The Fights Flame In Budapest; Reds Accept West's Aid

VIENNA, Nov. 9 (UP)—The Hungarian Reds announced that fierce new fighting has erupted in blazing Budapest today. They announced they would accept western Red Cross aid provided it is channeled through Communist Yugoslavia.

Earlier announcement by the red-run Budapest radio said rebels holed up in the narrow streets of the old city launched new attacks on the Soviet forces. Other fighting rages on both sides of the Danube and fire raged through the vast Hotel Royal.

The broadcast allegedly heard in Hungary that the Soviet Union had ordered its troops to accept no more western medical aid and food.

The Hungarian radio said that it was holding out for a "free" station claiming that at least 100,000 Hungarians had fled after the reds claimed the complete victory.

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Nov. 9.—The United Nations today admitted that Hungary's "glorious dead" have died in vain, called on Russia to permit food and medicines from abroad to be distributed to the Hungarian people.

The measure also asked Secretary of State Acheson to instruct the U. N. refugee office to assist interested governments on a public relations campaign to persuade the Soviet Union and Hungary to negotiate with the captives.

**Diplomats See
Russian Gains
In 'Cold War'**

MOSCOW, Nov. 9 (AP) — Western diplomats here say the Soviet Union in the last two weeks has achieved political victories ranking among its greatest since the Bolshevik revolution 35 years ago.

In private conversations they list three scores for the Soviet side along the Suez crisis developed into a sharp:

1. A sharp division of the United States from Britain and France on the international policy for the first time since the "cold war" began.
2. Soviet propaganda, plus the United Nations action to expel Egypt, has Britain's reputation for fair play with smaller countries, especially in Asia and Africa.
3. These two vital continents were opened to a great upsurge of communion through the active support of the Arab cause against the western powers.

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CALMER CONSIDERATION

The question whether or not to go on testing H-bombs may come in for more discussion now that the election campaign is behind us.

An issue so basically complex as this inevitably suffers from being hammered about in the heat of political combat.

When it is clear that further tests will dangerously contaminate the earth's atmosphere, that is a scientific statement.

As a free citizen he has a perfect right to vote it. But unless he is also noted as a political specialist, his judgment in this field may be no better than any other citizen's.

The H-bomb dispute was confused, too, by the fact that it really consisted of two issues. One was whether or not to test.

One was the question whether or not further tests would seriously imperil the health of this or future generations through release of powerful radioactive substances.

Science Lost In Wild Fall Of Two Men

RAPID CITY, S. D., Nov. 8.—A pair of navy scientists who survived a wild plunge in their balloons from a record altitude of 14,800 feet today they discussed the scientific information they were after.

Malcolm D. Ross, 36, a civilian employee, and Lieut. Cmdr. M. L. Lewis, 43, stepped unharmed from their pressurized aluminum gondola 14 miles southwest of Kennedy, Neb., yesterday.

The two covered the cabin from the balloon only about one foot above the ground after they had drifted 76,000 feet and taken them 10 miles from their starting point. The ascent shattered the record for manned balloons set in 1935 at Rapid City, when two army captives soared to 72,395 feet. The team soared to 72,395 feet, reached by a man in 125,000 feet, reached by a pilot in air force rocket plane last September.

The four-hour flight was intended to collect scientific data on the risks of outer space, but the scientists had little time to make any computations before the craft started reaching the 76,000 feet peak. Ross and Lewis dropped to 15,000 feet to begin inflation. The balloon would not stop its descent, however, and began to spin violently.

Within 20 minutes, the men noted a drop of two thousand feet. "I thought that was the limit," Ross said, "but the balloon was escaping through a leak."

At 70,000 feet, the drop quickened and the men reported they had "started taking pictures."

"We didn't get any work done," one of them said, "but I'd love to try that."

The rate of fall continued slowly, at 1,000 to 3,000 feet per minute. They had strapped themselves to their seats after electrically releasing an attempt to regain balance in the balloon.

"We let out everything that wasn't needed down," Ross said. When the gondola fell to the ground with a gentle thud, the men leaped out, complaining only that they were unable to hear clearly.

The 76,000 foot drop took an hour and 20 minutes.

Contrary to normal behavior, the balloons did not deflate and crumple on the ground once they were released, but remained in the air for several minutes before falling in a massive heap some 15 miles from where the gondola landed.

The balloons were flown back to Ellsworth air force base here.

Weak Link in GOP Is Seen By Ike's Aide

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9 (AP)—Presidential disarmament adviser Harold E. Stassen, the man who tried to help Vice President Eisenhower win the election, said today that the election results revealed a "serious weakness" in the Republican party.

He said this was evident in the GOP loss of both houses of Congress and a number of governorships, even though Eisenhower won a landslide popular vote.

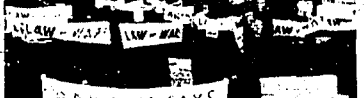
Stassen refused to say whether he blamed the Republican loss of an interview with Nixon. But in an interview he said:

"The election results clearly show, on the one hand, the tremendous popular support for President Eisenhower and his policies, and on the other hand, the serious weakness of our Republican party in losing both houses of Congress and a number of gubernatorial offices even though it had the advantage of the President's great vote."

"I should be possible to do this because millions of those citizens have indicated by their votes that they approve of President Eisenhower and his program even though he ran under the Republican label."

Stassen said this strengthening of the GOP can be brought about only "from the bottom up."

Eden Is Given Support, Wide Splits Avoided

LONDON, Nov. 2 (AP)—Only last minute moves by cabinet ministers averted open rebellion in Conservative party ranks and saved Prime Minister Anthony Eden's government from total split over Middle East policy, it was disclosed today.

As a result of the intervention, the government defeated a Laborite motion to censure the prime minister's house of commons. The motion was beaten by 230 to 223, a majority of 10.

Eden himself did not participate in the debate which preceded the vote. But he is expected to speak today, informants said he may announce British forces will be withdrawn from Egypt within 10 days.

The censure vote was considered critical for Eden in view of the recent defection of Conservative backbenchers. Two of his state ministers had resigned in protest against the armed intervention in Egypt. So did his public relations

MANAGONG, Burma, Nov. 2 (AP)—Three-thousand rioting Moslems protesting the Anglo-French invasion of Egypt tried to break into the British embassy here today and tried to stone the Israeli legation, but were driven back by police.

The mob also threw rocks through the windows of the Strand hotel. They attacked a European whom they believed to be British, but later learned he was a member of the Russian Olympic team en route to Melbourne.

Police used teargas to break up the mob trying to gain entrance to the British embassy and drove back the crowd at the Israeli legation before it could damage the building.

City police officials said an emergency meeting to adopt measures to protect foreigners and restore order. Police began rounding up ringleaders of the riot and several of the principal demonstrators.

Average Age of Senate Staying Around 57 or 58

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP)—Election of nine new faces among the 96 senators will top more than 100 years from the average age of that body, but the average senator in January still will be between 57 and 58.

The average has been between 57 and 58; years at the start of each of the last five two-year sessions, the Library of Congress says.

The senate acquires a new "baby member" in 22-year-old Frank Church, Idaho Democrat. He takes this distinction from Senator Long, D-La., now 38, who has been the youngest senator for eight years.

Church defeated Sen. Sherman Walker, R., Iowa, who at 50 was the youngest senator to lose or retire.

Jerome Tally Is Corrected

TETCOMO, Nov. 2 (AP)—Prior to sending Jerome county's official tabulation of 1956 to the secretary of state at Boise late Thursday afternoon, officials discovered an error of 100 votes in the previously announced total for Richard S. Steacy, unopposed Republican candidate for prosecuting attorney.

Steacy's total is 3,677 votes and not 2,677 as previously reported. Glen Taylor, in his written campaign for the U.S. senate, received 122 votes and not the 177 reported Wednesday following the unofficial tabulation.

The official canvass of votes, which was completed Thursday, also shows Joe McEntiff of the county to be the precinct for the seat end precinct with 11 written votes. J. L. LaJournette was elected constable of the same precinct with 30 written votes and George Ballew was elected constable of the Jerome precinct with 11 written votes.

Injunction Denied For Garbage Fills

BOISE, Nov. 2 (AP)—Ada County District Judge M. Oliver Scovel yesterday refused to issue an injunction which would have prevented the city of Boise from emptying a land-fill garbage and trash disposal site near Gowich Hill.

Residents of the area had asked the injunction on grounds the city's plans would devalue their land.

Brennan May Move Hornung

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Nov. 9 (AP)—Paul Hornung, Notre Dame's star quarterback, might not be at his familiar position Saturday when the Irish meet Pitt but "he'll play somewhere."

Coach Terry Brennan spiked reports that Hornung would make only a token appearance against the Panthers because of an injured thumb.

"We need him too much to let him sit on the bench," Brennan said Wednesday night. "If he can't play a quarterback then I'll use him at halfback or at tailback."

If the Irish (1-5) lose one more game it will be the worst season in their football history. "The only time they lost five games before was in 1933."

Brennan first dislocated his left thumb when Michigan State whipped the Irish 47-14. With Oklahoma as the opponent the following week, Brennan then said Hornung would be used at another backfield post because he couldn't handle the snap from the Irish split-T offense.

Hornung, however, is expected to start in the Oklahoma game. The first loss was 40-0.

The thumb was re-injured in a 33-7 defeat by Oklahoma last Saturday. Sophomore Bill Williams has been working out at quarterback.

Two Coaching Masterminds Set for Clash

A contest of coaching wits in the Oregon State-Stanford game at Palo Alto on Saturday will be the fiercest in the Pacific Northwest since the football season last year.

Cliff Gifford, coach of Stanford, and Tommy Prothro, mentor of the Beavers, face a combination of circumstances promising a winning combination of a game.

Prothro, former assistant to and coach of the Red and Yellow of UCLA, is the fellow who figured out the eight-man rush that smothered Stanford's John Brodie, leading passer and total offense star of the nation, in the UCLA 14-13 upset of the Bruins last Saturday.

Sanders and his staff also made good use of a Brodie tipoff, the position of his feet as an indicator of a pass or run play.

Prothro has the advantage of knowing who stopped Brodie, as well as a system almost a carbon copy of the Sanders single wing, and also faster backs than UCLA. But immediately the question arises, what will Taylor do about it?

Presumably he'll do plenty. Obviously he'll see to it that Brodie doesn't let his footstep tip off the play. Presumably the Oregon State line will be ready to stop Sanders from the mass rush. Brodie and company will try to counter with short burst passes.

But if the Beavers don't try the mass-rush-Brodie is likely to romp out of the stadium with the ball game on four passes. On the other hand, Prothro devised some other gimmick on the assumption that Taylor will be well prepared for the rush?

Integrating possibilities are endless.

There's comparatively little else that will count for miles in the league when California meets USC at Los Angeles. UCLA tangles with Washington at Seattle. Washington State takes on Oregon at Eugene and Utah State battles Idaho at Boise.

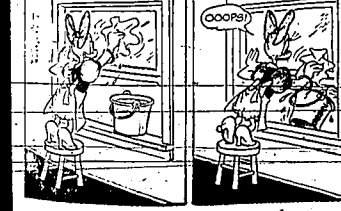

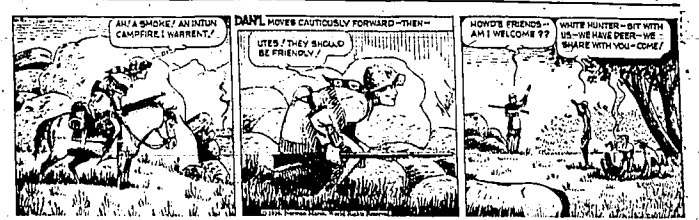

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Five Children Suffocated by Home Inferno

Spokane, Wash., Nov. 9 (AP)—The lives of five children were snuffed out late last night despite the desperate efforts of their mother to rescue them from a fire that destroyed their two-story home in nearby Spokane Valley.

Mrs. Ronald Lair, mother of the four boys and one girl who died in the blaze, said she was asleep on theavenport on the first floor of the home when she smelled smoke. "It woke me up," she said. "I tried to reach the children but the smoke and flames drove me back. The heat was just too much."

Runs for help

Mrs. Lair ran to neighbors for help but the intense heat prevented them from entering the burning home.

The victims were Steve, 9, Merle, 7, Louise Laura, 6, Jack, 4, and Timmy, 2.

Fire trucks from the Spokane Valley fire department answered alarms at 11 p. m. and 11:16 p. m. (PST) and three ambulances were dispatched to the scene.

Interior blaze

L. Schucker, chief of the fire department, said the entire interior of the house was lit by the time the fire-fighting equipment arrived.

Schucker said the children apparently died of suffocation although earlier reports indicated they had burned to death.

Schucker said the bodies of the four boys were found beneath their beds in the second floor of the home. The badly-burned body of Louise was found at the foot of the stairs.

Schucker said the blaze apparently started in the walls of the home and was caused by an overheated stove from an oil stove in the front room.

Mrs. Lair and her husband are separated.

Industry Told to Expect Rising Military Budgets and No Slashes in U.S. Forces

SEA-ISLAND, Ga., Nov. 9 (AP)—Industry leaders have been advised to expect rising military budgets and no substantial cut in U. S. military forces until 1960 or longer.

Asst. Secretary of Defense Carter L. Burgess presented this outlook yesterday to the commerce department's business advisory council at a meeting with government officials.

Burgess' speech to the council, whose 165 members include the heads of many of the country's greatest corporations, for support in the Pentagon's effort to obtain and hold the hard core of technicians and soldiers required to modernize warfare.

Burgess warned that defense costs probably will continue to mount for some time. The defense department assumes, he said, that the country's total production will continue to grow, and defense will remain about 10 per cent of the total. National production now is estimated at an annual rate of 414 billion dollars a year, and is rising.

He brushed aside reports that Washington's "new look" at the defense program might result in a sizable cut in the number of men in uniform.

The "military force strength may be subject to a very limited downward adjustment by the end of 1958," accompanied by a modest buildup of the armed forces, he said.

But the current review of the military establishment, in connection with preparation of the fiscal 1958 budget to be sent to congress by President Eisenhower in January, will result in "no cut in the combat force—that I know of," Burgess added.

He indicated the Pentagon will not be interested in proposals for ending the draft—as proposed for a study by defeated Democratic nominee Adlai Stevenson—until an alternative idea is presented for meeting military manpower needs.

One of the "basic assumptions" which underlie future manpower directions until 1960 and beyond, Burgess said, is that "selective service and the draft will remain an essential national insurance policy."

The draft law remains in force until mid-1959. Burgess said he could not see any change before congress takes up the question at that time.

WINNEMUCCA, Nev., Nov. 9 (AP)—California has a critical shortage of lawyers, according to Dean David P. Brodigan of the University of California's Hastings college of law.

He told delegates to the Nevada State Bar convention here yesterday that the legal profession has lagged far behind the medical profession and has failed to keep pace with the tremendous California population gains of recent years.
