Union pickets appeared in front of Wray's cafe Saturday morning, four months to the day after picketing began at Scott's cafe. Both restaurants are being picketed by members of the local AFL-CIO Hotel and Restaurant Employees and Bartenders union, AFL-CIO, Mrs. Paul Ward, local secretary, confirmed the strike and discouraged rumors that a third, unnamed cafe would be picketed in the near future. At the same time Mrs. Ward reported that Jack Caldwell, international representative of the union, had been arrested at Scott's cafe Wednesday for Sioux Falls, S. D. Caldwell replaced Len Loring, whose jailing July 16 on charges of disturbing the peace, placed a moratorium on the picketing at Scott's.

Soviets Seek Summit Talk On Disarmament Problems

MOSCOW, Nov. 17 (AP)—The Soviet Union called today for a summit conference on disarmament at which it agreed to discuss its proposal of President Eisenhower's "open skies" inspection proposal. The Russian proposal specified, however, that planes would be restricted to survey flights only 500 miles from the borders of participating countries. The Soviet Union extends half way around the world, nearly 8,000 miles in length, and at its widest part is about 2,500 miles. The Russians in a government statement, also called for destruction of all H-bomb and A-bomb stockpiles in the next 10 years and an immediate ban on nuclear tests.

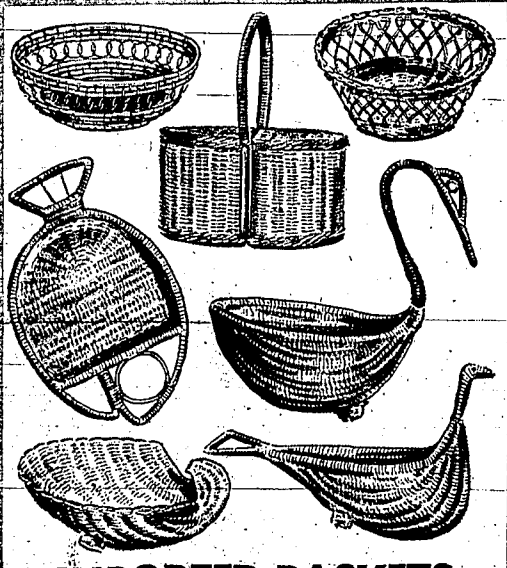

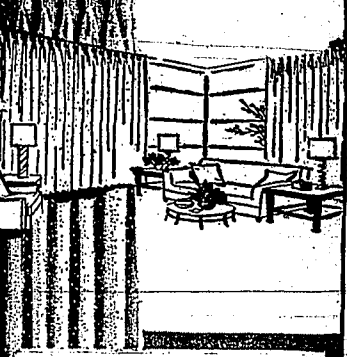

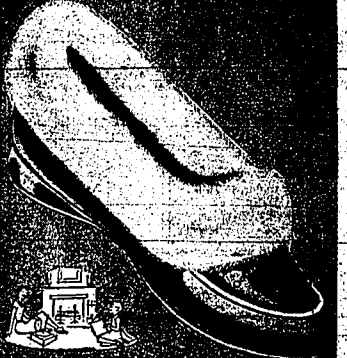

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

There are all kinds of places to visit in Magic Valley but to the small boys of SHOSHONE there is one place which has plenty of appeal, while it may not surpass all others. And it's only a mile from the city.

For generations Shoshone children have been making the trip and returning with tales of adventure, made more thrilling by the vivid imaginations of youth. Occasionally, evidence of the past, such as arrowheads, have been found to lend a note of credence to their tales. Even without imagination, it would seem Indians had sought the valley for years.

Each new generation gives the place a new name. Today's it's known as "Three Peaks," and three peaks it is, three peaks of lava jutting from the desert one mile west of the city.

A lot of foliage may defy tradition from time to time and try to take root on the peaks, but most of the time they're bare.

Send, sagebrush and lava mixed with rock, horned lizards and insects to give the boys a sense "of being away from it all" while only a mile from home. And, at night, some of the older boys add the mysteries of summer moonlight, the chirp of crickets, and the buzz of a mosquito to the fascination of the place.

Who but a boy knows what questions are asked and answered in such a setting? The moon, yellow-orange, hangs suspended in mid-air. Pink and red shadows flitter on the peeling clouds. In the distance tower the ragged Sandweasels while stately trees stand guard along the edge of town.

Who was the person like who fashioned the arrowhead? How long ago did he pass this way? Where did he come from and where was he going?

Real, vivid adventure for a boy—and only a mile from home.

Olaf Moller, Rupert artist who is holding an ongoing art show at his home today, has another occupation besides painting. He makes picture frames for other artists. The frames he makes are works of art in themselves and not simply four pieces of wood put together to hold a picture.

Many artists pay high prices for authentic antique picture frames and their paintings but since the supply never reaches the demand and antiquities being necessarily limited, artists have to look elsewhere for their frames.

Moller's frames are hand crafted and, in some instances, are copies of antique frames hanging in some of the leading art galleries in the country. He uses either balsa or white pine wood, chipping and carving the blocks down to the size and design he desires.

Most of his paintings are framed by his own frames. The antique frames he sells to his colleagues.

Born in Denmark, Moller came to Idaho to bring a wife to the new gold fields. He was brought to this country by his parents when only a months old. He was educated in Salt Lake City and Idaho and entered the Pennsylvania academy of fine arts in Philadelphia in 1919. He studied there for eight years as well as studying under a number of famous artists.

He has been awarded a number of prizes for his paintings, including two from the HEYMAN art exhibit which he held no longer.

Just about every year Moller returns east for a couple of months to paint landscapes, principally in New

Blast Planned To Get Rocks For Road Fill

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 17 (AP)—One of the biggest non-atomic explosions ever set off in the United States will be detonated in northern Utah Nov. 20.

The Southern Pacific railroad said it would set off 600,000 pounds of explosive in a 300 foot high cliff to provide additional rock for its 44 million dollar causeway across Great Salt Lake.

The blast is expected to jiggle seismograph gulls in Utah and Nevada but the surface shock will not be noticed more than a mile or two away.

Chief engineer W. M. Jackle of the Southern Pacific said only two larger non-atomic blasts have been set off in the country. Both were constructed by the TVA at the South Holston dam at Bristol, Tenn.

The largest previous explosion in Utah was 200,000 pounds of explosives at a test at Dugway proving ground just after World War II that nearly detonated 800,000 pounds of surplus mines at Arco, Ida.

On March 5, 1955, the petition says Paul W. and Dorothy B. Reed directed the land to the construction company.

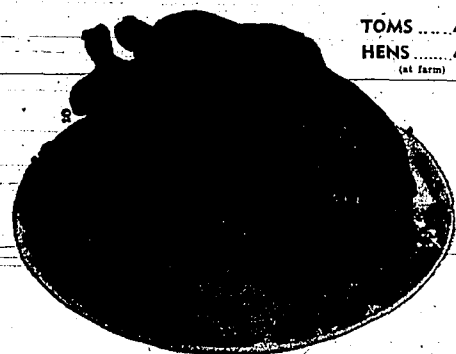

Parley Slated On Shoshone Sewage Plant

SHOSHONE, Nov. 17—Plans for a sewage plant at a meeting of city officials and representatives of civic organizations at 8 p.m. Monday in the public representative from the city health department, an engineer who made several attorneys familiar with the project will be present to answer questions. research on sugar beets in addition to supporting a national foundation dedicated entirely to this project. As a result, a monogenic beet seed has been found and scientists are currently trying to incorporate curly top and other disease resistance into the seed.

"They note that in 1934, before a curly top resistant strain was isolated, the Magic Valley beet crop averaged around five tons per acre. Now, this production has been raised to 20 tons.

The potato processors and manufacturers are working directly for the farmer by providing new ways of presenting potatoes to the public. The Idaho Frozen Foods plant in Kimberly, although just a year old, is planning expansion to answer the demands for its frozen hash browns.

The potato firms concerned directly with selling the " Idaho spud" to the housewife also increase the

income of the farmer. This has been accomplished through the national advertising of Idaho potatoes and through packaging the spuds in smaller bags. The five and 10 pound sacks along with the individually-wrapped potatoes are more in demand by the consumer than the old method of buying 100 pounds. They claim that this selling in smaller quantities gives the farmer 25 cents per hundred that would be lost otherwise.

Wheatgrowers recently received another outlet for their crops here with the opening of the Cannon Foods company, which specializes in frozen noodles. This, in addition to the Twin Falls and Burley Flour mills, offer the farmer a local market for their crops.

Official Notes 'Dynamic' Era Near in State

Explaining his bureau's activities, the bureau chief said his organization cooperates with 46 soil conservation districts in Idaho which embrace nearly 20,000 farms covering more than 31 million acres, exclusive of federal and state lands. In Idaho, he said, "we have approximately 13 million acres of unreserved public land, much of it intermingled with privately-owned and state lands and much of it within soil conservation districts."

He said "the water program for soil and moisture conservation work is approximately four times more this year than the state has received in any single year prior to the start of the department of Interior's 30-year soil and moisture conservation program."

Most of this, he stated, will be spent to improve the water yield from public lands, to prevent erosion

and to improve forage for livestock and wildlife.

"If the program continues through next year, the state will have a program out, and if the range users contribute the necessary cooperative effort, the range of Idaho can be completely rehabilitated and should be built to their full potential carrying capacity."

Returning to the Wood River pilot district subject, Woodley said 20,000 acres already have been planted in alfalfa. In addition, he added, "we have installed 41 miles of fence, 150 miles of truck brush, developed 11 water holes and one spring." Three cattle guards and one sheep pen also have been installed, he said.

In future planning for the area, he said, "we propose to install an additional \$143,000 for reseeded an additional 60,000 acres for 30,000 acres more of brush control, 10 new wells, one more spring development, 40 stock reservoirs, 57 additional miles of fence, 150 miles of truck brush, 20 more cattle guards."

This program, he said, will be tied in with the development of private lands and the overall program on federal and state lands will acquire a number of years for completion.

Prior to Woodley's speech, the Goodyear Tire and Rubber company awarded plaques to the Gooding district and Owyhee district for the two best conservation programs in the state during 1956.

A meeting of the group will be held in Pocatello, Don Fredrickson, newly-re-elected president, will be in the chair.

Delegates elected officers and passed seven resolutions during the afternoon business session. In addition, Fredrickson, other officers re-elected were William H. Lloyd, Gooding, vice president, and Lowell C. Moore, Robert, secretary-treasurer.

Robert M. Dandy, Edgemere, and John A. Lindler, Genesee, were re-elected to the board of directors. Alvin B. Benson, Melba, and Charles Head, Idaho Falls, were named new directors, replacing John L. Fry, Hessebrook, and Henry L. Bauer, St. Anthony.

Auxiliary members elected Mrs. John A. Lewis, Coeur d'Alene, succeeding Mrs. Beato M. Basil, Prairie. Mrs. Eugene Thompson, Moscow, was chosen secretary-treasurer. She replaces Mrs. Oliver Baum, Ashton.

Mrs. William H. Lloyd, Soda Springs, and Mrs. Clyde Lee, Howe, were re-elected auxiliary vice presidents. Other vice presidents named were Mrs. Alvin B. Benson, Melba, and Mrs. Ivan Butler, Bliss.

Six of the seven resolutions passed were designed to further the state's soil conservation program in the state. The seventh was a vote of thanks "to the people, Chamber of Commerce, merchants, hotels and local soil conservation district supervisors of Twin Falls."

Resolutions passed included:

1. A request to congress asking for sufficient funds to adequately staff local soil conservation districts with the type and number of personnel deemed necessary by recent work load analyses.
2. A petition to state and national soil conservation associations to seek a change in existing laws so as to make soil improvement loans available to small farm units.
3. A request that the noxious weed program be taken out of county hands and returned to the agricultural stabilization and conservation service, to take advantage of federal support of such a program.
4. The re-opening of a resolution passed in 1955 asking the fish and game commission to work more closely with landowners and farmers in setting local hunting seasons and the request that no hunting season start before Nov. 1.
5. An appeal to the newly-formed University of Idaho Agricultural Experiment Station that soil conservation service members be included before the expansion of the soil and water conservation branch of the agriculture department's agricultural research service.
6. Another resolution, calling for increased emphasis of the feed for research breeding program using native grasses was tabled for further study, but no action was taken on it before the close of the convention.
7. During an afternoon panel discussion entitled "Ways to Keep the Public Informed on Operations of Soil Conservation Districts," Jack Farrar, radio station KTFY, warned delegates "Don't hide your light under a bushel."
8. Farrar stressed the importance of good public relations in aiding local soil conservation department projects and offered "tips on how to best take advantage of spare and time made available by local communications media."

Russians Test Atom Weapon From Heights

MOSCOW, Nov. 17 (AP)—A Russian nuclear weapon was exploded in a test on Sunday, the official Tass agency announced.

The announcement of the nuclear test was published a few hours after the foreign ministry had announced the Soviet proposal for disarmament which repeated Russian demand for a ban on nuclear weapons.

The test of a nuclear weapon was carried out in the Soviet Union on Nov. 17, 1956, the brief Tass statement said.

The explosion was carried out at great height. The test was executed successfully.

There was no immediate indication of the strength of the explosion or the exact nature of the weapon.

Union Cry Is Raised After Court Ruling

DENVER, Nov. 17 (AP)—A city court ruling was the reply today of the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers to a court decision last week which held that officials and staff members of the union were not entitled to federal aid in suing to prevent the government from firing fifty Communist Party members.

The ruling was issued by a federal court in Denver. The independent union is headquartered here.

Bonds for each of the defendants was set at \$5,000 and warrants were issued. Among the 14 is the late "Drew" J. Foster, union president and secretary-treasurer who was convicted of conspiracy in 1954 for denying membership in the Communist party. He is free under bond pending appeal.

U.S. Atty. Donald E. Kelley said arrangements have been made for him to surrender at the U.S. marshal's office here. The defendants then will appear before U.S. Commissioner Howard E. Erickson to post the bonds or be committed to jail, Kelley said.

Statement Given

A statement from the union's executive board declared the indictment as "a attack on an old and respected labor union and its members." The board said all 14 are innocent of wrongdoing and Mine Mill is sure that this method of prosecution will be thrown out of the courts.

"Pursued by numerous defendants in an attempt to hamstring this union, Atty. Gen. Brownell has turned to the conspiracy charge which is the most serious charge that has been used in this country for 150 years," the statement said.

Officials of the union were accused of having conspired with Communist Party officials since June 1954. The indictments charge they conspired to deny membership in the national labor relations board for union benefits without actually and in good faith qualifying the union for those services.

The CIO expelled Mine-Mill in 1954, charging its leaders with communist domination. The union denied the charge.

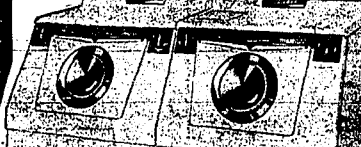

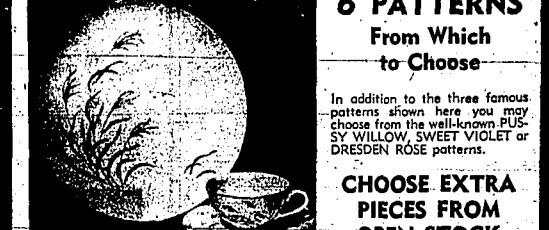
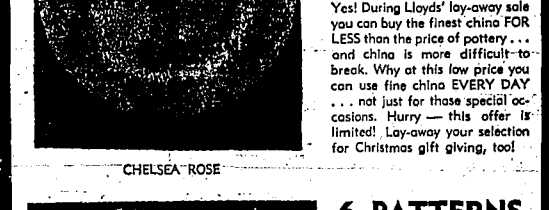

Farmers Keep Their Control Of Legislature

BOISE, Nov. 17 (AP)—Farmers and ranchers will continue to dominate the legislature in 1935 when the legislature convenes here in January, a survey by a Boise legislative reporting service showed today.

The Idaho capital report, a service of the Fodor Publishing company, shows that 21 of 40 senate seats and 23 of 50 house chairs would be held by farmers and ranchers.

Six "businessmen" will be represented by six senators and 17 representatives. The senators include 10 who have three representatives in the upper chamber and four in the house.

LAPWAI, Idaho, Nov. 17 (AP)—A check for \$200,000, the first payment of a \$2,800,000 settlement with the government for loss of fishing rights at Celilo Falls, went to the Nez Perce tribe yesterday.

The fishing grounds will be ruined in the spring when backwaters of the Dalles dam on the Columbia river cover them.

However, before the tribe can draw any of the money, a detailed and comprehensive plan for conservation and distribution of the money must be approved by the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Until then, the money will remain in the U.S. treasury, drawing interest, to the credit of the Nez Perce tribe.

The tribal executive committee already has a subcommittee working on a plan for the tribe to follow in using the money.

The remainder of the settlement will be made next March.
