### Arson Tip Is Given Police In Big Story

WICHITA, Kan., Nov. 10 (AP)—A university student wrote what he called a "whole lot of a story" for a newspaper early Saturday and then was picked up for investigation about the subject of his article—a series of small fires in a Wichita hotel.

Police Sgt. Lew Huxtable identified the student as Charles L. Novak, 26, Wichita, who is majoring in geology and psychology at University of Wichita.

Huxtable said Novak was held for investigation of arson. Novak appeared in the news room of the Wichita Eagle after two fires broke out on the mezzanine of the Lassen hotel in downtown Wichita.

Sam Kleiner, night news editor, said Novak told him he had a "whole lot of a story" and offered to write it for the paper. Kleiner made a typewriter available and Novak wrote three pages of copy—an eyewitness account in which he related how he helped firemen put out the blazes, told of guests leaving their rooms in night clothing, and interviewed firemen.

Kleiner said Novak handed him the original copy and the newspaper put a carbon copy in his pocket and left.

After the first two fires were extinguished, three more, all on the mezzanine, broke out.

District Fire Chief Jack McKee said nine fire companies answered the alarm. Damage was estimated at several thousand dollars.

McKee and J. Thompson, assistant manager of the hotel, said they thought Novak was a reporter.

When Wichita Eagle reporter showed up, Novak was taken into custody.

### Archeologist Studying "Time Capsule" Messages Deep in Jungle of Amazon

NEW YORK, Nov. 10 (AP)—Deep in the heavy jungle of the Amazon headwaters there are rock-carved symbols that could turn out to be a "time capsule" message from a prehistoric civilization.

An ancient-symbols specialist just back from his third expedition in a continuing effort to solve the riddle of the symbols reported today that mapping of the previously uncharted area with airborne cameras had added new evidence to the theory of a civilization in the pre-history of South America.

George Michanowsky, president of the Amazonia Foundation, led the recent four-month expedition into the Bolivian headwaters of the Amazon river system.

The expedition located, in the gorge of a legendary "River of Writings," a boulder measuring 35 feet on which were carved more than 20 petroglyphs.

Symbols by which an ancient people may have tried to leave a message to posterity.

The Aymara Indian tribe which lives in the high Andes has perpetuated the story of the existence of a "stone-walk" on the mountain.

Michanowsky said. This tribe is thought to have been illiterate back through the time of Columbus, but Michanowsky regards it as significant that their spoken language included a word meaning "writing."

Michanowsky believes the river in which his expedition's work was done is the one to which the Aymara legend refers. The symbols also occur on other rock outcroppings in the area. He has developed a theory of deciphering the petroglyphs and has been at work on the project for several years.

The aerial survey, in which three planes were used for photographing, disclosed an ancient road linking the low-lying river and jungle area with a nearby 14,000-foot plateau.

The Aymarans live in the mountainous area of the plateau.

Another accomplishment of the expedition was locating on the high plateau a stone-walk head of a jaguar.

"There are 20 petroglyphs on the plateau now and the Spaniards found none there in their time," Michanowsky said.

"On the jaguar head are painted symbols which to my knowledge have never been found in the western hemisphere before," he said.

"One is an Egyptian-type tau cross with a conventional Maltese cross on each side of it.

"This all fits into a theory of an ancient civilization using some of the ancient symbols of mankind. It is an addition to my theory that human writing may have originated through a 'universal organizing principle.' Perhaps buried deeply in the historic Hindu and mystic traditions."

Michanowsky believes that in the light of the discovery he should re-examine the question of whether writing existed in Pre-Columbian South America.

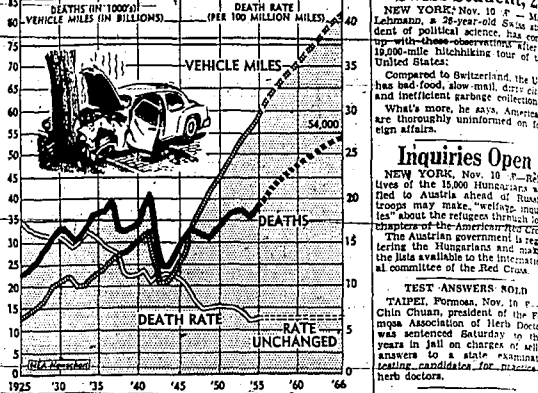

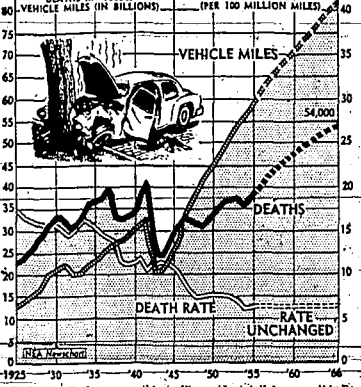

### Heart Expert Says Altitude No Drawback

DENVER, Nov. 10 (AP)—A cardiac specialist said Saturday that living in altitudes up to one mile has little if any effect on heart patients. He said that generally speaking heart patients do as well as a multiple altitude as they do at lower elevations but added each coronary case must be considered individual.

**Glves Report**  
Dr. Lawrence Lamb, director of cardiology research for the U.S. air force at Randolph field, Tex., made his report at his annual Western medical conference. He said it is probable that patients with coronary insufficiencies due to heart trouble should not live in altitudes above one mile. He said tests have shown that persons living at an altitude of one mile need more hemoglobin in their blood than persons living at sea level so that sufficient oxygen may reach the body tissues. Hemoglobin is the blood fraction which absorbs oxygen from the lungs and carries it through the heart to body tissues.

**Altitude Affects Noted**  
Lamb said altitude in Lima, Peru has shown hemoglobin levels of persons living at 12,000 to 14,000 feet altitude becomes only 80 per cent oxygen saturated. At sea level, he said, the saturation figure is about 97 per cent and at an altitude of one mile it is 83 per cent. Because of this, he said, the bodies of persons living at high altitudes must produce more hemoglobin. This sometimes takes a month or longer after the altitude is reached, and often is accompanied by drowsiness. Lamb's report was delivered to the closing session of the week-long conference, attended by more than 400 doctors.

### Legal Betting Plea Is Voted

MCCALL, Nov. 10 (AP)—The Idaho House of Representatives today voted Saturday to seek legislation permitting betting on horse races at a fair sponsored by nonprofit groups. Under the proposal outlined by the group, proceeds of the betting would go to the state, which would then donate it to the state's 44 counties. Ervin Johannessen, secretary of the group, said it was hoped that this money could be used for support of youth movements or research on polio, heart disease and other ailments. Some 180 delegates ended a two-day convention Saturday. They approved a calendar of nearly 40 fairs and rodeos for 1957. Fair managers participated in a panel discussion.

Johannessen said the organization wanted "profit-making" conditions "to take the profit angle out." In "profit-making" betting, the "winner" is the state, which takes a small percentage for the management.

### United States Held in Danger of Letting Nuclear Weapons Dictate Nation Policy

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 (AP)—Senate Minority Leader Thomas E. Murray said Saturday the United States is in danger of making "the fatal error" of allowing nuclear weapons to dictate policy. Instead, he said, "military policy must control our foreign policy," and this nation must find "a middle course, the road of justice" between the two extremes. "The danger is the abandonment of all nuclear weapons. Such a middle course, he asserted, leads to a firmly defined but flexible military policy that will recognize two principles as controlling in the use of nuclear arms — first, the military principle of necessity or usefulness, and second, the higher moral principle of justice in the use of force."

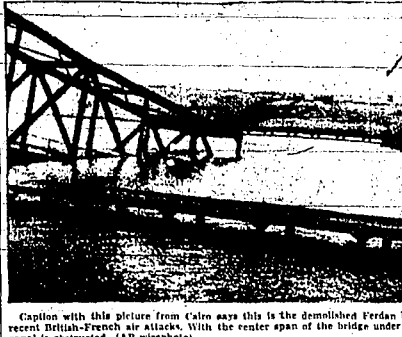
