### Magic Valley Hobbies No. 42 Sleep Is Necessary for Full Enjoyment Of Quilting, Comfort Making Hobbies

If you're never kept beneath the eightsixty quilts of a down filled comforter on a cold, winter night, you've missed a sensation that's almost too good to be wasted on sleep. Now, you'll have to admit, the quilt, the best that contributes most to the definition of serenity and coziness is a remarkable creature. Mrs. Johana Paul, Buhl, who has been making down comforters for many years, will tell you it's the goose down that makes the difference. That's because only the best of the down is used. Goose down has no peer when it comes to comforters, she says. A goose is not a bird, she says, that you don't have to kill to get its wool. Not do you have to kill a goose for its down. Back in Czechoslovakia, Mrs. Paul's husband, people pluck geese many as three times, meanwhile she feeds it a mixture of mashed potatoes and bran in order to make the bird fat. She reserves the old fat, claiming "the birds make the feathers." A hat is put into close confinement so it can't pick back while she is plucking and the feathers are saved. Mrs. Paul says, "Then the fat is used to make a frame upon which the quilt had been stretched to 'lie off' the quilt. This is the process by which the bottom and top sides of the quilt are seen together to prevent the cotton or wool or other material used as 'filling' from slipping, wading or bunching. In a similar manner, women interested in comforter making would gather at the home of one for a 'bee' to strip the feathers. Goose feathers, once collected, must be sorted, the down in one sack, the other feathers in another. Mrs. Paul says the basement is the best place in which to sort feathers because—since a small breeze will start the feathers flying. The feathers, as distinguished from the down, have sharp points which could be most irritating in the middle of a pleasant dream. During the 'stripping' bees the soft parts of the feathers are removed from the quilts. Mrs. Paul says it's a ticklish way to spend an evening. Mrs. Paul says it takes approximately three pounds of down and stripped feathers to make an average size comforter. The next step is to make a sack or white ticking, 72 inches wide. The sack then is di-

vided into nine sections, each eight inches wide. The sections are stitched together on a machine and five and one-fourth ounces of down stuffed into each section. The end of each section is sewn closed as soon as the feathers have been stuffed into it. Once all nine sections have been filled, the feathers in each are smoothed out and distributed and the entire comforter is covered with satin or taffeta. Quilting the covering is not necessary but the down will stay in place better if the covering is "tacked" lengthwise down the sections. Mrs. Paul claims.

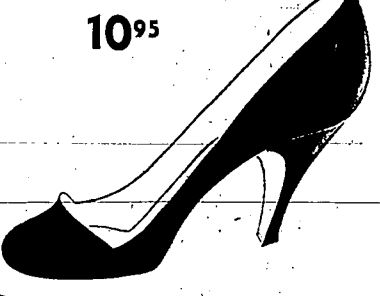

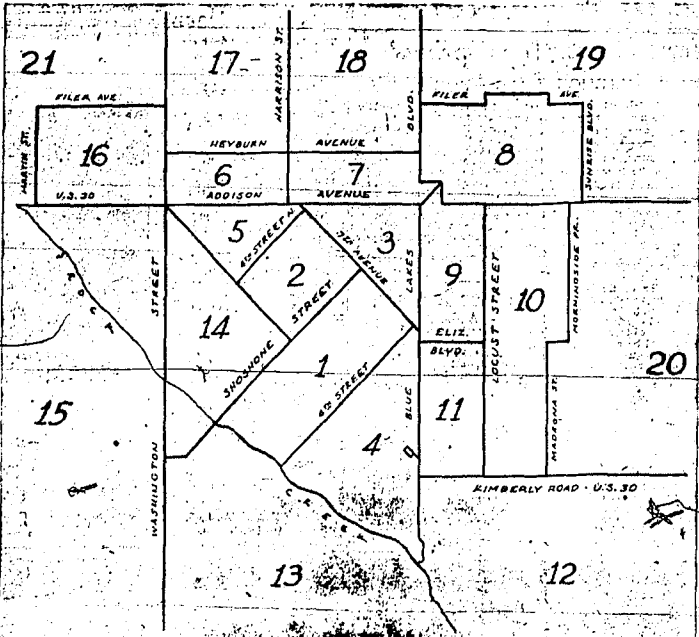

### Life in MAGIC VALLEY

In the last few days, Mrs. Lucille Kinsey, SHOAHONE, Lincoln county clerk, auditor and recorder, has received two requests, one from Washington, the other Wisconsin, for information on the Lincoln county courthouse. The Wisconsin man was looking for special stories in the history of the courthouse to include in a collection of similar incidents.

The other who sought information on the courthouse was a Seattle, Wash., boy whose hobby it is to collect pictures of county courthouses. At present, he informed Mrs. Kinsey, he has 222 pictures in his collection of Idaho's 44 counties he has 31, the latest being the one Mrs. Kinsey sent to him.

The inquiries about the Lincoln county courthouse set Mrs. Kinsey's curiosity to working and she delivered into the post of the building in which she works.

Lincoln county was organized at 9:30 a. m. March 25, 1855. Following a series of legislative moves for county seat of the area, Shoahone having been the county seat of previously organized Logan county as early as 1825, the legislature in 1855 abolished the counties of Logan and Alturas and created the counties of Blaine and Lincoln. Lincoln embracing the land north of Snake river, west of Elmore county, and the other counties having been the townships two south and three south.

Officials for the county were appointed by the governor and bonds posted.

The courthouse being available for rent around town of five.

The south half of the lower floor of the red brick building on Walnut street was obtained for the clerk and recorder at a rental fee of \$7 a month. The building was owned by the Werhicks home and hardware store for the treasurer and assessor at a fee of \$10 a month and two from buildings adjoining the jail were rented for the sheriff and probate judge for \$40 a month.

The county's first officers included Commissioners James L. Fuller, Lee S. Veder and Thomas Parr; A. S. Senter, clerk; J. P. White, sheriff; C. W. Werhicks, treasurer; Fred W. Gooding, assessor; J. O. Erven, probate judge and ex-officio school superintendent. The corner was W. H. Beahm.

The territorial legislature in 1864 had established common school systems and the probate judges were all ex-officio school superintendents.

A total of \$285 was spent for the first supplies for courthouse officers, and a call for bids for a building was made at the April 16, 1900 meeting of the commissioners. Estimated cost of the building was set at \$12,000. The bids were opened May 29, 1903, and the bid of O. J. Brennan for \$17,100 was accepted.

The courthouse was built in the "park" in the village of Shoahone, facing north. The building was to be completed by March 1, 1904, or Brennan would forfeit to the county the sum of \$5 a day for each day taken to complete said building beyond that date.

The new building was inspected on June 8, 1904, and was accepted.

### Area Resident Is Injured on Farm

PAUL, Oct. 13.—Bud Sanford was injured in a farm accident Wednesday. Following the accident he was rushed to a Burley hospital and underwent surgery. His condition was later reported as "improving."

Sanford was working on a potato combine in his fields, when the machinery became clogged with vines. He climbed on top of it and the rotating gears caught his foot, pulling him in two quickly as possible and he was rushed to the hospital.

### Lincoln County Didn't Change Again in 1913

Lincoln county didn't change again in 1913 when Gooding county was cut out of the west and Minidoka county on the east. In 1910 Jerome county was lopped off on the south.

Few changes have been made with the courthouse building since it was built. Some bricks began falling off the front of the building and a new entrance was built. Additional rooms were added onto the back for the sheriff's office and a rather extensive decorating and remodeling project has taken place in the court room.

Jack Clough, who works for the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph company in TWIN FALLS, doesn't think he's a particularly lucky person, but there are others employed at the Twin Falls office who have a different view.

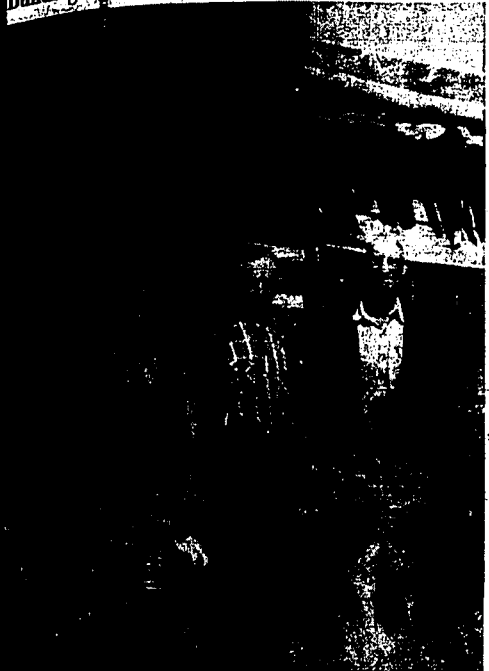

Building Probably Is Oldest in Magic Valley



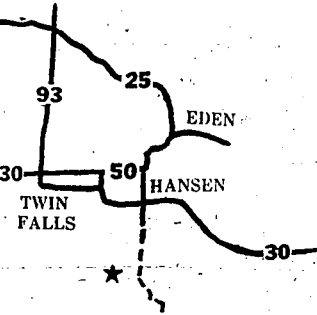

Four stage stations were established in this area. One was the Old Stone House, destroyed during the construction of Miller dam; another was Rock Creek, located 1 1/2 miles southeast of Twin Falls; the third was Diner, a stone structure, three miles east of Twin Falls, and the fourth was Mud Springs, near the Snake river north of Buhl.

Domos and many others, some unimpaired. They found living in the foothills was good and many of their descendants continue to live in the area even though Rock Creek, as a community, has all but passed from existence.

Not much is known of Tom Callaway or Pat Garaty who came to Rock Creek in 1872 but Garaty was given the first water right on Rock Creek. His place is owned now by Chli McDevitt.

Lars Peter Larsen came from Denmark in 1877. He received the third water right on the stream and his descendants still ranch the old homestead. The Shoenels ranch was given the second water right.

Christian Jensen also came to Rock Creek in 1876, arriving from Denmark. Davy Crockett wasn't the only adventurous member of his family. E. M. Crockett, a distant cousin, settled several miles up Rock Creek canyon in the early days.

After George Scott's death in 1899, his son, George Scott, a brother of the famous Death Valley Scotty, also was an early resident of the area.

The old Rock Creek station was sold by Bascom to Herman Stricker in 1876. Stricker came from Germany when he was 15 years old, and the Civil War as a private.

After he had purchased the Rock Creek station from Bascom he ran a large hotel there, a barn big enough to house 100 head of horses and many other establishments.

brush over the canal, and just beyond on a hill knoll the cemetery, enclosed with iron posts and fancy wire. Several marble slabs still are standing for the home- stead, Lars Peter Larsen, who was born April 28, 1831, and who died May 27, 1907.

The earliest dated stone is for Frederick Hansen, who was drowned in Rock Creek on May 20, 1882. He was 3 years, 6 months, and 21 days old.

The cemetery once located on the Stricker ranch, located about one-fourth mile west of the stage station, was a gray knoll, chosen when J. H. McNitt, a freighter and mule-skinner, was crushed between wagons in 1871.

A month later Hughie Quinn, who didn't carry a gun, was shot at the store. In 1877, Bill Dowdle, who had a reputation as a 'bad man' and who had been sent to prison with the help of Trotter and Willson, came back to seek revenge.

In 1878, a small immigrant girl was buried there and in 1884, a Gypsy woman died along the trail and was buried at Rock Creek. Mrs. Henry Snyder, who kept a restaurant, was next in 1883. In 1897 the cemetery became the resting place for another immigrant child.

Some 20 years ago the graves were robbed for their skeletons. The robbers started digging at night but soon became bored enough to come openly in the daytime.

At one time there were a few marble stones in evidence on the Stricker ranch, but in the early 1900's they disappeared. A tombstone salesman is blamed for taking them since the names and dates were cut very shallow and could have been removed.

One of the graves was a Gypsy woman, who was a bone rigid. One little immigrant girl had beautiful, red, curled hair.

Dr. Joseph David, Kimberly, was granted permission in the fall of 1927 to take the skeleton of the bad man, Bill Dowdle. The bullet still was imbedded behind the left ear. Dr. Davis left it there, but when the skeleton was loaned to the Kimberly

**Red-Japanese Peace Talk Is To Be Opened**

They announced the first business session will begin at noon Monday at the Kremlin.

Hatazuma arrived here yesterday to take personal charge of the new attempt to resolve the differences that have kept the nation in a state of war with Russia for 13 years.

He was given a warm reception by Bulganin and Japanese flag were flown in Moscow for the first time since before World war II.

Two previous series of peace talks ended in deadlock over the question of ownership of two large islands in the southern Kurils, which were occupied by Russia during the war and were never returned to Japan.

Hatazuma came here with the understanding that this issue, if not resolved, will be postponed for further negotiations after Russia and Japan have signed an "end of war" pact.
