### Diner Injured in Unusual Mishap

HONOLULU, Oct. 29 (AP)—Katsuhiko Tagawa, 33, yesterday was the victim of a freak traffic accident.

While eating breakfast in a Wall Street diner, he was injured when his own driverless car rammed through the diner's wall. Police said a cab driver had lost control of his taxi and slammed into the rear of Tagawa's car showing it six feet through the diner wall.

Tagawa, seated in a booth next to the wall, suffered arm and back injuries.

### Riots Spread

TAIPEI, Oct. 29 (AP)—Anti-communist demonstrators spread through China's Kwangtung province last week, the official central news agency reported from Hong Kong Saturday.

The agency said the disorders were out of an anti-communist unit of demonstrators in Canton on Oct. 10. Nationalist China's National Day. More than 30 persons were killed and 500 arrested in street fighting with red troops in Canton, the agency said.

### Red Cross Okays Aid for Hungary





### 'Boy Convict' Is All Alone in World of Men

MOORESVILLE, W. Va., Oct. 29.—Tommy Williams, 24, is the only inmate in the state penitentiary who is a boy. He is sentenced to life in prison for the murder of a 9-year-old girl. West Virginia law requires that he go to the prison with the other 1,235 inmates in the state penitentiary.

The boy is prisoner No. 40653. He is a white boy, 5 feet 10 inches tall, with blue eyes and a friendly smile. He is in the same mess hall and sleeps in the same cell as the other inmates. He is entirely different from the other inmates in that he is not a hardened criminal.

He has a cell to himself within the cell of the warden's office. He is the only inmate in the state penitentiary who is a boy. He is sentenced to life in prison for the murder of a 9-year-old girl. West Virginia law requires that he go to the prison with the other 1,235 inmates in the state penitentiary.

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### Living Stress Not too Great, Doctor States

CINCINNATI, Oct. 29.—Americans are inclined to over-stress the "stress" of modern-day living, a nationally known heart specialist says. "We are inclined as a nation to think we are living under more stress than any other people at any other time," declared Dr. Irving H. Page, president of the American Heart Association and director of medical research at the Cleveland clinic.

"Yet I dare say if you had been asked to have your scalp taken off by an Indian they would have been a fair amount of stress involved—band, building the pyramids must have been a somewhat stressful situation."

Page made the remarks in talking with a viewpoint that "stress and strain" is the major cause of high blood pressure. He spoke at a news conference prior to the opening of the annual scientific sessions of the AHA.

"I'm not prepared to say that stress is not a part of it," he said, "but it's too easy an explanation."

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### Pius Seeking Prayers' Aid

NATHAN CITY, Italy, Oct. 29.—Pope Pius XII called on the world's Catholics yesterday to join in a "crusade of prayer" for the people of Hungary. Rome's 428 Catholic churches joined him in prayers for the revolution-torn country.

In an afternoon radio address the Pope warned against communism in Italy. He addressed his remarks to a meeting of Catholics in Italy's most communist-ridden province.

"Your enemies," he said, "are not in a position to treat that which we have suffered as a social and social peace. These good things cannot be founded on materialism and atheism."

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### Mother's Arm Is Taken in Grinder

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 29.—A mother of four children lost her right arm below the elbow Friday in a meat grinder.

Police hurried the woman, Mrs. John L. Green, 30, to the LDS hospital from the Higgins for company with her arm still in the grinder. Doctors amputated her arm at free here. Hospital attendants said Saturday her condition was satisfactory.

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### Small Business Cries Loudly, Obalts Attention of Politicians

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—Small business is crying louder in these days of tighter money and rougher competition. The plaint gets more attention in this final pre-election week. And the American public, traditionally chary of big business, are flooding just how big some businesses are.

In big business squeezing the little firms? It might mean pushing the small fellow to the wall. How can Uncle Sam lend a bolstering hand? Where is the dividing line across which small business becomes big business?

Big business dealers it hurts small business. It insists, on the contrary that it needs, supplies and buys from small business—that each is mutually helpful.

Banks deny that the small businessman can't find loans. The banking fraternity stresses that most banks are small, too, and that their loan department customers are mostly small business firms. The American Bankers association says the total volume of business loans under \$100,000 is now 14 per cent higher than a year ago.

There are two ways of defining small business. One is to set an arbitrary line based on the number of employees, or on the total of assets, or on the amount of assets. One such common device, puts the top as 250 employees.

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# 61,417,750 Is Predicted for National Vote

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—State election officials and other qualified sources estimate 61,417,750 persons will vote in the national election on Nov. 6. This is 124,176 less than the record vote of 61,541,926 set in the first Presidential election in 1924. That turnout exceeded the previous high in 1940 by more than 11 million.

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# Polish Chiefs Start Purges For Stalinists

WARSAW, Poland, Oct. 22.—A Polish new communist regime reported purging 100 of its high party men who opposed the new leader, one-time Tito Wladyslaw Gomułka.

New leadership last night announced it had freed Stefan Cardinal Wyspolski and released him on parole as a Catholic priest of Poland. The announcement came 20 months after the cardinal was arrested for religious activities and placed under confinement.

At the same time, the Zdzislaw Wazowski, Poland's second largest newspaper, sharply criticized the Soviet Union for treating Poland as a "second class" country.

It said Poland's foreign policy "can be different from that of the Soviet Union."

The new Communist party leader had been carrying out his duties in the past week and that his first secretaries had been fired in district branches and suspended in the national party.

The sources said the secretaries in Lublin, Brest and Gdansk (Danzig), in October, former secretaries leading the districts were named first secretaries of the district party council.

The names of the officials appeared to be based on the premise that if they were not with Gomułka they were against him.

Gomułka took over as party leader two weeks ago and has been in close contact with the government. The charge was that he was a street demonstration against Russian influence in Poland.

Abyrskaya release was one of the major demands made by Polish demonstrators in the hectic days which preceded the installation of Gomułka as a "liberal" Communist leader.

### Campaign Managers Rest Easy if They Can Sew up Negro Vote for Candidate

**WASHINGTON, Oct. 29**—In the 1950 census, it is strategically concentrated in large states which cast substantial electoral votes. The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People checked the 1952 Negro vote in 50 cities. The survey indicated that 75 per cent of Negro voters had voted for Adlai E. Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee.

The Negro vote, therefore, was cast for the 1952 loser and was not decisive in this election. President Eisenhower's 1952 lead in popular votes was too great for the outcome to be changed even by the concentration of massive minority support for the opposition candidate.

For a balance of power minority to be effective, it must: (1) Vote as a bloc; (2) vote in a state where the major party division is close. Republicans are making an unusually anxious pitch this year for the Negro vote. That is because of indications of a close popular vote between Mr. Eisenhower and Governor Stevenson in key states such as California, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Missouri, New York, New Jersey, Ohio and Pennsylvania.

Three eight states cast 233 electoral votes, just 4 short of the 269 minimum for election of a President of the United States. Their Negro populations range from 442,300 in Michigan to nearly one million in New York state. The New York
