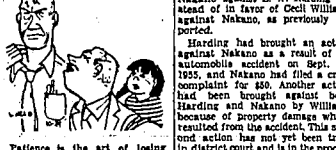

# World Communism Is Splitting Three Ways; Bloc Is Broken

LONDON, Oct. 24.—World communism is splitting today in three ways—Khrushchevism, Maoism and Titoism.

The blow to Moscow's prestige dealt Tuesday by Nikita Khrushchev's attack on the Soviet Union's 40th anniversary was a mere prelude compared to the open revolt now in progress in Poland and Hungary, experts said.

That's Titoism. And the ferment in the east European states is complemented by the quiet but deep-rooted independence drive of Red China's Mao Tse-tung, who has been moving away from Russia's tutelage at a fast pace.

That's Maoism. The prevailing view among expert observers here is that no matter how the present Polish experiment goes, the leadership of Khrushchev

has been effectively challenged. "Things may change again, but they will never be the same. Khrushchev's present is recognized by differences within the Kremlin itself, which appears increasingly split into two factions—one led by Soviet party chief Nikita Khrushchev and the other, the Stalinists, presently captained by former Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov.

There is no telling yet where this struggle will lead and whether it will emerge as the sole and undisputed ruler of the vast Soviet Union.

But the indications already are clear beyond doubt in Europe that the "Titoism" has burst forth not as a Himalayan from Lhasa, Tibet, but as a Himalayan from New Delhi, India has arrived safely in New Delhi, it was reported today. The successful test flight may result in regular air service between Lhasa and

Tito's "warm and hearty congratulations" to Poland's "Titoist" party New Delhi, informed sources said.

# Recess Called for Telephone Parley

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 24.—Negotiations between the Communist Workers of America and the Pacific-Telephone and Telegraph union broke off today on the recommendation of Federal Mediator Arthur East.

East recommended the recess when the negotiations on a new contract became deadlocked yesterday. They will resume tomorrow.

Both sides have agreed to extend the current contract until midnight Saturday, after which the union said it would be free to strike.

The union is seeking 50 weekly wage increases for 18,500 members employed by the telephone company in northern California and Nevada.

### Solon Asking Expulsion of Russ Envoys

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—Senator James H. Eastland has demanded the expulsion of two Soviet diplomats who he said helped assassinate 72-year-old Thaya Chwaszow out of the United States.

James, acting chairman of the Senate Internal Security subcommittee, said the Russians, as Fedor Kozlov, second secretary of the Soviet embassy here, and Konstantin Tsvetkov, first secretary of the Soviet delegation to the United Nations in New York.

Thaya and her father, Alex Chwaszow, left the United States aboard the British liner Queen Mary Oct. 3 after American immigration authorities made an unsuccessful attempt to prevent their departure.

"This is the first time that the United States has attempted to expel an alien citizen in the United States," James said.

The Soviets are extending their drive now to infamia.

An investigation being conducted by James' subcommittee has produced evidence that Thaya is an American citizen, having been born in Philadelphia July 12, 1904. Robert Morris, subcommittee counsel, said Thaya's father, Thaya Chwaszow, is the illegitimate child of Chwaszow and Mrs. George Dickson of Detroit. Dickson's name was the father's name at the time of the birth, the subcommittee was told.

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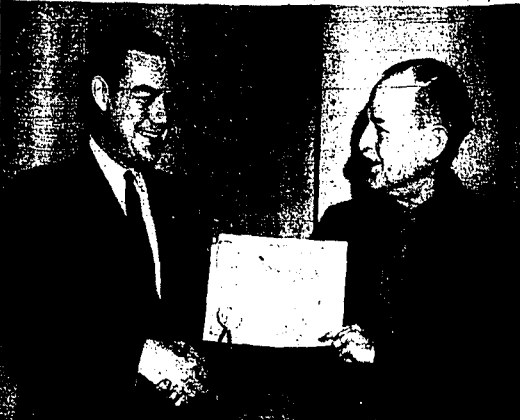

### Statistics for H-Bomb Tests Are Revealed

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—President Eisenhower disclosed yesterday that of all tests of atomic weapons conducted by this country since 1945, 29 per cent in every five — have involved thermonuclear H-bomb designs.

It was the first official disclosure of the scope of testing in the "high yield" weapons field.

The figures were disclosed in a memorandum prepared by executive branch officials — presumably the atomic energy commission and the defense department — and released by the President.

Relating that 13 test series have been conducted by this country dating from the first test in New Mexico in 1945, the memorandum said:

Of the shots in the several series, approximately 20 per cent were fission products — that is, the usual atomic energy weapons on the battlefield; and

1. The United States has steadily learned how to make weapons using less material than preceding designs;

2. Learned to make designs of a smaller configuration and lighter weight than others — presumably for use in tactical weapons on the battlefield; and

3. Learned to make weapons having "high yield" in terms of energy release but low production of fission products — that is, the products that constitute radioactive fallout.

On the latter development, the memorandum added:

The successful achievement of this objective will make it possible for us to have weapons with greatly reduced radiological hazard fallout.

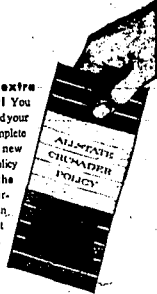

### Aid to Poland Is Offered by U. S. Officials

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—President Eisenhower last night held out the possibility of U. S. aid for Poland if the Poles want it and succeed in their drive for independence from Moscow.

In an address offering encouragement to Poland and other restive communist satellites, Mr. Eisenhower said that the United States stands ready to help "freedom-loving peoples who need and want aid and can profitably use our aid."

The Polish situation also drew the attention of Democratic presidential candidate Adlai E. Stevenson. Speaking in New York, Stevenson called not only for U. S. economic assistance, but for U. S. action to take Poland's case before the United Nations if "Soviet pressure continues" against the new Polish regime.

Stevenson said the U. N. move should be made only if Poland requested it.

Administration officials yesterday began a major survey to determine how much aid from this country Poland might need, particularly if the heavy trade with Russia dropped sharply. They emphasized this was only a study and that no aid would be offered unless the Poles made plans for such assistance.

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles is expected to expand on this and other aspects of U. S. foreign relations in a major foreign policy address in Texas Saturday night to the Dallas world affairs council.

### Farm Mishaps Toll Reported As U. S. High

CHICAGO, Oct. 24.—A color study indicates that the toll of farm accidents is probably higher than in any other industry, according to a report by the National Safety Council here.

The study is based on a survey of 100 farms in various parts of the United States, showing that the average number of accidents per year is 1.5 for every 100 acres.

Dr. H. Herman of the University of Illinois, who was the principal author of the study, said that the figure is probably higher than in any other industry because of the wide variety of equipment and the isolation of the farms.

He said that the study is the first of its kind to show the actual number of accidents on a large number of farms.

The study shows that the most common cause of accidents is the use of machinery, particularly tractors and trucks.

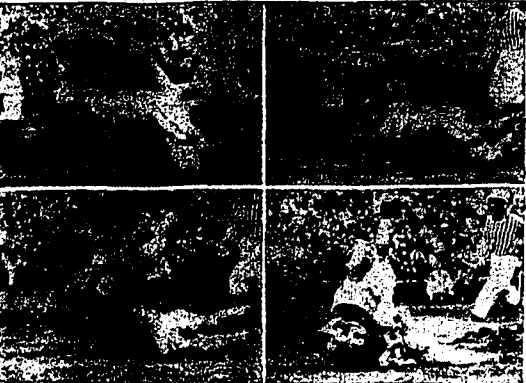

# King Saud of Arabia Spends Money for Popularity, Is Now in Debt and Disliked

Oct. 24 (AP)—King Saud of Arabia, absolute ruler of a fabulous oil empire, has become a poor little rich boy of the Middle East.

The king is roughly 250 million dollars rich. He has spent nearly a billion dollars of his own money to buy himself popularity. He seems to be spending his money as fast as he can.

His pet projects include building a grand palace and a new city. He has also spent millions on his personal luxuries.

Some of these demand nationalization of the Arabian-American Oil Company (ARAMCO) and its pipelines to the Mediterranean. This could spell ruin for Saud.

King Saud's "kept press" has followed a line of attacking Iraq, where King Faisal is a member of the Hashemite family, blood enemies of the house of Saud. Iraq is a member of the Baghdad pact, so these papers attacked the pro-western alliance in favor of a middle east grouping of Egypt, Syria and Saudi Arabia—the so-called 233 bloc.

But this had the effect of lending support to extreme nationalists Arab reformers, leftists and communists who wave the banner of Egypt's President Nasser. Saud must now suspect that those cheering Nasser are out to topple the Saudi throne. As an absolute feudal monarch whose wealth depends on American oil money, Saud is unpopular with anti-western Arabs and with young Arabs who dream of reforms.

his powerful minister of state, Shakh Youssef Yasin, probably will restrain him from breaking with Nasser. But there are rumors that Saud is going to stop paying subsidies to editors in Syria and Lebanon. If he does, a really dirty campaign by sheeting papers is in store.

Its target would be King Saud.

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### 1960 Body Is Used in 1957 Plymouth Car

The design scheduled for Plymouth for the 1960 model year will be on display in the 1957 models at Magic Valley Plymouth dealers on Oct. 23.

Entirely new, the Plymouth is lower, wider and more powerful, with a complete change in styling, body structure and chassis.

The models are as much as five inches lower than the 1957 models. Wheelbase has been lengthened from 115 inches for all models in 1956 to 118 for standard models and 122 inches for Suburban station wagons in the 1957 line.

The new car has the appearance of greater length which comes from functional styling. A broad hood, bearing tall fins and forward thrust, headlight brow all contribute to the impression of length.

In chassis design, the most significant change is replacement of front wheel suspensions with coil springs with control arms.

The new front suspension and steering system create a greater degree of stability under forces of acceleration, braking and cornering.

For the first time on an American passenger car, belt points are combined with torsion bar springs. A new rear suspension incorporates relocated leaf springs which contributes better riding comfort.

All 1957 Plymouths have more powerful engines. The standard V-6 for all models except the plaza is the new Pury 301.

Other innovations in the 1957 line include new 11-inch brakes. A new all-weather air conditioning system, padded instrument panel and sun visors as optional equipment and new safety reinforced center steering wheel.

Windshield glass area has been increased 45 per cent in sedans and suburbans and 41 per cent in the hardtops.

The line offers a total of 31 different models. There are nine in the Belvedere line, six Savoy models, six in the Plaza line and 12 suburbans.

### Stand Upheld

The four later appealed to the Unesco appeals board and the international labor office administrative tribunal.
