Civilians Protest Police Troops for Port Said Region

LONDON, Nov. 21 (UP)—The first token group of United Nations police troops entered Port Said today to keep peace between Anglo-French forces and the Egyptians. But noisy Egyptian demonstrators regarded them as just another occupation force. The (UNEP) reached Port Said today from the south in an emergency move to head off friction between the Anglo-French forces and the local population. From their reception, however, it appeared the UNEP troops still were a long way from being able to do any job of supervising the Mid East ceasefire.

In a report circulated to the U. N. secretary, recently in New York, General Dag Hammarskjöld said that a force of British, French and American troops from Egypt prevented the UNEP from taking over its full work.

Additional units may join the Norwegians if they prove too small a unit in acting as a "buffer" between the two forces and to prevent violations of the ceasefire.

At the same time informed sources said the British and French are seeking new volunteers for the police force in hopes of greatly expanding the unit. The force of 1,000 to a mobile force of at least division size, capable of dealing with new emergencies.

Funeral services will be conducted at 2 p.m. Friday at the First Methodist church by the Rev. W. A. Leach, pastor. Burial will be in the White mortuary. Concluding rites at Sunset Memorial park with interment in the Mausoleum. The family suggests memorial contributions to the Methodist building fund.

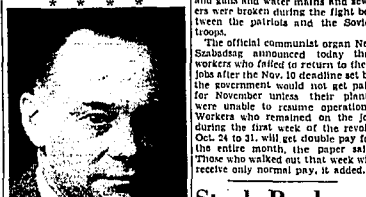
Budapest Struck By Epidemics of Deadly Diseases

VIENNA, Nov. 21 (UP)—A polio epidemic has broken out in war-ravaged Budapest, the communist controlled Budapest radio announced today. The radio said a polio epidemic had hit Budapest and Dobrence, the nation's third-largest city with a population of 100,000 some 100 miles east of Budapest. It also reported the spreading epidemic of amoebic dysentery from the hot water population of some 1.7 million when the anti-communist revolt erupted. Soviet tanks and jeeps took a toll of many thousands in the fighting.

The situation is even more critical because of a shortage of soap and other necessities. The communist masters had denied public and small children are threatened by a shortage of fresh milk in a country where rationing since the start of the revolt.

The public health situation generally in Budapest "unstable," it said. Much of the city itself was rubble from Soviet tanks and guns and water and sewerage were broken during the fight between the patriots and the Soviet troops.

The official communist organ Nep Szabados announced today that workers who did not return to their jobs after the Nov. 10 deadline set by the government would not get paid for November and the November plants were unable to resume operations. Workers who remained on the job during the first week before Oct. 21, will get double pay for the entire month, the paper said. Those who walked out that week will receive only normal pay, it added.

Stock Broker Pleads Guilty In Fraud Case

BOISE, Nov. 21 (UP)—Harold I. Nielsen, Twin Falls investment broker, pleaded guilty in U.S. district court today to violating a court injunction.

The injunction had been issued by Judge Baker here in 1935 from dealing fraudulently with stock of the Big Piney Oil and Uranium company. Nielsen was charged with selling shares of the company to investors and then selling them to the company at a profit.

Sentencing was set for today. Proceedings signed by Marion J. Calkins, U.S. district judge, and Donald J. Stoking, attorney for the securities and exchange commission, charged that certificates of Big Piney Oil and Uranium company stock had been misappropriated and sold in a manner which has operated as a "fraud and deceit upon the public." Nielsen was charged with selling to such stockholders.

The government charged that Nielsen was in San Francisco in 1935, about Nov. 30, 1935, causing sale of 2,000 shares to be made and registered in the name of Nielsen.

A remaining 1,100 shares, the government contended, Nielsen retained.

Listed as stockholders of record for the 6,000 shares was Paul Raymond Olsen, Ruit Cannon and M. O. Rigby.

The stock transaction was handled by Nielsen's partner, Joseph Leo Anderson, in Salt Lake City.

In addition to the above charges, Nielsen was charged with selling shares for great profit. Nielsen had left the judicial district, and a restraining order was issued against him.

U.S. Reported Ready To Help in Oil Crisis

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (UP)—The United States was reported yesterday to have pledged cooperation with 17 western European countries to help meet their emergency demands for oil from the western hemisphere. Acting Secretary of State Herbert Hoover, Jr., informants said, gave this assurance to Italy's Ambassador. The ambassador's appeal for swift American aid to prevent a shortage of middle east oil from crippling Europe's industries. Hoover is understood to have promised that American assistance, but only after European countries get together and decide how much oil is needed for the entire region and what shipping is available.

The government's combined requirement plan has been submitted. Hoover expressed readiness to give prompt and favorable consideration in the light of America's capacity to step up fuel shipments overseas.

An emergency oil shipment plan was drafted last August in connection with the Suez canal crisis. This called for delivery of 30,000 to 40,000 tons of oil daily to western Europe.

The government, however, has hitherto been reluctant to rush emergency oil supplies to Europe even though the Suez canal has been blocked and the flow of oil through Middle East pipelines almost completely interrupted. Top officials have deliberately delayed, fearing the Arabs would interpret such shipments as support for the British-French invasion of Egypt.

Authorities also have feared "protectionist" American oil deliveries would give the Arabs that they would up pipelines still operating and wreck oil installations.

Vehicle's Plates Readied for Sale

BOISE, Nov. 21 (UP)—Idaho's motor vehicle plates are being readied for sale through the state Saturday, Dec. 1. State Law Enforcement Commissioner Zeno Koehler said today.

The new plates are light green with white numerals. They will read "Idaho-Idaho-famous-potato" to fit the 1937 plates. In the purchase of the 1937 plates was Jan. 1, 1937. The change is not an extension granted this year.

Children Burned Fresh Little Girl Burned to Death

BOISE, Nov. 21 (UP)—Three little girls burned to death last night when the contents of a can caught fire against the stove in a one-room shack near here.

The girls, aged 1, 2 and 3, were sleeping in the shack when the fire broke out. The mother, who was asleep, did not wake up until the girls were already dead.

The fire was caused by a can of kerosene which had tipped over and caught fire. The fire spread rapidly and the girls were unable to escape.

The mother was taken to the hospital and is recovering from her injuries. The cause of the fire is still under investigation.

Mrs. McDonald was arrested in Burley, where she had obtained \$1,000 in checks from several merchants. She is charged with forging the checks.

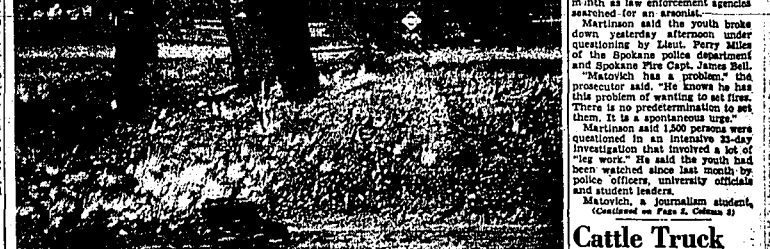

Matovich, 20, Kellogg, Id., signed a statement in which he made "a full confession to all dormitory fires" on the campus, Koehler said. The youth, held under \$40,000 bond, is charged, however, with setting only a minor fire at Christmas hall when he lived. The three students died in an early morning blaze at Coit hall about two blocks away.

Savings, Loan Hearing Is Set Here Nov. 29

Smylie to Try to Balance State Budget Despite 7-Millions Gap

BOISE, Nov. 21 (UP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie, faced with a seven-million dollar gap between anticipated revenues and expenditures as outlined by Idaho's joint legislative budget committee, set out today to put together a balanced budget. "Modification is possible and it is my intention to submit a balanced budget to the legislature," Smylie told newsmen here today for the proposed \$60,215,664 general fund budget from the committee. The proposed budget provides \$7,500,000 above anticipated revenue and surplus left over from the current one.

The governor said he thought the figures could be brought closer together by trimming some recommended appropriations and taking a "more realistic" view of the amount of revenue which can be expected.

The governor implied that the surplus for the current biennium will be more than the \$2,800,000 estimated by the committee.

The legislature appropriated \$125,000,000 from the general fund for the current biennium.

The committee estimated the state surplus for the current biennium at \$2,800,000. The governor's estimate is \$7,500,000. The legislature's estimate is \$125,000,000.

Yankee Ships To Have New Rocket Punch

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (UP)—The navy disclosed today that its new killer ships are being armed with a powerful new anti-submarine rocket known as "hedgehogable."

The rocket, which carries a conventional explosive charge, may be the "retreater" of a ship-launched atomic depth charge. It has been under secret development by the navy since 1934. The rocket is designed to penetrate to the underside thereof by Russia's large submarine fleet.

The new 3,400-ton class destroyer are now equipped with the hedgehogable. The new class destroyers in the active fleet are now armed with the weapon. All new destroyer escorts will have the weapon.

The navy said the weapon will give destroyers "greater range and latitude of action" against submarines. It gave no details on the rocket's range.

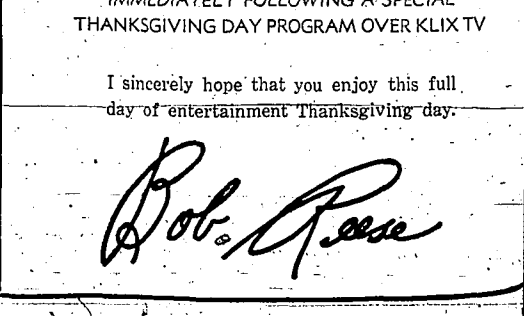

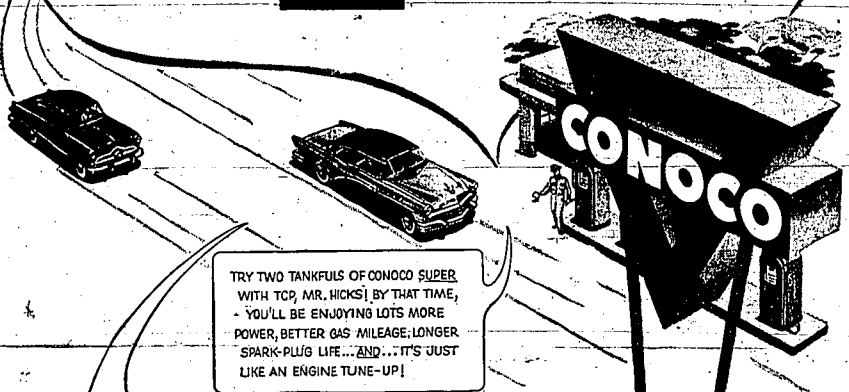

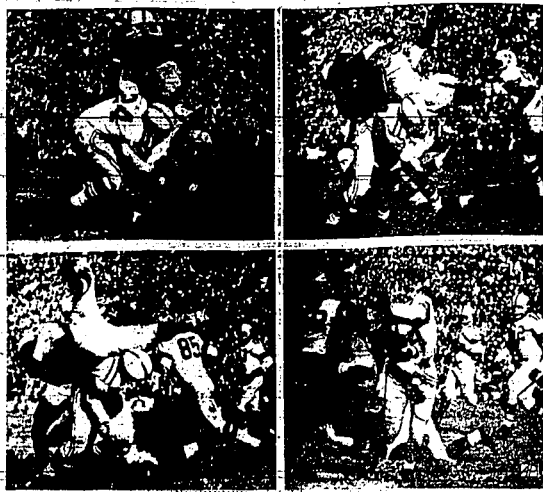

Student trainee examinations for positions in the fields of accounting, agricultural economics, biological and plant sciences, entomology, home economics, plant pest control and statistics have been announced by the U. S. Civil Service Commission, reports Agnes A. Strunk, Twin Falls examiner-in-charge.

At the same time Miss Strunk announced that "Professional" engineers and scientists are needed for filling vacancies in California.

One year of college study is necessary for student trainee positions paying \$2,175 per year, while two and one-half years are required for positions with a yearly salary of \$3,415, Miss Strunk said.

The engineering and scientific positions pay from \$1,115 to \$1,610 per year, she added. Further information may be obtained from her office in the Twin Falls postoffice building or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C.
