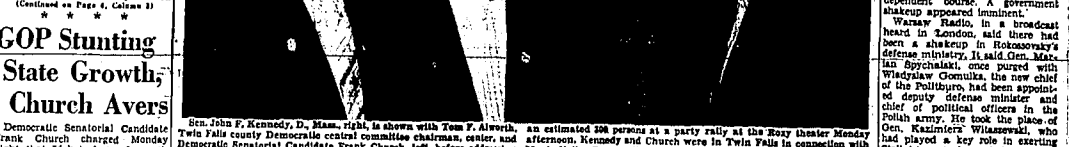

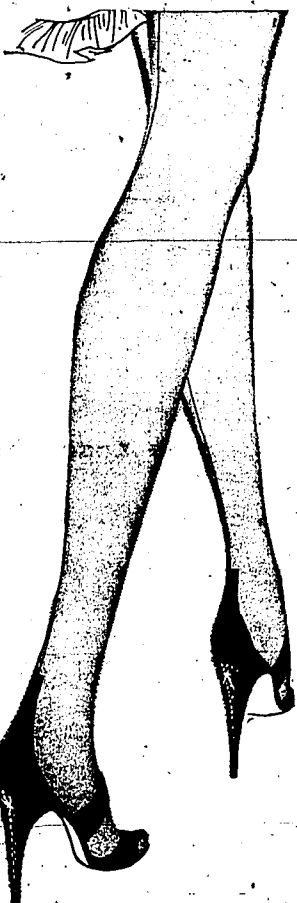

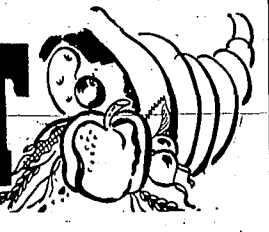

ASHAMED OF NAZI HORRORS

At the close of World War II, the horrors of the Nazi concentration camps were discovered, the overwhelming bulk of the German population dismissed the disclosures as enemy propaganda. They would not believe that such crimes had been committed.

Poles to Seek Memorial for Heroic Dead

WARSAW, Oct. 23 (U. I.)—In little more than three weeks the Polish people have contributed four million dollars (over ten million dollars) for a memorial to the heroic Warsaw uprising of 1944.

Every day newspapers carry long lists of donations. They have caused much comment because they are the first public acknowledgment of the extensive part played in the uprising by non-communist resistance groups.

The uprising is one of the most successful battles of World War II. In the early fall of 1944, Russian troops were just outside Warsaw across the Vistula river. Resistance leaders inside the city called a revolt against the German occupation forces, thinking it would speed a Russian victory.

But the Russian armies held off. The Germans killed about 200,000 Warsaw citizens, then eventually destroyed the city by calling a revolt. Only then did the Russians move in.

Many western authorities and many Poles have charged the Russian delay was intentional and designed to allow the Germans to wipe out resistance forces loyal to the Polish government in exile in London.

The communist reply always has been that the Soviet forces needed the regrouping after an exhausting advance across Poland and that, anyhow, the majority of the anti-Nazi resistance was pro-communist.

Now it is clear from the publicly printed list of donations for a memorial that most of the underground army, the smaller A. L. underground army and the Polish Scouts, all of which took their orders from the London government.

Until recently, survivors of those groups and the Germans who died were difficult to get work. Children of A. L. members found it difficult to get into universities. Widows were denied pensions.

Since the 20th congress of the Soviet Communist party in Moscow has February 15 this is changing.

Skin Grafting Technique Is Told for Meet

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Oct. 23 (U. I.)—Plastic surgeons disclosed today they can build ears and snip away skin cancers, but confessed that normal blindness is one trouble they can't fix.

They can, however, help some persons achieve a fairly normal appearance after accidents or burns involving the scalp.

Dr. William F. Whalen of St. Vincent's Hospital, New York, told the American Society of Plastic Surgeons how a 20-year-old girl, "Cecile," in an industrial accident, was aided by plastic surgery.

Whalen said the girl's hair was caught in a paper-folding machine's mechanism which lifted off her whole scalp except for a half-inch area around the forehead and ears.

A skin graft was performed but left the girl almost completely bald. Then, Whalen said, a large flap of hair-bearing skin from the back of the scalp and neck was rotated to the front of the head. Normal hair growing from this flap was allowed to grow long, and the patient by adult hairdressing can so comb her hair that the scalp is largely covered.

Dr. Truman Blocker of University of Texas medical school said "unfortunately, the plastic surgeon has so yet nothing to offer for the relief of ordinary blindness."

Canal Dispute Might Hit U.N. If Talks Futile

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Oct. 23 (U. I.)—Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold expects the Soviet claim to be brought back to the United Nations if private negotiations fail to solve it, his annual report to the general assembly indicated today.

Hammarskjold made no direct recommendation on the Suez crisis in the introduction of his report to the assembly session opening Nov. 12, but said:

"The charter itself foresees negotiations between parties as an initial step in the solution of conflicts which are unavoidable during a period of fundamental change. But I believe that such negotiations gain by being conducted against the background of the purposes and principles of the charter and that the results can be usefully brought within the framework of the U. N."

"If the negotiations prove unsuccessful, they should then be followed by an immediate investigation in the form prescribed by the charter."

"What has been said about the role of the U. N. also has a bearing on the Suez problem."

Hammarskjold's report dated Oct. 4, dealt at length with the application of self-determination principles in many parts of the world.

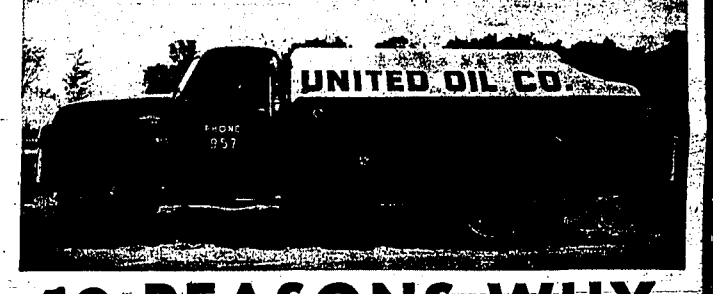

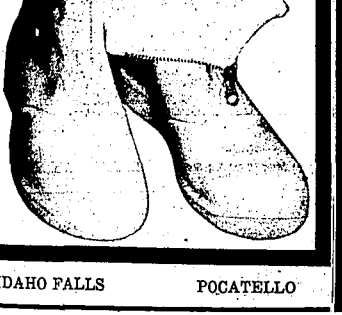

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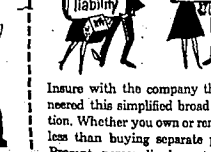

Water Victim Tosses Away Hope for Life

ADAMS CITY, Colo., Oct. 23 (AP)—Leroy E. Burton, 25, trapped in a rapidly flooding ditch yesterday, tossed away all hope for life when he was crushed by his head.

Burton, Lafayette, Colo., and three other employees of the Chicago Concrete Company had been laying a sewer line in the 12-foot ditch. The ditch was rapidly filling with water and was bursting a water main.

The three other men fled but Burton was buried in the clay-laden water.

Burton, father of three children, was calmly with fellow workers as they frantically attempted to free him. The ditch was rapidly filling and the water from the broken main and their efforts to haul him free with a rope failed.

He was fashioned a breathing apparatus from an air hose which they inserted in Burton's mouth. The water continued to rise gradually covering Burton's body.

Burton panicked and tossed aside the air hose, through which he might have been able to breathe until he died.

When the water main was about 10 feet from the ditch, it was shut off. His death was attributed to accidental drowning.

Time may show the most important question of the campaign—how to improve things that are not really much of a campaign issue.

Eisenhower said early in the campaign it should be debated. And he disagreed it far more than Stevenson.

The President has dwelt on foreign policy at length only twice: At the Republican convention in August and in his opening campaign speech Sept. 19.

Stevenson has accused the Eisenhower administration of lacking new ideas in foreign policy. Basically, he's said the Eisenhower policy is the Truman-American foreign policy—military alliances and foreign aid.

Whether that's right or wrong, Stevenson says he's not so much a difference in programs, or the lack of them, but in attitude.

The august the Eisenhower administration has alienated other peoples by bluster, and he says he would allow them respect as individuals to win them over.

Both men agree disarmament—when it's worked out with safeguards—is a key to peace. Both agree this country is in a contest with Russia for the hearts and minds of men and that they must be helped with American aid.

Both use almost identical words in saying other peoples must be respected. Eisenhower: "We respect fully the rights of all peoples, east and west."

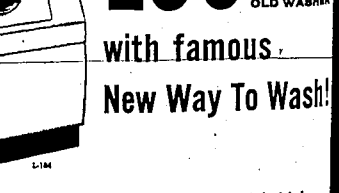

TOKYO, Oct. 23 (AP)—A young American who became a Buddhist priest with the new name Shunzo, looked forward today to live to study the Japanese language very diligently for the next year. Robert C. Wheeler, who lives at Newark City, N. J., told United Press in a telephone interview that he became a Buddhist priest Oct. 16 in orientation rites at Zenshoji temple near Kyoto. The 37-year-old Wheeler took the name Shunzo which was a combination of his adoptive name and that of his teacher, Zensho Narima. In translation it means "excellent completeness." Wheeler said he has been studying under his teacher since last January and does not have to serve the customary 40-day probationary period. Ordinarily, novitiate must remain on probation for 40 days after which temple officials decide whether they are worthy to continue. Wheeler said he hopes to study Buddhist doctrine for the first year.

Plea Switched On Acid Trial In N. Y. Court

NEW YORK, Oct. 23 (AP)—Joseph Carlinio, named as a co-conspirator in the acid-blasting of labor columnist Victor Diesel, last night hastily changed his plea from innocent to guilty in the presence of a silent cell-mate and fellow defendant.

Carlinio and seven others, including notorious hoodlum Johnny (Doc) Diagarina, are accused of plotting the attack which blinded Diesel on a mid-town Manhattan street before dawn last April 8.

Carlinio, 40, changed his plea before Federal Judge Frederick Van Peil Bryan. In a 10-minute hearing, Bryan set Nov. 9 as sentencing date—the same day trial is scheduled to begin for the seven others.

Carlinio was whisked to the court from his Westchester county jail cell along with Gondolfo Miranti, 43, also accused in the case.

Miranti, under heavy guard, watched from the back of the courtroom but said nothing.

Neither Carlinio, Assistant U. S. District Attorney Arthur Christie nor Carlinio's lawyer, Bernard Heildow of the Legal Aid society, would say why the plea was changed.

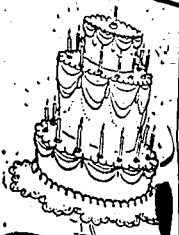

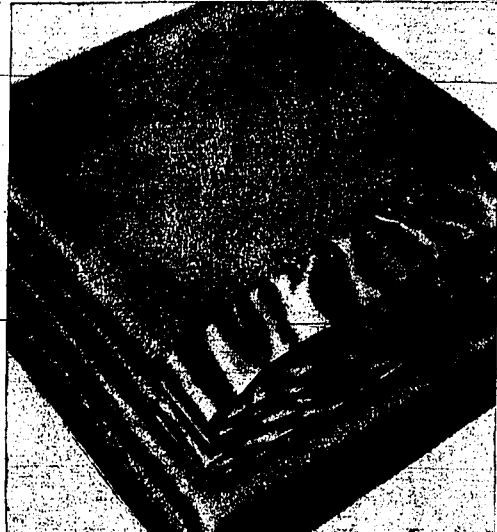

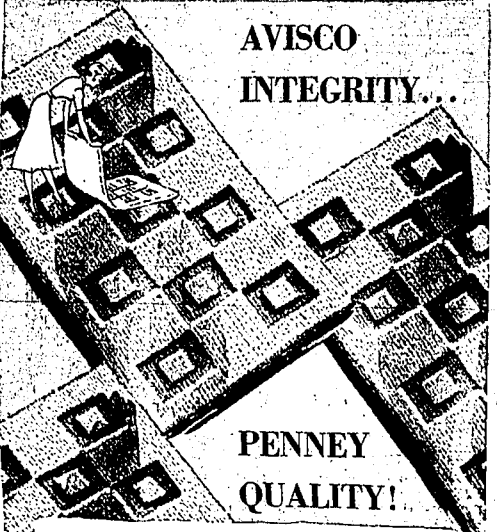
