperous times as at present—it would "be a crime to retard production."

"All property is ultimately based on increasing production, which in turn tends to keep down retail prices and the cost of living. In other words, while increasing wages is nearly a sure way of increasing anything which retards production is 'cutting the tree at its roots.'"

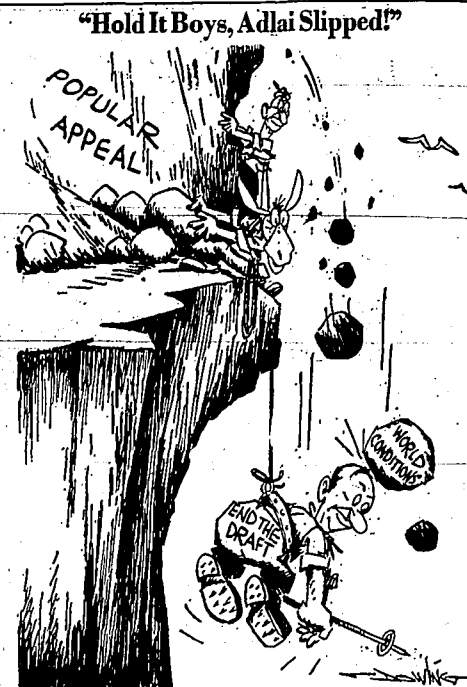
To tell the story in another way, Babbson said that "any number one" now being faced (and feared), is the relation of consumption to production. Consumption can be increased by increasing advertising and other selling efforts. But retarded production cannot be offset in any permanent and satisfactory manner.

Governor Lee Not Dropping His Tax Fight
