Legality for Idaho Power's 3 Dams Is Sustained in Court

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9 (AP)—The U. S. court of appeals today upheld legality of Idaho Power's construction license for three dams in Hells canyon. The court turned down a request by public power groups that a license granted by the federal power commission be set aside and the stretch of the Snake river along the Idaho-Oregon border be reserved for a bigger government dam. The next step in the long and bitter fight between private and public power advocates is a time political issue in the Pacific Northwest.

The court's decision is certain to be an appeal to the supreme court.

Two Sisters Burn To Death as Blaze Razes Area Home

HAILEY, Oct. 9—Two sisters were burned to death and their mother hospitalized with burns when their single-story frame house was destroyed by flames of unknown origin Tuesday. Dead are Janice Marie Stevens, 12, who died in the home, and Judith Ellen Stevens, 14, who died later at Halley General hospital. Their mother, Mrs. Harry Stevens, has burns about the face, neck, chest and arms but is not considered as being in critical condition at the hospital.

James Stevens, 16, brother of the girls, has cuts on the arms, received as he broke windows in rescuing his mother and Judith from the flames. Judith died shortly before dawn.

The father of the two girls, an employe at the Shoshone mine, believed to have been at the mine when the fire broke out. He was killed in the fire. The cause of the fire has not been determined. Mrs. Stevens, who lives across the street from the Stevens family, was awakened by a noise and fled from the flaming building reflecting in her bedroom. She turned in the hallway to find the fire department arrived, the building was all but destroyed.

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ROUGH ROAD AHEAD

When congress enacted the \$3.8 billion dollar highway program this year, it was properly hailed as the first truly modern road plan of the postwar era.

Nothing has happened to alter this view. In certain facts are emerging which demonstrate rather forcibly that in this instance—as in so many—the lawmakers did not exactly "pass a miracle."

In other words, the business of translating the program into reality is subject to many important pitfalls. All kinds of detailed difficulties must be surmounted before major progress can be expected.

Traffic engineers meeting recently in San Francisco laid some of the problems out. The states have not yet received the necessary legislative authority for cooperation in the program.

In most cases their delays don't meet until 1951 or later, hence details on this score are strongly indicated.

The key feature of the program is the 41,000-mile interstate road network, yet factually backing even for the beginning phases of this effort. States and communities as a whole do not have enough space work completed on possible highway locations, problems involved in land acquisition, and so on.

Sometimes these troubles can be met swiftly, but not always. Chicago needed 13 years to get all the land for its Congress street superhighway.

Warnings have gone out that there may not be enough traffic engineers around to do the job. Government pay scales aren't high enough to attract the needed manpower.

Unless a pay boost comes in many cases, the problem may not be licked.

In addition, there are natural delays that follow from having to deal with many, many local and state governments, often within a limited geographic area. To get agreement on plans and routes can be almost as hard as winning approval of a particular route.

The engineers at San Francisco questioned, too, whether sufficient public support can be mustered for some parts of the vast project. Without that backing, important gaps in the highway might exist for years.

The program is projected, of course, over a 13-year period. But it will take much longer than that if there is not a spirited attack now on the hard-nut obstacles looming in its path.

Washington has wasted a \$3.8 billion dollar war, but it has wrought no magic. Ahead is tough, grubby work at the state, regional and local level.

The highway program today is a bright promise. Only American citizens in every corner of the land can make it a fact.

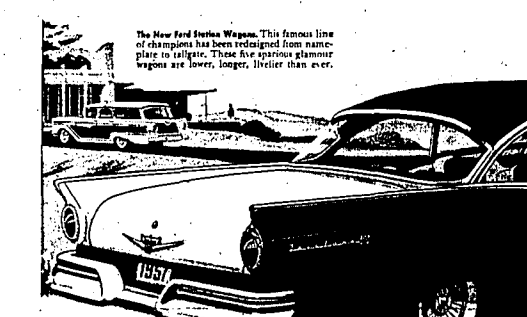

One evening last April, pressed for time while preparing dinner for her husband and two small sons, she remarked on the number of frozen foods on the market, expressing the wish that noodles could be added to the list.

After giving it a little thought, the Cannons could find no reason to eliminate noodles as a possible frozen food. Cannon, a former machinist now working as a pick-up and delivery contractor for the Union Pacific railroad here, set to work, aided by tips from his wife, to construct the necessary machinery.

Mine Workers Union Fosters Merger Plans

CINCINNATI, Oct. 9 (AP)—Merger of the national coal business into a few big firms is expected and even covered by the coal industry labor organization, the United Mine Workers Union.

John L. Lewis, UMW president, has put an accent on improving industry efficiency to pay for raising wages and worker benefits and says industry combines will help advance that cause.

This policy has been made clear by Lewis during sessions of UMW convention sessions there, which resumed today for a second week.

Lewis told the convention that the new era of peaceful labor negotiations in the industry, contrasting with the former period of bitter strikes, is making possible larger combinations of coal producers.

The UMC chief said the industry trend toward a few big operating firms is to be desired, not blocked. He said the pooling of capital, purchasing and managerial talent could only result in lower industry costs and enable producers to pay miners greater benefits.

"These great combines now being formed in the industry are able to save enormous sums of money," Lewis said. "That is modern operation. That condition is one which I think the industry now in its major sense is dedicated to continue."

The significance of the situation in coal seemed to be that Lewis, having succeeded in building the UMW labor organization into a force fully able to batter the best firms possible, now is encouraging coal producers into more efficient combinations to pay even higher wages and keep coals down. Lewis recently won a new \$2.40 daily pay boost for coal miners that brought them to a \$22.25 basic wage level.

Care of Your Children

"Our usually peaceful home is old turmoil because our 14-year-old daughter, Paula, is having a hard time. She has a nervous habit. She belongs to a society, which means a dance every two weeks. She has a regular date every Saturday evening. There are two school dances and special dates, all evening affairs. We have to wait she is home before midnight and she complains that she is the only one and only to break up a party. 'Um the drop. We have a date every time she goes out. How long should a girl of 14 stay out at night?"

Dear Mrs. a girl of 14 should be in her bed at night, every school night. In my book, "Education for Health," I discuss the importance of healthful teen-agers. Late hours do not induce these impulses.

Would there be such battles if the child had been reared with the idea to the fore? Would she fight her parents' decisions had she been reared to go along with their ideas, knowing that they always gave every consideration to her without held fast to what was best for her? I think not.

Children of boys and girls alike, should not become involved in social activities to the extent that they do every minute of their day and night. They are too young to keep such matters in proper perspective in their own minds. They put a "date" ahead of a lesson and demand beyond attendance at a cool season. With their minds on such matters, school and home duties are neglected greatly, to the detriment of their growth and progress in essential.

Childhood and youth are fleeting. The children and young people should be granted the privilege and protection their inspectors desire. They are not to be given everything they ask for; they cannot take over duty as they wish because they long to do so. Not if they are to develop wholesomely. Not if they are to ripen into healthy maturity in body, mind and spirit.

Every father and mother has to consider the child's health, safety and the character of the stage of maturity of the child when heavily in any decision in relation to their welfare. The customs of the community and the group to which they belong have to be considered.

But one thing we can stand on 10 days a week: sound, logical, sound for a full calendar of social engagements. Hold them down to the week ends and guard the hours of sleep. Let the children stay young.

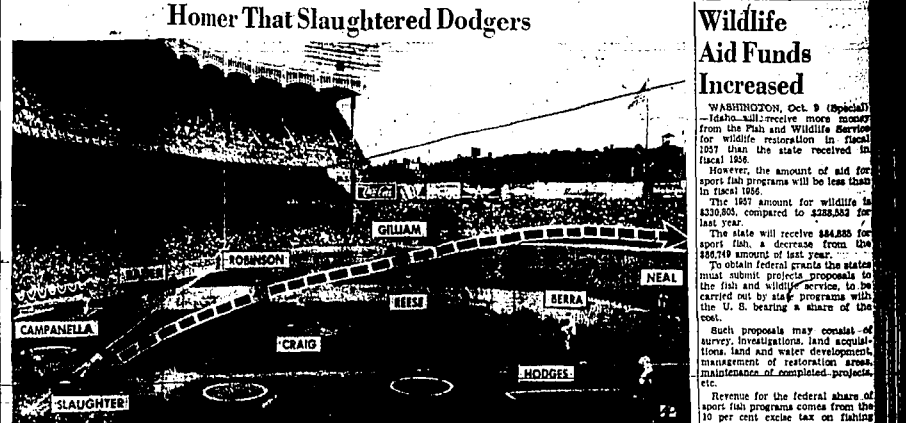

Soviets Take Father, Child To Sanctuary

LONDON, Oct. 8 (AP)—Tombstone Russian refugee Alexei Chvostov and his American-born daughter, Tanya, 21, arrived here today from the United States and were whisked off to the Soviet embassy for "safe-keeping."

The 54-year-old Russian who fled to the United States five years ago for "peace and security" was escorted to London by two Soviet bodyguards who met him and Tanya at Southampton when they arrived aboard the Queen Mary.

American sources have reported Chvostov returning against his will to the United States and were whisked off to the Soviet embassy for "safe-keeping."

He and Tanya had hidden aboard the Queen Mary in New York harbor when U. S. immigration authorities tried to find the pair in response to a fearful plea from Tanya's mother who was left behind. Other Russians aboard were reported to have helped them hide.

Today they arrived at London's prime Waterloo station by boat from the two Soviet embassy officials escorted them through crowds of newsmen, photographers and American tourists in a taxi and when they jumped in a cab and ordered "Soviet embassy."

They landed without incident at Southampton. At his Detroit home, where she lives with her second husband and their 8 1/2-year-old son, Mrs. Helena Driesman, 24, Tanya's mother, could only say she hoped the government would do something.

"I had not heard of any I went to the government last Friday," she said. "I told them Tanya was an American citizen. She says there she is not Russian. He stole her from me."

Northwest Power Outlook Improves

PORTLAND, Oct. 8 (AP)—The Bonneville administration, in a periodic report on stream flow conditions, said today that the Pacific Northwest power outlook is improving.

The system's firm loads were met by hydroelectric power last week, and interruptible loads were filled with provisional power through release of water at Hungry Horse dam and some outside resources.

The report said river flows increased last week and the "Columbia river critical flows rose sharply to above medium conditions," although the water volume was dropping slowly by the week-end.

Bonneville said the outlook is favorable for meeting the 1951 firm loads through Nov. 4. The agency might be able to resume part of the interruptible loads by that date, the report said.

No Action Set On Test Case In Tax Battle

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8 (AP)—The United States supreme court failed to act yesterday on the test suit in which Utah Gov. J. Bracken Lee is challenging the legal right of the government to use tax money to finance the foreign aid program.

The Utah governor said he took the action in an effort to test the legality of the foreign aid program, but instead of going to court, the internal revenue bureau simply filed a lien against Lee's bank account and collected the money due it.
