 Party for full-time work at the world's longest job. Does the nation want Vice President Nixon for its commander in chief?  
 In addition to his address from the Chicago Stadium, Eisenhower issued a statement another of his "major affirmations" to guide his administration if he is elected.  
 He outlined a program of irrigation, power development, soil conservation, minerals policy and river basin development to replace what

he called the Eisenhower administration's "sorry record of give-aways."  
 Among other things, he called for "stabilizing and cheaper power" from all sources and for federal leadership "in the development of atomic power."  
 Proceeding—the Stevenson speech—his supporters lined up a tremendous parade in his honor—a 2½ mile procession from the Chicago Loop to the Stadium, a procession with flares, floats and fireworks and thousands of marchers.  
 Vice President Nixon, who got his last major address Friday night at Hershey, Pa., put in a day of whistling across Ohio by train before awaking back to Washington on an overnight run.  
 Nixon's Democratic rival, Sen. Kefauver, boarded a train for the first

time in some 34,000 miles of campaigning for an 18-stop marathon stint through eastern Minnesota.  
 The Tennessee senator traveled through the state, with a scheduled-in-advance speech sounding an old refrain.  
 The Eisenhower administration, Kefauver said, has been "favoring big business interests."  
 "The favored big business interests," he said, "can have anything they want from all reserves or the best deal since to a walter of the government's claims and rights to assets of a storage company in trouble on its obligations to the government."  
 While the other principals in the great political battle were pretty much coasting, Kefauver figured on turning up in St. Louis Sunday.

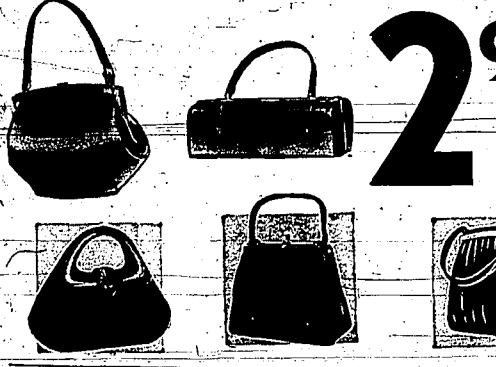
**Penalty Asked**

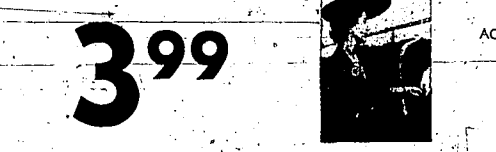

The law amendments in respect to the probate and justice courts. The best of the amendments was the 1954 meeting, approved during the 1954 meeting, and the recommendations of the committee and the legislative committee instructions to draft legislation and submit it to the state legislature.

It should be noted that in the majority of the voters favoring the amendments the state legislature must enact legislation before amendments become a part of the constitution.

While few voters are in doubt regarding their choice for President, many indicate they have not made their choice for Idaho's junior U.S. senator. The three-way race has supporters, Democrat Herman Weiker, Democrat Frank Church and one-time senator, Cletis Taylor, running as a write-in candidate, all bidding for the senate seat.

The detailed Taylor by 2000 votes in the primary and recently Taylor announced himself as a write-in candidate.

Republican incumbent H. A. M. Hodge is up for reelection against Democrat John W. Reynolds in the second district.

On the state level, Carl D. Irwin, Republican incumbent, is opposed by Don D. Gibbs, Democrat.

Candidates and their party for state representatives from this district are Harry E. Turner, C. W. Collier and Kenneth Self, all Republicans, against Democrats Luke V. Bonner, James L. Barnes and Aker B. Wilson.

On the county level the Republicans are running a near complete slate of candidates for all 14 justices of the peace and seven constable positions on either side of the county. On the other side of the county two candidates for county office and two for justice of the peace. They have for candidates for the constable positions:

Paul H. Crow, Republican incumbent, is running unopposed for county commissioner for the second district in third district, Cletis Taylor, Republican, is running against Russell Larsen, Democrat, in the second district. Republican, appointed to fill the unexpired term of Jess Carlton, is running unopposed for justice of the peace.

Brevet M. Sweeley and Ross J. Williams, Republicans, are running for reelection as probate judge and treasurer, respectively. The Democratic party competition for the Republicans for the office of prosecuting attorney, James M. Cunningham for opposition to the election and is opposed by J. Dean Mosher, Democrat.

No opposition is evidenced on the official ballot by the Democrats to the reelection of Clifford Thompson as county assessor. Dr. J. Woodson Reed, appointed to fill the unexpired term of Dr. E. H. Bailey, is running for election as county assessor on the Republican ticket.

John E. Hayes, Republican, is seeking election as county surveyor and has no opposition listed on the Democrat ticket.

The election of two justices of the peace for the Twin Falls justice court has created interest in the area. Three candidates aspire to the position. Democrat, incumbent J. O. Pumphrey is opposed for one of the seats by Republican Claude Brown, Jr. and incumbent William Bakes.

In other precincts in Twin Falls county, Jess O. Eastman and C. Z. Rudy, both incumbent Republicans, are running without Democratic opposition for justices of the peace of the Buhl precinct.

For the Castleford precinct, Mrs. Anna Williams, Democrat, is the only candidate for office.

At Piler, Republican incumbent E. A. Atkinson is the only candidate as is E. J. Henlock, Hollister, and Ray E. Dotter—Kimberly. Neither party named a candidate for justice of the peace at Murrumbidgee.

Republicans Charles Burbank and Parley Harmon are running for the offices of Buhl and Castleford, respectively.

# Missing Prisoner Is Found in Dixie

MIAMI, Fla., Nov. 3 (AP)—The federal bureau of investigation announced today that it has found Jesse Woods, missing from the Wildwood city jail since Sunday, in Andalusia, Ala.

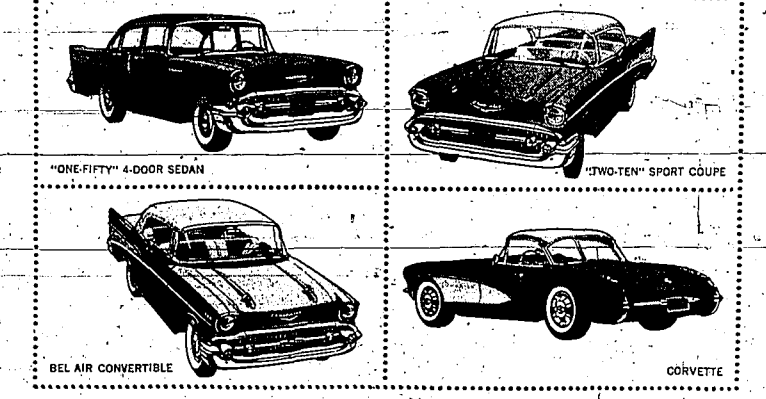

BUDAPEST, Nov. 3 (AP)—Hungarian engineers and troops tried for the fourth time today to gain the entrance to a secret underground fortress where half a dozen "prisoners" were being held out of sight.

Officials said for a way to get into the bunker's ventilation system, but they were unable to find the door.

Some of Hungary's best engineers joined troops in digging for an underground entrance. The thick-walled, three-story fortress was built under Kocelraszlag (underground) by the former Stalinist regime.

Leaders of the Hungarian rebellion and communists have used the bunker as a prison for political opponents for the past several years.

"I believe secret police and hard-communist leaders plan to hold out in the fortress, holding as hostages twice their number of political prisoners, who were there before the revolution started. No one knows how many people may be inside."

### Humphrey Says Dollar Is Sound

CLEVELAND, Nov. 3 (AP)—Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey said Friday night the Eisenhower administration has established "as sound a dollar as this country ever had."

"The money of our people during this administration has stayed sound because our government has been doing the things we said we would do in fiscal and monetary policy to stimulate confidence and incentive," Humphrey declared.

Tentative plans for a trip to Salt Lake City Sunday threatened their perfect voting record, so the Andersons voted by absentee ballot to preserve it. The trip was canceled later.

Anderson, a retired railroad man, has picked the railroad in nearly every presidential election with one notable exception. "I voted for William Jennings Bryan all three times the ran and lost," he says. "He was a fine man and would have made a great President."

In his 68 years of voting, Anderson has supported candidates of both major parties, although he indicated that in this election, as in 1952, he had supported Eisenhower and Nixon.

Anderson has made a concerted effort to keep informed throughout his voting career. Referring to the present Egyptian crisis, he said: "I hope Eisenhower can keep us out of war until this is settled by the United Nations. I believe that nations can agree to disagree, but I'm against their disagreements leading to wars."

He recalled the colorful rallies of former campaigns in which the politicians' wearing stovepipe hats decorated to designate their party affiliations: p a r t y through the towns and meeting places in their campaigning.

"Modern politicians seem to be too busy sneering at each other," he said. "They should keep their campaigns at a higher level."

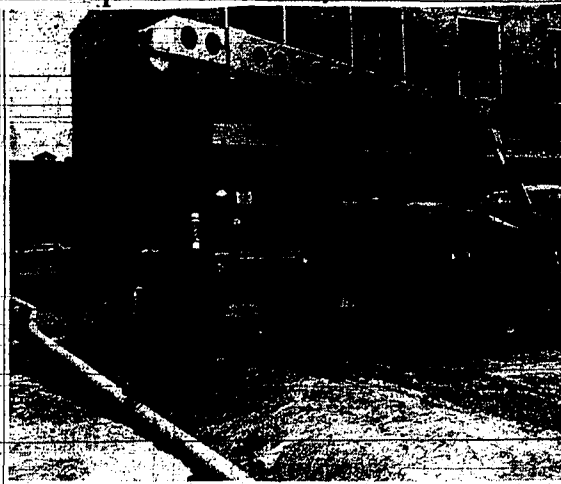

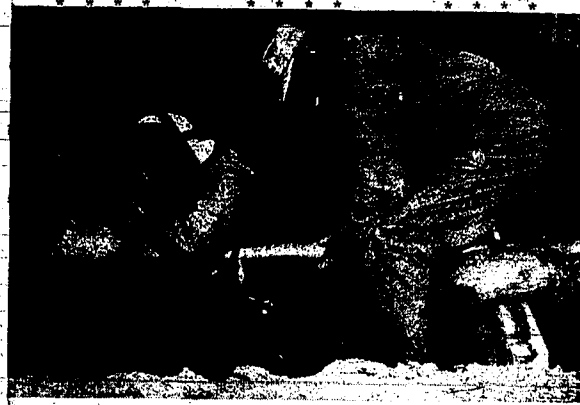
### Crews Work to Install Miles of Gas Pipeline Around City

### Weather Material Shortages Hamper Gas Pipeline Project

About 25,000 feet of gas pipeline have been laid within the Twin Falls area since the Universal Pipeline Constructors, the firm contracted by Intermountain Gas company to lay the pipe in communities from Glenns Ferry east to Georgetown, reports Fred Preston, superintendent of local construction.

Pipe laying in the area has been hampered by a shortage of materials and by inclement weather, Preston added. When completed, the pipeline in Twin Falls will total slightly under 430,000 feet.

"We originally had planned to begin Sept. 1 and hoped to be finished by Dec. 1," Preston continued. "We didn't start, however, until two weeks ago and with bad weather ahead, we estimate now that it will take about six months to complete the job."

He also blamed the torn-up streets in the city on the weather. "If we could have a week of sunshine," he said, "we could finish repairs on every street and alley where pipe has been laid."

"Before the firm can obtain a release from the city, it must restore all streets and alleys affected by the pipe laying to as good or better condition than they were before," Preston reported.

"The final approval and release will be given by Joseph Latimore, city manager."

"We realize that our operations have inconvenienced the people of Twin Falls, particularly in the downtown districts," he said, "but we are making every effort to make accessible as soon as possible those streets and alleys in which we have laid pipe."

In residential areas, Preston said, many streets can be bored through for laying pipe. "In the downtown area, however," he continued, "there are so many wires, cables, manholes and other obstacles that we have to dig up the streets."

The firm employs three crews in the city and hopes to start a fourth operating in the near future. "Under optimum conditions," Preston said, "a crew can lay up to 2,000 feet of pipe a day."

After the metal pipe arrives in Twin Falls, it is cleaned inside and out before being coated with enamel. An asphalt coating is then applied and let dry. The asphalt is then wrapped in sheets of fibreglass.

When the pipe has dried and has been checked electronically for flaws, it is taken by truck and delivered along-the-routes of the line to be laid.

A ditch is dug for the pipe with a wheel-type trenching machine. For crossing sidewalks and streets, the firm uses pavement-breaking machines. After the trench has been dug, the pipe is welded together.

By using air pressure, the constructors then blow a whirling brush through the inside of the pipe to remove any foreign objects which may have become lodged within it.

Air is forced through the pipe and it is coated with soap to check for leaks. When one is formed in the pipe, bubbles are present on its surface.

After removing the soap, the welded joints are sealed and the pipe is again checked electronically for any weak spots. If none is found, the pipe is lowered into the trench and covered up by a grader.

Construction crews follow as closely behind the grader as possible to restore the original appearance of the street or alley.

"Some say we spend too much time checking and rechecking our pipe before installation," reported Preston. "We don't think so. Once we put our pipe in, we want it to be a long, long time before we have to dig it up for repairs."

"When we work in a community, we try to become a part of it," said Preston. "Our payroll in the Twin Falls area, for instance, is \$17,000 per week, in addition to the supplies which we purchase locally."

He indicated that PUO is "strongly" considering establishing a permanent office in Twin Falls, if there is enough work to warrant it—and that there will be.

Nearly all the pipe presently being installed is part of the grid system, which is a framework of pipes in six- and four-inch diameters to supply gas to the lateral system which will connect to individual homes and firms using gas and will be installed later.

### Polio Is Reported In Revolt Regions

MUNICH, Germany, Nov. 3 (AP)—An epidemic of polio in northeastern Hungary was reported here today.

Radio Free Europe picked up the reports, coupled with an appeal for medical help from the Hungarian rebel radio Miskolc. The report said 150 persons were "stricken" in the area and that 30 children had died from the disease.

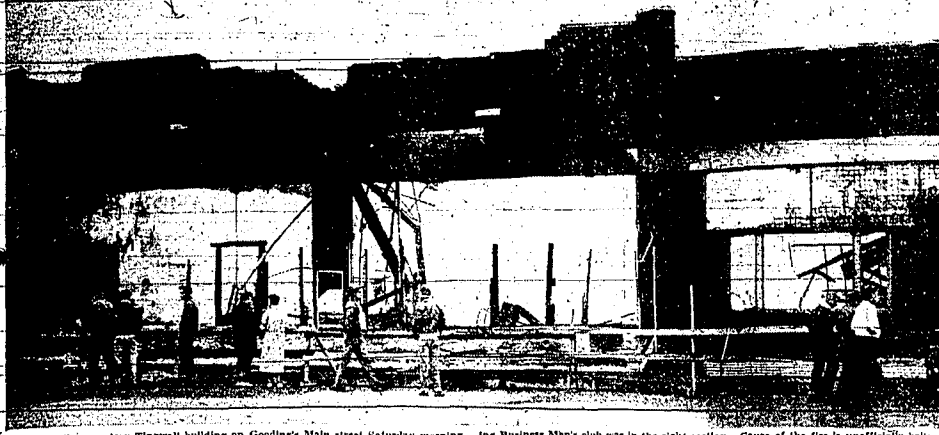

### Former State Solon Scores Amendments

A former state senator charged Saturday a proposed amendment to the 1935 ballot which would allow "anybody" to succeed the incumbent as "socialistic."

Fred C. Reynolds, Fairfield, said he was "compelled to take issue with State Republican - Chairman James R. Gossett, Gooding, on the four-year term for governor."

"I am for the two-year term and let the governor succeed himself so long as he can fool the voters," Reynolds said. "If you have a good governor, the people can reelect him. If a poor governor, he can be defeated in two years. Especially if he doesn't know the value of money. Sometimes it doesn't pay to let a governor finish his program."

"Besides," Reynolds continued, "having the hold-over election every two years to elect our congressmen so it doesn't save the taxpayer any money. It only creates more interest in an election as the politicians are crying for every one to get out."

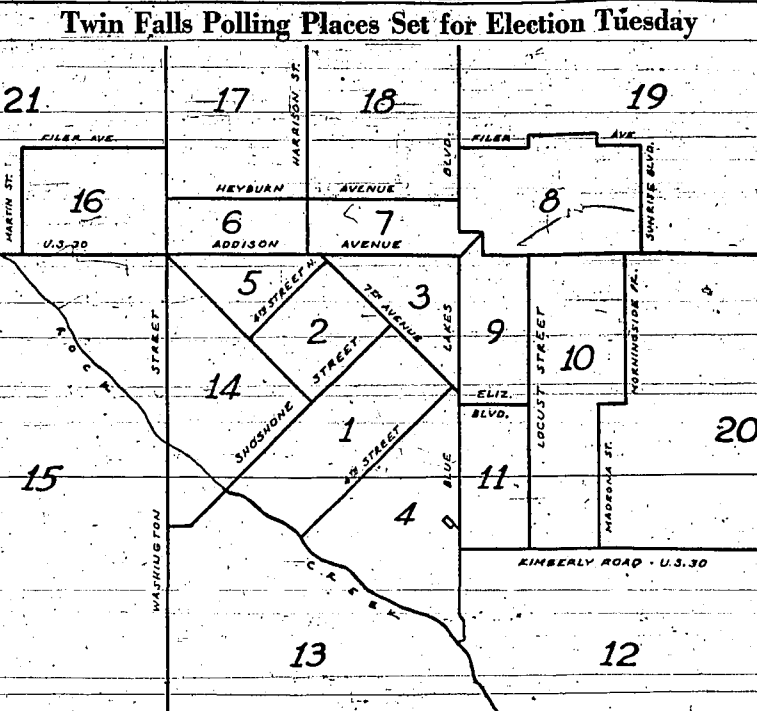
"The next amendment, to set out jury resolution No. 6, makes it possible for the legislature to take joint office of the ballot, then the party in power can appoint their people, taking more power from the people."

"SJR No. 4 would allow the legislature to fix without limitations the limits upon which financial cases may be brought in court. It means cutting off the dog's tail an inch at a time," Reynolds asserted.

"The next thing is amending tax collectors and commissioners and all other elected officers will have limitations to cut their ways of thinking instead of a due course of law. Now if we are going to take the power from the voters, let us cut the dog's tail off behind the ears instead of an inch at a time."

"The above amendments would make the new and fair deal bluish."

"If you want any power, you take down this socialist form of government-amendments," Reynolds said. "Just elect a governor and make him run the state."

The new husker room will be approximately 50 by 100 feet, while the canning plant section will measure about 65 by 90 feet. Walker said he said the amount of the contract "is in the vicinity of \$200,000."

Reynolds and Walker will begin work on the building immediately, Walker added.

## Magic Valley Tours

### Three Small Areas Provide Quarry for Large Number of Anglers and Hunters

Surrounded by some of the best hunting and fishing areas in southern Idaho are three small tracts dedicated exclusively to supplying the quarry of sportsmen.

Located in Hagerman valley, north of the Snake river crossing on highway 30, are two fish hatcheries and a game refuge. Immediately after crossing the bridge is the game refuge. Into this 700-acre tract flock thousands of birds each year, either to rest on their southward journey or to seek sanctuary from the shotgun patrolling the riverbanks.

During the hunting season, those unacquainted with the area can find the refuge easily by the frustrated duck hunters traveling the highway along the border to watch their quarry preen and rest within easy gun shot range.

A major product of the refuge is Canada geese. Each year, between 7,000 and 12,000 are raised there for planting in less friendly areas.

H. E. Cherry is superintendent of the refuge, which includes nine man-made ponds planted heavily with bulle and bull rush.

Each December, those ponds become headquarters for an estimated 16,000 ducks plus a small number of geese. Year round residents include 15 Canada geese. Although these are relatively tame, visitors are warned against teasing the birds.

One hunker has a habit of attacking. Adjoining the refuge is the state fish hatchery, which provided entertainment for anglers this season to the tune of 132,000 pounds of fish. This is more than 500,000 legal size trout.

Reports on last year's plantings include 823,000 rainbow trout, 12,000 brook and 25,000 Golden brown trout. These fish were freed in lengths of six to 10 inches, depending on the weather and conditions of the area in which the fish are distributed.

Providing "gull" on the anglers' and is a long and costly process. The eggs are brought from American Falls or purchased from commercial hatcheries. The incubation is completed in 28 tanks from November through March. The eggs are set in the fish appear, followed in a week by the " fry." When the minnow reaches an inch in length it is called a fingerling and remains so, even to the time it is put in the fryling pan by the fisherman's wife.

During the "growing up" period, the fish receive pellets and meal, supplemented by such meat items as beef lungs, liver and salmon viscera. The use of meal, introduced as an economic measure, also provides more rapid growth.

This state hatchery has more than a mile in receiving, where the "fingerling" spends his adolescence. There are eight concrete raceways and 10 earth raceways with gravel bottoms. After reaching a certain length, the fish are transplanted into four large rearing ponds.

Water is piped in from Tucker springs, which arises from a bluff one-fourth mile from the plant. This water maintains a year round temperature of 49 degrees.

Grimes estimates that 5,000 persons visit the hatchery each year.

The operation demands full-time employment of six men with more added during the busy seasons.

Across the road, the federal government has availed itself of Thousand Springs water. Jack Chipman is superintendent of this plant that produced 182,000 pounds of trout this year. Of this total, 25 per cent was sent for the enjoyment of Ne-

## Final

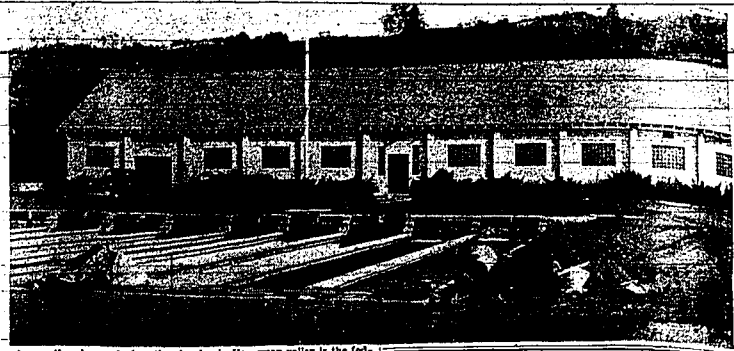
There are three man made lakes on the state property, which are stocked by the state and federal hatcheries for public fishing. However, the junior anglers, up to 14 years of age, receive the edge as they are eligible to fish Riley creek, which produces most of the "whoopies" caught in this area.

Also of interest in this vicinity are two Idaho Power company dams, Upper Salmon falls dam, located one mile downstream from Owyhee bridge, has a capacity of 37,000 kilowatts. The first two units of the dam were constructed in 1937 and had a 20,000 kilowatt capacity. In 1947, the other two units were added, tipping the output to 57,000 kilowatts.

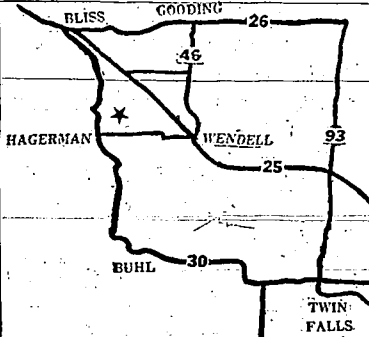
From the regulating dam located at the head of Upper Salmon falls, the water is diverted through a 4,400-foot canal which carries water to both plants. Public park and picnic area are maintained by the company as a public service.

The other dam, Lower Salmon falls, is the older brother and was built in 1910. This old power plant was put out of use in 1949, when a new dam was constructed.

Standing 105 feet high, the new power plant generates 68,000 kilowatts. The retooling created a lake seven miles long. It provides excellent fishing and boating for the public.

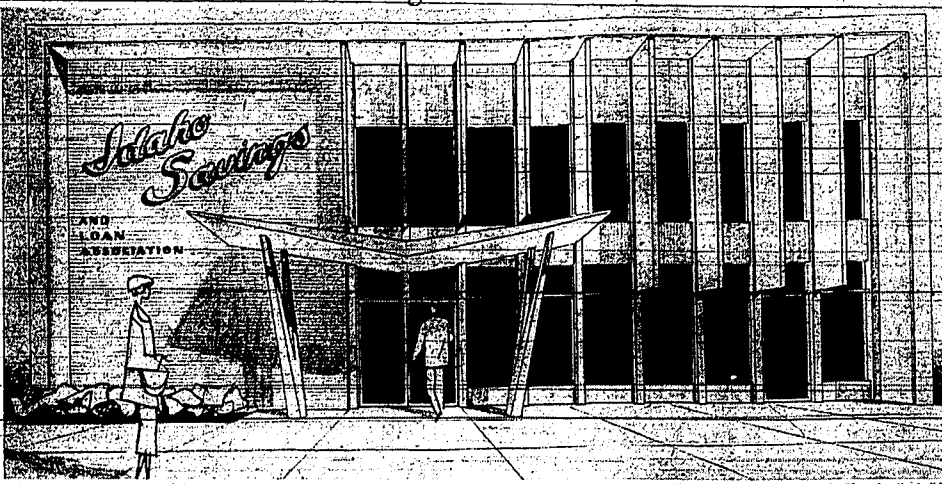

### Railroads and Unions Reach Contract Pact

**WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)**—The national mediation board has announced that the nation's railroad and 11 non-operating unions, representing some 700,000 workers, have reached agreement on a long-term wage contract.

The mediation board said the new contract calls for a first-year wage increase of 10 cents an hour, effective Nov. 1, and another seven cents an hour Nov. 1, 1957.

**Other Benefits**

Unions agreed to apply an additional 2 1/2-cent-an-hour wage increase or 2 1/2 cents a month per employee, at the cost of an employer, for dependent hospital medical and surgical bills.

Secretary said a cost-of-living benefit clause is provided which will raise wage rates to fluctuations in the bureau of labor statistics consumer price index. Pay rates will increase or decrease one cent an hour for each one-half point change in the price index, with the current index of 117.1 at a base.

**Adjustments**

Adjustments which may be necessary under this part of the agreement will be made beginning May 1, 1957, and each six months thereafter, negotiators said.

Railroad representatives placed the first-year cost of the agreement at \$30 million dollars when extending it to cover both non-operating and operating employees. The two-subsequent seven-cent-an-hour increase will each add 185 millions to rail cost, the representatives said.

**Goal in mediation** is dispute-free, reflecting some 200,000 operating railmen — the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and the Switchmen's Union of North America.

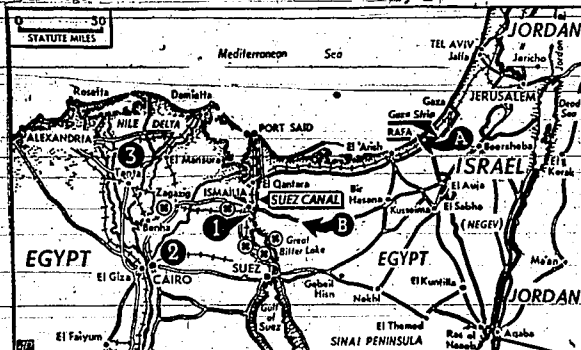

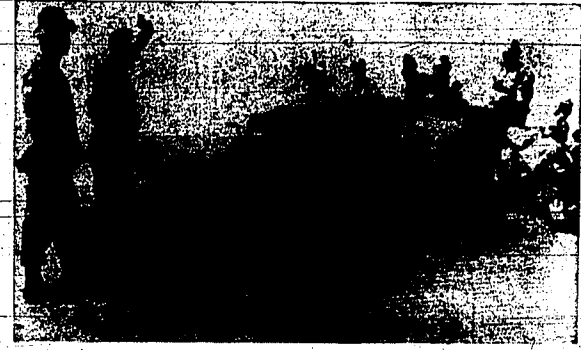

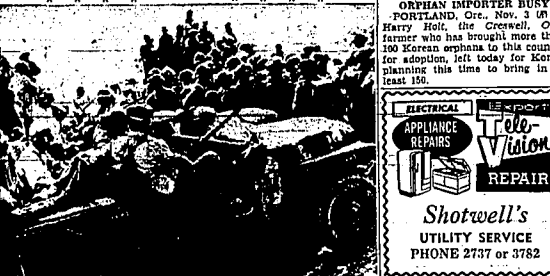

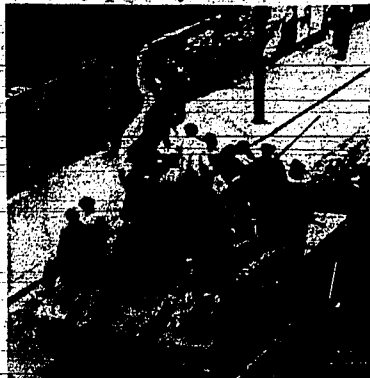

**Hungary Gets Offer of Help**  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)—A picture of support for the Hungarian fight for freedom, President Eisenhower Friday offered 20 million dollars worth of food and medical supplies to the people of Hungary.  
The action appeared to challenge the Soviet government to permit the supplies to move freely into Hungary, Soviet military formations, at least reports, control Hungarian airfields and presumably could be in position to prevent delivery of large quantities of food if they wish to do so where the supplies are made available there.  
However, an American Red Cross statement did not speak of any difficulty in getting supplies of food and medicines to Hungary.
