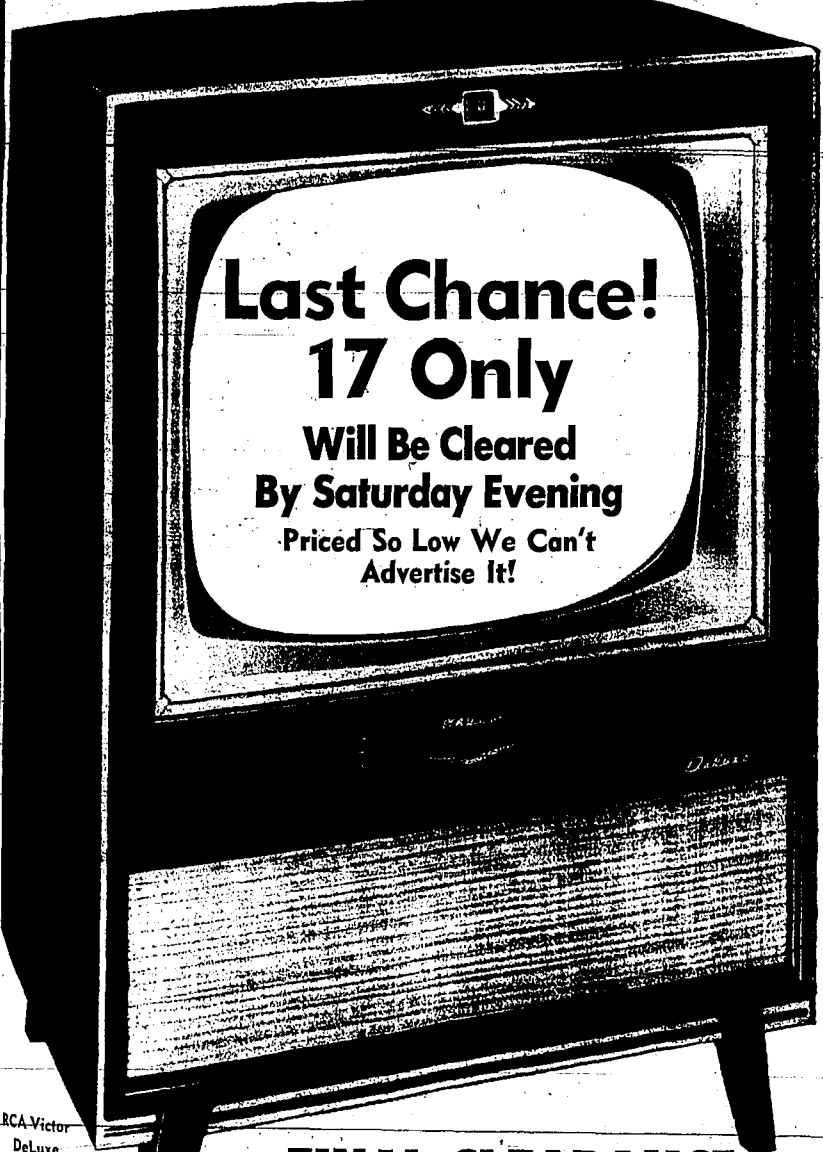

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11 (AP)—The French ship *Albatross*, which will be circumnavigating the globe with the United States Navy's *Albatross* in a her three-year voyage, will be able to "hear" the universe.

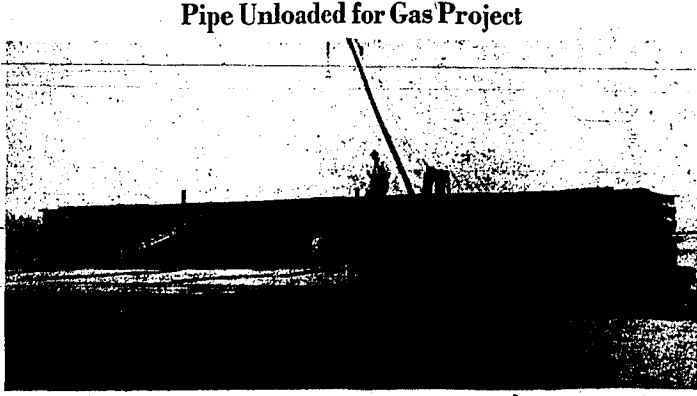

## "Mail Early" if Friends Overseas Are To Get Yule Gifts, Postmaster Warns

The period between Oct. 15 and Nov. 15 again has been designated for the acceptance of Christmas parcels for members of the Armed Forces overseas and authorized U.S. friends who receive their mail through an APO, reminds Twin Falls Postmaster W. W. Francis.

Francis says the importance of mailing Christmas parcels during the designated period "cannot be emphasized too strongly—the earlier the better."

He cautions those sending parcels to overseas personnel that no assurances can be given that surface parcels mailed after Nov. 15 of this year will be delivered in time for Christmas.

Francis explains that in addition to a large volume of Christmas mail, it is necessary for the medical and military supplies be given the highest priority on the available overseas mail.

Senders should not delay the mailing of parcels until December on the assumption that timely delivery will be assured through the use of air parcels. After an air parcel arrives overseas, final delivery, in many cases, must be made through the use of surface facilities.

Francis notes that parcels destined for Japan, Korea and the Pacific Islands should be mailed as early as possible, "preferably not later than Nov. 1, because of the distance involved."

Regarding the size and weight of parcels, Francis says air parcels are limited in size to 30 inches in length and 30 inches in width and 20 inches in height.

The maximum size and weight limits for domestic surface parcels are applicable to Christmas parcels for the Armed Forces except that a limit not to exceed 50 pounds applies in the case of ordinary parcels addressed through New York, N. Y. to certain APO's.

The maximum size and weight limits for domestic surface parcels post to most other APO's are: If the parcel is over 12 inches in length and 12 inches in width, the maximum weight is 70 pounds, and the maximum length is 48 inches.

Broken down, the postal table for parcels is: over 12 to 48 inches in length—24 inches in girth; over 48 to 60 inches—24 inches in girth; over 48 to 60 inches—18 inches in girth; over 48 to 60 inches—12 inches in girth.

Boxes for overseas transmission must be of a strong construction on account of the great distance they must travel and the handling and storage they must undergo. Each box should be securely tied with strong cord.

It is suggested that senders obtain information at the post office regarding customs declarations for all parcels addressed to APO's and NPO's.

Francis cautions against sending parcels containing foodstuffs subject to spoilage and breakage in transit and says that such items are not likely to reach overseas destinations in good condition.

In addition to the articles normally prohibited in the mail, matches of all kinds, lighter fluids and other flammable liquids are prohibited.

The prohibition against the mailing of cigarettes and tobacco products does not apply to parcels addressed to exchange or special service officers at the APO's when endorsed "For Military Agency."

All boxes should be addressed legibly and in ink or by typewriting. Sales slips of retail stores should not be used as address labels.

Francis recommends that a slip of paper containing the names and the addresses of the sender and the contents be enclosed in each parcel to provide identification in the event the parcel is broken open.

In addition to the names and addresses of the sender, inscriptions such as "Merry Christmas," "Do not open until Christmas," "Happy New Year" and the like may be placed on the covering of the parcel providing it does not interfere with the address.

Letters may be enclosed in a third or fourth class parcel. Postage at the first-class rate must be paid for each letter. The mailer must write "first class mail enclosed" on the parcel below the postage and above the address.

Francis says greeting cards for Armed Forces personnel overseas may be mailed at any time, but notices should mail such cards prepaid prior to Nov. 15. For airmail greeting cards he suggests they be mailed by Dec. 1.

Francis recommends the use of postal money orders to send gifts of money to members of the Armed Forces overseas. He says "the expiration of United States currency to overseas military post offices where the dollar is not the accepted medium of exchange is prohibited."

He explained that currency cannot be accepted for mailing at a domestic post office when addressed to overseas military post offices or when mailed to such addresses to overseas military post offices except those APO's and NPO's which are branch-registered mail.

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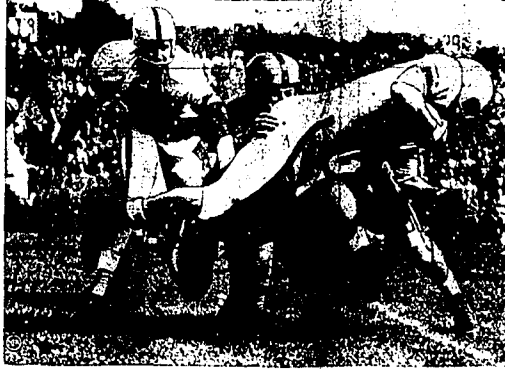

Except for this change, all modern methods of child-birth were followed.

The mothers apparently were much more comfortable and birth much more efficient, Dr. Newton said.

Most women had little need for anesthetics, and 60 per cent had none at all or merely local anesthetics.

Sitting or kneeling positions for child birth have been followed for countless generations, and still are found in many primitive societies, including some rural sections of the United States, he said.

### Drought Hits West Ranges

DENVER, Oct. 11 (AP)—Continued drought during September kept range conditions in the West parched and dry and in the worst condition in 22 years.

The blazing sun and lack of moisture cut the supply of feed crops, creating feed shortages in parts of Nebraska, eastward to Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and southern Utah.

These observations were contained in the monthly western range and livestock report released yesterday by the U. S. department of agriculture.

The FPC and the Federal Power and Light company of Portland will develop the site jointly, with the FPD building and owning the power house and allied facilities, and the private firm erecting and owning the main dam.

Construction work on the dam and diversion tunnel now is proceeding under a temporary permit from the FPC.

### Trial Slated for Sheriff Shooting

BLACKFOOT, Oct. 11 (AP)—A district court judge set Nov. 19 as a trial date yesterday for a man charged with attempted murder in the shooting of the Blingham county sheriff.

William (Ace) O'Kruka, charged in the shooting of Sheriff Everett Goodwin, pleaded innocent because of insanity yesterday at a sanity hearing before Judge Preston Thatcher.

Pending the trial, O'Kruka will undergo psychiatric examination at Idaho Hospital South.

O'Kruka was charged after sheriff's officers went to the hospital with him to quell a disturbance. Officers said O'Kruka was wounded lightly by a deputy sheriff after Goodwin was shot.

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## Fall Business Prospect Booming; U.S. Commerce Department Figures Cited

NEW YORK, Oct. 11 (AP)—Now that the World Series is settled the country can take stock today of how fall business is faring and where it's headed.

Briefly: It's faring well and it's headed—almost everyone agrees—for new heights.

Government figures issued while you were watching or talking about the ball games show:

1. For the first time ever the average hourly pay of factory workers has risen above the \$2 mark.

2. The number of those out of work is the lowest in nearly three years.

3. Sales of manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers continue to rise, and in August were 1 1/2 billion dollars above last year's mark.

4. Farm surpluses are shrinking a little as exports top last year's totals by a good margin.

5. Interest rates continue to rise and are at the highest level since 1922—but confident businessmen borrow more all the time.

6. And the same confident merchants and manufacturers continue to pile up inventories for the 20th straight month.

Businessmen report that rising prices on finished goods so far average hourly pay of factory workers has risen above the \$2 mark.

7. Above's met with much sales resistance. Retail trade is running above last year and appears headed for its biggest Christmas.

8. With unemployment below two million for the first time since November, 1933, and with the total of wages and salaries well above a year ago, merchants in most sections of the land are in a confident mood.

Non-agricultural employment is at a record 22.1 million.

Average weekly earnings of factory workers climbed to a record \$11 in September. New wage books and longer work weeks are expected to bring it even higher as the fall boom continues.

Total business sales in August reached \$3.1 billion dollars, 1 1/2 billion more than in August, 1933, the department of commerce reports.

But business inventories also rose by 200 million dollars in August to total nearly \$5.5 billion dollars. In the first seven months of the

year the monthly gain averaged 800 million dollars.

Rising inventories bespeak business confidence. But they also worry those economists who fear that the huge pile of goods and materials may become a weak spot if the pace of retail trade should falter.

Tight money also worries those who fear it may discourage further business expansion plans, just as it is accused of holding down the number of new homes being built this year.

Interest rates inched higher while most folk were noting only the ball scores. The U. S. treasury is now paying more than three per cent on its 91-day bills. You have to go back to the bank holiday of 1933 to find a higher rate.

The federal reserve bank of New York reports that in September business borrowers paid an average of 4 1/4 per cent interest on short-term loans from New York banks.

This was the highest average since August, 1932. Back in the 1920s, however, they paid as much as six and seven per cent.

But the same rate this fall is not discouraging borrowing. New York bank loans are at a record volume.

Most falls are doing well, feeling confident—and in debt.
