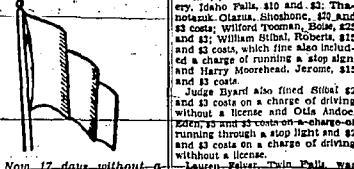

Plane Wings First of 5,000 Refugees Fleeing Reds to New Life in America

... give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free, by Emma Lazarus on the Statue of Liberty.

VIENNA, Nov. 20 (AP)—The first of 500 anti-communist Hungarians promised freedom in the United States flew westward today to a new life.

Forty-one men, women and children of different religious faiths, headed from Vienna aboard an airplane. They left behind a homeland torn in communist clutches.

The Flying Tiger line DC-4 headed for Munich, Germany, to pick up 49 more refugees before flying to the United States. It is scheduled to arrive at the McGuire air force base in New Jersey tomorrow morning (ET) 10 a.m. EST.

The plane, after a stop at Munich, took off for the United States from Prestwick, Scotland, at 11 a.m. (ET) with 28 men, 13 women and 19 children aboard.

The refugees had no trouble with customs agents because the passenger list bore the official note: "Number of bags—nil. They had only their lives and their freedom."

Only one refugee spoke English, the Rev. Imre Gabor, whose sole possessions were a Bible and a testament.

"The communists prohibited me from preaching for the last four years," he said during a brief rest stop at the Scottish airport. "I had to continue my work in secret."

Asked if he hoped to return to Hungary, he said: "My family do not want to go back, and I am of the same opinion."

36,000 Increase for Population Shown

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20 (Special)—Idaho has increased 36,000 in population since 1950 according to the census bureau's current population reports.

In 1950 the census found that Idaho had 688,537 residents. In July, 1956, the census bureau estimates there are 725,000 people living in the state. This is an increase of 6.1 per cent.

The other mountain states have grown in varying degree. Wyoming has an increase of 10.4 per cent; Montana, 8 per cent; Utah, 17.9 per cent; Colorado, 21.7 per cent; Nevada, 24 per cent; New Mexico, 18 per cent; Arizona, 41 per cent; and Oregon, 12.9 per cent.

"Campus club kitchen facilities were inspected by state public health officials in mid-October and given a high rating," said Charles Decker, director of student affairs. No samples of food served for lunch last Thursday were available. Dr. Ralph M. Alley, university physician, said only four students were hospitalized. They were released after a few days. The doctor said all cases were mild.

Hearing Is Due For Idaho Falls Brokerage Firm

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20 (Special)—Edward B. Clark and company, Idaho Falls, has been summoned to a hearing by the securities and exchange commission to determine whether the firm should be suspended from doing business as a broker-dealer. The hearing is scheduled for Nov. 28, in the commission's Seattle regional office. The order instituting proceedings asserts that information obtained as a result of investigations tends to show, among other things, that in the period from Dec. 1, 1955, to July 1, 1956, the firm violated the anti-trust provisions of the security act of 1933 and the securities exchange act of 1934 and the "net capital" rule; failed to keep proper books and records; failed to confirm transactions; converted customer's securities to the firm's own use for various periods of time; made secret profits in effecting transactions for customers; and filed a false financial statement with the commission.

The 23 new long range radar sets, capable of tracking airplanes at distances up to 200 miles, will be part of an expanding command-control and control network of more than 70 civil and military radar installations. James T. Pyle, Jr., acting GAA administrator, said the new radar equipment is the best yet developed. Plans announced last April to handle a fourfold increase in U. S. air traffic with a minimum of delay and with the greatest possible safety.

Airman Sentenced For Disobedience

DENVER, Nov. 20 (AP)—An air force court-martial has sentenced a 20-year-old airman to a maximum 3 1/2 years at hard labor and dishonorable discharge for refusing to salute an officer. Gunny Paulsen Orville Cupp, Dayton, Va., hasn't saluted since the day he became a Jehovah's Witness six months ago. He told the court that, regardless of the outcome of the trial, he would still refuse to salute or take orders he believed were contrary to the will of God.

Navy Is "Kidded" By State's Statute

MADISON, Wis., Nov. 20 (AP)—Navy men in Wisconsin take a lot of kidding these days from the army because of a careless mistake in a state statute. According to a 1909 law, it is illegal to wear navy clothing in Wisconsin but whoever wrote the law forgot to insert the crucial word "navy" in the main and qualifying section of the statute. Thus anyone wearing a navy uniform, unless he is in the army, marine or national guard, can be fined up to \$100 and sentenced to 30 days in jail.

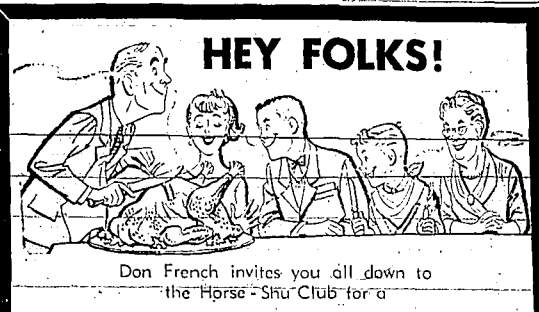

Police Judge Gives Report Of City Court

More than \$10,000 collected in fines and costs by the city's police court were turned over to the treasury during 1955. Police Judge W. O. Humphrey reported to the city commission Monday night.

Following a recent practice of meeting with city department heads after regular meetings, the judge invited Judge Humphrey to make a report regarding his function and problems. Previously the commission has heard reports from the judge and city fire chief.

Judge Humphrey told the members of the commission that during the year the court has acted on 390 traffic violations. This does not include parking or parking violations, he said.

He further stated his court is now dealing with a great number of juvenile traffic violators.

With these cases, he said, it is his duty to call in the parents of the juvenile and fully explain the youngster's rights under the law. Afterwards he continues to advise the parent so that the violator is punished within the limits of the law.

Most parents, he said, are cooperative. If a minor's license is suspended, the judge reported, the parents are notified. He said the judge spends about 30 minutes with the parents explaining the situation and the minor's rights.

In explaining fines and fees to the commission, the judge said that if a person is in violation of the law, the money goes to the city. If tried in the justice or state court, the money goes to the county.

Judge Humphrey's recent defeat of the office of justice of the peace does not affect his police judge status.

Chairman Lyons Smith said the practice of having department heads meet with the judge is a control measure which should be continued. He said that the judge should make occasional personal reports to the commission.

In a business discussion at the regular session of the commission, the commissioners decided to further study the problem of furnishing 1,000 picnic permits for the area of the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF). A request was made for each by the UN. The governor's letter said the permits would have a letter and tourist value, and would give the children valuable knowledge of the beauties of the world.

City Manager Joseph Lattimore reported receipt of a letter from Sir Robert B. Smyth, secretary of the city's request for state funds to aid in extending the runway at the municipal airport.

Lattimore pointed out the city has been paid into the state's aeronautics fund for \$15,000. The governor's letter said the request had been forwarded to the state's aeronautics board for study and a report.

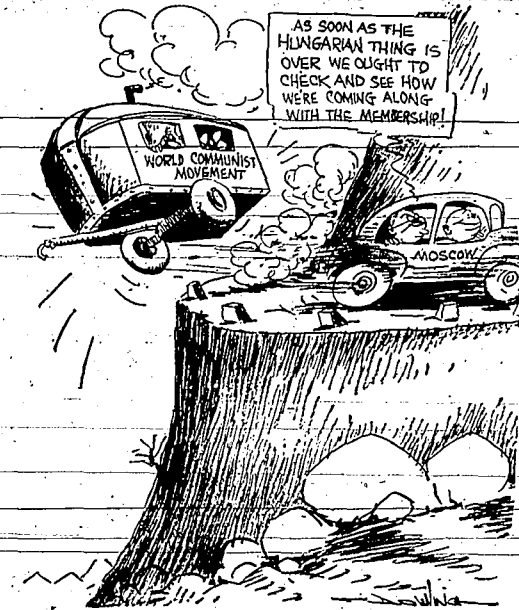

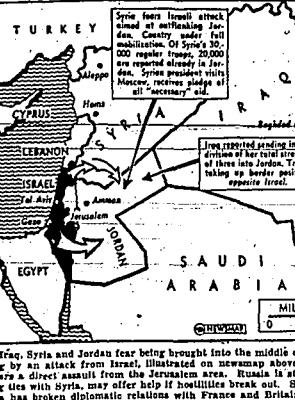

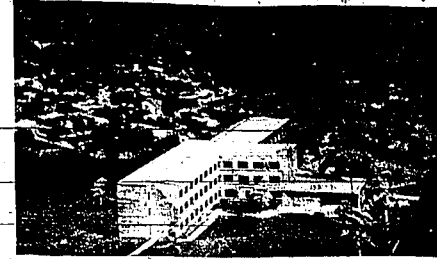

Kuts smilingly leaped into the street alone, slipped on the stairs and got the car moving. He struck a telephone pole, and blood pouring from his chin went into one of the big brick buildings housing the Soviet athletes. Later when his injuries were described as minor.

The Russian insisted Kuts was not badly hurt and immediately after the accident he went to the practice field for a few jaunts around the track.

Kuts appeared shaken at first but later seemed all right. As training tapered off political tensions raised their ugly heads to plague the International Olympic committee, which opened a three-day session.

A petition was distributed to the chief's mansion of all competing nations asking that they nominate athletes to bar Russia from the games. The petition was sent by the Hungarian Association of Amateur Athletes.

The petition said in effect that was incompatible with the Olympic ideal that athletes of the world should compete against one another, whose armies murdered innocent women and children.

Only the International Olympic committee could ban any team and this seemed unlikely in view of the announced stand that the games are a contest among individuals and that no politics should be allowed to enter the games.
