# Western Diplomats Walk Out on Soviet Chief for Second Time at Polish Meet

MOSCOW, Nov. 18 (AP)—Western envoys walked out on Communist Party leader Nikita S. Khrushchev last night for the second time in two days when he gave them another tongue lashing and said God would be on the communist side if he believed in God.

"We will bury you," Khrushchev told the western diplomats at the reception at the Polish embassy to mark the signing of a Sovie-Polish agreement giving Poland the right to pursue an independent course of communism.

"If you do not like us," the vodka-drinking Khrushchev told the American, British and other envoys, "do not accept our invitations, and do not invite us to you."

He also blasted Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito although he did not mention him by name.

"Those socialist countries who boast of their experience and attempt to extol their forms and methods have a mistaken attitude that does not agree with the principles of Marxism-Leninism," he said.

The red-faced Khrushchev, apparently encouraged by the many top-level Soviet leaders gathered around him, delivered the bitter anti-western tirade at the dinner at the Polish embassy.

He ran the gamut of internal affairs and the course of communist theory and relations behind the iron curtain.

He brought God into it when he said:

"Things are going very well with us if we believe in the existence of God we would thank him for it."

Khrushchev was frequently interrupted by Soviet leaders standing around him, but there was no indication anyone was trying to shut him up. They applauded, laughed and encouraged him as he rambled on about Hungary, Egypt and the United States.

Each time Soviet leaders tried to correct or tone down his remarks, Khrushchev brushed them off.

Once Soviet President Khrushchev took exception to Khrushchev's remark that Egyptian Pres-

ident Gamal Abdel Nasser put communist in jail.

"He had to," said Voroshilov. "Don't try to help me," Khrushchev answered brusquely.

He said Britain and France had got into an "idiotic position" in attacking Egypt and Deputy Premier Anastas Mikoyan leaped forward and said, "let us say in a delicate position."

The NATO diplomatic corps walked out after Soviet reception for the Polish delegation Saturday because of Khrushchev's anti-western remarks. Last night, out of respect for the Poles, they merely withdrew to an afternoon until Khrushchev had finished speaking.

"We base ourselves on the idea that we must peacefully co-exist," Khrushchev said this time. "Only a madman would reject it. It doesn't depend on you whether or not we

could, whether you like it or not, history is on our side.—We will bury you."

He said British Prime Minister Anthony Eden said there was "no war in Egypt, that this is only a police action."

"When the British, French and Israelis cut the throats of the Egyptians this is only a police action aimed at restoring order," he said.

"What order is this?" Khrushchev asked. "For us it is the order of the continent, the order of civilization, the domination of strong over weak."

**CHIEF NAMED**

### Letter Home Gives View of Polar Living

(Editor: Helen Robert N. Barber, 17, 21st St., Twin Falls, Idaho. I am writing you from the Arctic region of the North Pole. I am a passenger, acting as cover ship for a two-engine Navy R4D, which landed in 50 below zero weather at the pole.)

MCMURDO SOUND, Antarctica, Nov. 19 (AP)—The other day I returned from my third flight over the South Pole.

On this flight, the C124 Globemaster, "City of Peoria," on which I was a passenger, acted as cover ship for a two-engine Navy R4D, which landed in 50 below zero weather at the pole.

**Flag Planted**  
As I watched from a window of the Globemaster, the commander of the current U. S. expedition in the Arctic, Adm. George Dufek, stepped from the R4D and planted the Stars and Stripes firmly in the snow.

Later we learned the spot where the plane landed actually was some four miles from the pole. But this close, considering the difficulty involved in fixing the location of the exact bottom of the world.

After 45 minutes on the snow, the R4D skidded across the ice and into the air for the flight from the pole back to Beardmore Glacier camp. There was a tense moment just after the plane was airborne. Oil lines were proving troublesome and the ship was forced to jettison fuel to lighten the load on the engines. We followed it to Beardmore where it landed safely.

**Sheltered**  
Living at McMurdo is comfortable and we are all well off here. The food is good as well as cozy, giving and the entertainment provided by a nightly movie is a boost to the morale of all hands.

But it's crowded here right now. There are 200 people living, where there is room for 50. Things are expected to improve "when the tourists leave" as the navy calls the many observers and others not taking part in actual scientific research here.

It's hard to know which is day and which is night here since the sun is out 24 hours a day and there is sometimes going on all hours.

### Four-Day Ordeal Ends for Woman

POCAHELLO, Nov. 19 (AP)—A 70-year-old Pocahellico woman was in a hospital today after lying helplessly for four days on the floor of her home, immobilized by a broken hip.

Attorneys said Mrs. Rosemary Bentley was in fair condition. A neighbor heard pounding on the front door of the Bentley home Thursday night and called police. Officers said she told them she had been hanging on the door since Sunday, when she had collapsed after entering her home.

Olen Hadley, chief of detectives, said Mrs. Bentley had broken the hip to fall on a sidewalk Sunday and had taken a cab home rather than go to the hospital.

### Legislation Eyed To Aid Refugees

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (AP)—Francis E. Walter of the house immigration subcommittee has drafted legislation to permit 1,000 Hungarian refugees to remain in this country indefinitely.

The Pennsylvania Democrat took the action yesterday as a follow-up to President Eisenhower's announcement last week that the refugees would be admitted to this country on an emergency basis.

Walter expressed confidence congress will pass the measure.

Smylie was forced to turn down the speaking invitation because of previous commitments.

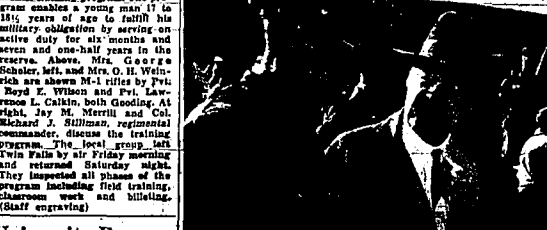
