Negroes Hail Court Ruling; Keep Boycott

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Nov. 15 (AP)—Thousands of Negroes cheered the supreme court decision against segregation on buses but voted last night to maintain their local transit fight until a federal court decree actually goes into effect.

The Rev. Martin Luther King, the Negroes' 11-month leader in the fight for the right to mingle on city buses, said with jubilation a "miracle" from the supreme court to reach the federal court here in "just a few days."

The Montgomery Improvement Association formed by the Negroes soon after their bus boycott began last Dec. 5, recommended the boycott end in view of the court ruling. It also recommended a "return to the buses on a non-segregated basis" be delayed until the district court issues a decree.

Request Denied

U. S. District Judge Frank M. Johnson turned down the Negroes' request for an injunction to bar the city from interfering with the boycott, which has been the backbone of the fight.

The city ordered a temporary halt to the car pools on grounds that they were "private enterprises" and they were operated without franchises. King said there was no longer a need for the pool car had struck down the Alabama law requiring bus segregation.

Cites Warning

But he warned the Negroes not to try to ride buses on an integrated basis until local authorities have been formally notified of the court order. Premature riding might lead to arrest, he said.

King said that until the court order is formally received here, "we will continue to walk and share rides."

 The present tax structure has recommended a sales and use tax together with the property and income taxes. This recommendation was based on a study of the trends over the past few years.

In our opinion, the most equitable and fair method of providing for our present system of state and local government and should provide a means to maintain the level over a period of years.

We do not approve or disapprove of the present trend. The legislature must make that decision.

One of the interesting facts provided by the study is the relation of state expenditures to local taxes. It shows that the state, in 1955, contributed \$1,395,861 or an average of 38 per cent of the average total tax budget on the county level. This has not been done in the past and it is not clear that the state could have discontinued the income tax completely, plus, eliminate the sales and use tax.

On the other hand, if the county property tax would have been increased 25 per cent to maintain the same services, I believe that the only relief that the local property taxpayer can get is through a number of collecting taxes on a broader base. A broad base could be either income tax or sales tax.

Inside Details Of Hungary's Fighting Told

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—An escaped leader of the Hungarian army, recalled yesterday many Russian soldiers "refused to fight us" but finally were "terrorized" into turning their guns against the rebels.

Some of the Russians "even fired on their comrades," the investigator young witness told the senate internal security subcommittee at a public hearing.

But he said the Soviets sent in new and tougher troops, including two Mountain divisions, who "terrorized" the others—and the iron heel of "communism" came down finally.

Testifying as a 21-year-old student-refugee, his face concealed by a white gauze surgical mask, and using the assumed name of "Ivan Kozlov," he has recounted the Russian's weak vengeance on his relatives still in Hungary.

Earlier he had described the secret chambers in which the Soviet-Hungarian secret police smothered dissent, tortured and killed with water torture devices, and destroyed the bodies in a crematory.

As he told some of the details of the Hungarian war, Anna Kozlov, a member of the Iron Guard revolutionary cabinet, and flew with her to the United States on Nov. 8.

Massive Cold Front Pushes Through U.S.

A massive cold front pushed rapidly across the plains today to day to cover the western half of the nation while the season's second severe snowstorm struck the Rockies and northern plains.

The cold snap extended from the Pacific coast to the northern Great Lakes and northwestern Texas, and was expected to move slightly eastward into lower Michigan and Illinois and through Arkansas into Louisiana.

Meanwhile, snow swept through Colorado and Wyoming into Nebraska, the Dakotas and western Michigan. Amounts were generally less than four inches, but heavy snow struck parts of South Dakota.

Strong northwesterly winds caused drifting snow, and weathermen warned that road conditions might be hazardous in the snow areas.

Twenty-four inches of snow was reported in South Dakota near Deadwood canyon and 18 inches at Deadwood. Schools closed early in many communities yesterday as the snow began to drift.

Some telephone circuits were out in western South Dakota early today, but snow was not hampering air and bus transportation.

Temperatures Plunge

Drifting snow also was reported in North Dakota, where minimum temperatures fell to 14 degrees early today.

Blowing snow, sleet and large hail at Alameda, where a three-inch snowfall whitened the western portion of the state. Slippery roads were reported around Wadena and Alexandria, Minn., and in parts of Wisconsin.

The snow was expected to move into all of Wisconsin and Minnesota and southwest through northern Kansas and northern Missouri.

Weathermen warned of locally heavy snowfalls in northern Wisconsin, Minnesota, the eastern portion of Nebraska and northwest Iowa.

Low Readings

Temperatures on the leading edge of the cold air and along the west coast were generally below zero. But in between temperatures were much in the teens with some reading near zero in the Rocky mountains.

The cold front was expected to move slightly eastward, reaching lower Michigan, Illinois and through Arkansas into Louisiana.

Light showers wet portions of the Midwest last night and early today. Meanwhile, rain was forecast for the far Northwest and from eastern Texas to Alabama and northward to the lower Great Lakes region.

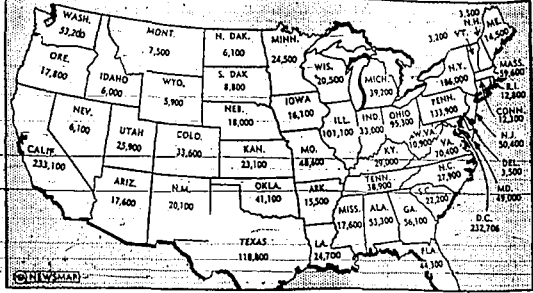

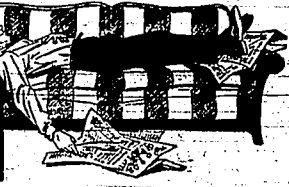

Soviets Slate Revision for World Goals

VIENNA, Nov. 15 (AP)—Humiliated by the Hungarian revolt, Moscow appears to be planning a far-reaching revision of world communist policies.

The satellite world it seems likely the Iron curtain will be patched up where that is possible—and remain unbroken elsewhere.

It would be a revision that would remain to be established firm control throughout the empire.

Outside, it seems likely Moscow's policy will harden once again in a final effort to win a victory in Hungary but it is a telling world policy that the revolution in Hungary in the free world has given communism a setback from which it may never fully recover.

Communism now is more difficult to sell in free countries. The Russians probably will fall back on their hard communist core abroad, concentrating on harassment and subversion and stirring up the elements in favor of the new Russian policy in Moscow.

Among the satellites, some concessions can be expected for a while in Hungary, Poland and Czechoslovakia. The heart of world opinion is on the Kremlin. But it is clear that warlike adventures must not be repeated.

Pearl Harbor Teeming With Combat Ships

PEARL Harbor, T. H., Nov. 15 (AP)—Pearl harbor was teeming with more combat-ready warships today than at any time since World War II.

It was a part of the navy's accelerated schedule to improve American defenses in the Pacific during the Middle East crisis.

The attack aircraft carrier Philippine Sea steamed into the harbor yesterday with four destroyers as her escorts.

Already at the big naval base were three cruisers and four other destroyers. They arrived Sunday.

Their appearance spoiled the holiday week-end for navy and civilian supplies. The seven ships saved "hundreds of requisitions for fuel, spare parts and provisions," the navy said.

The carriers Yorktown and Shanghaia steamed through the Golden Gate on Wednesday and are expected at Pearl this week-end. Navy officials refused to confirm reports that the carrier Wasps was being readied at San Diego for Far East duty.

In a joint communique, these Asian leaders also expressed "strong disapproval and distress at the recent intervention by the great powers against weaker countries in the Middle East."

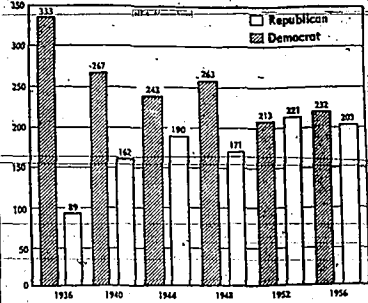

Rig Waits for Hurricanes to Show Designs

NEW ORLEANS, La., Nov. 15.—The world's largest submarine and floating structure is on a skidway crane—waiting for the hurricane to show whether the monstrous gadget known as Kermac 48 will stand up to a 2 million dollar gamble which paid off. She must be able to ride out a big blow.

The rig is a 10-story building, two-thirds the size of a city block. Kermac 48 was designed to carry the search for oil farther offshore than ever before. Her job is to dig holes in the ocean floor.

She is afloat now in the Gulf of Mexico off West Cameron parish, La. In a calm sea, an assumed steady and safe as dry land. "Safe," said A. M. Souther, one of the men aboard her. "She ought to make a hurricane behave."

Muro M. Lanier, president of the Ingalls Shipyard, which built the rig, described it as the largest submersible barge ever built.

"It is basically a series of pressure tubes, built to submarine tolerances," he said, "with its drilling mast above the deck. It is the tallest floating structure in the world, and, indeed, it is the largest submarine in the world."

He said the rig's stability is guaranteed by four huge cylinders which serve as corner posts of the structure. It has no position or side riggers.

"If the tilt or tends to tilt, the cylinders on the opposite corner will compensate," he said.

The top of the drilling mast, or derrick of Kermac 48 is 226 feet above the water. When the barge is submerged to a maximum depth—70 feet—the mast still juts 166 feet into the air.

Kermac 48 has a roomy air-conditioned bunkhouse for workers at one corner of its deck. Off shore oil crewmen live a week aboard and spend a week ashore. But sometimes bad weather keeps them at work.

Idaho Farmer Refuses Federal Check Because He Desires Less Government

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15 (AP)—A story about D. A. Van Slyke, an Idaho farmer who refused to accept a tax refund because he was mad at the government.

Although it couldn't force him to take the refund, the government, it was expected, wins in the end—it will keep the money itself.

Van Slyke filed out internal revenue bureau form 2240. He listed gasoline taxes purchased for non-business use on his Wilder, Ida., home.

Under a bill, proposed by President Eisenhower and enacted last year, taxes paid on gasoline last year, were refundable. On Nov. 15, Van Slyke got a government check for \$100. He refused it and made out a "tax refund" and made out a check for \$100.

Five days later Van Slyke sat down and wrote a letter to Sen.

Henry C. Dworshak, R., Ida.—"Will you please dispose of the check for me? I do not care to accept it," Van Slyke said.

"This is to protest the increasing burden of federal government taxation for increased taxes and myriad reports which are most effective to keep the little fellow little," he enclosed the check. For a few hours yesterday he had the government on the spot.

Dworshak's office read Van Slyke's letter and called the internal revenue service. They were sorry, they said, but the check was not endorsed and the internal revenue bureau could not accept it.

Dworshak's office was powerless, too, and the check was in limbo. But then an attorney at the internal revenue service thought of something.

Dworshak's office was advised to return the check to L. W. Looker, the treasury's regional disbursing officer who issued it.

Looker, the tax attorney decided, can arrange to take the check into the treasury's books again.

He'd better get in practice. The \$3822 check covered only six months' operations on the Van Slyke farm—it is his intention to file for successive refunds which I do not plan to accept," Van Slyke said in his letter to Dworshak, and signed it "yours for less government."

Lower Prices Are Slated for 1956 Turkey

Housewives looking ahead to next week's Thanksgiving day holiday can be sure that turkey prices will be 10 cents a pound lower than last year.

Because of an abundant supply of birds—government men put the crop at 18 per cent over 1935, most housewives can expect to pay from 10 to 12 cents a pound for turkeys. For those planning a family party, a special turkey—bigger and cheaper—turkeys will bring corresponding savings.

Shoppers will find, however, that various cuts of beef are vying with turkey for the featured spot on national week-end menus. The more expensive cuts such as rib roasts and steaks are being featured. Turkey with—chuck—roast—and around beef, sirloin or down—steak—roast—18 and 20 cents in some sections with super specials.

Pork, a recent headliner in the supermarket and neighborhood groceries, is from 10 to 10 cents higher in many sections this week. Poultry also are up pretty generally, although the higher price tags are in the two to four-cent range.

Eggs Cheaper
Eggs are reported somewhat cheaper this week, declining from a penny to eight cents a dozen.

The housewife's savings on turkey may be balanced somewhat by higher prices for cranberries, a must at most Thanksgiving dinners. Also, while only another holiday favorite, went up in price this week.

Vegetable Scarcity
With the onslaught of cold weather across most of the northern part of the country, the leafy vegetables in very light supply and therefore expensive, in many sections. Cabbage, yellow onions and potatoes once again are being featured. Cauliflower, in areas where they're available from nearby fields.

Potatoes Rising
Sweet potatoes are a little higher this week and produce experts say they may go higher next week.

Housewife planning a fruit bowl to decorate their Thanksgiving table have a rather limited list to choose from. Grapes, pomelo grapes and apples are about the best bet, although eating apples are still reported on the high side. Tangerines, another winter favorite, are just starting to come to market in good volume but are yet numerous enough to be rated a good buy.
