Leaders Meet In Poland to Chart Course

WARSAW, Oct. 15 (AP)—Poland's Communist leaders met this week to chart the future of their regime.

There was a widespread belief that the Premier Wladyslaw Gombor's speech would be a landmark and that he might play a leading role in an era of "de-Stalinization" in the eyes of party leaders.

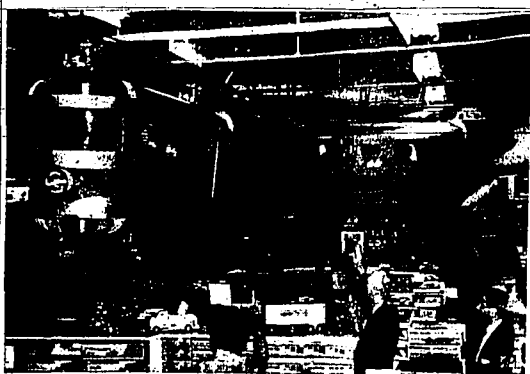
Gombor was charged with "de-Stalinization" as the result of the Tito dispute and was reported to have been a bitter opponent of the late Premier's policy.

There are reports he may be given the job of Vice Premier. He also was charged last week in a speech with Poland's economic recovery.

The central committee meeting of the Communist party, originally scheduled for tomorrow, was postponed to Tuesday. This was confirmed officially, and there was no clue in the official press.

The country was shaken by the news of the assassination of Premier Gombor and the arrest of other leaders in parliament. Saturday night rioting by army officers and 200 high-ranking army officers was also strongly suspected. The article in Poland was "not necessary."

Indian Family Leaves Idaho For City Job

LAWRENCE, Oct. 15 (AP)—A young Indian couple left behind the ancient ways of tribal living Saturday night and boarded a train en route to a new kind of life in the "white man's world."

The Arnold McCormicks are going there where McCormick, who runs the business administration for years at the University of Idaho, says to lead a "civilized" life.

The Indian lived in the Colorado area for a time during a tour with his wife from 1952-1954.

The McCormicks were the first Northwest Indians to participate in the relocation program of the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

The newspaper also supported Stevenson in 1952.

Hungary Reds Offer Favor to Former Chief

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Oct. 15 (AP)—The Hungarian Communist party "glorified" former Premier László Nagy yesterday and hailed his return to the fold into disservice because of the "personal prejudices" of former party leader Matyas Rakosi.

The official Communist party newspaper Szabad Nep published the central committee's decision to permit Nagy to rejoin the party. He was expelled last November on charges of "gross deviations."

The decision was published as a declaration of Hungarian leaders' left for Rakosi for talks with Marshal Tito.

Earlier Hungary had rebuffed a Soviet-suggested interim Minister László Rajk and had arrested Miklos Horthy and other persons connected with Rakosi's flight. Rakosi had been accused of Tito's activities.

In Vienna reliable sources said Zoltan Szotek, former Hungarian minister to Belgrade and press chief of Nagy's cabinet, may become Hungary's next prime minister. It would mean it unlikely Nagy would become premier.

The political resolution on Nagy said the political committee tried to invalidate the November 1955 resolution that expelled Conrade Nagy from the party. It said he committed political mistakes but they did not justify his exclusion from the party.

Noted Psychiatrist Reaches 3 Conclusions on Behaviorisms

CHICAGO, Oct. 15 (AP)—A man who has been a leading leader, politician and has spent a lifetime delving into the problems of other people has reached three conclusions:

Parents have gone from the extremes of too much discipline to not enough in raising children.

Television has promoted mental health by a change in public thinking about emotional problems and psychiatry.

There is no simple set of rules for mental and emotional health.

These are the conclusions of Dr. Franz Alexander, eminent psychiatrist who is retiring as the director of the famed Chicago Institute for Psychoanalysis.

Alexander, a pioneer in psychoanalysis and an associate of the late Sigmund Freud, is going to Los Angeles to head the new psychiatric research center at Mount Sinai hospital.

He founded the institute here in 1926 and pioneered in research on psychosomatic illness.

The emphasis today should be placed on preventive psychiatry, said Alexander, who still speaks with a trace of Hungarian accent.

"We talk a great deal about our overworked mental hospitals. This is a big, practical problem, and a lasting one."

But the neurotic individual who is confined to any institution is a far greater social problem," he said.

He said neurotic school teachers, television, he said, is a popular and lasting one.
