Attorney General To Help Prepare Fire Prosecution

MOSCOW, Nov. 23 (AP)—Atty. Gen. Graydon Smith is expected Tuesday to lend a hand in preparing the case against Paul D. Matovich, 20-year-old University of Idaho freshman charged with arson. Smith told newsmen in Boise today he is going to Moscow at the request of Prosecuting Atty. Lloyd Hartman. Smith said he does not know how long he would be in Moscow "because I don't know all the facts in the case." "It could be only a day, or it could stretch out to a week or more," Smith added.

Matovich was arrested Tuesday afternoon and Matovich said he has signed a confession admitting all four fires in campus dormitories last month, including one in which three students died. Matovich was held in the jail for some time and then was taken to the Federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kan. He is held under \$100,000 bond in connection with a minor fire in a rooming house in Boise. He has not been charged in the fatal fire at Gault hall.

Anti-Soviet Hungarians Disappear After Getting Safe Conduct Guarantee

VIENNA, Nov. 23 (AP)—Yugoslavia charged today that deported Premier Imre Nagy and 12 other Hungarians vanished after they left asylum in its Budapest embassy with a safe conduct guarantee from the Hungarian regime. The Hungarians had not reached their homes today despite an agreement between Belgrade and the Moscow-backed Hungarian government that they would not be arrested, a Yugoslav spokesman said. Foreign Undersecretary Dobrovic Vite warned the Hungarian charge d'affaires in Belgrade that any interference with the missing-Hungarians was regarded as a grave violation of international law. Nagy, who became premier one month ago today, and several members of his short-lived anti-Russian government fled to asylum in the Yugoslav embassy in Nov., when Russian troops invaded Budapest.

Switzerland Has Maritime Future

FOREIGN MONEY PILES UP

Disclosure at long last that members of U. S. senate committees spent \$188,000 of U. S. government counterpart funds for travel abroad last year puts the finger on U. S. treasury's tremendous operations in foreign currencies.

For the fiscal year ended last June 30 they amounted to over a billion dollars. This is more than it took to run the whole U. S. government for a year prior to World War I.

When the Marshall plan and subsequent foreign aid programs were at peak operation, they provided the principal sources of foreign money.

The deal was that the U. S. gave aid to foreign countries. They paid for the aid with their own money because they didn't have dollars.

Those were the famous "counterpart funds" that congress took a cut of to provide for travel expenses of "investigating committees" who traveled abroad to investigate.

Up to the time when Sen. Carl Hayden, D., Ariz., made public first figures on last year's expenditures by senate committees, it has been impossible to get any idea on how money was being expended.

There still is no break-down by individual congressmen—who who he spent it for—although this is very definitely public business.

The treasury's real problem is how to get rid of these foreign currencies, once they are collected. They can't be exchanged for dollars and there aren't enough things the U. S. wants to buy.

U. N. POLICE ACTION
Though it will take considerable time for the world to learn how effective the United Nations police force will be in Egypt, the mere fact of its creation may prove one of the big headlines of the year.

The charter of the U. N. envisioned such a force. But heretofore the opposition to its establishment has been compelling. This one great chance the U. N. seemed to have to show some teeth was spurned by its members.

To be sure, upon the outbreak of the Korean war a "United Nations Command" was set up to defend South Korea against Communist aggression. But everyone understood that was only a military force, and that we had sought U. N. sanction for a defense we would surely have made anyhow.

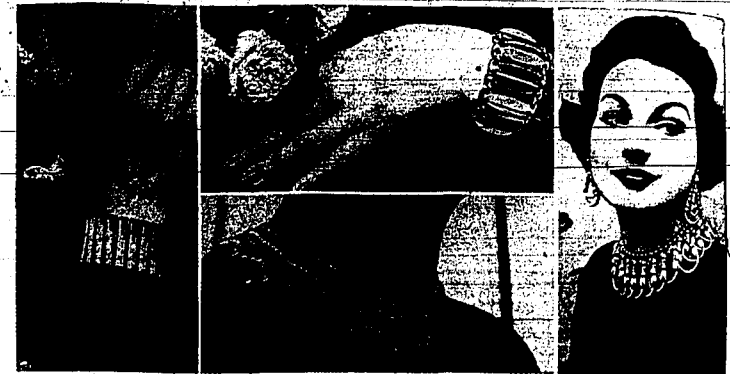

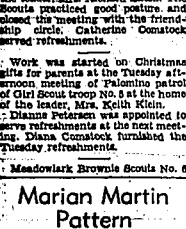

Grants Given To Start Top Training Job

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 (AP)—The National Science Foundation announced yesterday the award of more than four million dollars in grants to 14 colleges and universities for individualized training of high school science and mathematics teachers.

Alan T. Walslerman, director of the foundation, a government agency, estimated 150 teachers will be enrolled in the \$4,000,000 program which it starts in September, 1957.

Each teacher is to follow a course of study especially designed for him. College instructors will be chosen for both competence in their field and for skill in presenting it. Teachers' salaries will get upwards of \$3,000 each for the academic year, with extra allowances for dependents and travel expenses.

The foundation has been operating summer teacher-training programs of \$100 each for the academic programs similar to those announced yesterday have been tested at the University of Wisconsin and Oklahoma A and M college.

Scholar Notes Differences in U. S. Catholics

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 (AP)—America's 22 million Catholics in the United States are not the same as other Catholics in the world.

In their long struggle for "acceptance" by a predominantly Protestant culture, they have taken on the "color" and "accent" of their life to such an extent that their Catholicism now is "quite different" from that of Europe and Latin America.

This conclusion is expressed by a Jesuit scholar, Rev. Dr. Joseph Weigel, in a new book, "The Catholic Church, U.S.A.," to which 24 other prominent Catholic writers contributed. The book records the growth of the Roman communion from a small and often persecuted group to the largest single religious body in the United States, comprising one-third of the total church membership.

Doctrines Not Involved

Weigel, theology professor at Maryland's Woodstock college and a leader of the Catholic intellectual movement, emphasizes that the "differences" of American Catholicism do not involve doctrinal differences.

"American Catholicism, first of all is Roman Catholicism, with no denying that," he said. "It is its differences from European and Latin-American Catholicism 'do not imply any doctrinal differences' as they are explained by differences of history and cultural background."

Here are some of the "overall traits" which Weigel said "distinguish American Catholicism from Catholicism elsewhere:

"The American Catholic has explicitly chosen to be a Catholic and the religion was not thrust upon him by a culture. If he chooses to become a Protestant or Muslim, the church member, 'no social condemnation will fall upon him'—unlike the Catholic in Europe, France or Brazil, the American is under no 'pressure' from the cultural environment to be a thin, nominal allegiance to Catholicism.

"The American Catholic is much more tolerant of non-Catholic religions than members of European communities where only one religion is effectively present. He accepts American 'religious pluralism' as a fact of life and is not 'scandalized' by it. It is impossible for him to entertain fanatical notions concerning Protestants, he 'knows too many.' And 'his own love of religion makes him prefer to have his neighbor in some church or other than in no church at all.'

The American Catholic regards religion primarily as 'something to do rather than something to believe about.' Activity—in the form of good works and moral endeavor—is more congenial to him than contemplation.

Tito Denies Visit Okay for Hearst

BELOGRADE, Yugoslavia, Nov. 23 (AP)—Yugoslav officials refused to admit British broadcaster Hearst, Jr. for a visit to the New York publisher.

"The personal appearance in articles appearing in his newspaper is now in Bonn, Germany. He is one of a number of private citizens who have been asked to make an on-the-spot study in Norway, Denmark, West Germany and Austria on behalf of the United States special senate committee investigating foreign aid programs.

Nation's Stores Officially Open 1956's Yuletide Season; Record Sales Hoped

NEW YORK, Nov. 23 (AP)—The Christmas season opened officially today in the nation's stores. In the next four weeks they should do about one-fourth of their entire year's business—it's the season that makes or breaks the year for most of them.

Shoppers will have to show more buying spirit than they have in the last four weeks if the hopes for a record sales volume are realized. Unseasonably warm weather in November got the blame in many cities for sluggish sales.

The rather slow start worries some merchants who have loaded up with large stocks in expectation of record sales.

They have other problems. "Finding extra clerical help is harder this year—with the nation's total employment already at a record. Some retailers have foreign purchases tied up by the dock strike, although in most cases the imported articles arriving in volume in December. Importers count upon this being the largest Christmas season for foreign goods.

Another worry is what effect the recurring war scares will have on consumers' buying tendencies. Still another is the reaction to higher prices this year on many items.

But most merchants count heavily on the plus factors this season. Disposable income after taxes is at a record high. Some previously depressed areas are humming again.
