Former Chief Of Italy Army Dies of Attack

GRAZZANO BADOLIO, Italy, Nov. 1 (AP)—Marshal Pietro Badoglio, commander of the armies of the late Benito Mussolini, died today of a heart ailment.

Badoglio, who was 85, left his villa in Rome for this small northern Italy village which bears his name early in August to recover from an attack of influenza. He showed signs of improvement but suffered a heart attack on Aug. 24.

His daughter, Marchioness Maria Alceida, flew here from Rome to be at his bedside.

Badoglio headed the fascist armies which conquered Ethiopia in 1936 and was already a national hero when he was named chief of staff.

He vainly tried to prevent Mussolini from entering World War II and when the allies landed in Sicily in 1943 he joined forces with the King Victor Emmanuel III to arrest the fascist dictator. He served for a short time as premier to Italy, concluded an armistice with the allies and later led Italy into the war on the side of the allies as a co-belligerent.

Russian Plan Is Concession For "Titoism"

Russia's offer to consider the withdrawal of its troops from Poland, Hungary and Rumania looks like an enormous concession to "Titoism."

Those three countries are the only satellites, according to the Soviet government, in which Russian troops are stationed.
That may or may not be true. It was reported in the early days of the Hungarian revolt, that Russian troops were moving in troops from Czechoslovakia, Rumania and Albania, though they most probably are "advisers" and not members of regular units. There are advisers also in Bulgaria.

There are about 20,000 Russian troops in Germany. But they were not covered by the Soviet offer. The troops in East Germany are classed as occupation troops because no peace treaty has been signed between Russia and Germany.
It may be assumed, in examining the Soviet offer, that the Moscow government never makes any big-hearted gesture in good faith.
If Russia is ready to pull its troops out of the three countries, specified, and it may be, its offer emphasizes the historic importance of the Polish and Hungarian revolts against Moscow domination.

Return Asked of Hungary Symbol

VELDAPING, Germany, Nov. 1 (AP)—Archduke Otto of Austria has asked President Eisenhower to help regain the Hungarian crown of St. Stephen to the "freely-elected Hungarian government."
The archduke, pretender to the Austrian crown, said in his cable to Mr. Eisenhower yesterday that the crown "is currently in American custody."
He said he had been asked by "important persons in liberated Hungary" to request return of the crown, "the highest national symbol of the country."

Russian Airmen Could Aid Egypt

JERUSALEM, Nov. 1 (AP)—Soviet planes has hinted that Russian volunteers will fly Soviet-built MIG fighters for Egypt.
When asked if he had heard a report that Israeli fighters had downed Egyptian-piloted MIGs in the battle over the Sinai desert, Sergei Andreyevich, correspondent for the Soviet Press news agency, said:
"Wait until some of our volunteers handle those MIGs. When our Soviet volunteers get going you won't be able to do it them."

Threats Cited Of New Idaho Gasoline War

MOSCOW, Nov. 1.—A major gasoline price war, such as hit California last summer, threatened to break out in Idaho, a few days ago, according to a spokesman of the Idaho Chamber of Commerce.

Robert E. Smylie, Jr. said he had a conference at Boise early yesterday with representatives of oil men who he believed was on the verge of renegeing the price competition.

Smylie said he hopes the gas oil price war at Pocatello with Clearwater is sent the major oil companies threatening prosecute under Idaho's anti-trust and fair trade act. The price of motor oil has dropped from 24 to 20 cents and "it is not independent operators had to close shop" before the state took action, he said.

Smylie said Idaho's laws are far more effective in this field than those of many states but "the need for better laws could well look into the possibility of strengthening the anti-monopoly laws."

'Tight Money' Disputes Will Be Continued

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—The controversy over tight money will not stop on election day. Neither will the tightness.

"Money is tight because there is more demand for loans today than there is money to fill that demand. When there is more demand than supply, the price—the interest rate—rises."

Today's situation, with interest rates at their highest level in more than 20 years, reflects recent borrowing on one hand and federal reserve credit restraints on the other.

Critics accuse the federal reserve system of strangling the business boom, and particularly of putting a crimp in housing and small business.

Defenders maintain that without credit restraint the boom could blow up like a balloon and then burst.

Business developments after the election will determine whether money becomes tighter or stays relatively loose.

Rep. Wright Patman, D. Tex., an outspoken foe of the federal reserve's credit policies, will give them a public airing at hearings in December.

Church Wind Now Rustling Iron Curtains

A religious cross-wind is blowing behind the iron curtain. There is no certainty as yet about which direction will prevail in the ultimate course of events. But recent developments, at least in some areas, have indicated the rise of a new force—the voice of the churches.

Most dramatic and influential of these changes is the return to full legal status of Lutheran Bishop Lajos Ordas, of Hungary.

The restoration of the influence of this sturdy, uncompromising churchman—of the "Protestant-Physician" Minkowsky—in the church struggle against communist domination—has been implications in Hungarian church affairs.

Among Catholics in iron curtain countries, open contacts with the rest-of-the-world—through the Vatican—have been rigidly restricted.

But among Orthodox and Protestant Christians there has been a swelling volume of communications and visits between East and West and apparently this reawakened bond has begun to have its effects.

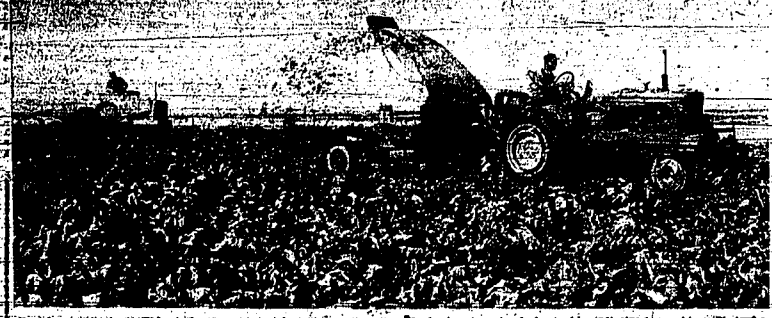

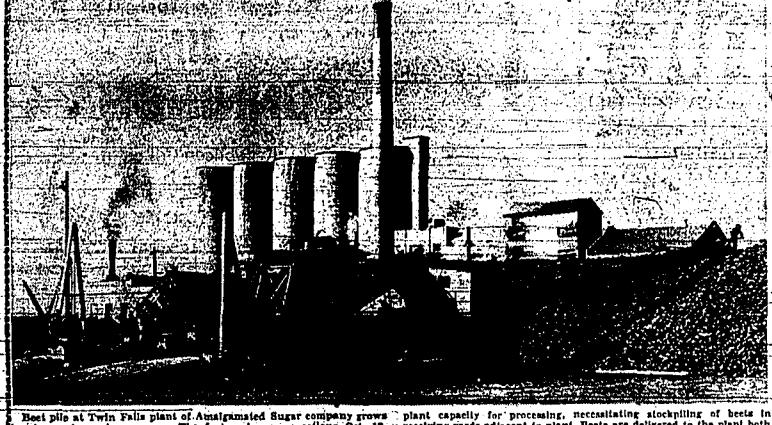

Farmers Hit Stride in Harvesting Sugar Beets Across Magic Valley

Year's Supply of Sugar for 1,600,000 Americans Provided by Beets in Valley

Enough sugar beets to provide an entire year's sugar supply for more than 1,600,000 American men, women and children are being harvested this fall in Magic Valley, according to estimates based upon records of the beet harvest in the Magic Valley and processing campaign.

The 1936 sugar crop is a good one, according to weather conditions which combined with steadily improving farming and processing techniques to bring this result.

The outlook, a survey of the area's sugar producers show, is for a harvest aggregating some 560,000 tons of sugar beets. When processed, these will produce about 15,780,000 pounds of pure beet sugar—150 tons, pulp and molasses highly valued as livestock feed and fertilizer.

At an average retail value of 10 cents a pound, Magic Valley's sugar crop this year will be worth well over 150 million dollars. Cash income to the area's sugar beet growers would amount to some \$7,800,000.

In the Associated Sugar Company's Twin Falls factory district, indications are that this year's beet crop will average 21 tons to the acre, or over 16 tons per acre. District farmers planted 14,200 acres of sugar beets this year and expect to harvest about 13,900 of these.

Harvest began Oct. 10, the factory began operations three days later and the factory "campaign" is expected to end about Jan. 1.

In the Rupert district, about 17,000 acres planted are being harvested.

Average yield per acre is indicated this year at about 16½ tons, somewhat better than the 15½ tons per acre a year ago. Sugar content appears to be up, too, from slightly below 10 per cent a year ago to about 16.5 per cent this year. Harvest in the Rupert—Burley district began Oct. 8, the Rupert factory started rolling Oct. 10 and the "campaign" is expected to be completed about Jan. 3.

Beets processed at the Twin Falls and Rupert factories are grown in six Magic Valley counties—Cassia, Blaine, Teton, Twin Falls, Jerome, Gooding and Lincoln.

The sugar beet crop in Idaho as a whole this fall is one of the best in recent years, state-wide reports show. Throughout the state, estimates are that the 1936 crop will yield 21 million tons of beets, sugar production will exceed 40 million pounds, may run as high as 420 million, the average beet production is also indicated as higher in all production areas, up from about 15.20 per cent this year.

The improved crop is attributed largely to the extensive gains made in the last 10 or 12 years in mechanization of sugar beet farming, development of new plant varieties and general increase in the efficiency of the beet sugar industry, which already ranks as the most efficient in the world in terms of man-hours

American Arms Utilized Against American Arms

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 (AP)—American arms probably are being used against American arms in the continued fighting in the Middle East, but neither by design nor with approval of the United States.

There is little doubt among highly placed Pentagon officials that some U. S. weapons either given away under the military aid program or sold in private channels are being used by both sides—and in a military venture which the United States strongly opposes.

American arms in British and French possession went to them under the regular U. S. military aid program. In the past six years, this country has furnished 3.6 billion dollars in military equipment to France and more than one billion dollars to Britain.

The United States has refrained for some time from giving arms under the same program to either Egypt or Israel for fear of upsetting the delicate balance of power in the Middle East. But both nations have bought American arms either privately or through private channels.

Use of U. S. military aid by British and France for an attack such as they have launched against Egypt actually violates the bilateral military aid agreements between them and the United States, as well as the military aid law. They are supposed to use the aid solely to "promote the integrated defense of the North Atlantic Treaty area."

Negligence Cited For Road Mishap

WEISER, Nov. 1 (AP)—A Washington county coroner's jury ruled yesterday that the traffic death of Mrs. M. M. Clement, of Ontario, Ore., was by "reasons of the supposed criminal negligence of Grant Lewis, Nyssa, Ore."

Mrs. Clement was killed outright last Thursday in a two-car collision south of here. Her husband, 72-year-old Charles Clement, died Saturday of injuries incurred in the same accident.

Lewis was driver of the other car involved in the collision with the Clement automobile.

Farmers in 44 States Receive Soil Bank Pay

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 (AP)—The agriculture department reported yesterday that farmers in 44 states received soil bank payments totaling \$10,543,440 through Oct. 26, the fifth report on payments issued under the 1948 soil bank reserve program. The last report, covering payments through Oct. 19, showed total disbursements of 10.7 million dollars. Payments through Oct. 12 total \$2.5 million dollars. The first report through Sept. 21, showed 3.4 million dollars in payments, and the Oct. 28 report showed 10 million dollars in payments. Iowa was in the first four reports. Iowa farmers got the largest total payments for soil-producing crops. The total was \$3,871,770. Texas farmers were second with \$1,856,371, and Illinois farmers third with \$1,250,924.56.

Payments by states (in round figures) included: Idaho \$402,000; Kansas \$222,000; Oregon \$124,000; Utah \$223,000, and Washington \$100,000.

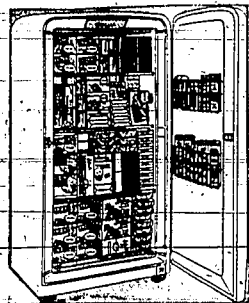

Evacuation of War Areas Is Being Rushed

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (AP)—The state department announced Wednesday night that more than 1,000 Americans have been evacuated from Middle East hot spots in a move being speeded by the air force and units of the U.S. Sixth fleet.

The department said 1,889 Americans had left Egypt, Israel, Syria and Jordan as of a p.m. Wednesday. It said 4,878 Americans remained in the four countries at the time of its count.

A navy announcement said earlier that transport units of the Sixth fleet, backed by combat vessels, were ready to assist in the evacuation of Americans from the Israeli port of Haifa and the Egyptian port of Alexandria.

Later the navy disclosed that its senior commander in Europe, Admiral Walter S. Brooke, is proceeding from London to the eastern Mediterranean to assume direct control of the evacuation.

It said Brooke, acting under direct orders of the joint chiefs of staff, is coordinating the evacuation of American citizens from the Middle East.

White's figures showed a total of 1,000 Americans evacuated from Egypt, 148 from Jordan and 87 from Syria.

This left behind, as evacuation by auto, plane and ship continued, a total of 2,843 in Israel, 1,669 in Egypt, 172 in Jordan and 194 in Syria.

White said all Americans still in Jordan and Syria were doing essential work. The state department had called Sunday for the departure of all U. S. citizens not in this category.

In Israel, he said, about half of those remaining were considered essential personnel. This means the total number of those yet to be evacuated from Israel is 1,451.

White said 67 persons were admitted from Tel-Aviv to Athens earlier Wednesday in air force transport.

Eleven C-54 Globemaster transport planes were used in the Tel-Aviv-Athens shuttle service.

Paper and Guild Break Off Parley

NEW YORK, Nov. 1 (AP)—The New York newspaper guild and the New York Post broke off contract negotiations early today.

The Post guild unit called a meeting for tonight to recommend a strike.

Six of New York's seven major daily newspapers agreed early today to a two-year contract and a nine percent pay raise, including a six-hour night-long negotiations with the guild.

Strikes Begin In Industries; Workers Idle

Some 31,000 workers were idle today in walkouts against the rubber and shipbuilding industries and a bus line serving 18 states.

The largest strike, called by the United Rubber Workers union, involved 2,000 workers at eight plants of the Firestone Tire and Rubber company.

Negotiations in the rubber walkout were scheduled to be resumed today on the union's demand that its contract with Firestone be brought "in line" with those with other rubber firms.

At Quincy, Mass., 200 draftsmen at the Bethlehem Steel company's Fore river shipyard set up picket lines, and production workers refused to cross them. The Bethlehem walkout caused a work stoppage of about 5,000 workers employed on construction of five destroyers and a super tanker.

About 400 employees of the Eastern Greyhound lines were out in a strike called by the Street Railway and Motor Coach union which demands transportation in the Northeast.

Party Slogan Of GOP Gets 'Fraud' Label

Don J. Cernanich, Twin Falls, Idaho, is a member of the Republican Party and has served the party for many years as a member of the "Peace, Prosperity and Progress" as a myth with "no foundation in fact."

Cernanich's statement says: "The slogan of 'Peace, Prosperity and Progress' adopted by the Republican Party has no foundation in fact. It is proclaimed as 'peace' in only a few countries. Korea and China were divided, leaving millions of those people free and the other half sold out to the communists."

"No nation like Germany can long remain divided. Our civil war was fought to free the slaves but mainly to overcome economic conditions. There is no peace in the world today when we view Israel and Egypt at war and when the Russians still maintain armed forces in some of these areas. We keep a gun and are sitting on a powder keg."

"We persuaded England to remove its armed forces from Egypt and the Suez canal. This following problems in an effort to free people who are not ready to give themselves and their property to a dictatorship. Certainly, civilization is a slow growth."

"That the administration should be credited for prosperity is another myth. Government never creates prosperity but could hamper it. Government taxes and spends out everything. East German Students Ask For Change

BOSTON, Nov. 1.—Fascious East German students strongly criticized the some communist youth organizations today and demanded an end to the compulsory study of Russian language.

The same type of student criticism of the Russian language and the national uprising last week, students asked to withdraw from the Free German youth organization and set up their own student organization.

The demands were disclosed by the communists themselves. In an effort to prevent open demonstrations, the communists threatened the students with punishment but they sought concessions and promises.

The communist reaction indicated the seriousness with which the situation was viewed by the East German government.

The students demanded the right to withdraw from the youth organization permitted in schools and universities. The German youth secretary of the East Berlin branch of the Communist party, rejected the demands as an attempt to split the youth movement.

Idaho Commission Explains Why State Doesn't Contribute to U.S. Spud Group

BOISE, Nov. 1.—A folder outlining the reasons why the Idaho advertising commission has not contributed to the National Potato Council has been mailed to all potato growers of record by the ad group, according to Harold West, commission chairman.

"The advertising commission," the folder states, "has from time to time been requested to contribute potato tax money to the National Potato Council and it is felt that the time has come to explain the commission's stand to the potato growers and shippers who pay the tax. The specific amount now requested for the National Potato Council is \$4,000 of \$5,000 budgeted for that purpose by the Idaho Potato Producers association. However, the original 'quota' named for Idaho by the council was \$10,000 annually, so it is to be presumed that other requests will be made as time goes on.

"While the commission, as a body, neither approves nor disapproves of the National Potato Council and its objectives, it has been unable to accede to the requests; and here are the reasons:

"Because the Idaho advertising commission was established by an act of the legislature, it must adhere to the laws which established it and by the constitution of the state of Idaho.

"Furthermore, the commission has always thought that the intent of the potato advertising legislation originally adopted by the legislature, as amended, has been to promote the sale of Idaho potatoes and the welfare of the Idaho potato industry.

"Therefore, regardless of the merits of any organization or plan to promote the use of potatoes generally, the Idaho advertising commission is unable to use any of the funds at its disposal to finance such organizations or plans. This was made known in a decision of the attorney general as early as April 10, 1952.

"The 1955 legislature amended the potato advertising act to permit the commission to spend up to 1% per cent of taxes collected for research and education. If it chooses, which percentage amounts to \$1,000,000 a 50,000-carrot season. Following that action, on July 1, 1955, the commission entered into a contract with the Idaho Potato Producers association to carry on such activities under commission direction. The contract was renewed last July 1.

"In recent months, the thought has been advanced that, by virtue of that amendment, financial support can be given the National Potato Council through these channels.

"However, the attorney general has ruled that the Idaho advertising commission is not authorized to expend its use of tax funds to finance voluntary private associations. In addition, the amendments above mentioned expressly states that, in order to carry on research and education, the commission may cooperate with any organization of growers in this state.

"From the start, the main duty of the commission has been to plan and conduct a campaign for commodity advertising, publicity and sales promotion to increase the consumption of Idaho potatoes.

"In accordance with that directive in the original law, the commission has always tried to invest your advertising dollars wisely. Since the inception of the commission in 1937, the U. S. per capita consumption of all white potatoes has decreased 16 per cent while per capita consumption of Idaho potatoes has increased 14 per cent. In other words, today Idaho shows a 30 per cent gain over competitive potato growing areas as compared to 10 years ago.

"Your comments, criticisms and suggestions as to the subject discussed herein, or on any other activity of the commission, would be appreciated either in writing or verbally expression before any regular meeting of the commission."

The message is signed by Harold West, as chairman of the Idaho advertising commission.

"We believe," said West, "that all of the state's potato growers contribute to the working funds of the commission, each should have a copy of this explanation. As a consequence, we have mailed the folder to everyone on our mailing list, a total of about 9,500.

"However, in an industry as vast as in the Idaho potato growing industry, it is entirely conceivable that our mailing list is not 100 per cent complete. Therefore, we ask that any grower not receiving a copy of the folder write the Idaho advertising commission, postoffice box 100, Boise, those writing will be mailed a copy and their names added to the mailing list for receipt of all future communications from the commission.

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Middle East War For Coming Games May Upset Plans

MELBOURNE, Nov. 1 (AP)—Will Britain and France allow the Olympic Games now that they have begun warlike operations in the Middle East?

That was a question of prime importance Wednesday in Melbourne, host city of the Olympics scheduled to start Nov. 22. Strangely, nobody was talking much about it.

Egypt withdrew a few weeks ago but Britain has 350 athletes and the United States has 183 and Israel has 22.

Otto Mayer, chancellor of the International Olympic committee, said Wednesday in Lausanne, Switzerland, that countries in a state of war would be permitted to compete at Melbourne despite the traditions of peace.

"There is no question of preventing any nation from competing because it finds itself in a state of war," Mayer said. "On the contrary, we hope the Olympic games can give an example of peace by uniting the athletes of the entire world, whatever their personal beliefs and national loyalties."

Ed. Gen. Sir William Bridgeford, chief executive officer of the games, told the Associated Press "Mr. Mayer's attitude is a very commendable one. The International Olympic committee will decide the issue."

While news was popping in the Suez, a 72-strong Romanian team arrived in Melbourne. It was the first complete Olympic team to arrive from an Iron Curtain country.

Teams from 14 of the 71 competing nations, who eventually will send about 4,500 athletes, already have arrived at the Olympic village with three weeks and one day to go. More than 200 athletes have arrived and fresh arrivals are expected daily.

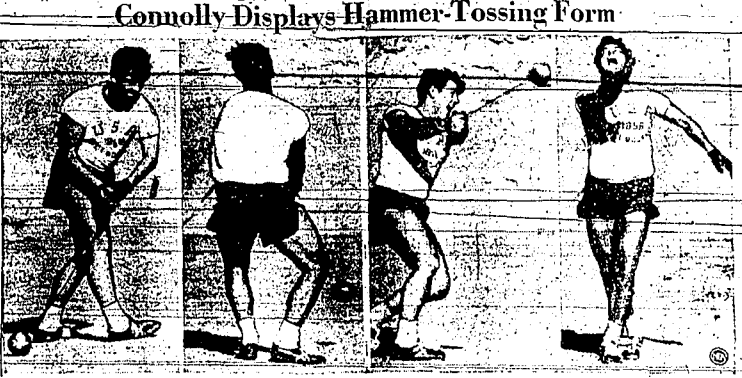
Colorado Not Afraid, Says Buff Coach
