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Yugoslavs See Deadlock In Yalta Talk

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—Yugoslav officials indicated yesterday that they remain deadlocked on their main differences after the current talks between President Tito and Soviet leaders at Yalta. No one here was willing to comment on the talks. But usually reliable sources privately reported that the Yugoslavs are unwilling to continue the "Stalinization" policy in regard to the continued de-Stalinization of a coalition relations between communists and the satellite countries. Official sources say Soviet party leader Khrushchev's recent party congress is intended to continue a policy of liberalization. The party congress is to be held at the 20th congress of the Soviet communist party. Yugoslav sources express belief that Khrushchev's change of mind on the "Stalinization" influence of the party and the army following the Poznan riot in Poland. The sources also reported that Khrushchev's surprise visit to Yugoslavia was designed to explain to Tito why de-Stalinization is to proceed.

Problems for Alaska Noted At T. F. Meet

School officials in Alaska find the rapid growth of the territory brings many problems. A. W. Morgan, who has served for five years as superintendent of schools in Anchorage, told members of the Methodist men's club Tuesday night in Twin Falls.

Morgan described Anchorage as one of the fastest growing cities in this hemisphere. Eleven new school buildings have been built there during the past four years at a cost of 12 million dollars, he told the group. He placed an active part in obtaining the funds for the new buildings, and also introduced the operation of school buses which, he said, was thought impossible during severe winters.

Morgan was formerly superintendent of schools in Twin Falls. He mentioned two other Alaska Valley men who hold prominent positions in Alaska's school system. They are Don M. Dixon, former superintendent at Boise and Rupert, and A. J. Ryan, former superintendent at Bliss.

Idaho is now commissioner of education for the territory and Ryan is an official in the territorial education system, Morgan said.

He also described the Alaska Community college at Anchorage. He said it was a government supported school where 100 students study a wide variety of subjects, including a course in training dogs. He also reported on the land purchased and located at Anchorage on land purchased from the government under a special act of congress. It was expected to open in two years, he said.

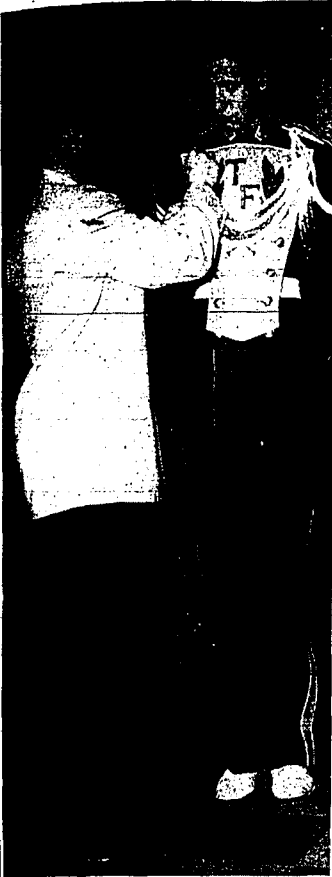

Fire Method Gets Use for Rain Making

PARIS, Oct. 4 (AP)—Two Frenchmen say they can make rain by lighting a bonfire under the sky.

The rainmakers, brothers Jean and Henri Desbreaux, believe their technology may be a boon to vast dry areas with few natural, moisture-bearing clouds overhead. They reported to the Academy of Sciences, France's top scientific body, on experiments they conducted in the Belgian Congo.

They say their method works this way: They light a big bonfire over a certain area of 125 acres, on a day when wind and air pressure conditions are just right for the formation of rain clouds. The fire causes a cumulus cloud to form. Then, if all goes well, it rains.

They reported they brought the first rain in a month to the Congo last month, according to government figures. A 10th attempt was successful since because a sudden wind pushed their cloud out of sight, they said.

The two brothers didn't explain why all forest fires don't automatically produce rains that would put them out. Presumably atmospheric conditions frequently aren't right.

Father Takes His Daughter To Red Land

NEW YORK, Oct. 4 (AP)—A Russian refugee-born U. S. immigration official last night is taking his American-born daughter with him back to the Soviet Union.

The naturalization and immigration service searched the European-bound liner Queen Mary for several hours last night and finally gave the girl's mother, a woman who filed a complaint in Philadelphia, an appointment in New York.

A New York Times correspondent aboard the Queen Mary said it appeared that Russias had assisted the father in hiding the girl.

The newspaper said ship officers had confirmed that the girl was aboard.

The child, Taisana Chavarsky, 3, and 14 years old, had been taken aboard the ship by her father, Alexander Chavarsky, 36, about 2 p. m. yesterday, several hours before the vessel's scheduled sailing.

The naturalization and immigration bureau said officials yesterday searched the Queen Mary before she set sail for Cherbourg, France, where she is due Monday.

The inspectors found the child would have been taken from the ship if she had been found because she is an American citizen.

The complaint from the child's mother said her husband had announced he was taking the girl back to Russia to visit his mother. The couple was married in the country in 1951 after he had arrived here as a displaced person.

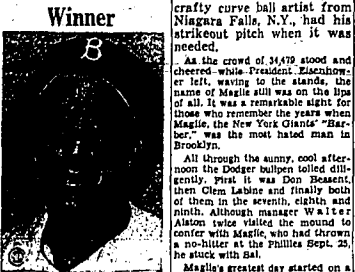

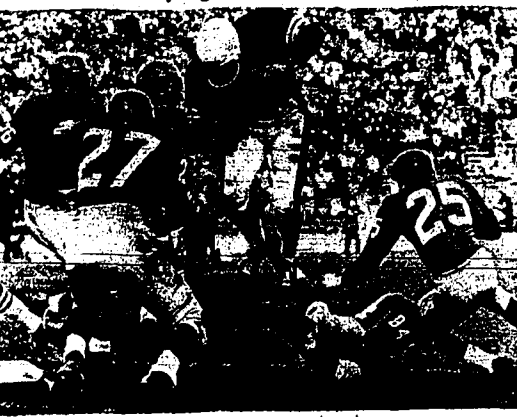

Lollar, 22, has been with Cleveland since the 1920s but the old Sox bought him and the White Sox. He doesn't make much distinction between pitchers, but he considers himself a hard catcher to "shake off." "If I believe I'm calling the right thing I'll disregard the pitcher's shake off and call for the same pitch again. If he still won't listen I'll walk out to the mound. Then it'll be up to him to convince me." "Once in a while I'll get a signal from the bench to call for a pitcher. I never shake that one off," Lollar said. "It comes from head-quarters."

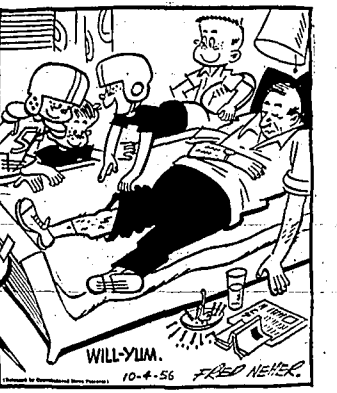
