Church Wagon Welker in State Upset

Ike Carries Idaho; Budge, Mrs. Foster Win Seats in House

BOISE, Nov. 7 (AP)—Democrat Frank Church, 32-year-old Boise attorney, overwhelmed incumbent Sen. Herman Welker in the bitter Idaho senatorial battle yesterday, to become the youngest man in the United States senate. His victory fulfilled a prediction by Democratic State Chairman John Glasby who said Church would win by 40,000 to 50,000. The youthful Boise attorney, who carried all but four of the state's 44 counties, had more than a 40,000 margin of victory in incomplete unofficial returns today.

Tottering Truce Being Observed; Tension Is High

LONDON, Nov. 7.—A slinky ceasefire ruled in the Middle East today, but it was clouded by uncertainties which could bring warfare again at any time. Prime Minister Anthony Eden said there was "some shooting" in Port Said today, but no organized fighting. British and French troops were in control and had taken up "defensive positions" along the canal from Port Said to south of Ismailia. Egyptian observers said the ceasefire. Yet it was insisting that United Nations "policing" of the war zone was not possible until Anglo-French and Israeli troops left Egyptian soil.

But, he told hundreds of disappointed voters early in the morning at a big Hotel Conrad Hilton ballroom—and millions who watched on their television sets—"our cause" will ultimately prevail.

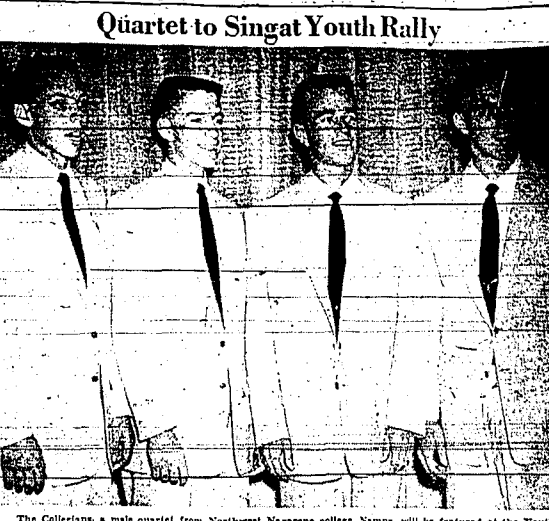

Israeli's Army Gains Victory In Sinai Area

ISRAELI COMMAND POST OVERLOOKING ISMAILIA—Nov. 7.—The main road from Ismailia to Egypt is lined with 46 knocked-out Egyptian tanks and 338 wrecked Egyptian vehicles. Many of the tanks are Soviet T34s.

The wreckage is along the desert highway crossing the center of the Sinai peninsula—a distance of 135 miles from El Agella on the east to just short of Tanta, a point of the Suez canal zone, on the west.

The destruction was caused by Israeli ground and air forces during the four-day advance last week that put the entire Sinai peninsula into their hands.

At Israeli army headquarters on the peninsula, officials said that Egypt's army lost 75 per cent of its fighting equipment in the four days of battles. The Israelis say they have seized their own arsenal by capturing intact hundreds of vehicles and large quantities of arms, ammunition, gasoline and supplies.

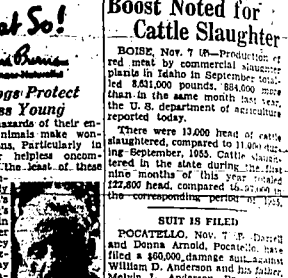

Pentagon Has New Lexicon, Meaning Told

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—The Pentagon is a great inventor of words and phrases—like, for example, "spendable dough."

This phrase has a lot of meaning for army reserves. It has to do with the one day a pay check reserve acts for two weeks' training per week.

It's mad money—what's what it adds to.

The services hope that the little woman of the reservist doesn't have this phrase spreading dough all over and above what the old man makes in the shop or at the office.

Take an army reserve sergeant with six years under the colors. His extra spending cash for a little while spent in uniform, adds up to \$400 a year.

A reserve army captain now can run his expendable dough up to about \$600 a year.

Across the land, some 200,000 army veterans in the reserve program got spendable dough counting up to 95 million dollars in fiscal year 1956.

Getting back to Pentagon jargon, here are some classic examples:

A flag: "I don't know if somebody had better do something because far reaching commitments are at stake, or because influential people want something done."

Another kind of flag: "I hope a batch of brass who want a report pulled together within 30 minutes—or less."

File 13: "The 'round file' or wastepaper basket."

Stay loose: "Keep 'flexible and uncommitted on this subject."

Can of worms: "Article or report which has come from one hand to another until it has lost its meaning."

Pentagon paler: "An expression like the wheels of a car as well as important, apply for what happens to them when they work until it's too late to get to the golf course."

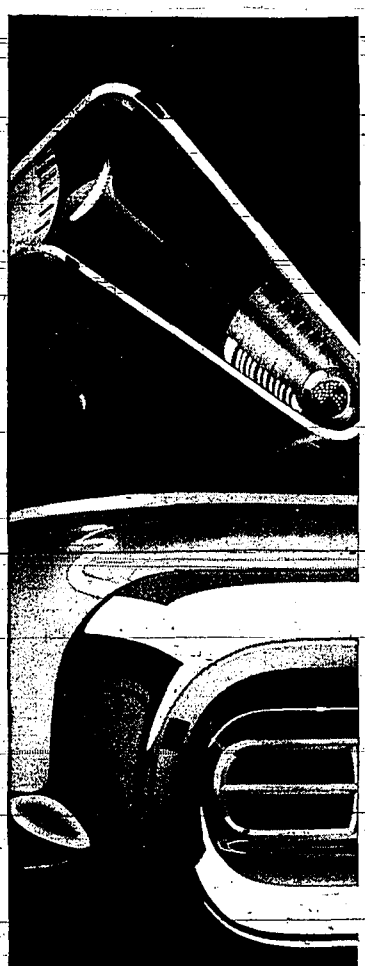

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—How did you like it? It was no surprise to pollsters and political experts that he won. What did surprise them was the way he handled Adlai Stevenson under a handicap.

Great issues were supposed to be running against Mr. Eisenhower. Farm states were supposed to be in rebellion. The leadership of the newly merged AFL-CIO advised 15 million members to turn Mr. Eisenhower out of the White House. The President was warned that renomination of his young friend, Richard M. Nixon, for vice president would peril the ticket's chances. Moreover, the Republican party had be-

come a minority party; second, in almost all vital legislation to the Democrats. But then the guns began to boom abroad. It was contained: Peace, prosperity and Ike. And Ike! That can lick a party, will look overseas for some of the answer, peace and prosperity was the campaign pack- age offered by the Republicans to American voters. But in the crucial days of the campaign, the Middle East caught fire. The United States' two most powerful allies joined in an armed police action to regain control of the Suez canal. It must remain largely a matter of the politicians' belief and judgment that the Middle East ruckus added some millions of votes to Mr. Eisenhower's total. While the guns pinged almost the impact of a



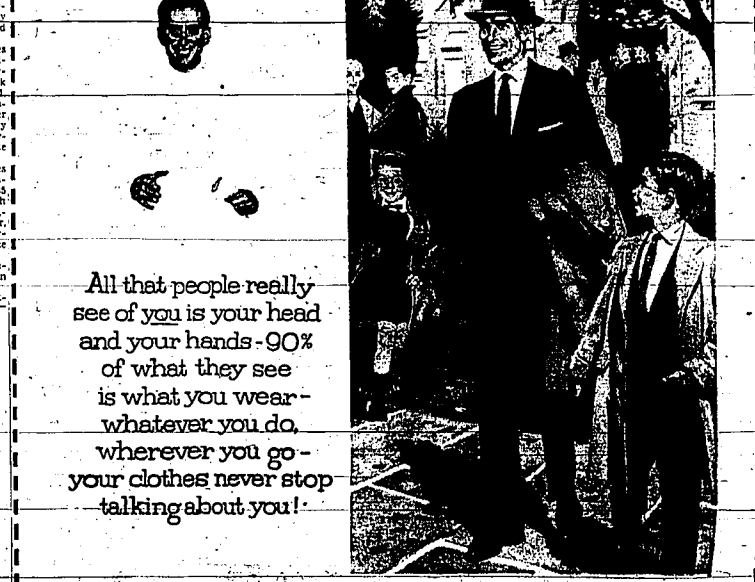

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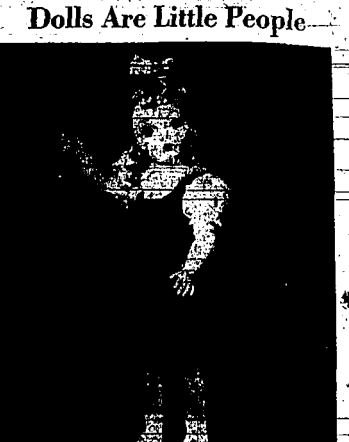

Pontiac Adds Style Change, Length in '57

Increased length, body-style changes and a lower silhouette are featured by the 1957 Pontiac. It will be in Middle Valley Pontiac dealer showrooms Friday.

The wide front end of the car is protected by heavy wrap-around bumpers with integrated beam-type bumper guards. Large oval parking lamps are set into the lower part of the bumpers. A semi-circular chrome grille and a full-width air scoop direct air flow to the car radiator.

Greater vision from the driver's seat is achieved through lowering the hood 1.6 inches and increasing the windshield area a minimum of 6 square inches on all models.

The fite of the rear fender rim houses an integrated tail and back-up lamp and a safety reflector. The projection of the tail lamp is protected by a projection in the rear bumper which also serves as an exhaust port on cars equipped with dual exhausts.

A dual stainless steel sweeps a entire length of the car on each side. The "star flight" styling is further accentuated by windshield molding in the rear fender.

To set off these features, Pontiac offers 15 color and trim combinations in leather, nylon cloth and vinyl.

The Buick Wildcat V-6 engine headlines the choice of three power units. It has a displacement of 347.04 cubic inches and 10 to 1 compression ratio. These are coupled with larger manifold, machined and contoured combustion chambers and more efficient valves and newly designed carburetors. The other engines are rated at 232 and 270 horsepower. An extra horsepower engine designed for law enforcement cars is available.

The piston stroke is three and nine-sixteenths inches. The new thermal controlled pistons are standard. Among other new features are a new "power" steering system, the starting motor, new ignition control switch and large coil spring clutch for use with the synchronizing transmission.

Pontiac offers 33 different accessories and 14 optional equipment items. The leader is the Strato Flight Hydra Matic transmission, which is offered on all models. Redesignated to accommodate increased horsepower, the Hydramatic has a cooler for transmission fluid located in the lower radiator water tank.

Two other new features are a transfer radio and a new air conditioning unit. Power steering and power brakes are available.

There are 16 models in the three lines, Chevrolet, Super, Chief and Star Chief. Four models of station wagons have variations of two and four doors and seat from six to nine passengers.

Smother rides are guaranteed on all models with insulation of the body in the lines of the car springs. These are corrosion resistant and impede road noise and vibration.

Health-of-Ike Is Lauded as Grind Closes

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—President Eisenhower rode out his victorious reelection campaign today in "good physical shape."

The word on the President's condition came from White House aides. Many of the President's associates were pleased by the President's show of stamina in the grueling final few days of the campaign when he was faced with Soviet aggression in Hungary and a Middle East crisis.

The 66-year-old chief executive—second oldest man ever elected President—appeared to be in ruddy good condition. His doctors agreed that he is.

Yet Mr. Eisenhower came up to election day working a considerably longer day than before his heart attack in September, 1955.

He himself has said he was surprised to husband his strength. But he has maintained a highly active schedule in recent weeks, working from early morning hours to midnight at the grinding job of coping with the eastern European and Middle East crises.

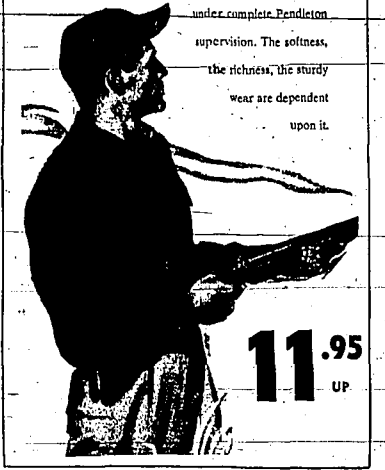

Water Report Of Idaho Area Is Announced

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (Special)—The interior department geological survey has released a report summarizing present use and potential development of ground water in the Snake river plain and tributary valleys south of the Snake river in south-central Idaho.

The report area was divided into 14 ground water districts and sub-districts. The known geologic and hydrologic factors in each district are summarized and a preliminary appraisal is made of groundwater resources in relation to land resources and to the treatment of streams.

The report area contains about 160,000 acres of irrigated land—of which about 145,000 acres are irrigated with surface water and 30,000 are irrigated wholly or partly with ground water.

The area also contains more than 200,000 acres of arable land that is idle or is used only for grazing because it lacks water for irrigation.

The report may be obtained at 504 Federal building, Salt Lake City, or the federal building, Idaho Falls.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—Mamie Eisenhower, though blinking back tears, was probably the happiest woman in a jam-packed room of wildly cheering Republicans here last night.

As President Eisenhower closed his brief victory statement, and thunderous applause broke loose, bright-eyed first lady turned to Mrs. Richard M. Nixon and murmured, "It makes me weep inside."

A moment later she was blinking back tears as her beaming husband took her arm to escort her back to the White House for another four years.

The first lady was radiant from the moment the presidential party entered the cheering auditorium of some 1,000 happy Republicans. She came through the door first, then turned to wait for her broadly grinning husband and they entered as the "team" that they have been for the past four years.

Mrs. Eisenhower will be celebrating her 60th birthday just a week from today. She carried a bouquet of two dozen "Mamie pink" carnations. She wore a full-skirted electric blue net gown with blue sequins around its scoop neckline. Her blue satin pumps matched her gown. She wore her favorite pearl necklace and on her wrist an "Ike" bracelet.

A cabinet wife earlier described Mrs. Eisenhower as "wonderful hostess" in the hotel suite above the GOP party in the ballroom where officials gathered during the evening.

Besides the officials, Mrs. Eisenhower's mother, Mrs. John S. Doud—wearing an "I Like Mamie" button—Mrs. Eisenhower's sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. George Gordon Moore, and the Eisenhower son and his wife, Mel, and Mrs. John Eisenhower, were on hand.

Come along in mean funny. I am at a loss to know what it means to be a mother of children who are afflicted with crime.

There is nothing funny about crime and to "hint" dreadfully to children, who have no experience with the use of words, that there is something highly amusing about murder and worse is a wicked thing to do.

It is wicked because it inordinately percolates in the mind of the child a feeling that such atrocious deeds can be acceptable to decent people. While healthy, well-trained children are unlikely to be led into such a behavior, the ideas exposed in the crime books have their effect in that they take the edge off the adolescents the child should have. Thus his mind and conscience are conditioned to look at such things with a degree of tolerance that is likely to weaken his moral stamina.

Life being what it is, a pattern of crime, crime and crime—our young people need all the strengthening influences possible to face the world about spirits. "Crime comics" are no such influence. They do their work with the immature group whose ages are low. These young ones are eager for excitement on the printed page and are the least prepared to use it. The well-trained, intelligent child soon discards this sort of book. When a youth of secondary-school age is found to be buying and reading them as steady diet, look out for trouble.

What can one do about this? Is something all fathers and mothers and teachers have to think about religiously. First, look at the children—buy, borrow and read and read them out wisely. All comic books are not bad. Some of them are worthwhile, some are just silly,



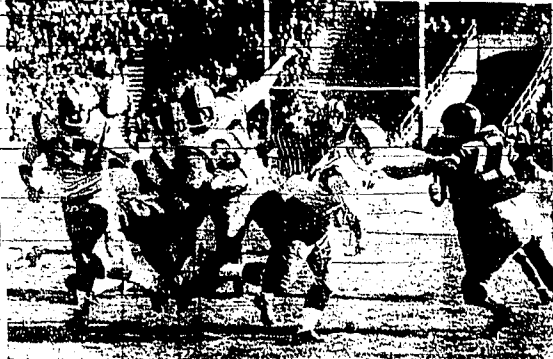

Three Nations Decide Not to Send Teams to Melbourne Olympic Games

LAUSANNE, Switzerland, Nov. 7 (AP)—Spain and Red China withdrew from the Melbourne Olympic games Tuesday, the first two because of Russia's military action in Spain.

Spain announced its withdrawal formally through Olo Meyer, chairman of the International Olympic committee. The Dutch decision was made known by Dr. J. Lindhard, Hanover, president of the Netherlands Olympic committee in The Hague.

Instead of traveling to Melbourne where the games are scheduled to start on Nov. 22, the Dutch donated 100,000 guilders (\$25,000) to Hungarian relief.

News of Red China's withdrawal came from behind the iron curtain in a bid.

Originally, 73 nations accepted invitations to compete. Now five have dropped out in the past month. Egypt, long before it was invaded, withdrew because it saw no prospects of winning medals.

After the invasion of Egypt, Iraq dropped out because of the unsettled conditions in the Middle East. Then the trio of withdrawals Tuesday.

Ironically, the Hungarian team left Prague Tuesday in a chattered plane for the games.
