### Presidential Campaign in Iowa Finds Farmers Liking Ike, Hating Policies

DES MOINES, Oct. 5 (AP)—The presidential campaign in Iowa is being shaped up largely as a contest between the personal popularity of President Eisenhower and a dislike for his farm policies, according to a survey of farmers say they like the President but are dissatisfied with his farm program. This apparent paradox complicates the outlook for this traditionally Republican state.

Iowa is one of the few farm states in which farm income is down this year. Supporters of Adlai Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee, concede that Eisenhower is popular throughout the state but question the extent to which this will be reflected at the ballot box.

Republican leaders agree there is strong dissatisfaction among farmers but say there is not enough to swing the state to Stevenson.

How will this issue of Eisenhower's popularity versus dislike of his farm program be resolved on election day?

Seeking an answer to this question, this reporter found that a majority of more than 100 persons interviewed, farmers, business men, professional men, newspapermen and political leaders—all said they would vote for Eisenhower if the election were held now.

But some insisted that changed conditions—such as a sharp decline in hog and cattle prices before election time—might turn the state to Stevenson.

Eisenhower won Iowa by a majority of 357,000 out of 1,289,000 votes in 1952. GOP State Chairman Don Pierson, while conceding the President will lose votes this year, predicted a victory margin of at least 100,000 votes.

But Jake More, the Democratic state chairman, said he sees great similarity between this campaign and the one in 1948 when Iowa went for Harry S. Truman in his surprise victory over Thomas E. Dewey. Then, as now, there was dissatisfaction over Republican farm policies.

More and other Democratic workers say Stevenson is gaining new supporters every day.

The Eisenhower popularity was forcefully demonstrated by the large income given him by an estimated 350,000 persons during a two-day visit he made to the state last month to speak before the National Field days at Newton.

Stevenson, who followed a day later in the state last month than a day, was greeted by a smaller turnout.

Last year's low hog prices coupled with crop losses from drought have put many farmers in a resentful mood. Many of those interviewed spoke harshly of Secretary of Agriculture Benson.

Farmer complaints were found to be most numerous among the younger farmers and those with small production units, as well as tenants.

Why, then, if there is less support for Eisenhower among farmers than four years ago, is the President apparently ahead at this time? There are a number of reasons. Farmers make up a minority of the voters, even in the farm state of Iowa. So far, observers say, there has not been a switch of farmers strong enough to overcome Eisenhower's expected margins in Iowa urban areas.

Democratic leaders are hopeful there will be a considerable switch to Stevenson by businessmen who depend largely on farm trade.

Few businessmen would allow themselves to be quoted, but many of them—with a few exceptions—said they did not believe farmers to be as bad off as they picture themselves.

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### Seven Probes Eye Charge of Soft Concrete

JACKSON, Mich., Oct. 5 (AP)—An elaborate investigation is under way today that unhardened concrete used in a partially completed office building to collapse and kill 10 men.

The investigation is being conducted by the Connecticut Power company, charged Wednesday with rebuilding 15 others, all of them seriously.

Four of the dead were recovered today. Two more were killed and three others were seriously injured. Only one body was recovered in the tons of steel and concrete.

It is possible that some of the concrete was so soft that it would have crumbled when the heavy beams to fall but it ended up in a mass of rubble that was so hard that it was found in many places.

More than 400 workmen, using steel supports, tried to clean up the rubble.

Many of the workmen, including Harry Berry, Jr., and W. James Berry, Jr., and W. James Berry, Jr., who both lost their lives, were being poured on and charged with supporting the concrete on the lower level. It had not been broken down sufficiently but the supports were being removed.

Frank Herring, head of the main construction firm on the job, said that concrete was at least 100 pounds per cubic foot when it was poured. It was supposed to be 150 pounds per cubic foot.

### New Seed Plant Starts Operation

HEBURN, Oct. 5—Western Seed company's new plant at Heburn is now processing seed even though work still is being done on the 15 by 200-foot building.

The company's manager reports that the warehouse handles alfalfa, grass, and other seed. The company is marketed in the United States, Canada, and England and Germany and brought from grass seed from Canada and alfalfa from Argentina.

Fourteen employees work at the plant. In addition, the company employs the commission buyers in Idaho, Utah and Wyoming. The company plans to handle between three and four million pounds of grass and alfalfa seed during the year, plus 100,000 bags of certified seed.

### Russ Official Slates Visit to Austria Area

VIENNA, Oct. 5 (AP)—Austrian government leaders are bracing for a visit this month from one of the Kremlin's newest operators, Soviet Deputy Premier Anastas I. Mikoyan.

His prospective visit is the result of one of those casual invitations extended in Moscow at banquets or cocktail parties—the same kind that took Premier Bulganin and Nikita Khrushchev to England.

An Austrian government delegation in Moscow 18 months ago negotiated a Soviet agreement to the long-delayed Austrian freedom treaty. The treaty thanked the Russians for their hospitality and casually extended invitations right and left to come and visit us some time, too.

Then the Austrians, happily rid of occupation armies from their country, forgot about it. But not so the Russians. In early September the Soviet ambassador in Vienna called at the chancery and remarked that Mikoyan was ready to visit Austria. Chancellor Julius Raab passed the buck to his cabinet. They couldn't very well say "tell Mikoyan we don't want him to come."

### 10 People Die In Collision in Canada Smash

VIRIDEN, Man., Oct. 5 (AP)—Ten persons were killed and one seriously injured late last night when two automobiles collided head-on on the Trans-Canada highway 10 miles southeast of here.

It was the second case of 10 deaths from a single traffic accident in as many days. About 24 hours earlier 10 persons died in a highway collision at Munton, Ind.

Royal Canadian mounted police said there were at least six cars and only the driver survived. All five in the other car were killed. The cars both were 1955 models. One was registered in Saskatchewan and the other in Manitoba.

Four of the victims were children. A woman and the four children were killed in a car bearing Saskatchewan license plates. A man driving the car was in serious condition in a hospital at Viriden. Five men in the other car, which was owned by Standard Oil company, were killed instantly.

Police said all six persons in the Saskatchewan car were thrown clear of the wreckage. Three men in the other car, believed to have come from Viriden, were thrown clear and the two others were trapped in the vehicle.

### Atomic Waste Disposal Seen As Easy Task

BOISE, Oct. 4.—The disposal of waste from atomic energy industrial plants of the future will be no more difficult or unsafe than the operation of the ordinary garbage dumps of today, two engineers of the Idaho state commission reported yesterday.

John W. Healy of the Hartford and Richard W. Washburn of the T. Bladett of the AEC experimental station near Arco, addressed the commission in a two-day meeting of the Pacific West Association of Industrial Waste Association.

Bladett told a reporter after his speech that cities of the future may be using a sort of radio-active garbage can for continuous burning of atomic wastes.

"In any event," said Healy, "it is not so difficult as you might think. The most economical method of disposal is to do it with ordinary sewage plants."

Bladett said that in an atomic energy electrical power plant the nuclear waste could be stored in a tank for indefinite lengths of time and hauled away for burial or dumping.

"At the present time, control of all atomic waste makes it about as experimental as the atom itself," he said.

He said there is plenty of room for disposal of waste in the atmosphere," he said.

### Drought Worsens For Great Plains

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—The drought in the great plains states worsened last week, the agriculture department reported today in its weekly weather and crop bulletin.

No rain whatsoever fell on the eastern part of the Dakotas, most of Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska and in most of the great basin area of the Far West, the bulletin said.

It said winds stirred up considerable dust in western Oklahoma, Kansas and the Nechaco river has stopped flowing in the northwestern part of Coffey county, Kansas.

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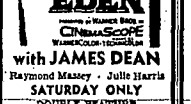

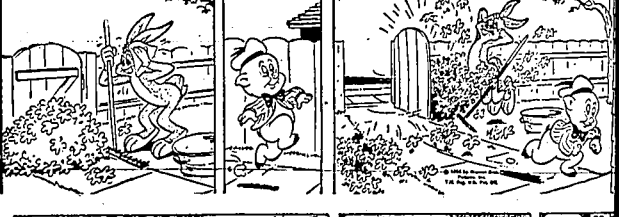

### Canal Official Lashes Action In Suez Tieup

CAIRO, Oct. 5.—An Egyptian canal official accused the captain of a British tanker today of stopping his navigation in the waterway to "disrupt" navigation.

Sayed Mahmoud Younis, deputy chairman of the Egyptian Suez Canal managing board, said the incident occurred several days ago. Younis in an article published in the newspaper Al Akhbab said there had been a "conspiracy by certain countries" to start canal traffic.

The story said three other ships in addition to the British tanker also had mechanical trouble while passing through the canal.

Younis' account of the British tanker's alleged attempt to disrupt canal traffic did not mention the name of the ship or its captain.

Younis said the Egyptian pilot who steered the ship through the canal asked the captain at the outset if the vessel was all right and was told it was. But during the crossing the ship's engines were stopped, "leaving her at the mercy of currents and winds in the narrow waterway," Younis said.

### Guardian Labors Of Mothers Cited

BALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 5.—Mrs. Bell G. Spafford, president of the LDS Relief Society women's auxiliary of the LDS church, told concluding sessions of the society's annual two-day conference yesterday that mothers must "ever be on guard to fortify their homes and children against the 'mischievous forces' at large in the world."

The society's conference, highlighted Wednesday with dedication of its \$10 million-dollar building near Temple Square here, preceded the LDS church's semi-annual conference which opens today and concludes Sunday.

Mrs. Spafford said: "Homes that are undergirded by the principles of the gospel and the conditions, as well as certain philosophies that are abroad, are making headway upon them, and in too many instances adversely affecting our children."

### Korean Leader Still Believes Russia Danger Threatens All

By DR. SYNGMAN RHEE, President of the Republic of Korea.

SEOUL, Korea, Oct. 5.—In my opinion, the question that transcends all others in international importance is whether or not the communist tide will be turned back.

If still-free peoples realize their danger, I am sure the world would be safe. But the appalling spirit of egoism has distorted some leaders in whom the people trust. Others, who say they love liberty, add that they value life more, and that was the reason they would bring death to millions. They would be willing to settle for slavery.

I do not propose war, but I disagree with those who say that we will not fight no matter what.

As I have said repeatedly there is no substitute for force or the attitude that aggression will inexorably evoke determined unlimited resistance. Aggression would die and there would be no more war if all good-neighbor countries would instantly and unreservedly come to the aid of the nation attacked or threatened.

Had the war in Korea been carried through to victory, Korea would be a perfect example.

International respect force—superior force.

Guarantee avowed aggressors pain for profit and there will be no war.

The problem of unification—uniting the North and South peninsula into a democratic, independent nation—is the greatest problem we Koreans face. But we recognize that it is in Korea with the entire free world's problem of turning back communism.

If Korea were a free island in the communist sea, how long could we survive? Because we realize that all democracies have identical problems we guide our national cause for the common welfare.

"All for one and one for all" connotes and multiplies many times the individual strength.

There are times when to act alone is the only honorable course open, but we pray that those conditions which will regard human freedom as paramount will move to combine their strength to oppose communism to turn it back upon itself, taking fresh victims and new conquests. It will wither and disintegrate.

Unification of Korea would signal the retreat of communism, the start of a new era of peace from the high water mark. Our neighbors, themselves in peril, tell us they drew courage from our courageous resistance. Many people throughout Asia are awakening to the truth about communism by virtue of our experience.

But there is great need for more vigorous international leadership for actions to match the above words that prove respectable states.
