WASHINGTON, Oct. 30 (AP)—The U. S. court of appeals was asked today to reconsider its decision upholding the legality of a construction project for a dam in the Snake River National Fish and Wildlife Refuge area of the Snake River. 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## Church Says Southwest Oil Interests Financing Campaign of Opponent

Frank Church, Boise, rolled out his heaviest ammunition of the campaign Tuesday to bolster a charge that "the big oil and gas interests of the Southwest" are contributing substantially to the reelection campaign of Idaho's Republican Sen. Herman Welker.

The Democratic candidate told a Boise rally that contributions to Welker's campaign total nearly \$88,000, most of this is from out-of-state sources, and a large share from gas and oil interests. Church called this a "staggering" sum. His campaign manager estimated contributions to Church's campaign at about \$35,000. Church did not list individual contributors. He said the "document" his statements later.

Welker could not be reached immediately for comment. His campaign manager said there would be a statement later.

Church said the Win With Welker committee filed a report with the senate secretary in Washington, showing contributions of \$17,475. He said 944 contributions totaling more than \$64,000, were of \$100 or more, and only 31 of these were from the people.

He said the rest of the contributions filed under the corrupt practices law, were from personal sources and the National Women's Committee for Welker.

He also said a "major portion" of the money contributed to the Win With Welker committee "has come from the big oil and gas interests of the Southwest."

"I think this pretty well demonstrates who is being financed by out-of-state interests in this campaign," he commented.

Welker had charged last Saturday that "the deluge of dollars pouring into the state from faraway places trying to elect one of my two opponents, Frank Church" constitutes "harassment interference in Idaho's election."

## Egypt Forces Clash

Neither Side Will Use War Label on Battles for Desert

Egypt's Soviet-equipped air force went into action Tuesday against Israel's lightning thrust into the Sinai desert and said its land forces "are presently advancing to mop up" the Israeli invaders. Neither side would call it a war. But in the capitals of the western world, and in the council halls of the United Nations, there was fear that Israel's thrust allegedly to wipe out Egyptian suicide commandos bases, might be the spark to touch off the long-ferred general war in the Middle East.

Non-essential American civilians were being evacuated as rapidly as possible from both the Israeli and Egyptian sides. Two thousand Americans were stranded in Egypt after the Egyptian government closed major ports and airfields.

Here were the principal developments:

Israeli decreed general mobilization and claimed that her airforce had shot down two enemy planes and destroyed 13 armored cars. It said "heavy losses" had been inflicted on Israeli forces and that the Israeli attack had been brought to a "complete standstill."

Israeli reports said Israeli forces had struck 126 miles inland Egypt to within 12 miles of the Suez canal. Official announcements said Israeli forces had captured the Kusseima road junction, about six miles west of the canal, in the vicinity of the Suez Canal.

Tense quiet rippled along Israel's borders with the other Arab neighbors. But Syrian troops were digging in on their side, Israeli forces were being moved to the Golan Heights and Iraq said it would support the fight if it continued. Premier Nehru said Israel's move would have "serious international consequences."

### Sales Battles Begin for '57 Model Autos

DETROIT, Oct. 30 (AP)—Several model cars remain to be published, but the competitive battle in the industry history is getting under way.

The first flight began when Chevrolet introduced its new offerings on Oct. 23. It followed Ford by a week. The most recent new car registration figures show that 50 per cent of new cars sold in the first eight months of 1956 were Chevrolet 1,092,517 and Ford 1,045,544 out of a total registration of 2,138,061 cars.

Prices quoted

Ford initially announced price increases ranging from \$1 to \$104. Chevrolet announced a list price of \$50 for its initial price schedule. The price cut prices on some models as much as \$41 and raised others as much as \$20 from the list.

The Ford action gave it a price of \$179 (without tax and other charges) to \$428 for a deluxe station wagon. Chevrolet's range was \$1,280 for a comparable lowest priced model to \$2,490 for a complete station wagon. The prices for six cylinder models; eight cylinder models.

Ford pocketmen have been saying that will be the year they expect to overtake Chevrolet in production and sales leadership. Chevrolet's top executives do not believe the Ford competition, but they say their cars will remain in the No. 1 position throughout the year ahead.

How much of the price increases will be passed along to the car buyer will become clear until the final flush of the new model eye-ops has proceeded somewhat.

It has been said in some quarters that to help maintain list prices at the retail level the car makers will produce more closely than in the market during the coming year.

From the retailers' standpoint that probably would be a very desirable program. But it might not work out in a practical way in a market such as lies ahead in the piece dominated by Chevrolet and Ford.

### Record Sales Loom in U.S.; Fight Is Seen

NEW YORK, Oct. 30 (U.P.)—Retailers are agreed this will be the biggest year for total retail sales. But for what kind of stores and which particular ones?

Competition rarely has been fiercer than it is this fall between the discount houses and the conventional stores, the cut-price catalogs and the small town appliance or furniture shops, the big retail chains and the small merchants who stick to list prices and those who under.

Frequently the competition is increased by the retail monthly rate has decreased in recent years. The latest census bureau count (1934) showed fewer retail stores than in 1928, although sales totals were steadily higher and so was the number of customers to be served.

Most of the competitive methods used are old. They just hurt more now in a buyer's market with profit margins shrinking, and mass buying and distribution tipping the scales of profit and loss.

And the faces of the competitors are changing. Discount houses first, then direct mail or word of mouth advertising. They still send out their catalogs. But they also advertise now in the newspapers. They are selling by branch stores and growing into chains. They are beginning to offer the services they scored in the early days of relying solely on cut prices. Some will deliver, set up, offer their own guarantees.

Their old-line competitors are changing, too. Some big department stores cut prices to meet the discount house figure. Others push their trade-in plan, their cut-price warehouse sales, or trim some costlier services.

Smaller stores fight back to meet the competition of low prices. A group of 100 home furnishings retailers in the Rocky Mountain and Pacific coast states has just been formed to do mass buying of furniture, carpets and appliances. This buying group is just the latest in an increasing total of them in the retail field.

### Cost of Living Index Assumes Triple Significance in Pre-Election Tussles

NEW YORK, Oct. 30 (U.P.)—The cost of living has a triple significance today.

Since it started rising last March after a long period of moving aside it quickly became a table topic in many a home. And the cost of living index means much to millions of workers because their pay scales are tied to its up and down movements. But today the index especially interests the politicians. They hope to make some last minute hay out of it.

The index is actually the bureau of labor statistics' consumer price index, but popularly it is accepted as measuring trends in the cost of living.

It has been widely assailed by critics who doubt if it reflects accurately the cost of living for most folk, or if it is authoritative enough for wage scales to depend upon it. Some complain that on its list of items supposedly purchased by middle income city dwellers are many luxuries and goods bought sparingly. If at all, by many families.

Critics claim the index uses list prices instead of discount or bargain sale prices. A smart shopper, they say, can do better.

And they charge that the persons who sample the prices around the country do so at time of the week or month when prices are normally higher. Example: Food items are priced at the first of the week instead of on week-end when food bargains are pushed.

The labor department's BLS has a reply for these criticisms. It says the goods and services on its list are the things that peo-

ple actually spend money for. BLS isn't interested in whether there are luxuries or not—whether they should or shouldn't spend their money that way.

BLS gives varying weights to these items. Example: Cars. A new change in the price of the new cars may cause less of a stir in the index than a hike in public transit fares. It takes into consideration that some families don't own cars, many buy second hand, and anyway only buy a car once in awhile. Millions, on the other hand, pay transit fares every day. When the New York subway fare went from five to 10 cents in 1948 it raised the national index a tenth of a point.

As for discount houses, which BLS doesn't sample, it says that other stores have cut prices to meet the competition. And, anyway, the total of all appliances and furnishings subject to discount practices is less than five per cent of the "market basket" it makes up each week.

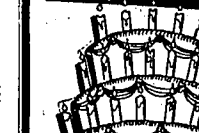
BLS uses sales prices on clothing and house furnishings when the sale is in effect for two weeks and includes a full selection.

The index makers admit that food prices would be cheaper if sampled on the week-ends instead of the first part of the week, as is the BLS practice. But it stresses that what it does is to measure the change from month to month and questions if the monthly change would be any different if prices were taken at the end instead of the first of the week.

Above all the index is set up to measure the change in prices as noted by the average city family. It

doesn't measure the shopping ability of individual households, nor changes in the spending habits of individual families. But, as with most bureaus, the BLS waits a long time to change the make-up of its fixed market basket.
