# Eden Refuses to Answer Demand To Stop Fighting

## Hungary Braces For Invasion by Russian Troops

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Nov. 2 (U.P.)—A U. N. resolution called for a ceasefire in the Middle East today but Prime Minister Anthony Eden refused in the hour of commons to give his answer to the U. S.-sponsored demand. The measure, which had been approved overwhelmingly by the assembly, called for a withdrawal of British troops from Egypt and urged Great Britain and France to halt the movement of military forces and arms into the embattled area.

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Nov. 2 (U.P.)—The United States, French and British legations prepared today to send the wives and children of their staffs home in the face of reports that Russia has decided to retake Budapest by force. There are about 20 wives and children of American legation members here.

# Wild Blizzard Slams Plains, Halts Traffic

DENVER, Nov. 2 (U.P.)—The first big blizzard of the winter slammed across a vast area of the Rockies and Great Plains today, blocking highways and stranding motorists. Two ranchhands were reported missing in the storm near Alliance, Neb., and an undetermined number of cars and trucks were stalled in snowdrifts in eastern Colorado. Schools were closed over most of eastern Colorado where winds up to 70 miles an hour reduced visibility to zero in some places.

(In Washington, Monsignor Bela Valko, Hungarian refugee leader, said Communist Premier Nagy has resigned. Varga said Vice Premier, Zoltan Tilly, chief of the anti-Communist "Small Holders party," had succeeded Nagy. Varga said "tremendous" Russian armies were re-entering Hungary to seal the borders and try to starve the Hungarians into submission. Many Budapest residents were planning to flee to the west at the first sign of attack from Soviet troops which were reliably reported surrounding the city up to 15 miles from its center. However, the capital was quiet this morning. No sound of firing that would indicate the outbreak of fighting was heard.

Stevenson disclosed the text of his telegram shortly before he left by plane for Cleveland, O., where he will arrive today to address a political rally.

Britain's Cyprus radio said that "our warships will disembark tanks and guns on Egyptian soil." The British admiralty warned all merchant shipping to get out of the Mediterranean before the Anglo-French expeditionary force entered the Gulf of Suez south of Egypt. A communique issued at Anglo-French headquarters on Cyprus said that the British command was preparing for the final operation.

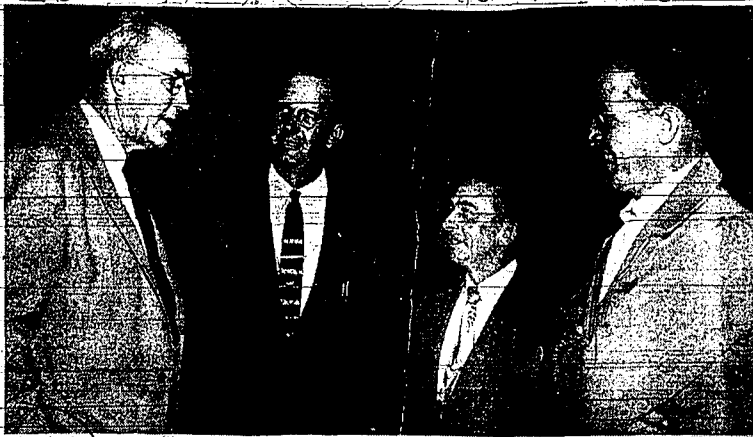

### Traffic-Death Toll Reports Near Record

CHICAGO, Nov. 2 (AP)—Traffic deaths in the United States—accidents at record-smashing speed—were reported last night by the National Safety Council, an organization that has been active in the past year in the Department of Transportation.

The council reported that more than 100 Americans were killed in motor vehicle accidents in the week ending Nov. 26, a record for any one month since the September toll was 5,600—a 10 percent increase over the corresponding month of last year.

It was the 19th consecutive month in which more deaths were reported than in the corresponding month of the previous year. The total for the first nine months of this year is 52,000, an increase of 800 per cent over a similar period last year.

The nine-month tally is a new high for that span of time. The former record, set in 1937, was 28,139.

With figures for the last three months still to be tallied, fatalities are expected to total the full-year record of 59,000 before 1956.

### Arctic Rocket Research Now Being Started

P. F. CHURCHILL, Manitoes, Nov. 2 (AP)—Up from the Arctic plain, scientists are sending the inquisitive eye of the rocket to sniff at the secrets of space.

The first of a scheduled "shoot" of a rocket—each will probably be high as 200 miles—the first altitudes over Hudson bay have been set.

These initial firings are preliminary to the formal opening of the 18-month long international geophysical year starting next July.

More research rockets will be launched from this base than from any other of the many IGY centers operated by American scientists in the far corners of the world.

The most ambitious of the high-altitude rocket research of the ionosphere has been conducted in the lower and warm latitude of New Mexico. But now scientists have come to suspect that some of the best answers in questions about the ionosphere's influence on weather and electrical-communication systems may be found in the Arctic.

The ionosphere is that part of the atmosphere which begins about 30 miles above the world's surface.

It is the realm of the aurora borealis—the "northern lights." Scientists think these may be tell-tale signs which indicate the impact of the ionosphere of cosmic sources of high energy rays from the sun.

And even across this area flow air masses from the far north polar regions which set the pattern of weather for the farms and cities to the south.

The launcher for the Arctocade—the rocket and higher flying of the two rockets types used here—stands in an aluminum-shed building with a pyramidal-shaped roof and a tall tube reaching 120 feet above the pit-on-which-the-tails-of-the-rocket rest at the base of the tower.

Also in an aluminum building, which is the launcher for the Cajon rocket may be found here is a conventional ramp used for Nike anti-aircraft missiles and loaned by the army to the scientists.

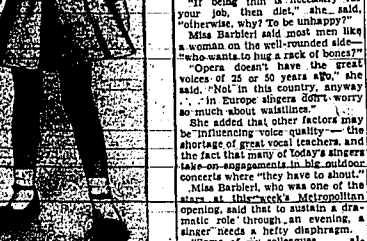

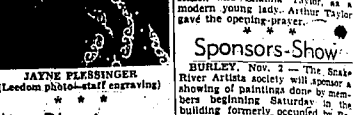

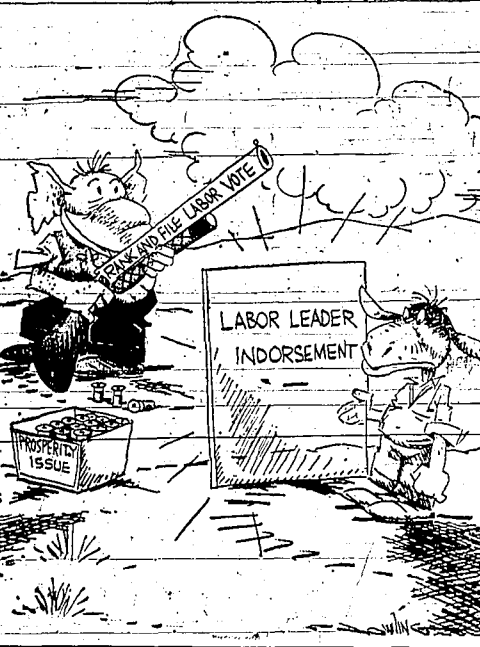

### Farmers' Technical Efficiency Hailed as Base for Prosperity

BAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 2.—Earl Coke, vice president of the Bank of America, said today the technical efficiency of the nation's farmers provides a "sound base" for long-term growth of America's economy and standard of living.

Coke told the convention of the Western Growers' association that the technical advancement of agriculture during the past two decades is unmatched in any other major agricultural area of the world.

"So rapid has been this progress, stimulated as it was by the urgent needs for food and fiber during the war and postwar period," he said, "that it has in some measure contributed to the embarrassing and price-depressing surpluses of some farm products."

"This technical progress resulted in increasing efficiency of production, processing and distributing agricultural products. It provides a sound base for the long-term growth of our economy and our ever-increasing standard of living."

Coke, who is a former assistant U. S. secretary of agriculture, also pointed out that the number of persons needed to provide the nation's food has declined from 200,000 to 6,000,000, despite the increase in the country's population.

"This trend is most likely to continue," he said, "as a result, an ever-increasing portion of the country's working force will be freed to produce the other goods and services which contribute so much to our American way of life."

He said farmers must be alert to guard against "stimulants and soothing devices that originate primarily from political considerations."

"These devices may, as they live in the past, prolong or create problems for agriculture, not solve them."

### American Diplomats Angry at Manner In Which 2 'Allies' Hoodwinked Them

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—Additional details have come to light on how British diplomats kept American diplomats in the dark about plans for military action against Egypt.

The British maneuvering was presented strongly, and cables still in humming between Washington and London trying to get things back on the track after a virtual complete breakdown in diplomatic contacts.

As reconstructed by American authorities, here is what happened: Secretary of State John Foster Dulles became alarmed at the ominous signs of trouble building up in the Middle East. Envoys in London and Paris were asked to find out what was going on.

When they made contact with the British and French foreign offices, American diplomats got no inkling that a big power play was shaping up. And some information obtained now is described as "misleading."

Recently, according to American sources, British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd passed the word to Dulles that he planned to see him in advance of the Nov. 12 meeting of the U. N. general assembly.

The purpose of the meeting, it is said, would have been to discuss a "peaceful" solution of the Suez crisis. Dulles thought it was a trick. He was not, however, to be hoodwinked. He had already been advised by U. S. Ambassador to London, W. Phillips Aldrich, that British diplomats "had been confronted by the British States with evidence that British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd gave a deliberately misleading account of events to American ambassadors in London, W. Phillips Aldrich."

They said Dulles' "reading" showed a British diplomat here an account of what Lloyd had told Aldrich the day before. This was after word of the British-French ultimatum to Egypt and Israel had been received in Washington through press reports.

Lloyd conferred in London with Aldrich Monday morning, the day before the British and French started military action against Egypt.

The British diplomat complained about American plans to put the Israeli aggression against Egypt before the U. N. security council. But he gave no hint, officials say, that he would move against Suez under consideration the day.

Officials confirmed a report (New York Herald-Tribune) that British diplomats "have been confronted by the British States with evidence that British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd gave a deliberately misleading account of events to American ambassadors in London, W. Phillips Aldrich."

The largest offer in the 44-tract sector of the reservation is \$1.2 million for a tract with 4,100 acres, with a bonus of \$120,000 offered by Pure Oil-Sun Oil.

Tract 1a Popular

The highest bid per acre was offered for the same tract, No. 164, at \$100 per acre.

On the 52 tracts offered, the bonuses totaled \$27,476,210.95. Tribal officials said these figures are not necessarily final as bids may be re-examined.

Of the bonuses, \$45,874,438 would go to the Indian allotment trust which does not belong to the tribe. The bonus payments to the Navahos will receive rental on the land of value of 12 1/2 percent and will receive mineral products.
