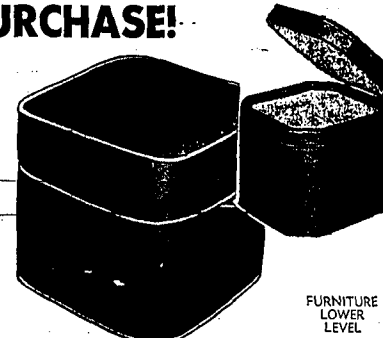

### Legal Tussle Begins Over Writer's Will

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 13 (AP)—Two women battled over the \$77,237 estate of the late James Hilton, British novelist and author of "Lost Horizon."

Hilton's first wife, Mrs. Alice Hilton, 50, Long Beach, Calif., and his cousin, Mrs. Elizabeth Hill, 46, Escondido, yesterday took their case to superior court.

Mrs. Hilton testified that she was Hilton's legal widow and entitled to half of the estate outright as her community property share. Mrs. Hill, through attorney Samuel Friedman, claimed that Mrs. Hilton has no right to half the estate because Hilton obtained a Mexican divorce from her in 1927.

The first Mrs. Hilton charged that the divorce was not legal. Friedman told the court that Hilton married Mrs. Gailna Hilton, 50, four days after he divorced his first wife. Both Mrs. Gailna Hilton, who divorced the author in 1928, and Hilton's secretary, Adele Barticklow, were left 25 per cent of the estate.

Hilton died Dec. 20, 1934, of cancer at Long Beach. Under conditions of a 1946 will the author's estate was to receive \$500 monthly for life with the remainder going to Mrs. Hill on Mrs. Alice Hilton's death.

### Man Can't Get Into Sweat on Any Occasion

TAMPA, Fla., Oct. 13 (AP)—Adolph Pricken is a man who never gets in a sweat about anything because he is so great it puts his sweat glands out of commission.

Since a new life began for Pricken who until a few years ago was turning handbags and golfing bags for a living, he has had a very hard time to shams.

A life spent largely in belittle, his house and carefully arranging working hours followed Pricken's work of sweat glands, without which his body could not throw off heat.

His doctors say his medical case is very rare.

Air conditioning has helped a great deal, and when the temperature goes to 78 or above he still must take at least three ice baths daily. That's good, because in the hot air conditioning he is necessary for him to ask in ice water eight to 10 times daily.

These ice cubes, which he carries in his pocket, are used to cool the body heat. If the heat were to build up too fast the blood pressure drops and he soon would collapse. Most miserable times for Pricken are after meals.

Ice houses are his favorite cooling off places.

His ice bill is big. When it's hot he buys 20 pounds of ice daily.

That's nothing. Before attending Monday morning when their car overturned twice on a country road two miles from Dietrich between Dietrich and Shoshone.

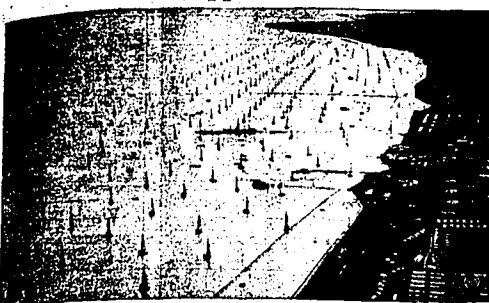

### Venezuela Supplies Oil to U.S.

### Nation Builds "Little Suez" To Aid Allies

MARACAIBO, Venezuela (NEA)—A "Little Suez" for the western world has quietly gone into operation at Venezuela's oil-rich Lake Maracaibo. The rest of the world is embroiled in the crisis over the big Suez.

Venezuela's "Suez" is a 20-mile canal through the sandbar barricade at the mouth of Lake Maracaibo. It costs \$3 million to build. It gives huge tankers access to the lake wells from which, once built, they can sail directly to ports over the world.

At the same time, Venezuela is building 100,000 acres in the coastal zone on the lake that will supplement the estimated 1,600,000 barrels of production now coming from 1,500 wells on the lake and its vicinity.

A general spokesman for a government which ranks second in the world production of crude oil, says Venezuela could up its production by 25 per cent immediately to meet the demand on Europe should the Suez canal "have" a "stopdown" of any kind.

The new Maracaibo canal is expected to channel 700,000 barrels of oil a day.

The 20-foot-deep canal had been planned by the government, but always made the project an impossibility. A two-mile breakwater would fill the water and the total concentration of dredging in history turned the canal into a "stopdown."

The new canal has given such importance to the lake that when the government announced the project, they were literally swamped with requests for new concessions. They were literally swamped with requests for new concessions.

Questioning of Calamai was expected to end tomorrow. Capt. Gunnar Nordstrom, master of the Stockholm, was scheduled to be the next witness, probably taking the stand on Monday.

### Mother, Two Girls Critical From Poison

DENVER, Oct. 18 (AP)—A mother and two of her daughters were reported critically ill today of the food poisoning that took the life of a third daughter Tuesday.

In all 14 persons at some of the spoiled beef steaks during two meals at the home of Harry Thayne at Maybelle, 32 miles west of Cheyenne, were stricken or treated for food poisoning.

The Thaynes formerly lived in Thayne, Utah.

On Monday night 8-year-old Gwendolyn Thayne became ill. The girl died the next day in Craig Community hospital.

The cause was given as botulism—the potent toxin from improperly canned food, which affects the respiratory system and causes general paralysis and a weakness similar to that of bulbar polio.

An air force officer returned to Lowry air force base with the 24-year-old mother, Mrs. Carrie Thayne, and three of her daughters, Kathleen, 15; Gayle, 6, and Diane, 3, and a nephew, Lyman Taylor, 10. They were placed in Colorado General hospital, where today Mrs. Thayne, Kathleen and Gayle were reported unimproved.

### Railroads Pay Huge Sums in New Gambles

WASHINGTON (AP)—Amtrak's recurring railroad industry is now sweating out a 20 million dollar gamble.

Whether it pays off depends on how the traveler and paying customer. The outcome could determine one industry's future.

The big money question is: "Will you quit your car and climb aboard the revolutionary low-slung and high-level trains appearing on the tracks this year?"

For these streamlined trains of tomorrow are specifically designed to lure the public away from the highways and give the railroad business a needed boost.

This expensive experiment will meet the crucial test over the next 12 months, according to the experts. And passenger traffic during this summer's travel season will be monitored closely, "they tip."

"All times with interest in passenger service are watching this development closely," says Robert G. Henry, vice president of the Association of American Railroads. He estimates that about 20 million dollars have been sunk into the look-ahead trains which have been introduced on the lines.

"Never before in so short a time have so many new-type trains been introduced," says Robert G. Henry, President of the National Association of Travel Organizations.

Latest of the low-level trains made its debut on June 13. This summer Santa Fe's double decker Z-Caplan went into regular operation between Chicago and Los Angeles.

"The appeal of the high-level train is long distance travel at coach rates with a high degree of luxury and scenic interest," explains Henry. He points out that the main idea behind the new train is to lure travelers away from their cars.

"It's not the airlines we're worrying about," he says. "We're competing with the automobile, for 85 to 90 per cent of inter-city travel is by car."

### Decision Eyed On Loans for Israeli Nation

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 (AP)—The administration is about to take another step toward reaching a final decision on Israel's bid for a \$75 million dollar American loan.

Israeli officials are "impatiently" waiting for a decision which would help finance various irrigation and agricultural projects.

Administration officials said today that a three-man mission from the Export-Import bank will leave for Iraq within a week to check out irrigation projects already under development.

Indications are that a final decision on the loan will not be possible before the Nov. 6 elections with Republican politicians had hoped for action before that date.

New York Attorney General Jacob K. Sives is a Republican candidate for the senate from New York, recently urged quick administration action on the Israeli project.

Javits stressed the importance of the loan during an Oct. 2 conference with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles. Javits said after the meeting that he had won Dulles' assurance "he would give the matter his personal attention."

President Eisenhower may be able to give a report on the loan's status when he speaks in Madison Square garden Oct. 25.

But officials denied reports that there are plans for Dulles to make a pre-election announcement of the loan approval. There had been reports that such an announcement would be made to counter Jewish wariness over U.S. interest in Israel's appeal for defensive arms from this country.

### Twinship Seen Between Two Men Battling for Presidency

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 (AP)—There is a twinship between President Eisenhower and Adlai Stevenson not only in the promises they make but in the lack of new ideas in this campaign.

Eisenhower has offered no new ideas at all. Neither has Stevenson with two possible exceptions—on the 12-bomb and school aid. Eisenhower is vaguer on his promises although Stevenson in most cases is pretty vague, too.

An American who looks at the two parties with fixed prejudices or new enthusiasms may feel he discerns big differences between the men. To an impartial European this election may look like a choice between two managers for the same store.

Both men, moderate and conservative, are basically alike in their outlook. They are agreed the social progress of this country must be retained. They're not offering to change it but only to improve it.

"These voters must make their choice on small differences rather than big or radical ones; Which man can do the White House job better, and whose program, since they are generally similar, look a little better."

On foreign affairs Eisenhower and Stevenson basically are eye to eye on a need for alliances and continued foreign aid.

And on one of the really fiery subjects of the day—getting the South to accept the supreme court's ruling against public school segregation.

Henry Wynne, organist at St. John Vianney church, called for technicians after trying in vain to keep the instrument from talking about flying conditions in the British Isles. He does not suspect angles.

Wynne told a reporter he clicked down a stop for strings and instead gets a crisp male voice saying: "A trough of low pressure is moving in from the North sea."

A flick of the diapason stop is apt to produce the unsolicited information that there is fog in the English channel, or winds of gale force around the Faros.

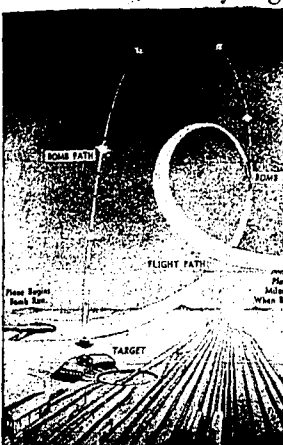
"I can keep the voice down to a whisper by staying off the lower local," said Wynne. "But even that is hardly the thing for a church service, is it?"

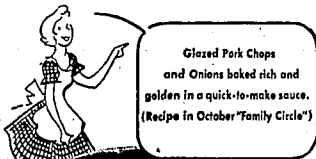

### Liberace Will Ask Damages Against News

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 16.—Liberace, in a trans-Atlantic telephone call, has instructed his attorney to begin immediate legal action against the London Daily Mirror for an alleged libelous article.

The smiling pianist player said if his appearance didn't depend on his hands, "I would knock Casanova's teeth down his throat—and a sin's kiddin'."

He phoned his instructions yesterday to his attorney, John R. Jacob, Jr., and the law firm of Cabbe, Lalle and Heller concerning the article which appeared in the Sept. 26 issue of the Mirror.

"Most of my publicity in England has been wonderful and the English people have been kind to me and my music," Liberace said. "The column in the Mirror, written by Casandra, was a complete and unmitigated lie. It is just too much for any man to stomach."

Jacob was ordered to contact a solicitor in London and proceed at once with the libel action for the maximum money damages allowed under the property laws of England.

Liberace contended the alleged libelous statements would have a substantial damaging impact upon his career because the column was printed first in his public performance by him in the British Isles.

He told Jacob the column was a deliberate defamatory and malicious insinuation of a man's character and morals.

"The Casandra article is so about a libelous, repulsive, vicious, malicious and unfair, I have to take at least a legal stand against him and his paper," the London Daily Mirror, Liberace told his attorney.

### Trading Stamps Fad Heading For Sticky U. S. Controversy

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—The trading stamp craze with its "something for nothing" lure is all but leveling down the property road at a dizzy pace. But Uncle Sam may apply the brakes in the near future.

The U. S. government is already entering the picture to the point of publishing a bulletin advising business men about stamp plans. It is to be released shortly.

Today more and more Americans are devoting collecting these little adhesive backed pieces of paper and putting them in books. And they are buying them on a colossal scale for luxury items as a pay-off for purchasing every-day goods such as gasoline, groceries and garments.

Yet numerous business men, without stamps to induce customers, are devotedly collecting these little bits of gum and are saving them as if they were gold. As one official here puts it, "Don't they say you still have mixed feelings?"

The largest number of protests have piled up at the Federal Trade Commission which is now investigating the stamp plans to see if they break U. S. laws prohibiting price discrimination and create unfair competition.

The senate committee on small business is standing by to launch a trading stamp probe based on the FTC findings.

The trading-stamp boom is also stirring action on other federal fronts.

The agriculture department is making a study to determine how the stamps are affecting food prices.

And the commerce department is about to distribute that booklet.

According to the commerce department publication an estimated 49 million families in the U. S. are collecting trading stamps. For their efforts they're getting in between 500 and 750 million dollars worth of premiums in the current year.

### Revolutionary Research Method Used By Prize Winner Described in Detail

STOCKHOLM, Oct. 18.—In 1929 the young German physician Werner Forssman performed a dramatic experiment on himself to prove a practicable method of studying the human heart in motion.

He pushed an oiled tube into a vein in his arm and 60 centimeters, or 24 inches, through the body and into his own heart. He lived to prove his point and share in a Nobel medicine prize today for his pioneer work.

But at the time, harsh criticism against his own experiment would be "criminal" to use the method. One critic said the method might be dangerous to the patient and not in a hospital.

At the time of his first experiment Forssman was engaged at a surgical clinic near Berlin.

In the presence of one of his colleagues he introduced in the wall of his right arm an oiled urethral catheter—a fine flexible tube of the kind used in order to obtain samples of urine from one kidney. On the catheter the catheter could easily be pulled forward about 35 cm. (13 1/2 inches). A week later, Forssman repeated the experiment and succeeded in introducing the catheter 63 cm. (25 inches) from the bend of his arm. Without any aid he went to the X-ray department two flights higher up in the building and grooved with the aid of X-rays that the tip of the tube had penetrated his heart. Forssman then wrote an article his intention of studying the action of the heart with the aid of catheterization. Two years later, he demonstrated the possibility of using the method for X-ray studies after the injection of some contrast substance through the catheter.

Slight attention was paid to Forssman's conclusions. Although his method was also used by a few others. On the whole, reception was rather cold. An American monograph on "The cardiac output in man" published in 1932 declared that the Forssman method was too hazardous on account of the highly technical nature of thrombi, or blood clots. Other objections were also raised and the procedure was characterized as a clinical curiosity.

Rehabilitation of the Forssman method came from the U. S. A. when Dr. Dickinson W. Richards, Jr., at Columbia University in New York, began dredging his main interest in the study of circulation during certain pathological conditions. He stumbled around him a number of

### Eisenhower and Adlai Begin to Sound Like Old Phonograph Record

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 (AP)—The longer this campaign lasts the more President Eisenhower and Adlai Stevenson sound like phonograph records of themselves.

They've been repeating themselves not only in their attacks, promises, claims and counterclaims—but particularly in some of the words they use.

This might be expected in a campaign and must be due to one of three reasons: (1) They can't think of new words or (2) they like the old ones so much they can't bear to part with them, or (3) they think using them over and over is good politics.

In this campaign sounds dull—as if done in a lot of repetition. It may be because the candidates are beginning to make one speech sound exactly like another.

One of Eisenhower's favorite words is "peace." He works that

word over and over in his speeches, and "honesty" and "telling the truth." These words grow through his speeches as regularly as a night watchman making his rounds and punching a time clock.

Stevenson—perhaps because he has talked far more than Eisenhower—in this campaign—has a larger vocabulary of standby words and phrases which he pulls out, dusts off and plays over and over.

One of his specialties is "the Democratic party is the party of the people." This is often a preliminary for him to accuse the Republicans of being "indifferent" to the "little man" and the "little fellow," not to mention the "small businessman" and the "small farmer."

The phrase which has brought perhaps the most lively response is "let's get on with it." Under whose skin it seems to get—the repeated complaint that the present White House occupant is a "part-time President."

With these words, sometimes rearranged in new combinations, he accuses the Republicans of "complacency" and "political expediency" and being "stalled on dead center." He says they are "amusing" and put "stubborn opposition to new ideas."

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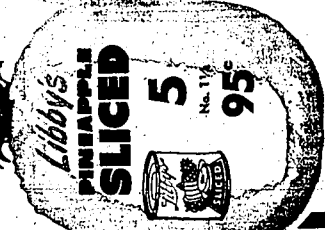
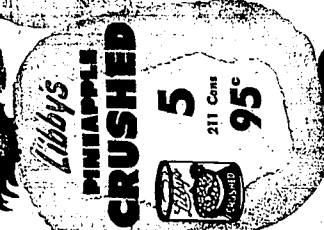
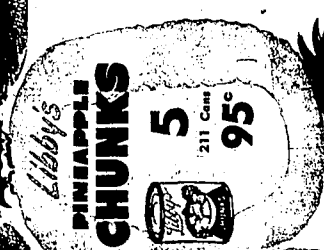
