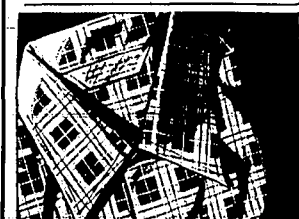

### Secret Parley Is Planned for Issue on Suez

Cairo, Oct. 20 (AP)—An Egyptian official said today "preliminary talks" regarding the Suez canal dispute will open in Geneva on Oct. 23.

The official, who requested that he not be quoted by name, told the press that the Egyptian government would be represented by a delegation headed by Fawzi al-Khalidi, a former Egyptian ambassador in London. At a moment's notice, the Egyptian government could be represented by a French government official, he said.

The Egyptian official said the report probably was a "red herring" and that the Egyptian government would not respond to a proposal by the United Nations Security Council resolution asking the Egyptian government to accept a proposal in New York, a spokesman in the Egyptian government said today. "No comment," he would say only.

Diplomatic sources here and in the United States have predicted a meeting of secret talks was being made between Egypt, France and Britain on six days of negotiations through the canal as a basis of settlement. These talks with guarantees on freedom of navigation through the canal, limiting the waterway from political control of any nation, tolls and improvement of the waterway.

### Bureau Notes U. S. Increase In Population

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—The population of the United States increased nine per cent or approximately 12,000,000 between the last census in 1950 and July 1, 1955, the census bureau said today.

The total as of mid-1955 was 167,300,000 compared with 150,000,000 when the census was taken in 1950. California led all the states in total population growth during the five-year period, but Nevada led percentage with a 47.1 gain.

The increase in California was 7,700,000, or 22.4 per cent for a total of 41,000,000. New York, the most heavily populated state, gained only eight per cent, or 11,951,000, for a total of 149,500,000.

ATHENS, O.—A beetle is killing the famous McGuffey elms at Ohio university here.

The trees were planted 117 years ago when William H. McGuffey, then university president, thought the campus was bare and needed more scenic beauty.

McGuffey later became a national figure in education through his textbooks called "The McGuffey Readers."

Ohio University has tried to preserve the trees by every possible means but it looks as if the beetle and Dutch Elm disease are the victors.

All but four of the trees have been cut down.

### Twin Brother Is Good Luck For Sick Lad

POCAHELLO, Oct. 20 (AP)—Doctors say 12-year-old Jimmy Foster, Pocahello, is dying a slow death of uremic poisoning but for one thing—he has an identical twin brother.

But now a rare and fascinating operation is planned at a Boston hospital which could save Jimmy's life.

Jimmy and his twin brother, Jerry, are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Foster, who operate a fruit ranch.

Their doctor says "when an individual's kidneys fail, he will gradually die of uremic poisoning. Jimmy's kidney function cannot be re-established because it just isn't there anymore."

So with Jerry providing one of his sound kidneys, the operation by a doctor from the Harvard Medical school is planned. The doctor in Pocahello came to Jimmy and the doctor in Boston to see Jimmy and Jerry are identical.

A prerequisite for such an operation is that the boys be identical twins. Their doctor said skin grafts and blood tests show Jimmy and Jerry are identical.

"They actually look forward to the trip," their mother said. "Just I don't know whether they realize the importance of what they are going to do."

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### Truman Jobs Top Men and GOP Policies

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—Former President Truman charged today that President Eisenhower has "strapped and twisted" interest which "dominated by the views of the few who control our great financial and industrial organizations."

"Mr. Truman, self-styled 'No. 1 president' of the Democrats, also took some sharp cuts at Vice President Richard M. Nixon in a five-ten-hour speech before cheering Democrats here."

When anyone looks at Nixon with the so-called disease used by the Republicans, he said, an "amazing" thing happens. "He looks as clean as a house's tooth and every inch a statesman. He has little Lord Fauntleroy clothes and wears a halo."

Mr. Truman had warm praise for Adlai E. Stevenson, the man he opposed for the party's presidential nomination. He called him a "leader of discernment, wisdom and courage" and predicted he will sweep to victory next month.

The former President spoke at a \$100-a-plate dinner which helped mark the kickoff of a "111 days to victory" drive. He also delivered a pep talk over a closed television circuit which carried the words of party leaders to almost 100 million diners all over the country.

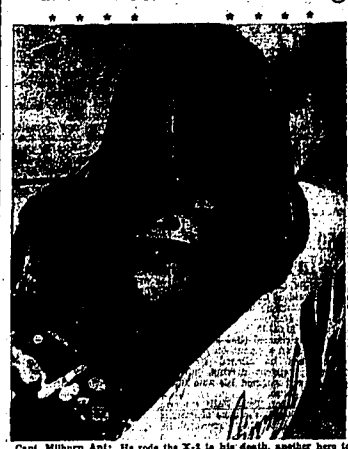
In his pre-election address, Mr. Truman said the "greatest mystery of these last few years is why Mr. Eisenhower cannot see the dangers of the farmer, the housewife and the small businessman."

"It seemed incredible to me that he should be doing so little about our school problem, about high taxes, and hard money and the cost of doctors' bills and hospital bills."

But Mr. Truman said the answer seems to be rose-colored glasses which, he said, the Republicans have been using to view America's problems at home and abroad.

Through the glasses, he said, Nixon looks like a statesman and Adlai, Gen. Herbert Brownell, Jr., he said, "looks like an attorney general, a director of what he really is." And he said former Air Force Secretary Harold G. Trobair, who resigned under congressional fire for writing business letters on air force stationery, "looks like a fellow who deserves a medal" and "you can't see any corruption at all."

### American Aviation Progress Owing Its Advancement to Courage of Brave Men

WASHINGTON, (NPA) — The price aviation progress is a toll in human flesh and blood that can't be redeemed in dollars and cents — and often goes forgotten.

It's paid by men like 23-year-old Capt. Milburn Apt, who met death last September in the costly crash of the Bell X-2 rocket plane at Edwards air force base in California.

Apt was a test pilot — member of an elite fraternity of men whose trademark is courage and who have died attempting to hurdle the barriers of speed, sounds and survival. Many who sometimes call themselves the "cautious daredevils."

There's no known tally of all the test pilots who have lost their lives, but from the files of the Pentagon, from aircraft companies and from the memories of their friends, you can pick a few. They speak for the rest.

Nearly to a man they are veterans of hot wars who came back home as heroes. Take Maj. Richard Bong, the country's greatest World War II air ace who accounted for 40 Japanese planes.

Ironically Bong was brought back to the U. S. for "safe" duty near the close of the war so as not to risk his valuable battle experience.

It was in that capacity that he was flying one of the early jet fighters, the shooting star, P-40 on Aug. 6, 1945. Coming over the airfield at Burbank, Calif., on a test run Bong's plane wobbled, veered off and crashed half a mile away. He never had a chance.

Bong was one of the first casualties of the jet age. In the more than 10 years since his death tremendous steps have been made towards higher and faster flights.

The X-2 in which Captain Apt took his first and last flight had established a new record of 1,900 miles per hour last July. Captain Apt's flight was the first to break that record in Col. Frank Everest, a close friend of Apt, whom he described as "one of the best pilots in the lighter group" at Edwards air force base.

Yet at a recent meeting of the American Rocket Society in Buffalo, N. Y., Everest told rocket engineers that they "must have the guts of the 'heroes' who will power these flights."

"If they perish, don't lose your heart," he told them. "But continue to strive on and some day you will find you have really contributed to the progress you have had to sacrifice to make life much better for millions."

Everest was assigned to test the X-2 as replacement for "Skip" Zeigler, a civilian pilot for Bell Aircraft corporation, who on May 23, 1953, was shot down with the first X-2.

"Skip was all we had as a test pilot," says a Bell spokesman. "When we lost him, Colonel Everest had to come into the picture."

Zeigler and Frank Wolk, 23, a flight engineer, died when the experimental research plane was blown away from its mother B-30 by an explosion over Lake Ontario.

Other civilian test pilots besides Zeigler have been victims of air accidents.

"We've had our share of losses," is how officials of most of the major aircraft companies sum it up.

An outstanding example is George Welch, the first man to shoot down a Japanese plane at Pearl Harbor. On Oct. 13, 1954, he died of injuries after attempting to parachute from an aircraft company's test run. 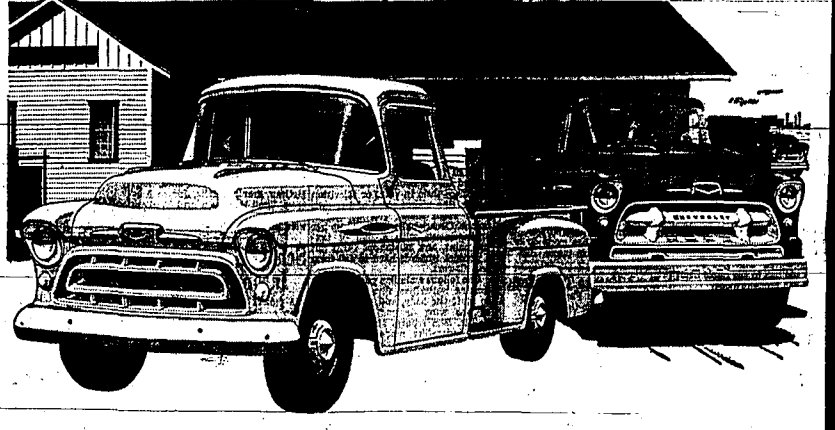

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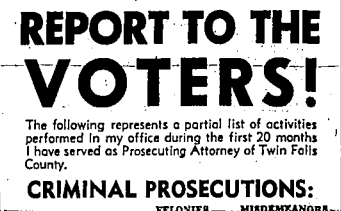

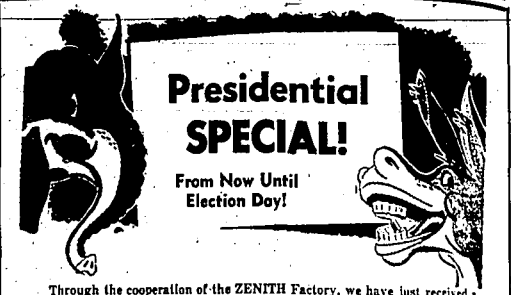

### No Change Is Seen in Rate On Diversion

BURLEY, Oct. 20.—W. E. Whiteley, president of the National Potato Growers' Association, reported Saturday that the diversion program will remain unchanged.

Whiteley, on behalf of the council, had been seeking to have the rates raised from 80 to 85 cents per hundredweight.

Because of Morse's decision, Whiteley said, "in view of the above decision by the department of agriculture I would recommend growers take a good look at the situation—the total production with the enormous storage of potatoes—and get behind this program and start to move their potatoes."

Meanwhile, the Idaho Potato Producers association has petitioned the department of agriculture again to increase the potato diversion payment to \$1 per hundredweight on two-inch or four-ounce minimum quality potatoes or better grade "in order to make the program effective."

The program was authorized Oct. 5 but, to date, has had very little participation. M. O. Burford, Idaho Potato Executive Committee member, said it is evident the 50 cents per hundredweight rate of payment is not sufficient incentive for growers to divert their lower quality potatoes this early in the marketing season, he said. Now that harvest is in progress, the rate is even less incentive to divert storage stocks because of the added costs involved in placing the potato crop into storage, he continued.

The department of agriculture announced Wednesday the program was being amended by requiring the withholding of all cuts and at least 20 per cent of the tubers from the market in order to qualify for the diversion program. This call for a five per cent greater withholding than the original program.

Growers whose potatoes were killed by the frost on the last day of August will be penalized if more stringently graded and also regulations that the present program is being amended to require growers to divert their lower quality potatoes to the processing agreement committee.

The amended program is a good producing season has resulted in a surplus of potatoes throughout the nation, making it imperative that something be done to reduce or eliminate the surplus, Burford said.

The diversion program can accomplish this purpose if its provisions are modified to provide a workable program for the growers of the Idaho Potato Producers association, in a meeting in Idaho Falls Friday evening.

The amended program would call for a payment of \$1 per hundredweight, based upon the original withholding requirement of 15 per cent of table grade.

### Chancellor's Distrust of Radio Causes Change in Broadcasts

BONN, Germany, Oct. 20.—Von German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer will deliver all his future radio broadcasts from the chancellery because he no longer trusts radio studios, federal press chief Felix von Eckhardt said today.

Von Eckhardt said Adenauer's distrust resulted from an incident Tuesday night in which a private conversation was recorded while he waited in a cabinet to explain his cabinet reshuffle to the nation. Bootlegged transcripts of the tape recordings are kicking up a lot of political dust, Eckhardt said.

During a private conversation with Eckhardt in front of a live microphone, Adenauer described Foreign Minister Heinrich von Brüning as being "read as a bull" because he was not named vice-chancellor in the cabinet reshuffle.

Eckhardt said a radio technician told the chancellor he would signal when the microphones were switched on, and "we relied on this when we exchanged a few words while waiting for the broadcast to begin."

But, unknown to Adenauer and Eckhardt, the microphone was turned on and the conversation was recorded.

According to the newspaper 'Bild Zeitung', Adenauer remarked, "Now Brüning is read as a bull because he wasn't made vice-chancellor."

Eckhardt said he just phoned him. His voice didn't sound so excited any longer. Now he wants me to go with him to Paris and I don't want to go.

Adenauer: "Herr Von Brüning ought to get used to the fact that you work for me and not for him. (Pause) Eckhardt also complained bitterly."

The conversation ended with Adenauer asking Eckhardt how he would know their talking and future planning with this in mind."

WESTON, Mass., Oct. 20.—A "strong" earthquake occurred late yesterday in the Bering sea area between the Aleutian islands and Siberia, Western college seismograph experts said today.

The tremors were recorded at 4:58:33 p. m. EDT but the photographic plates used in recording were not developed until today.

A spokesman at the observatory said the quake was "strong" and centered "4,000 miles northwest of Boston, or in the area between Russia's Komandorsky islands and the U. S. Aleutian islands."

### Indians Approve Bureau Services

DEER MEADOWS, Oct. 20.—Representatives of six Wisconsin and Iowa Indian tribes have gone on record as favoring the continuance of services by the bureau of Indian affairs.

The resolution was passed yesterday at a general session of tribal representatives.

Officials of the bureau have been meeting with Indian representatives from Minneapolis, Wisconsin and Iowa this week. Russell M. Kelley, Minneapolis, assistant area director to the bureau, told the delegates "the time is coming when the bureau of Indian affairs will cease."

The meetings were being held, he said, as the Indian people could "adjust their thinking and future planning with this in mind."

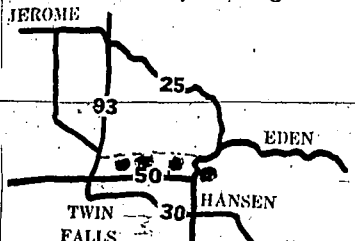

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# Bison in U.S. Have Comeback; Boom Is Shown for Surplus, Dead or Alive



Thundering out of the past, modern cowboys ride hard to follow a bison across the plains. Fifty years ago there were less than 100 buffalo. Today there are 10,000.

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Buffalo are all the rage—dead or alive, on the hoof or dried.  
That they know for sure over at the department of the interior where the mail has been piling up. For example:  
A New York night club wants some choice cuts of buffalo for its customers.  
Boy Scouts want them for "cook-outs." A college wants one for a mascot.  
Churches want them for socials. Sportsmen's associations want them for outings. People want them for pets.  
A man named Byron wants a bison for an Elk picnic. And the zoo

in Buffalo, N. Y., wants some—  
Bison are making a stunning comeback in the U.S. and this has created an overflow of nearly 600 of the hulking animals. That's a big difference from 50 years ago when there were less than 100 of them in existence.  
Today about 10,000 buffalo graze on the plains and some 6,000 of these belong to the federal government.  
Since word went out that extra were on hand, the demand has been terrific, according to interior officials. And the supply is almost exhausted.  
Preference is being given to applicants who wish to purchase the animals for breeding or exhibiting. Two buffalo will be shipped to Portugal for the Lisbon zoo, and the zoo in Norfolk, Va., and Buffalo, N. Y., will buy bison.  
"We're trying to spread them out

as far as possible and give everybody a chance to have one," says William Ackerknoch of the fish and wildlife service. "We're reluctant to see them used as pets and for purposes that are unattainable to their nature."  
For instance, he has turned down a request from a college for a buffalo to be used as a mascot. Seems little to likely that the animal might get frightened and charge into the crowd.  
"We want to make damn sure that they're in a secure enclosure and not able to hurt anyone," he explains.  
The service also makes sure that people who receive bison will not mistreat the animals. If necessary, they'll check on an applicant's facilities.  
A number of people who have written to indicate that they have fenced off property ranging from 10 to 7,000 acres. Several individuals

wanted as many as eight or 10 animals.  
Among those letters from nearby states to the union come some of the following remarks:
