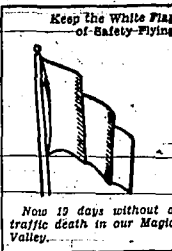

Mrs. SARAH HALE AND PRESIDENT LINCOLN PIONEER MAKING THANKSGIVING AN ANNUAL HOLIDAY 1863.



The oldest and most truly American of our holidays, Thanksgiving, was celebrated by the Pilgrims in 1623 with their Indian friends in 1623. Two years later, the first real Thanksgiving was set aside, not as a harvest festival, but as a day of prayer. A resolution proclaiming our first national Thanksgiving was passed by Congress despite vigorous debate, and George Washington set aside Thursday, Nov. 26, 1789, as a day of Public Thanksgiving and Prayer. President Lincoln, influenced greatly by the plea of Mrs. Sarah Josepha Hale, issued a national Thanksgiving proclamation on Oct. 3, 1863—in the midst of the Civil War—proclaiming Thanksgiving an annual holiday, since that time, every President has proclaimed Thanksgiving a legal holiday in the whole nation except its shops, offices, schools and banks, and offers thanks to God for the blessings of our free and beautiful land.

### Civil Defense Facilities Put On Top Alert

**WASHINGTON, Nov. 22**—Since the Middle East crisis developed the civil defense administration has quietly placed its seven regional offices on 24-hour alert.

The alert is a result of the increased tension situation, particularly in the light of the civil defense act of 1954. The administrator said "if any present emergency situation should occur, so that improvements in plans can be made."

Peterson said the national civil defense headquarters is always on 24-hour duty to alert the nation in case of an enemy attack or a natural disaster. Last week the regional offices also were placed on 24-hour alert.

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### Shoshone Gets Data at Parley On Proposed Sewage System

SHOSHONE, Nov. 22.—Data on the proposed sewer system for Shoshone was given representatives of various occupations at a special meeting Monday night at the city hall.

Mayor Arthur Hall introduced representatives of the public health department, Engineer Wendell Smith, and other city officials.

Representing the public health department were Al Schaeffer, health commissioner, and Dr. Cecil Reinhold, Twin Falls, health director, and Richard H. Warren, Boise, junior public health engineer.

Organizations represented were the American Legion post, Rotary club, Civic club, Legion auxiliary, Mother's circle, City Water Supply, Bert Tracy and City Attorneys Jack Murphy and Fred Schwartz.

Smith explained the sewage plant and system from a location, stating the proposed plant site adjacent to the old slaughter house west of the city limits.

There would be three lift stations and a primary treatment plant. The plant would be used for final disposal of the sewage.

There would be no further maintenance cost added to the estimated \$200,000 cost of construction and installation.

Dr. Reinhold said "You are sitting on a keg of dynamite." He gave an analysis of the water system of Shoshone and the chance of contamination of area wells from the sewer disposal system.

Although the current flow for the area may appear to slant in one direction, the underground flow may direct in an opposite direction and even the deeper wells are not safe.

Warren said once approved by the city, the public health department continues to check the installation to see that requirements are met.

"From a health angle," he said, "Shoshone will be in about the best position of any city in the state if a sewer system is approved."

"There is nothing more dangerous to public health than people dumping waste into a hole in the ground, in doing so, the water will reach the well-water system in most cases."

Even though a sewage plant may appear to be expensive, over the years it will save property owners money.

Olla advantages listed by the public health officials in the installation of the system would be that EPA loans could be approved for the city, bringing more young people to the community and making property more valuable.

The amount of chlorine needed in the water system here may be reduced if the sewer system is installed, officials pointed out.

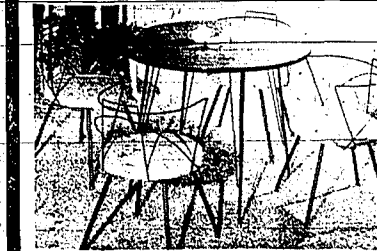

### Blaze Season Damage Said "Not Severe"

BOISE, Nov. 22 (AP)—Idaho this year had one of its least-damaging fire seasons of the past decade, the fire-fighting Roger Guernsey has reported.

### Shipper Band Asking Repeal On Excise Tax

**DENVER, Nov. 22 (AP)**—The Central Western Shippers' Advisory board asked that federal excise taxes on transportation be repealed. The board, in a resolution approved at its 7th regular meeting, said the taxes of three per cent on freight and 10 per cent on passenger fares are "unreasonable and inequitable."

The board also predicted a 42-per cent increase in freight car loadings for the central-western states in the first quarter of 1957, compared to the same period this year.

More than 3,100 freight shippers in Colorado, Nebraska, Utah, Wyoming, Idaho, Oregon and Iowa are represented by the organization.

The resolution called the freight tax "extremely discriminatory," and added: "It has promoted the growth of private transportation at the expense of the common carrier."

The board forecast that Utah car loadings in the first three months of next year will go up 13.8 per cent, Colorado 41 per cent and Wyoming 16 per cent.

It predicted a 5.8 per cent decrease for the Idaho-Oregon area if average rates are 2.1 per cent drop for Nebraska-Iowa.

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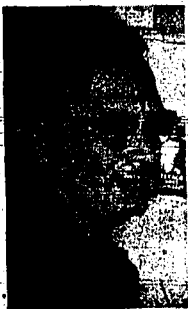

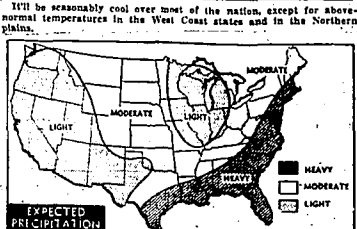

### Americans Spend Half Billion For Turkeys During Holidays

NEW YORK, Nov. 22 (AP)—Americans will spend about half a billion dollars this year for turkeys, most of it at Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Millions of gobblers have gone to the slaughter in the past few months and those that survived the annual Thanksgiving slaughter face a gloomy future. Another purge is planned before Christmas.

The 1956 turkey crop is a big one—76,240,000 birds or about 1 1/2 for each American family. Back in 1930 there were only 17,419,000 gobblers, or about half a bird for each family.

The department of agriculture estimated that about 75 per cent of the turkey crop will have been killed and processed by the end of November. The remainder will be killed in October, a spokesman said.

The banner turkey crop bears lower price tags this year than last, according to the department. The department estimated that turkey prices at retail are running anywhere from \$8 to 10 cents a pound below 1955, depending on the size of the bird you buy.

Turkeys have been the overwhelming favorite at the Thanksgiving table ever since 1621.

"Turkey consumption in the U. S., the country that made the gobbler famous (it has been suggested as the national emblem to replace the eagle), has been rising steadily through the years.

This year, according to the department of agriculture, turkey consumption will average 8 1/2 pounds for every man, woman and child in the country. That compares with 2 1/2 pounds in the years prior to World War II.

### Idaho Twins Face Medical Exam Series

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 22 (AP)—Tests began yesterday to determine whether twin brothers from Mink Creek, Idaho, can undergo a rare kidney transplant.

The 13-year-old twins, Jerry and Jimmy Foster, arrived by plane last night with their mother, Juanita. They were admitted to Peter Bent Brigham hospital where kidney transplant surgery has been performed successfully on three adult and five identical twins.

If Jimmy, who is doomed to a slow death from nephritis, and Jerry prove to be identical twins, they will be the first children to undergo such an operation.

Doctors said the two boys would be kept under observation for several weeks before the operation would be attempted if they are found to be identical.

Jimmy, the smaller of the two, contracted the fatal kidney disease about a year ago. If the operation is attempted, one of Jerry's healthy kidneys will be grafted to Jimmy. After it begins functioning, the one at a time over a period of about six months.

The first successful kidney transplant at Peter Bent Brigham was performed on Ronald and Richard Hicks, 23, Northboro, Mass., Dec. 23, 1954. Jesse and Louis Holman, 40, Washington, D. C., underwent the second operation. The third transplant was on 15-year-old Margaret, twin sister, Mrs. Edith Helm and Mrs. Wanda Foster, from Oklahoma, early this year.

**Rail Workers Reach Accord In Wage Hike**

CHICAGO, Nov. 22 (AP)—The nation's major railroads and the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and Engineers Wednesday agreed upon wage increases.

The agreement covering about 50,000 workers provides: Pay raises ranging from 10 to 15 cents an hour for the first year. An increase of 7 cents an hour Nov. 1, 1957.

The announcement, made in behalf of the national railroad union board, said the package agreement costs "the equivalent of 29 1/2 cents an hour over a three-year period."

But spokesmen for both sides said the 5 1/2 figure involved calculations based on many job classifications, and they skipped a detailed explanation.

The understanding followed the pattern of the Nov. 2 settlement with the 11 major operating unions, which represent about 720,000 employees not directly engaged in running trains.

Those 11 unions received wage increases of 10 cents an hour immediately, and raised their rates one hour in each of the next two years.

The new contract provides for cost-of-living escalator clause. Under that arrangement, wage rates will rise or fall one cent an hour for each change in a fair wage in the consumer price index compiled by the bureau of labor statistics.

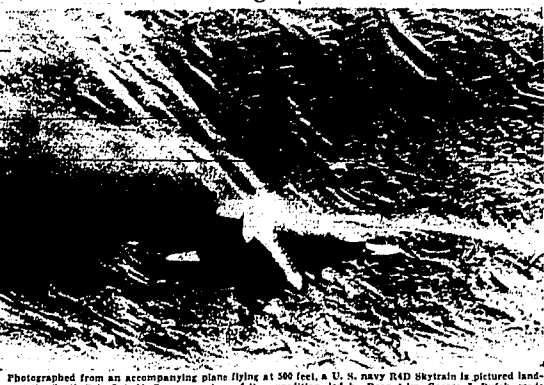

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### Business Has Cash Gifts for Stockholders

NEW YORK, Nov. 22 (U.S. Christmas is coming early for some lucky stockholders.

A heavy flow of year-end and extra dividend payments has started from the board-rooms where directors of a sizable number of corporations are "lolling up the year's business and the prospects for 1935."

The tide is expected to increase after Thanksgiving.

Many directors like to wait until they have a good idea of the entire year's record before handing out largesse to the shareholders—and some boards wait until January.

Many boards are finding plenty for which to be thankful today, in just three days directors have declared dividends on 180 issues of stocks.

Two voted year-end payments and 16 voted extra dividends, in 18 other cases, without mentioning the approaching yule season, they increased the payment above that previously paid. Holders of five other stock issues got special dividends. And one corporation resumed quarterly dividend payments on common stock after a lapse of 25 years.

Not all stockholders are as happy. Two companies reduced their dividends, in line with the pinch on their profits this year for one cause or another. And one big company, sending out year end dividend checks isn't making them as fat this year as last.

But for a lot of stockholders the year end generosity of directors puts an "ing on a year" that has been very lousy.

### Kremlin Realignment Is Seen In Molotov's New Assignment

By THOMAS F. WHITNEY

The re-emergence of V. M. Molotov into a more prominent role in Moscow probably means an important realignment of Kremlin factions and forces is taking place, in the continuing power struggle that began with Stalin's death.

It almost certainly indicates that Nikita Khrushchev has suffered a setback in power and position—that his opponents in the top Soviet leadership have firmed up the coalition they formed against him last summer and are in the process of executing an assault against him.

The key question is where the Soviet army stands and the probabilities are that Defense Minister Marshal Zhukov has thrown his immense weight against Khrushchev because of army officers' alarm at the danger to Soviet positions in eastern Europe as a result, they consider, of Khrushchev's policies.

A key personality in the Kremlin maneuvering is likely a man little known in the West—Mikhail Suslov. He holds the position of a secretary in the central committee of the communist party, with rank up to the present time only second to Khrushchev himself.

Information reaching the West through "Buzgalin" indicates Suslov last July at a central committee meeting led a successful campaign to defeat Khrushchev on his policy toward President Tito of Yugoslavia.

In any case, whether Suslov or someone else is pushing the strings in the anti-Khrushchev operation, the way in which Molotov has come back into the limelight makes it seem more likely that for the present, at least it is not Molotov who is playing the role of king-maker or king-breaker.

The two new positions which Molotov has acquired in the last two days are important but they are probably not those he would choose.

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to stepping stones to the top position in the Kremlin hierarchy. On the one hand Molotov has apparently the job of communist party supervision over the Soviet area. On the other he has been named minister of state which can be unimportant or important depending on the man who runs it and his authority. Essentially it's an auditing and inspection-organization with semi-police powers.

The labels which are currently being pasted on the Kremlin factions, "anti-Stalinist" to indicate Khrushchev and his adherents and "Stalinist" to describe his opponents, are in all probability a somewhat misleading oversimplification.

There is a considerable validity in little in applying the term to a number of other Kremlin leaders who are likely to have joined Molotov, Suslov and others to curb Khrushchev.

It would also be a mistake to jump to the conclusion that Nikita Khrushchev has "made" it. This man is fast on his feet.
