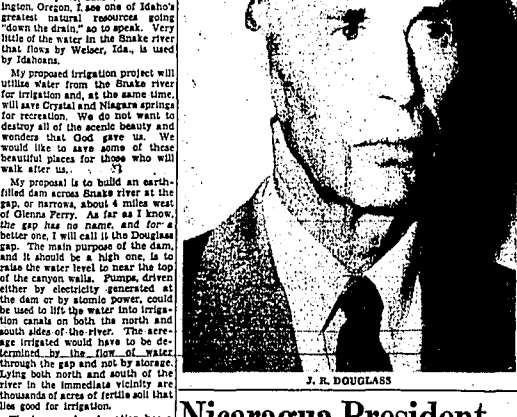

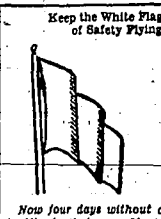

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### Road Projects In T. F. Areas Are Reported

Twin Falls highway district completed 18.8 miles of new hard surfaced roads in the district during the summer months at a total cost of \$60,845.44 bringing the total number of miles of road covered with new pavement to 250.

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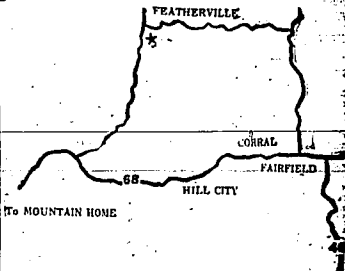

# TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

**WASHINGTON**—Many readers have asked me why President Eisenhower is so disliked by certain groups. The answer is simple: he is a member of the Republican old guard, in contrast to President Eisenhower's program of "New Frontiers."

Answer: In preparation of my answer to this question, I must say that I have examined Nixon's performance and various records. He does not vote in the Senate except in case of the bill to give the president the right to know Nixon personally, and that I like him. For that reason, if they wish to impeach Nixon, they should evaluate the vice president, although it is based on the record.

**Why Tucker**

**OFF-THE-RECORD MEETINGS**—I think I may be pardoned for introducing a personal note into this column as a way for the arrival of the next year, about 20 Washington newspaper correspondents, radio commentators and television personalities used an off-the-record meeting in a dining room with members of the Eisenhower household. They are extremely helpful to newspaper, radio, television and columnist reporters.

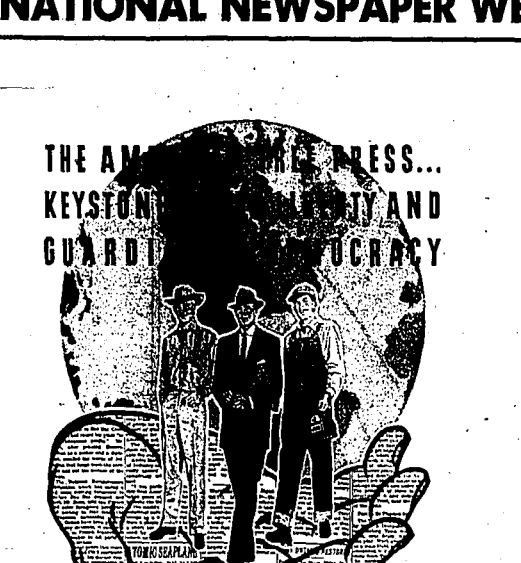

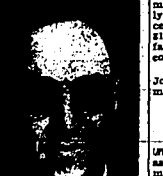

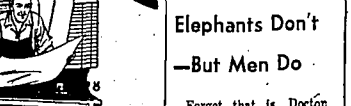

### Work Layoffs Blamed Upon Benson, "Ike"

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Sept. 29 (AP) — Gov. Orville Freeman and top state officials have blamed the work layoffs on the Benson farm program for the loss of 1,200 workers at the Minneapolis-Moline farm implement plant.

The company announced workers would be laid off for about two months because sales of the company's combine harvesters had not expanded as the sales force had expected. 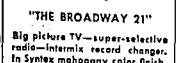

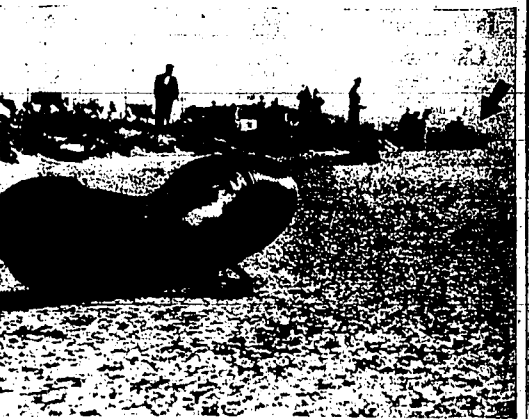

Farm prices started a steady rise in January and continued to rise through mid-June. Then they began to decline.

The agriculture department also noted that farm production and prices declined one-third of one per cent last month. This put the price index in mid-September at 31 per cent, the same as at mid-June but two per cent below a year ago.

The farm price index is the legal share of the farmers' purchasing power compared with the price of goods. When he gets 100 per cent, the farmer is said to be getting a "fair price."

But he added Mr. Eisenhower "does not lead his party—he fronts for it."

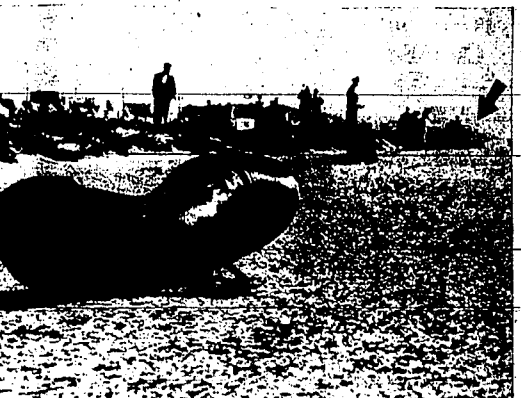

# Mammoth 6-Ton Vault Door Is Ready for T.F. Bank Addition

A six-ton vault door containing three inches of solid steel in its two-foot thickness was unloaded Friday afternoon at the Twin Falls Bank and Trust company's new addition to the present location.

When in place, the door will guard a 24-by-25-foot concrete vault, according to William M. Reza, second vice president of the bank. The door has a dual combination and a three-movement time lock. In addition, the door is fully wired in the wall, ceiling, floor and door with a burglar alarm system, he added.

Contractor Otto Hall, whose firm unloaded the door, said that the vault itself contains over 250 tons of concrete and an additional 10 tons of reinforcing steel.

Total weight of the door is 10,000 pounds. There are, however, 250 pounds of weight on a 1,000-pound liner attached when the door is completely closed. In addition to the three-inch thickness of solid steel, there are four foot plates and an inside door.

### Local Agency Illustrates 'Office Work' Difference

Many women and girls take jobs lumped under one classification, "office work." But in business the work is distinctly different and includes much more than the well-known typing, dictation and filing.

For instance, at the local employment office investigation into the duties of three of the workers revealed many phases unsuspected by the general public.

The receptionist, Mrs. Lorene Logan, who greets you as you walk up to the counter, doesn't just answer the phone, routing the calls to the proper person, she also does some interesting, some of the applicants can be referred to jobs by her.

Keating will refer you to one of the other counselors, Mary Jo Cahill or Mrs. Bobbie Sherwood. These women fill out an application for employment for the job seeker or refer to one already in their files. Mrs. Sherwood and Mrs. Cahill take their respective available positions, and then begin the process of fitting the applicant to a job that they are capable of doing and in which they will be happy.

This particular phase can be an easy one or a difficult. Sometimes a person who is unhappy in their work comes in and asks for help in finding something more compatible. After all, the average person spends a good part of his life working and the importance of being happy is being recognized more and more. A worker can spend a lifetime working and doing the work well and yet still fail to achieve any satisfaction from it.

Individuals are interviewed, tested for aptitudes and preference, and then an endeavor is made to find that perhaps unrecognized, desirable place for them.

A great emphasis has been placed upon placement by the agency this summer. Many employers pass up bright, intelligent, well-dressed young people for the jobs they experienced, leaving the agency to face the problem of just how to get that experience that is so in demand.

Mrs. Cahill and Mrs. Sherwood, along with others at the office, spend many hours giving aptitude tests and counseling to all high school seniors in this area, trying to aid them in finding a place where they can be happy in the working world they are about to enter.

The counselors also set up by the organization, includes five phases for those engaged in employment placement. One is vocational choice, two, change to a more satisfactory employment; three, adjustment, four, verifying the choice, and five, assistance in planning for the future.

After an applicant has made a change or secured the work that he believed was an endeavor continues to work with him to be sure that the choice was right.

This includes many things. They work with the person in correcting personal habits or problems which might hinder the work they stand in the way of a good relationship or of advancement.

The counselors also do an industrial checking conditions and will prepare specifications for the employer to use in making changes. A prospective employer or one who is scheduling, leaving the agency, will be given the employer's request to determine suitability.

A specialized program also is in effect, where help is offered for the handicapped, the aged and disabled veterans as well as youth and veterans. An attempt is made to find a job which suits their needs and glasses, a hearing aid or medical care, will be given assistance and recommendation to the proper organizations for help.

All kinds of help is available at the employment office. One little boy called Mrs. Cahill to ask what to do about a sick cat.

Mrs. Sherwood and Mrs. Cahill meet all kinds of people and all kinds of problems. It is necessary to have a great good feeling, good mood, and advice for home life.

They have some pet doves about the women they interview, mostly about the girls who are seeking work, with their hair in curls and dressed in slacks or some other outfit definitely out of place in the business world.

They say employers still object to aberrant blouses worn in the office, too tight sweaters and some have an aversion to bright red nail polish, heavy jewelry and extreme diets.

Employees in the employment office obtain their positions through a state merit exam system. There are various classifications carrying different pay scales as well as duties. An applicant may take the test and choose for the job she has in mind and obtain it depending upon her score. After being hired, promotions can be earned by other examinations.

Those women receive a great deal of satisfaction out of the work they are doing in helping people attain the type of work that will make them satisfied. They have troubles, too, when the employer or employee is dissatisfied.

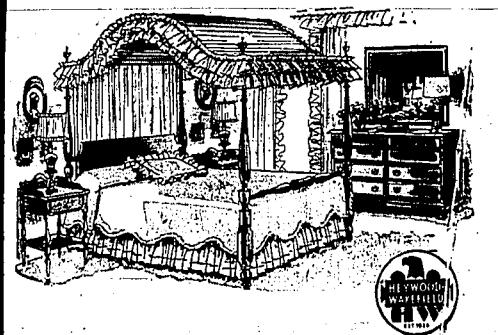
