Peace Parley Is Reported Under Way as Hungary's Rebels Making Demands

VIENNA, (Sunday), Oct. 28 (AP)—The government-controlled Budapest radio said Sunday fighting in the Hungarian capital had ceased during the night and that peace negotiations were in progress. There was no confirmation of this report from any other source.

The brief government announcement said only that negotiations to end the bloody rebellion in Budapest had been initiated by the rebels who have been fighting Russian and Hungarian troops for more than four days. The announcement came shortly after Hungarian rebel forces spelled out their demands to the Budapest government through a radio station.

SINGAPORE, Oct. 27 (AP)—Fresh violence flared in Singapore Saturday night as British and Malay troops with shoot-to-kill orders tried to quell rampaging Chinese mobs in the third day of anti-government protests.

Five more communist-led rioters were shot dead during the death toll of 12. At least 100 persons, 18 of them Europeans, have been injured in the fighting which raged across Singapore island.

Probate Judge, T. F. Justice of Peace Favor Two Amendments to Constitution

Twin Falls County Probate Judge Everett M. Sweeley and Justice of the Peace J. O. Humphrey favor the two amendments to the Idaho constitution to the state constitution increasing the jurisdiction of probate and justice courts with certain other provisions.

Senate joint resolutions (SJR) nos. 4 and 5 would remove monetary limits on cases handled by probate and justice courts. At present, there is a \$50 limit on civil cases handled by justice courts and a \$500 limit on cases in probate court. The object is to relieve district courts of heavy case loads by providing means for lower courts to handle more cases.

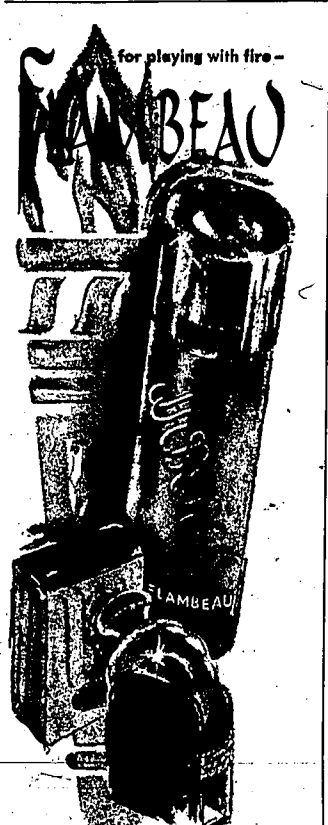

Eight Minor Candidates Vie With Ike And Adlai for U.S. Presidential Votes

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27 (AP)—Eight minor party candidates will compete with President Eisenhower and Adlai B. Stevenson for votes on election day.

Their platform ranges from abolition of the federal income tax to a return of prohibition to socialism.

T. Coleman Andrews, who used to collect taxes as Mr. Eisenhower's commissioner of internal revenue, is one who might be ultimately rejected among the independents.

The tall and handsome 57-year-old resident of Richmond, Va., is on the ballot in 11 states and has the support of hoosier knit splinters.

Andrews advocates repeal of the federal income tax as a "throughput-American" device pulled "right out of the communists' manifesto."

He also wants to abolish the draft, reduce federal spending by at least \$5 billion dollars a year and leave school segregation strictly up to the states.

Andrews, strongest of the minor party candidates in the field, hopes to make a fight of it for Virginia's 12 electoral votes.

At least, the actions of Andrews and other independents in the field could tip the balance in closely-contested states by taking away votes that otherwise would go to Stevenson and/or Eisenhower.

Andrews' name is on the ballot in Arkansas, Iowa, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Jersey, New Mexico, North Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia and Wisconsin. In addition, a slate of independent electors organized in

Senator Byrd Heads Ticket Of New Party

COLUMBIA, S. C., Oct. 27 (AP)—Democratic Elder Statesman James V. Byrnes, who supported the Eisenhower ticket in 1952, today announced both major 1956 candidates because of their civil rights stands.

The former senator and one-time top adviser to Democratic administrations in a televised address last night asked South Carolinians to support an independent slate headed by Sen. Harry F. Byrd, D. Va.

Can's Back Stand

Byrnes, who four years ago supported the Independent Party of South Carolinians for Eisenhower, said that today he cannot support the party because of either President Eisenhower or Adlai Stevenson.

Byrnes said he considers Mr. Eisenhower less offensive to him than Stevenson and said, "If today there were no other choice I would vote this man over" as in 1952.

But the newly formed independent slate makes it possible for him to vote this year in accord with what you believe to be right," Byrnes said South Carolina voters.

Little Chance

Byrnes admitted the independents have little chance of winning but said, "In three years something more important than voting for a winner."

Earlier in the day a group called the South Carolinians for Independent Electors named Rep. John Hall Williams, D. Miss., as Byrnes' running mate.

An independent Mississippi group which at first had supported the state rights or constitution party headed by T. Coleman Andrews switched to the Byrd-Williams ticket, also called a state rights party.

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Damages Granted In Airliner Crash

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 27 (AP)—A jury in U.S. District Court awarded \$10,000 damages to the estate of a woman killed in the crash of a United States plane at Meigs field near Salt Lake City, Oct. 6, 1955.

The case is the first resulting from the crash to be brought to trial in Utah. Sixty-six persons, including several members of the fibernose choir of the LDS church, were returning from a European tour, were killed.

The jury granted the \$10,000 damages award to the Continental Bank and Trust company, executor of the estate of Mrs. George West of Salt Lake City, who was killed in the crash. United air line was the defendant. The suit had asked \$25,000.

Permit Granted For Gas Export

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27 (AP)—The federal power commission announced today it has authorized Pacific Northwest Pipelines corporation, Salt Lake City, to export an additional 25 million cubic feet of natural gas daily to Canada for delivery to British Columbia Electric company.

The commission authorized Pacific Northwest last Nov. 26 to export 12 million cubic feet of gas daily to the point near Sumas, Wash., and Thurston, B.C.

State, Federal Agencies Get Report on Powerplant Plan

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27 (Special)—A Bureau of reclamation report on the potential Burns creek dam, powerplant, and reservoir on the Snake river near Idaho Falls has been forwarded to interested state and federal agencies.

These agencies will be asked to comment prior to submission of the report to the President and congress for consideration and possible authorization.

The proposed development would be located about 30 miles downstream on the Snake river from Palisades dam, now nearing completion by the bureau of reclamation.

Operation of the Burns creek power-plant and reservoir would be integrated hydraulically and financially with the existing Palisades project for the purpose of amortizing out peaking releases from Palisades powerplant, producing sit-a-site power, and providing 100,000 acre-

feet of holdover irrigation water storage capacity.

This would provide an additional supplemental water supply to lands in the Snake river valley, the water supply for which is diverted above Milner dam, west of Burley.

The plan of development calls for construction of a 115-foot-high rolled earth dam to form a 234,000-acre-foot reservoir. The powerplant would have an installed capacity of 90,000 kilowatts. The integrated or combined operation of the power plant with the Palisades powerplant would permit the prime output from Palisades alone, to be more than doubled.

The interior department estimates that the average annual benefits of the combined Burns creek and Palisades project would pay for the development within 41 to 43 years of full operation, including the irrigation portion and interest on the power allocation.

The department has estimated the construction cost of Burns creek dam, powerplant, and reservoir at \$48,210,000. Under preliminary studies could be allocated on the basis of \$27,000 to irrigation, \$33,440,000 to power, and \$43,000 to minimum basic recreation facilities. Irrigators would repay about \$775,000 over a 60-year period, while the remainder of the irrigation allocation would be repaid from power revenues. The department said that these allotments might be adjusted following refined allocation studies.

In Korea

BUELL, Oct. 27—Army Maj. Wendell C. Gannon, 41, whose wife, Alta Gannon, lives in Buhl, recently arrived in Korea for duty with the Korean military advisory group.

Major Gannon, a former student at the University of Idaho, was previously assigned to duties in Savannah, Ill., ordnance depot. He entered the army in 1940 and served in the Atlantic-Pacific theater during the World war II.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 27—Benjamin Franklin Gibbons, 33, a writer, Friday, was sentenced to five years in federal prison for manufacturing some likeness of the man's name.

He pleaded guilty of counterfeiting 50-cent coins bearing a likeness of Benjamin Franklin.

Now why don't we buy some insurance for staying alive and preventing those possible accidents on our main intersections and roads.

Other words, what the barn door sign on the home gets out.

Let's put stop signs on these main roads and also other needed stop signs and warning signs.

Every one I've talked to agrees that the north and south roads should be through roads and all east and west roads to stop roads at every intersection. Unless of course something like U. S. 30, U. S. 10, or factory road, Oliver road or a throughfare.

Signs who raise a stop sign to stop that sleep or just a plain stop sign that doesn't know any better and of these people are not allowed to be allowed to stop on our roads and highways.

Official Avers Spoiled Wheat Is Not Scandal

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—(Special Service.) Agriculture True D. Morse said Friday there is not the slightest suggestion of irregularity or propensity of government loss in the case of government wheat alleged to have "rotted" in a commercial firm's storage bins.

Morse issued a statement replying to allegations Sen. D. C. Hooper made at a political rally at Washington, N.C., Thursday.

Scott said 35 million bushels of surplus wheat rotted after being stored in tents by Burrus Mills Inc. of Dallas, Tex.

The senator said the government "may have to pay a pretty price to buy the wheat that was not involved," and that Arthur Eisenhower, a brother of the President, heads one of the banks.

Morse's statement backed up an earlier reply by an agriculture department official and by Jack F. Burrus, president of the milling company. Burrus said any loss suffered would be borne by him.

Morse said no estimate is yet available as to damage to the wheat, which would be 20 million bushels. He said nearly half the grain has now been taken from the tents and stored elsewhere.

Lake Walcott Designed for Irrigation, Means Many Things to Many People

Lake Walcott, east of Rupert, is a state reclamation department but it means many things to many people. To farmers, it is a source of water for irrigation. To anglers, it is a place to fish and boat. To pleasure seekers, it is a place of peace and quiet away from the humdrum cares of the world, and to thousands of men, women and children it is a supply of light by which to read, study and work.

Started as an irrigation project, Lake Walcott became a source of power plant at Minidoka dam. Gradually it was put to use by the sportsmen and, in recent years, has been discovered by people who "just want to get away" for a few hours.

The Minidoka project, 49 years old this year, is unlike other irrigation projects in that it has a beach, a swimming area, a boat landing, a picnic area, a popular boating and picnic area. There is a sandy beach for swimmers and a boat landing. The picnic area was developed by the bureau of reclamation and has shade trees, stone fireplaces and grills. The park is located only 13 miles from Rupert.

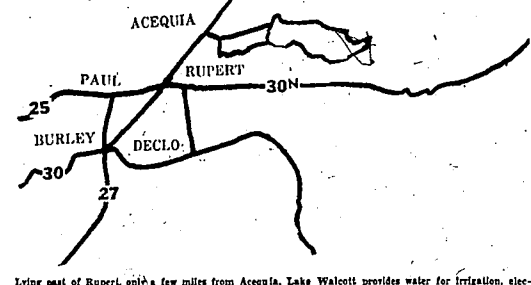
Fishing is good at the lake and three- and four-pound trout are not unusual. The lake contains blue-crappie, rainbow and German brown trout and is stocked by the state fish and game department every year.

The lake probably would be good for migratory waterfowl hunting were it permitted. The U. S. Fish and Game department, however, takes a very dim view of any hunting in the area since most of the lake is a wildlife refuge and is used by thousands of ducks and geese annually. Fishing at the lake is prohibited during the migratory waterfowl season. The refuge runs from a little below the dam to a point known as Cold Water camp or Bonanza bar.

Access roads into the game refuge are not very good. They are used

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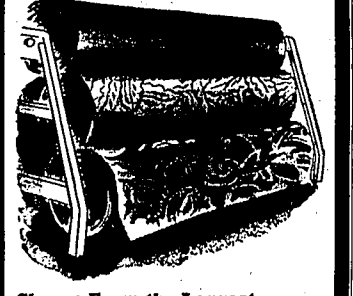

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Navy Readies New Altitude Record Flight

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Oct. 27 (AP)—Two Navy bombers, flying from a chamber, left today for a 21-year-old altitude record flight in a new manned balloon.

M. D. Rose and Lewis, of the U. S. Navy, are expected to encounter the stratosphere.

Both chain-smoked cigars at a press conference last night, explaining they had not smoked during the flight but had been able to do almost everything else as they expected.

The "hams" Lewis quipped about the aluminum sphere in which they hope to fly for 21 years before the earth next Friday or the first suitable day thereafter.

For years both men have planned the 21-year-old altitude record flight in a pressure chamber and near Rapid City in 1933.

They have made a dozen or so flights in "open basket" balloons in preparation for the altitude record attempt.

They recently, on Aug. 10, flew for 40,000 feet above 11,000 feet, going from a ground temperature of about 70 degrees above zero to a temperature of minus 50 degrees high above the earth. Coffee was carried in a vacuum bottle as they passed through.

The two pilots are Capt. H. L. Bond and Lt. Col. George A. Soper, setting a new altitude record will be only incidental to the upcoming flight.

From their experiences and instrument records, the navy hopes to glean valuable new information in the fields of meteorology, atmosphere studies and military equipment evaluation.

Magic Valley Hobbies No. 44 Ham Radio Serves Dual Purpose; It's Used as Hobby and for Public Service

Unlike most hobbies which are practiced for the personal satisfaction derived from them, amateur radio gives its adherents an opportunity to use their knowledge and abilities for the service of their fellowmen. They perform these acts of service without compensation or public recognition.

Most "ham" radio operators probably don't give this side of their hobby much thought, performing public service as a matter of course. Those of them who are conscious of their duty and sometimes place upon their own reason for being "that part of their hobby."

Physically a ham operator doesn't go far afield, but through the medium of his skill he reaches out to other individuals with a faraway look in their eyes. Alone, they turn on their sets and cast their voices out onto the ether waves to talk with operators in faraway places they never see.

Each operator must be licensed by the FCC. The lowest license is the novice class. To qualify, an operator must be able to send five words a minute by International Morse code and must have a limited technical knowledge of radio.

The advanced class carries the same privileges as the conditional class but operators, in order to obtain the license, must be examined by the FCC. The FCC also rules that an amateur station cannot be used for commercial purposes.

Studebakers' Showing Set In November

A sharply-styled line of 15 sedans and station wagons in three series covering the low price field will be introduced by Motor Valley Studebaker dealers Nov. 8 with the 1957 Studebaker.

Getting rid of the new driving controls on slippery roads and increased engine power highlight the 1957 line. The President Classic with a 725-horsepower engine leads the line followed by the President V-8, Commander V-8 and Champion six-cylinder series. The cars are two inches longer to emphasize the "family slant" design. The Chief V-8's 12 1/2 inch wheelbase is the longest in the low price field.

The station wagon series has been expanded to four models with the addition of four-door models. They are six inches longer than last year.

Two new developments are the Luxury Level ride with variable rate coil springing and the Twin Track chassis with the non-slip power-dividing differential.

The front coil springing automatically adjusts to varying loads throughout the spring range to give the same ride with one to five passengers as is obtained by conventional suspension only under heavy loads.

The safety differential automatically divides engine power between the rear wheels in the proportions necessary to stop wheel slipping and spinning under adverse driving situations. Up to 60 per cent of the engine driving force is transmitted to the rear wheel with the best traction. This feature is optional on all sedans and station wagons with V-8 engines.

Three power plants are available including the 210-horsepower, 289-cubic-inch V-8 for the President series and the 180-horsepower, 230-cubic-inch V-8 for the Commander series and the 101-horsepower, 180-cubic-inch six-cylinder engine for the Champion series and the Falcon station wagon.

Thru-axle ratings up to 305-foot-pounds, 2,000 revolutions per minute for the President Classic's V-8 compression ratio in 8.3 compared with 7.8 last year.

Four-barrel carburetion and the dual carburetor standard on the President Classic will be optional on the President series and Commander series.

The 1957 Studebaker body styling features newly-styled hood, new wrap-around grilles, split-level bumpers and hood ornaments and larger tail lamps under the rear of the cars.

A complete range of power equipment is available including power steering, power brakes, power window lift and power seat, new heater and defroster system provides the same air flow at 17 miles per hour as was formerly attained at 50 miles per hour.

The Studebaker special safety device, the hill holder is continued. This prevents any rollback of the vehicle when it is stopped on an incline.

Safety features are padded sun visors, safety belts, low center of gravity, low body construction, padded dashboard and interlocking safety door latches.
