Cash Is Sent To Three for Scholarships

WASHINGTON, Ill., Oct. 3 (AP)—The National Merit Scholarship corporation today announced that checks for \$10,000 have been mailed to 54 merit scholars, and to the colleges and universities of their choice.

The winners were chosen from almost 10,000 high school seniors who took the first merit scholarship examination for the first time in 1955. Those named to receive the scholarships survived two rigorous college entrance tests, the scholarship corporation said, and many are high school leaders in their communities.

The 54 merit scholarship winners are: Idaho—A. Dempsey, Hatley, and Curtis; Oregon—Twin Falls, William L. Alworth; Washington—national merit scholars, and Bob G. Stock, Burley; a Sears-Roebuck merit scholar, Seattle; and a merit scholar at the University of Idaho, Alworth, a student of engineering at the University of California, Berkeley.

The scholars were free to select any accredited college or university and to choose any course of study.

Harvard was the most popular choice of the scholarship winners, with Massachusetts Institute of Technology second.

A total share of the scholarships went to boys. Seventy-two per cent of the winners were boys.

Eighty-eight per cent of the boys and 81 per cent of the girls chose engineering, and the physical sciences courses, NMS said, with physics the most popular of the physical sciences.

As the 1955 scholars prepared to enter college, NMS announced an evening examination will be held Oct. 14 for the 1957 competition. About 13,000 high schools were expected to seek the scholarships, NMS said. The winners were advised to their principals for details.

NMS, a non-profit corporation, was established last year with initial grants of 255 million dollars, and was underwritten for a 10-year period.

Approximately two million dollars in scholarships is to be awarded annually in grants ranging from \$100 to \$1,000 up to a maximum of \$2,000.

The award is based on personal need.

Speaking at the government's plant research center at Los Alamos, Kefauver said that other nations—including Russia—have outstripped the United States in nuclear power development because President Eisenhower let the atomic energy program get bogged down in partisan politics.

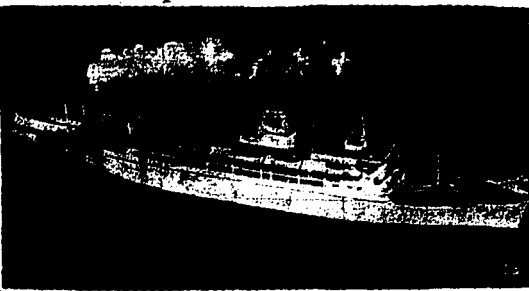

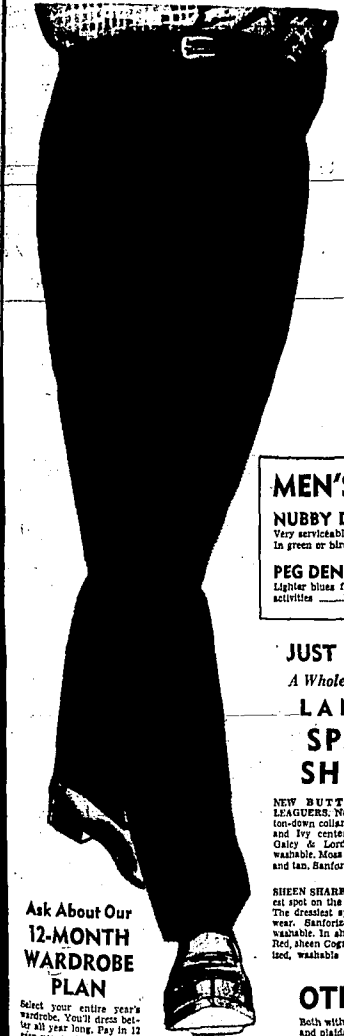

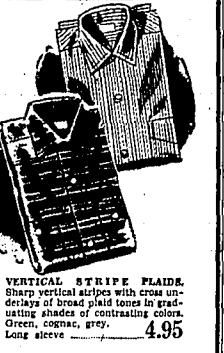

Record Sales, Profits Listed For First Half

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—American manufacturers rang up record sales and profits in the first half of this year and headed into the fall with employment at new-record levels and consumer demand for goods at an all-time high.

These developments were reported yesterday by government agencies, which said:

Manufacturing corporations sold a record 146 billion dollars worth of goods in the first six months of this year—nearly 10 billion more than in the first half of 1955 when the business boom was gathering force.

Their profits from these sales reached a new high of nearly eight billion dollars after federal taxes, a gain of nine per cent over the first six months a year ago.

Total employment in the U.S. was down on a seasonal basis by 700,000 in September but was still close to the record of 66,752,000 set in August. The drop to 66,071,000 was attributed solely to the return of students to school. The number of adult workers remained steady.

The number of jobs also declined by about 200,000 last month to a total slightly below two million. This was one of the lowest unemployment totals recorded in the last three years.

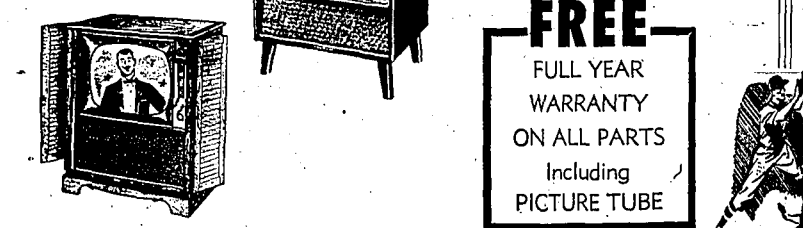

Soviet Envoy Favors U. N. Talk on Suez

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Oct. 3.—Soviet Foreign Minister Dimitri Shepilov said today he believed a "reasonable solution" of the Suez controversy could be found in the security council debate that begins Friday.

But in oblique reference to the western powers and past Soviet criticism of their attitude, he said the Soviet Union deplores any approach to a settlement of the problem from "positions of strength."

Shepilov arrived at 4:30 a. m. on a Scandinavian Air lines plane from Stockholm. It marked his first visit to the United States and his first session of the United Nations since he succeeded Vyacheslav M. Molotov as foreign minister this summer.

Shepilov lost little time in bringing up what the Soviet Union has criticized in the past as a Western desire to "negotiate from strength."

"Unfortunately, attempts are still being made to approach the settlement of the Suez problem from positions of strength," he said.

"These attempts are caused by lack of understanding of the spirit of our times and of the renovation of the forms of social life that is in progress throughout the vast expanses of the east."

"It is ignorance of these processes that lies at the back of all ill-headed and impractical projects to resolve the Suez problem through compulsion."

Shepilov's five-paragraph statement read to newsmen at the airport confirmed what western diplomats already knew—that he would back the Egyptian stand in the security council discussions.
