Spanish Poet Is Winner of Nobel Award

STOCKHOLM, Oct. 25 (AP)—Spanish poet Juan Ramon Jimenez today was awarded the 1956 Nobel prize for literature for the "high poetic and artistic purity" of his work.

Jimenez, 73, who now lives in Madrid, Spain, published his first book of poetry in 1905 and went on to become Spain's greatest poet. The Swedish academy of literature made the selection and international committee called Jimenez the 1956 Nobel prize of \$28,000.

The cable went to Jimenez at the home of his wife in Madrid, where he was at the verge of death in 1955.

Translated: The academy said he earned the prize by "his lyrical poetry, which in Spanish language constitutes an example of high spirit and artistic purity." His poetry has also been translated into many other languages.

Dr. Anders Osterling, academy secretary, invited Jimenez to come to Stockholm to receive the award. He is secretary of the Spanish Academy of Letters, which has 45 million dollars in assets.

The self-exiled Jimenez left Spain in 1939 for the United States and traveled through the western hemisphere before settling down as a guest professor at the University of San Juan, Puerto Rico.

He is the third author of Spanish literature to receive the Nobel award. In 1907 Spanish academy member Jose Echegaray won the prize for drama. In 1922 Madrid dramatist Jacinto Benavente was whole winner.

Jimenez was born in Moguer, Spain, Dec. 24, 1881. He published his first poem while still a teenager, causing a sensation among Spanish literary experts.

Studied law in Seville for a few years but finally moved to Madrid to concentrate on writing. Among his works is his famed "Platero y Yo" (Silver and I), a story of a donkey which has become a standard lecture of literary classes in Spanish schools.

Ranks Thin

MANILA, Oct. 25 (AP)—A malaise endemic to the justice of Mindoro Oriental province has thinned the ranks of a group of former Japanese soldiers still holding out there in the belief that World War II is still in progress. It was reported here today.

Dial reports said 60 former Japanese soldiers refused to leave the mountain area, but natives made a consubstantial offensive today that at least 10 have died of malaria. They said two of the soldiers have married women of the Mangyan mountain tribe.

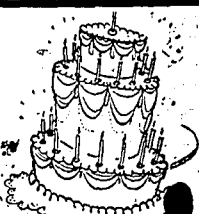

**Spark That Started Hungarian Revolts
Cracked First in Noted Historic Shrine**

VIENNA, Oct. 25.—The revolutionary spark that set Budapest aflame yesterday lit first in the square that university students marched in protest against the non-fallen leader of the revolution, the Kremlin.

It is one of only four usable bridges in Budapest proper—crossing the Danube by the chain bridge, a two-lane iron structure built by the communists after it was destroyed in World War II.

Once across the river, the marchers surged northward again into Ben square, and the great granite foreign ministry building.

Ship's Captain Becomes Ill in Collision Trail

NEW YORK, Oct. 25 (AP)—A junior officer of the Stockholm steamer *Wendell* died yesterday during a collision with the *Andrea Doria* off the coast of New York.

The 63-year-old captain of the *Wendell*, 63, suffered a cerebral aneurysm at the end of his third day aboard the ship and was taken to the hospital for observation.

The 63-year-old sea dog said his "heart just stopped working" when he was struck and was unable to go to his cabin. His physician said he had a "period of lack of consciousness."

He now is in a coma, but his condition is not expected to improve.

The collision occurred in the waters south of New York City on the night of July 23.

Quip Piro Calamai was hospitalized for "emotional shock" for nine days after the crash and died at sea. He appeared on the *Wendell* stand during the collision.

"I had loved the sea all my life," he said. "Now I hate it."

Calamai was the Italian-lynx-resembling man who was seen on the *Wendell* stand Tuesday aboard the *Wendell* in the waters south of New York City. He said merely that Calamai was planning to return to his homeland.

Federal Prosecution Set for Depriving Negroes of Ballots

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25 (AP)—The federal government plans to prosecute white supremacy supporters in several southern states for depriving qualified Negroes of their right to vote.

Assistant Attorney General Warren Olney III charged yesterday there have been "wholesale purges" of Negroes from voting lists in Alabama, Georgia, Louisiana, North Carolina and Mississippi. He said the purges were "deliberate and systematic" and that thousands of Negroes had been removed from the lists.

Olney, head of the justice department's criminal division, said the government will take criminal action against "many thousands" of complainers after the Nov. 8 election when it can be proved that the vote was denied.

"In every instance where we can show a person was denied his right to vote by reason of color, we intend to prosecute," Olney warned.

While southern leaders immediately denied the charges and shrugged off the threat of federal prosecution as being "just politics," white citizens council leaders in Alabama high state officials in the denial of any wholesale purge of Negroes from voting lists except on purely legal grounds.

Gov. J. F. Coleman of Mississippi broke a prosecution plan as a "mass political bluff." He said he would neither defend any accused whites in his state.

W. M. Rainach, Louisiana state senator and president of the Citizens Council Association of Louisiana, said the South will not stand for federal interference in enforcement of state voting laws.

Alabama state Senator Sam E. Stewart, also a citizens council leader, called Olney's charge "just politics" and moved to "quash the threat" of Negroes in the deep South.

Olney told a press conference that the purges have centered in "three or four sections" in each of the five states. He would not specify all of the cities or counties involved, but said that in each case the federal bureau of investigation is "actively investigating."

Olney did single out the counties of Montgomery and Macon in Alabama and Grant parish in Louisiana. Earlier this year, he told senators, investigators under conditions prevailing in Ouachita and Rapides parishes in Louisiana and Pierce coun-

Science Is Aiding Storage of Grains

MOSCOW, Oct. 25 (AP)—Researchers of the U. S. department of agriculture are experimenting with high frequency radio waves as a means of keeping insects out of grain bins, an official reported.

H. H. Walkden, who works with the USDA stored products laboratory at Manhattan, Kans., told of the work at the Pacific Northwest grain sanitation short course at the University of Idaho.

Means are being found for putting insect-free grain into storage and keeping it that way, Walkden said.

"At times, the impression has been conveyed that no good control measures have been developed and that a deplorable situation confronts us," he said. "This is not the case."

Polish Leader To Attend Top Kremlin Talks

WARSAW, Oct. 23 (AP)—Wladyslaw Gombolka, new "independent" leader of the Polish "United Workers" (Communist) party, will leave today or tomorrow for Moscow to smooth the path of Soviet-Polish relations, it was reported.

First word of Gombolka's planned trip to Moscow came in a broadcast from the Soviet capital. He and his delegation is expected to confer with Soviet leaders on how to forge their own road to socialism in close alliance with Russia, Yugoslavia and other Soviet bloc countries.

A reshuffled Polish government was concentrating today on holding down anti-Soviet feelings. Street fighting erupted in Warsaw last night when thousands of Poles attempted to march on the Soviet embassy. The Poles had massed in front of the Hungarian embassy in support of rebels fighting Soviet and Hungarian troops in Budapest.

Communist party workers tried to disperse the demonstrators with clubs and tear gas. A mob then marched on the Soviet embassy. Tension ran high while the demonstrators surged through the streets and security forces blood-guards with machine guns, automatic weapons and rifles.

Another problem for the new Polish regime is the attitude of the Polish Catholic clergy. The Polish government is forbidden by its constitution from carrying out this kind of activity. The agreement between the church and state.

Thousands of Catholics crowded around the central railway station when running on the cardinal already was en route to Warsaw and was scheduled to arrive here today. The rumors proved to be just that.

Acid Poisons Water Supply For 3 Towns

DURANGO, Colo., Oct. 23 (AP)—A jagged tank plunged off a bridge south of Durango yesterday, dumping acid into the Animas river which furnishes water to three towns. Health clubs in the towns turned to the communities against water from the river and apparently the danger health clubs were when the deadly acid passed the towns in diluted form.

Dr. George Moore, director of the San Juan basin health unit at Durango, said that the acid was dumped at about the river bank and warned residents against eating them. District Health Officer E. J. Rasmussen ordered water intakes shut off at Farmington, Arlee and Shoshone. Citizens were warned to get water from the San Juan river below the point where the Animas empties into it.

He instructed water supply personnel at the three New Mexico towns to keep the intakes shut from eight to 10 hours. He said by that time the water should not be dangerous but tests were being conducted to make sure the water was not contaminated.

Durango residents escaped exposure because the acid spilled into the river, below the water plant.

"The reason we ask is that this is the very first communication we have had from you."

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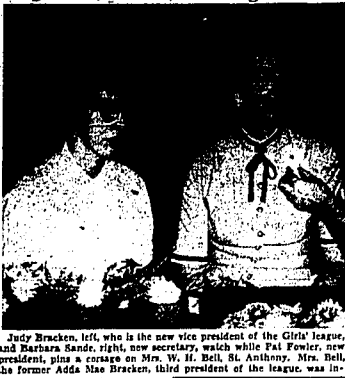

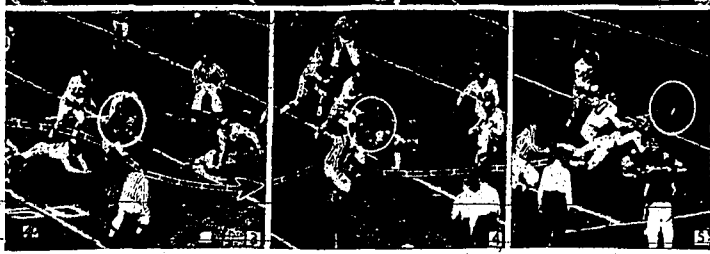

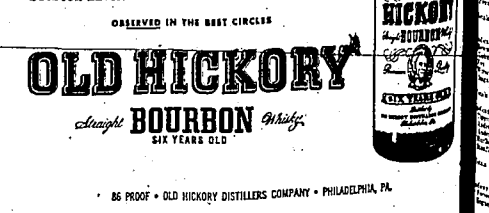

HUNTERS PREPARE FOR BEGINNING OF UPLAND BIRD SHOOTING

Better Than Average Take Predicted for Pheasant Hunt Which Opens Saturday

Magie Valley hunters should enjoy better-than-average success in the pheasant, partridge and quail season which opens Saturday noon. This prediction was made today after a review of field work reports by state fish and game department personnel.

Charles Blinke, department biologist for the department, said the total number of pheasant tronds counted in the valley in 1956 increased considerably over last year. There were, however, fewer pheasants this year. The small decrease in brood survival is more than offset by the increased pheasant success, Blinke noted.

Shooting begins Saturday noon for pheasant, quail and partridge. The bag and possession limit on pheasants is three cocks.

Blinke said there had been a number of mallards in the past, concentrated partly in the lower valley. He advised hunters should look for mallards in the lower valley to identify the sex of the bird before squeezing the trigger.

Hunters should not dress birds so completely that the sex of the bird cannot be identified if the head and feet are left on the bird. It may be fully dressed otherwise if the hunter so desires.

Chukar partridge will be hunted in the area of the Snake river, Casia, Oodling and Lincoln counties. Chukar production in the Clatsop and Clatsop counties has been excellent and populations have been established in the Rock creek, Snake river and the Snake valley, Clatsop creek areas of Casia and Twin Falls counties.

Limit on pheasants on both hinds and chukar partridge is five birds. Bag and possession limit on chukar partridge is three birds. Quail is five in the aggregate of the three species.

Most pheasant partridge shooting probably will be found along the agricultural edge of the valley and in the area of cultivated land and along the edge of cultivated land in Minidoka county.

Birdie had no 20-game winning pitch in his first season as Cincinnati helm. His top victory came Brooks Lawrence with 11. With help from Herbie Freeman, who had 14 pins in relief, Tebbetts maneuvered and improvised, getting 21 triumphs in an admittedly weak staff.

Despite injuries to Ted Kluszewski and a constant midseason slumping by Wally Post, the Redlegs held a 15-game lead over Milwaukee at the all-star break July 8. Four days later they fell from first place but remained in contention.

It was the first time since 1944 that Cincinnati finished in the first division. In the other seasons under Tebbetts' direction, the Reds moved up in fifth place each time—with a 74-80 record in 1954 and 75-79 in 1955.

'Super' Football Conference Is Suggested to Top Gridiron Teams

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 25 (UPI)—A "new super" football conference, including eight of the greatest collegiate gridiron powers in the nation, is under consideration today with a target date for formation around 1960.

The conference, the United Press learned exclusively, would include such great teams as Notre Dame, Army, Navy, Pitt, Oklahoma, the new Air Force academy in Colorado and UCLA and Southern California from the west coast.

The conference has been proposed by representatives of eastern schools to take the place of past opponents who now are tied up in round-robin schedules in the Ivy league, the Big Ten and the Pacific Coast conference.

Col. Robert V. Whitlow, athletic director at the U. S. Air Force academy, said he has been approached on the proposed conference—but did not reveal who approached him.

"It has been mostly in the nature of sounding out so far," said Col. Whitlow. He said that there were several factors involved in whether the Air Force team would be interested in joining. One of these was the time element.

"The Air Force academy would not be ready for such competition as early as 1960," he said.

At Pittsburg, athletic director Capt. Tom Hamilton said: "I can't say yes or no about joining such an organization at this time, because nothing is very concrete. However, we are keeping an open to such an idea."

Hamilton admitted he was receptive to the idea of having Pitt hook up with a football conference.

"There have been recent discussions in regard to Pitt joining various proposed conferences," he said. "We've given a great deal of thought to such proposals, but we would run into difficulty with the time element."

Pitt, like most other schools, has its schedule filled for the next three years. Proponents of the conference, however, do not plan organization until 1960—or later.

Coach Red Blank of the Army said the plan for the conference was first proposed two years ago.

"But nobody had contacted anybody at West Point since that time," he added.

Several of the other school deny ever having considered such a conference.

Athletic directors Hubert Jones of UCLA and Willis O. Wampler of USG both denied any discussions on the proposed conference.

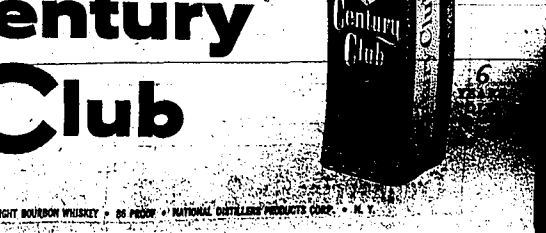

Unusual Cactus Found by T.F. Woman During Hunt

Mrs. Frank Hodge, Twin Falls, Idaho, discovered a cactus which has been termed "very unusual" while hunting with her husband in the south hills of Kimberly two weeks ago.

While the gray-green plant for which she first because of its coiled appearance, Mrs. Hodge cried out in surprise. She then recognized it as a snake-like cactus.

"I was trying to disturb her husband who was hunting across a stream from her," Mrs. Hodge continued with the hunt. After describing and mentioning the unusual plant during the week to her husband, however, she persuaded him to return to the location Sunday.

"I'm impressed with the cactus' uniqueness, Hodge dug it up and returned home with it.

"The cactus," he explained, "grows like a snake instead of vertically because of an injury or because of some natural cause. I have several similar examples in my own collection, but many collectors have been searching for years to find such a specimen."

DeSoto Adds Third Series To '57 Lines

Addition of a new series, the Fireweep, makes a total of five models, which will be displayed Tuesday by Magic Valley DeSoto dealers.

With the Firefile and Firestone, the Fireweep and De Soto cover all but the low price field.

A highlight of the De Soto Fireweep is a 122-inch wheelbase incorporating a new suspension, call Fireflex. Also, and specialties, section bars replace conventional front springs, save space and reduce weight by 50 per cent. It also standard. This coupled with mounting of rear springs outboard of the frame, reduces lubrication points from 22 to eight. These are standard on the Firefile and Firestone as well.

The Fireweep features a "step down" chassis giving the car a low silhouette, measuring barely four feet, seven and one-half inches from the road to the roof.

Five Fireweeps are offered including a four door sedan, two and four door sportsman hardtop, two seat station wagon and three-seat station wagon.

In the other two models, the Firefile boasts a 255-horsepower engine with the Firestone rated at 270 horsepower.

Both models are lower with high sweep functional tall fins. The Firefile and Firestone also offer the new three forward speed transmission with the Firefile model having it as standard equipment. The new transmission is controlled by five manually operated push buttons.

Dual headlights increase wattage from 100 to 150, giving a minimum of 75 extra feet of visibility.

Windshield area has been increased 38 per cent. It is swept by 16-inch windshield wiper blades.

The interior is designed to reduce driver fatigue. Included in the grouped instrument panel is the new scurriborn speedometer. This resembles a thermometer lying horizontally as the red hand moves from left to right indicating miles per hour.

Safety features such as padded instrument panel and sun visor and recessed safety steering wheel are offered.

A total of 130 color combinations and variations throughout the three models of the line are offered. Firefile and Firestone models have 16 two-tone and 14 solid exterior colors with the Fireweep available in 50 two-tone and 14 solids.

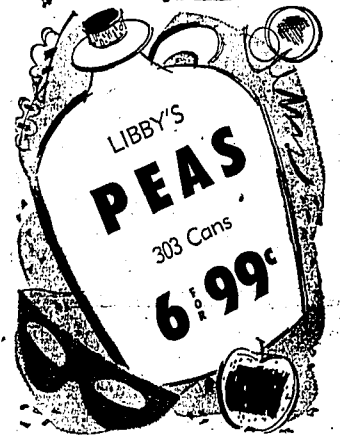

Steak was the standout item among "specials" being promoted by food chains for the coming week-end. One supermarket chain in the New York area advertised sirloin steak at 59 cents a pound, down six cents from the week before.

Other beef cuts you're likely to find at reduced prices this week-end include chuck roasts, pot roast and rib roast.

You'll also find occasional bargains this week-end in pork loin roasts, center cut pork chops, veal and poultry. Turkeys are being heavily promoted, although Thanksgiving is still a month away. Broilers and fryers are also featured.

With Halloween almost here, pumpkins have joined cabbage on the list of best buys among vegetables.

Potatoes and onions also are still rated as outstanding buys in most sections, along with celery and cucumbers.

Radishes, beets, carrots, spinach and winter squash are reported to be good buys, especially in prices where they're still available from nearby farms. Corn, on the other hand, is just about finished almost everywhere except Florida and California.

Today grapes and limes will head the bargain list at most fruit departments. Prunes, oranges and lemons also are fairly good buys now and apples are getting better each week from the price standpoint. In case you didn't know, this is National Apple week.
