RUSSIAN TROOPS STRIKES EGYPT

Russian Troops Occupy All Hungary

Rebel Remnants in Nation Still Fight Huge Soviet Force

VIENNA, Nov. 5 (AP)—Hungarian rebel remnants fought on in isolated actions today against the Soviet military tide that has flooded out the remnants of anti-Russian revolt fighters give up their arms by 6 p. m. (10 a. m. MST), of face courtmartial apparently was ignored. Communist and rebel radio broadcasts alike told of continued shooting in the warfare set off by the lightning Soviet attack that deposed Premier Imre Nagy's national-minded coalition government yesterday.

Britain, France Okay U.N. Plan; Go on Fighting

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Nov. 5 (AP)—Britain and France today accepted United Nations plans for an international police force in the Middle East but said their military action in Egypt will continue until the Egyptians and Israelis also agree.

Israel asked the U. N. to obtain clarification of Egypt's recent willingness to enter into a cease-fire providing the U. N. forces in the demand.

The general assembly scheduled a meeting for 8 p. m. EST to hear the British and French replies to the U. N. cease-fire demand.

Secretary-General Jan Thomsen received a joint communication from Britain and France and another from Israel there was no word from Egypt on the establishment of an international police force.

Britain and France suggested an early meeting of the security council, attended by foreign ministers, to work out an over-all peace settlement in the Middle East.

General Sir Bernard Freyberg, British and French commander in chief, said today that his troops are working out an over-all peace settlement in the Middle East.

British Ambassador Sir Piers Dixon filed a letter on behalf of Britain and France saying they were in support of the U. N. plan for an international force to be interposed as a shield between Israel and Egypt, pending Palestine settlement of the question of the Suez canal.

British Claim Port Said to Surrender; Charge Is Refuted

LONDON, Nov. 5 (AP)—Britain and France invaded Egypt with paratroops today and by nightfall the British said the commander of Port Said was discussing surrender terms.

The blitz assault from the skies flamed briefly into tough fighting at Port Said, sole object of the initial Anglo-French attack, and suddenly ended, the British said, with cease-fire ordered. Egypt denied its garrison at Port Said had offered to surrender. A communique broadcast in Cairo said "the armed forces and the people are fighting with great determination despite the air-bombing to which they have been subjected throughout the day."

Sir Anthony Eden made the dramatic announcement in commonsense of what could mean a quick victory at Port Said.

"I have had a flash signal from the commander-in-chief in the eastern Mediterranean," Eden said. "It says: 'Governor and military commander' Port Said now discussing surrender terms with British commander' Brigadier Butler. Ceasefire ordered."

There was no immediate word whether a ceasefire might apply to all of Egypt. A great emphasis at once was placed in the case of the canal, prepared to launch a mass attack at any time.

The British said they had blasted at Port Said at the outset. Tanks, mortars and machine-guns were used against the port. The British said dawn on Port Said. Cairo officials claimed one Anglo-French force had been annihilated at an airfield.

A second "large" wave of French paratroops struck in mid-afternoon. A short time later came the announcement that the British had taken Port Said.

Kimberly Man Dies In Mishap on Farm

KIMBERLY, Nov. 5.—Orson Floyd Jones, 70, a Kimberly farmer for the past 43 years, was crushed to death Sunday morning by his farm when his clothes became entangled in a power takeoff on a tractor and boot loader.

Mr. Jones, route 1, Kimberly, was digging beets in a field east of his home when the accident occurred. His farm is located three and one-half miles east of Twin Falls on highway 30.

Joe McCleeny, son-in-law of Mr. Jones, drove up to the tractor in a beet truck shortly after Mr. Jones' death. He saw the clothes which pulled him between the drive line and elevator digger.

Sheriff James E. Benham says he believes Mr. Jones stepped off the tractor and his clothes became caught in the power takeoff. His clothing was wrapped around the shaft, stopping the big tractor. A guard on the shaft had been removed earlier and had not been replaced.

McCleeny ran to a field across the highway and summoned Milton Ballard and Robert Niven. They ran over to help and later called Sheriff Benham and Dr. Glenn Hoan.

When they arrived Mr. Jones was dead.

Funeral services will be conducted at 2:30 p. m. Wednesday at the Kimberly Methodist church by the Rev. W. A. MacArthur. Concluding rites will be held in the cemetery in park under the direction of White mortuary. The family suggests memorial church-building fund.

Tax Collection in Idaho Increasing

BOISE, Nov. 5 (AP)—Idaho's general fund took in \$2,047,881 more in taxes between July 1 and Oct. 31 than it did during the corresponding period of 1935, state Tax Collector P. G. Neill reported today.

Income taxes accounted for almost the entire revenue boost, giving \$2,015,000 more to the state than they did during the same four-month period last year.

Stevenson charged in his final campaign speech that the Republican chief executive "doesn't know what's going on, and doesn't care enough to find out."

"And negligence is precisely what we have been getting," Stevenson declared.

Stevenson's speech was prepared for delivery at a Minneapolis breakfast rally. He came here by train from Chicago during the night, after a brief stop at St. Paul, Minn., to fly to Boston to see his first grandson, a 10, 7 or boy born yesterday to his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Nancy Stevenson.

He charged that the President was at his Gettysburg, Pa. home, when Egypt took over the Suez canal in the middle of the hydrogen bomb crisis.

"No one is buying the President's lies," he said. "He is a full-time job," Stevenson said.

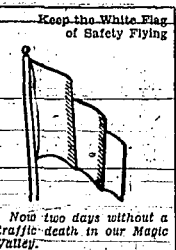

Matthews, Burley, John Garro, Rupert; Ernest Hogan, Pocatello; L. Skinner, Nounan; Cy Young, St. Anthony; Ed Blaworthy, Idaho Falls; and Floyd J. Whelan, Latah, all directors.

The conference will be the first since the federal incentive payments have been made and will show what effect the new program has had on the wool industry.

Anglo-French Acted First to Defeat Nasser

By Associated Press

Britain and France attacked Egypt because they felt they must stop President Gamal Abdel Nasser before he became too late.

British prime minister Anthony Eden and French Premier Guy Mollet, it is indicated, were convinced that Nasser was a potential "time bomb" in the reason why they attacked in defiance of the United Nations and risked their alliance with the United States.

Eden and Mollet are not trigger-happy men. They appear to have decided they had to set off what they hoped would be a brief, limited explosion to prevent a bigger one later on.

The situation goes far beyond Nasser's seizure of the Suez canal. Eden and Mollet saw their entire position in the Middle East threatened by Nasser's ambitions.

They felt that Nasser had made it plain that he aspired to be the master of the Arab world. They do not have felt that if that happened, the enormous allied oil interests in the Middle East—which involve American interests—would be jeopardized.

Larger Cities' Votes Present Top Question

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (AP)—The big cities provide one of the big question marks in tomorrow's presidential elections.

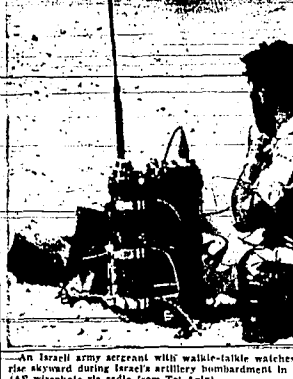
Republicans are banking on holding off increasing the gains registered in 1952 to help reelect President Eisenhower. Democrats are hoping for a return to the normal voting pattern in these cities, which generally have been Democratic bastions.

Of the 35 U. S. cities with populations above 300,000, Eisenhower carried 17 in 1952 and Adlai E. Stevenson, the Democratic nominee, won 18. The total population of these cities represents about 20 percent of the national figure.

Mr. Eisenhower's vote in the 35 was 47.3 percent of the two-party vote compared to 42.5 for Thomas E. Dewey, the GOP candidate in the 1948 election. Dewey carried only four—Cincinnati, O.; Indianapolis, Ind.; San Diego, Calif.; and Rochester, N. Y.

Among the cities with population in excess of one million, Mr. Eisenhower carried only Los Angeles. Stevenson carried New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, and Detroit.

Store of Oil Is Threatened by Arabs' Actions

LONDON, Nov. 5.—One-fourth of the world's entire oil production has been cut off or endangered today by the war in the Middle East.

Arab nationalists were blowing up pipelines running across the desert from oil fields to ports. A pair of smoke 10,000 feet high was reported in Syria over the pipeline of the British-controlled Iraq oil company.

U. S. Areas III

Cairo radio said American-owned oil installations also had been destroyed or damaged. It said the Bahrain Petroleum company, a subsidiary of the Caltex company, had its pipelines set afire and destroyed. The pipelines of the Arabian American oil company in Saudi Arabia were said to have been damaged in three places.

However, the New York office of Aramco reported yesterday that its pipeline running from Saudi Arabia to the Mediterranean, with a capacity of 215,000 barrels a day, is still open.

Need Grows

With the Suez canal blocked, the world tanker fleet was woefully inadequate to supply Europe's needs. The journey around the African coast is nearly twice as long as the Suez route and, even before the current trouble began, there was a shortage of tankers.

British gasoline stations today had a run-on sale prompted by the belief that gasoline rationing may be near.

Fires Feared

The cutting of oil pipelines was considered not so grave as the possibility that fanatics might set afire the oilfields themselves. The fields are spread over hundreds of thousands of square miles and dotted with widely spaced wells. While pipelines can be repaired, such fires would be extremely difficult to quench.

The fireup had placed in jeopardy billions of dollars of American, British, French and Dutch investments in the world's largest-known ocean of oil. The income from oil royalties is vital, too, to the Arab states. The KSA is buying 200 million dollars annually to Saudi Arabia.

Nasser Cheered

Utahns Expecting Hot Ballot Battle

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 5.—A startling three-way fight for the governorship stirred interest in Utah's general election this week. State predictions today think a new governor might be set in the balloting.

Utah voters choose a complete slate of public officials. They include, besides the governor, all other state executive officers; a United States senator, two representatives in congress; members of the legislature, many county officials, and members of local school boards.

Officials estimated, on the basis of registration, absentee ballots received and the heat generated in the pre-election campaign that the total vote might run to 250,000. That would exceed the present record of 228,554, set in the presidential election in 1952, by more than 20,000.

Scout Awards Ceremony Set

JEROME, Nov. 5.—Some 40 members of the Snake River Council, Boy Scouts of America, will be presented awards here Friday night by Governor Snylle.

Ray Baugh, district Scout executive, estimates between 500 and 600 Scouts from throughout Magic Valley will be honored at the affair which begins at 8 p. m. in the Jerome high school gymnasium.

In addition to three awards, Governor Snylle will present eagle, 16-boy, and 16-girl plaques.

Baugh explains this 40 per cent program was instituted and is headed by Governor Snylle as a service to the boy in Scouting. The program, which was introduced to this council last year, has proved an incentive for the boys with very good results, Baugh said.

Many Feel Fallout Plants Time-Bomb In Future Generations; Issue Queried

By ALTON L. BLAKESLEE

Associated Press Science Reporter

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—It is raining active fallout plants a time-bomb in our hereditary—domestic some future children to shortened lives, deformities, and deaths.

If so, how many, and can it be avoided?

These are points at issue in discussions over "banning" fallout tests, and when and how best to prevent nuclear war. They touch upon some known and unknown in the science of genetics, and also involve morality.

"Looking at some main aspects of facts and opinions on questions involving heredity and fallout,"

Q. How is human hereditary determined?

A. By genes, or carriers of characteristics, in the sex germ cells, the eggs and sperm. The genes you inherit determine color of eyes and hair, height, susceptibility to some illnesses, many other things about you.

Q. How does radioactivity affect sex cells and heredity?

A. X-rays and other radiations, and certain chemicals, can make genes change or mutate if they strike the germ cells. The altered genes are then transmitted to offspring, and then to their offspring.

Q. Are genes changed always occurring in humans naturally?

A. Yes, there are spontaneous mutations. Many are induced by the natural radioactivity around us. But also spontaneous changes can be produced by medical radiation treatments, and actually or potentially by fallout, most geneticists believe.

Q. How much radiation are we getting now from each source?

A. In a study conducted by the Independent National Academy of Sciences, leading geneticists and other experts said:

By age 30—the time at which parents have conceived half of their children—the average person has received this dosage of radiation:

From natural radioactivity which is everywhere—4.3 rads (rads—short for röntgen, a unit of radiation dose); three rads from X-rays and fluoroscopies; three rads from fallout from tests made by other nations.

The current rate, they estimate, is one-half of one röntgen per year from fallout from nuclear radiation exposure.

The NAS study said the 50-year exposure from fallout would be "fair as high—about twice to one-fourth—if tests were made annually at the rate of the two most active test years in 1953 and 1955."

Q. Does this mean that fallout radiation is not important?

A. It shows fallout is not so important relatively to the existing radiation that could produce genetic changes and damage. But it is doing something, which just is considered as a risk.

Q. How little radiation does it take to make human genes change sex cells and heredity?

A. So little that the NAS estimates that it might take up to 100 rads to the sex cells from birth to age 30 to have an appreciable effect upon descendants if a system became a habit at this age.

Q. Are all gene changes caused by radiation bad ones?

A. Yes, so far as is known in virtually all cases, says the National Academy report. "Observable human mutations are believed to be universally harmful." One expert says the changes in health or longevity are usually minor and might not be easily apparent.

Q. Do the genetic changes from fallout radiation cause "brooks"?

A. They can, but this is probably a low level of radiation, such as we are exposed to from all three sources, are more likely to produce "brooks" of shorter lifetimes, than from fallout. Very rare the gene changes would produce serious effects.

Q. Does the human race already "have about" genes?

A. Undoubtedly, says the geneticists, and some point:

Q. What do some leading geneticists say about the risk from fallout?

A. Dr. A. H. Sturtevant, California Institute of Technology, says natural radiation probably produces one in one billion changes per 100,000 germ cells per generation; fallout to date might be creating one per 100,000 germ cells per generation.

Dr. H. J. Muller, Noble prize winner in genetics from Indiana University, says it is false to think there is no danger at all to heredity from fallout, and equally false to say all mutations are being undermined by H-bomb tests, and that tests should therefore be stopped for that reason.

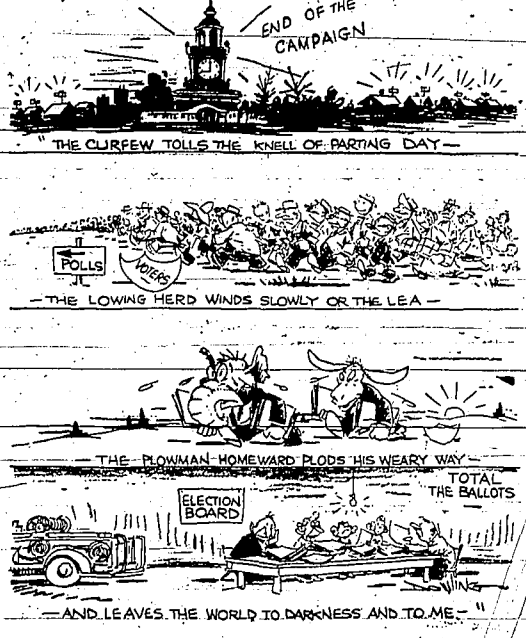

Voters to Pick 103 Members Of Legislature

Idahoans will elect 103 members of the state legislature Tuesday in a contest in which Democrats think they have a good chance to capture control of the senate for the first time since 1942.

Republicans are confident they will retain control of the house, which they have held since early in the 1930s. Their margin in the 1955 election was 35 members to 23 for the Democrats.

The Republican margin in the state senate was 24-20, if the Democrats can hold the number of seats to 24 and pick up three more, they can organize the senate. If the two parties split even, electing 22 members each, Republican Lieut. Gov. J. Berkeley Larsen will cast the deciding vote.

Issues, particularly the sales tax, state school finances have been the only questions which have even approached being issues in most of the legislative races.

No one has come out in favor of the sales tax. Rep. Ralph Wickham, state tax committee head of the interim tax committee, said some months ago the committee would probably have recommended a tax.

Idaho Democrats came out against a sales tax in their platform.

Notice Given To Key Spots For 'Trends'

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (AP)—Election states with more than enough electoral votes to choose the next president will be closely eyed in tomorrow's battle by people looking for an early trend.

Between them they have 306 electoral votes, 30 more than a majority.

Four years ago President Eisenhower carried all of them except one losing Kentucky's 10 electoral votes to Adlai Stevenson by only 700 ballots.

Eisenhower's victory margin was less than 10 per cent of the popular vote in eight of the key states: Illinois, 27 electoral votes, 445,000; Massachusetts, 14 votes, 109,000; Missouri, 13 votes, 70,000; Oklahoma, eight votes, 87,000; Pennsylvania, 22 votes, 210,000; Rhode Island, four votes, 8,000; Tennessee, 11 votes, 2,000; Texas, 24 votes, 134,000.

The 69,000 vote by which the president took Florida's 10 electoral ballots in 1952 was just above 10 per cent of the total vote.

Other states with big electoral votes, or which save the President comparatively slim percentages of the vote in 1952: California, 32 votes, 700,000; Michigan, 20 votes, 317,000; New Jersey, 16 votes, 510,000; New York, 45 votes, 4,800,000; Ohio, 23 votes, 600,000; Virginia, 12 votes, 80,000.

The trend-seekers also will be watching anxiously for early returns from nine states, including Texas, which in past elections seldom have been on the losing side.

Missouri, Montana and Idaho have been in the winner's column in the last 12 presidential elections, dating back to 1860, and voters in New Mexico haven't backed a loser since they became states in 1912. Nevada, too, has been "right" since 1912.

Illinois counties have supported winning presidential candidates in the last 35 elections, dating back to 1800. More than 50 years, others are: Cook in Oregon, Albany in Idaho, Albany in Oregon, Albany in Idaho, and Elmford and Gos in New Hampshire.

The text of the President's message to Bulganin will not be made public until the United States and Russia reach agreement on publishing its contents.

At the same time White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said "new moves" may be undertaken in the United Nations regarding Hungary. Russian armed forces overran Hungary early yesterday and a new pro-Moscow puppet government was installed.

Mine Mishap Toll Now Listed at 37

SPRINGHILL, N. B., Nov. 5 (AP)—Twenty-eight miners, all but given up for dead two days ago, survived Thursday's explosion in the No. 4 Cumberland colliery, the Dominion Coal company announced today.

Thirty-seven other men died.

Shortly after the 8 1/2 man emerged from the mine, early today, a police official at the pithead said there were no more survivors. The company later confirmed this and issued a new list of dead showing there were 34 bodies still in the mine.

The list also indicated that 112 men had been trapped when a blast late last Thursday blocked passages and sent poisonous fumes through the coal mine.

In addition to the 34 dead reported today, 13 others had previously been listed as fatal victims. They included five other miners, six surface workers and two men who succumbed while engaged in rescue work.
