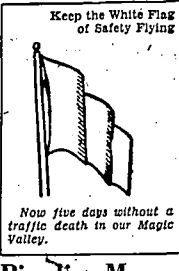

Attack Begins 'By Two Allies' On Suez Area

Farm Prices Fall, Become Election Item

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—Farm prices, an important issue in the campaign, dropped one per cent in the month ended Oct. 18, according to the department in its weekly price report issued yesterday.

The decline was due to lower prices for most animals, corn, potatoes, poultry, eggs, and wool. The report said higher prices were expected for dairy products, some vegetable oils and wheat.

Wool Campaign

While minutes after the report was issued, Secretary of Agriculture Charles D. Ickes interrupted a campaign tour at Corydon, Ind., to telegraph to the department his comment on the price situation.

He said the decline was "slight" and was due to normal heavy marketing at this time of year. He said that the decline in prices for the third quarter was 1.5 per cent above that for the same period a year ago and for the 10-year average four per cent above 1925 because of this year's large wool crop.

Butler Comments

Democratic National Chairman Fred A. Butler said the price decline "fits the bill of the rosy campaign" proclaimed by President Eisenhower and reveals the Eisenhower-Benson farm program for what it is—a failure.

The price report showed the price had to be 2.18 per cent above that of a year ago, 5.4 per cent above that of 1925, but 77 per cent below the record high set in February, 1921.

Dish Lower

The decline in the index of prices received by farmers, measured against the prices they must pay for the things they buy, was not enough to lower the parity ratio during the month. At 82, the ratio was the same as in August and September, 1934, and October, 1935. The report, based on Oct. 19 conditions, did not reflect recent price declines in the live hog market.

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Chinese Coast Guns Silent on Annual Events

TAIPEI, Formosa, Oct. 31 (AP)—Communist guns on the China mainland across from nationalist-held Quemoy were strangely quiet today during Formosa's celebration of the 25th birthday anniversary of President Chiang Kai-shek.

In past years the Chinese Reds used the occasion of the generalissimo's birthday to administer heavy artillery bombardings to the tiny island scarcely two miles from the mainland.

Military sources could offer no immediate explanation for the silent communist guns. But political observers noted that for more than a month there have been persistent reports of unrest along the coast of central China.

As he had on past birthdays, Chiang kept intact his dream of returning to the mainland.

Nationalist sources in recent weeks have been heartened by news of spreading resistance to the Peiping regime, and some have said nationalist troops will land once the long-awaited revolt begins.

Some pessimists say the similarity of the sexes has reached a point where half the time they can't be sure whether they're dealing with a man or a woman.

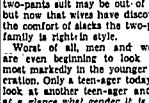
"It's particularly hard on pianists or a fishing trip," said one. "Then even grandmas dress like grandpas, and nobody but their own kids could be sure which is which."

Poland Slates Restoration of Church Lands

WARSAW, Oct. 31 (AP)—Poland's new "independent" communist regime was reported preparing today a purge of high-ranking Soviet officers from the Polish armed forces and the restoration to the Catholic church of all property confiscated by the old government.

Wladyslaw Gomulka, announced twin objectives yesterday to a group of youth leaders.

The new Polish communist leader said Soviet officers already have been weeded out from the nation's military ranks.

He said the number of Soviet "experts" attached to the Polish army will be cut from 150 to 30.

Gomulka confirmed reports that Marshal Konstantin Rokossovsky, who was sent to take over the Polish defense ministry by the late Josef Stalin in 1945, is through. He said Rokossovsky's "leave" from his military post will be "indefinite."

On the religious front, Gomulka said his government had reached "complete agreement" with the church. He said all church properties seized by the former government will be returned by the state. The church will not be permitted to form any political party or youth movement.

Gomulka said Stefan Cardinal Wyszyński, who was released Sunday after three years in communist concentration camps, had accepted the restoration and has accepted the restrictions.
