# West's Economy Called Dependent 'On Water Rights'

**BOISE, Nov. 27 (UP)**—Assistant Agriculture Secretary Edwin L. Peterson today told members of the Idaho Farm Bureau Federation that the stability of water rights, he spoke at two two-day sessions of the state Farm Bureau's three-day convention here. "The right to use water, and the vesting of the right, have traditionally been functions of the states," Peterson said. "Changes in numerous enactments, has recognized the water rights vesting under state law. That situation must not be disturbed."

Because of these changes, he said, "the assistant agriculture secretary said there had been almost 20 years in all previous years. The changes had been brought about by science and technology, stemming largely from land grant colleges and supported research and education. # Hungarian Red Regime Starts to Crackdown on "Criminals and Rebels"

**VIENNA, Nov. 27 (UP)**—A wave of arrests was reported from Hungary today in the wake of Soviet-sponsored puppet Premier Janos Kadar's announced crackdown on "criminals and counter-revolutionaries." Reports reaching Vienna said Hungary's puppet government was losing no time in putting its new "tough" policy into effect. Arrests of former freedom fighters' leaders were reported under all over the country. Returning diplomats reported the crackdown was started even before Kadar took the nation in a radio broadcast last night; "solely to declare that all criminals and counter-revolutionaries will be sought out and put on trial." In the countryside, the Russians arrested the 600-man-strong Hungarian army guard stationed at the village of Siroki, near the Austrian frontier.

Soldiers were charged with supporting the freedom-fighters by refusing to join the puppet government to freedom across the iron curtain border.

Premier Kadar was riding toughness over the disaffected leaders of the underground resistance of the uprising against the Soviet-backed regime.

# Soviet Infiltration Raises War Threat Between Syria, Iraq

**LONDON, Nov. 27 (UP)**—Wholesale Soviet infiltration into Syria threatened today to spark a clash between Syria and Iraq. There were urgent appeals to the United States to take prompt action to prevent the new threat to peace in the Middle East.

Over-shadowed developments in the Iraq crisis where the danger of war remained great despite the growing numbers of United Nations emergency forces (UNEF) arriving in Egypt, Turkey, a member of the pro-Western Baghdad pact with Iraq, and a steady stream of Soviet arms into Syria.

Reports reaching London said Syria had been warned by the United States for more arms and warned Syria in an official note that it would not be a "strategic ally" if it did that. It said the campaign in Syria had assumed "dangerous proportions" and it condemned the campaign against Iraq being waged in the controlled Syrian press.

Iraq media took note of the situation today and blamed the United States for what it called a "provocative campaign" against Syria. It said the campaign was "accompanied by attempts to goad Iraq into a military attack on Syria to fresh gambles in the Middle East."

The various reports added up to this: The anti-communist Jordanian countries, particularly Iraq, Iran, Turkey and Pakistan, were lining up to support the United States. They had accepted vast amounts of Soviet military supplies and equipment. Authorities in Syria and Iraq said the new Middle East struggle was potentially more dangerous to world peace than the current struggle between Israel and Arab states. # More Yield on Same Acres Seen for 1975

**WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (UP)**—An agriculture department economist said today the volume of farm output needed in 1975 can be produced without substantial new acreage despite the population increase. The economist, Carl P. Heistic, chief of the production economics research branch, told the House Agriculture Committee that the nation's need for food, feed and fiber needed about 20 years from now may be about a third larger than today. But he said a shift in the use of today's farmland, plus technological advances to increase yields should allow the job without bringing large new areas under the plow.

In a prepared talk, he gave this picture of probable changes in land use by 1975:

—About four million fewer acres of cropland will be needed than in 1950. Several million fewer acres of other farm land will be needed. There are three million fewer acres of soybeans will be required. Wheat and corn will require about the same acreage as is being used now. An increase of about 13 million acres for hay will be needed.

### Police to Halt Crime Efforts Of Hoodlums

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Nov. 27.—Juvenile authorities said today "fantastic" plans for crimes had been revealed with the arrest of teen-agers in a crackdown on gangs of young hoodlums.

Four more high-school boys were arrested yesterday. In the past two weeks 29 boys, ranging in age from 13 to 16, have been apprehended by authorities.

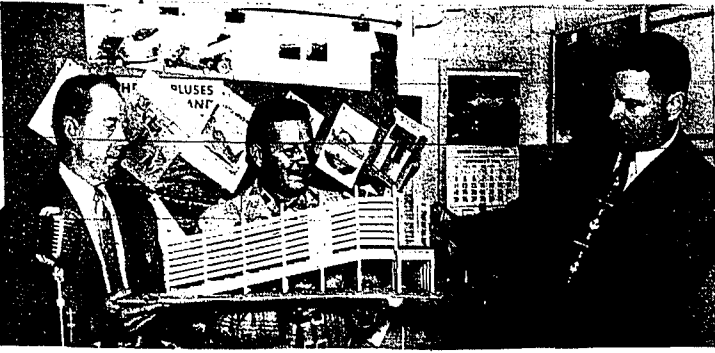

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### Refusal Asked For Proposals In Dam Battles

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (AP)—The federal power commission was asked today to refuse to let public power groups interfere in a hearing on a proposal for two private utility dams in the Snake river.

The lawsuit was urged by the Pacific Northwest Power company, which seeks a license to construct dams at Mountain Sheep and Pleasant Valley on the Columbia river tributary between Idaho and Oregon.

The reports were attributed to a source described as a senior member of the East-Nagya's office in the Hungarian government, now in Austria.

The Austrian interior ministry said that so far as it knows there is no senior member of Nagya's government in Austria and a spokesman commented that if one had got away he would be unlikely to know much about what the Russians have been doing since Nov. 4, when the Russians ousted Nagya.

### Survey Shows Skill Level of U. S. Labor to Rise in Future

PORTLAND, Nov. 27—Technological developments, including automation in the future, will result in an increase of the skill level of the labor force and consequently an upsurge of job opportunities, a recent economic survey reveals.

According to the National Association of Manufacturers, author of the survey, our labor force will increase some 50 per cent by 1975 with a greater proportion of these workers in the "skilled" category.

While the unskilled labor force increases by 35 per cent the number of skilled craftsmen will jump 46 per cent and the number of semi-skilled operatives will climb 40 per cent. Laborers will decrease by 11 per cent, the NAM estimates.

Parm workers will be almost one-third fewer by 1975, continuing a downward trend which began some years ago, the NAM added. Service workers are expected to increase by one-fourth in the next 20 years.

Largest gain will be the 75 per cent increase in number of professional people. They are expected to grow at over twice the rate for the whole work force. A sizeable increase will be noted for electrical and other personnel—an expected 51 per cent. There will be 38 per cent more proprietors and managers in 1975, the NAM added.

The year 1975 will see a total labor force of 83 million compared to 62 million today, the NAM said.

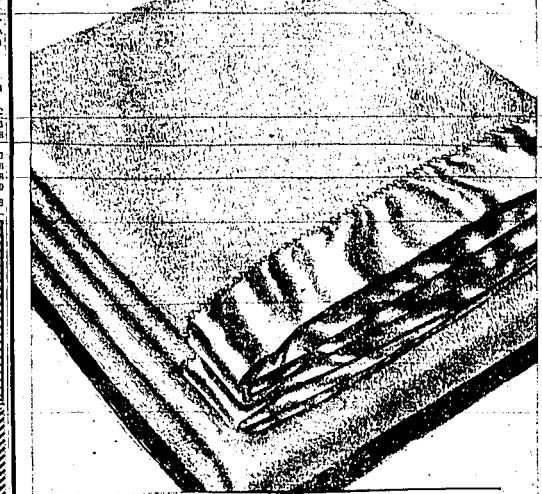

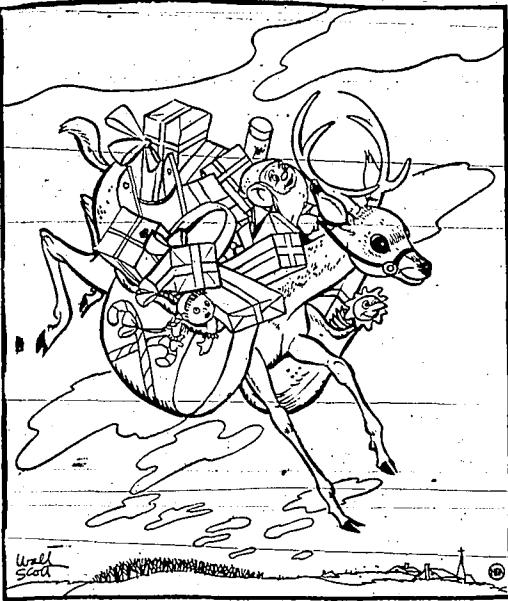

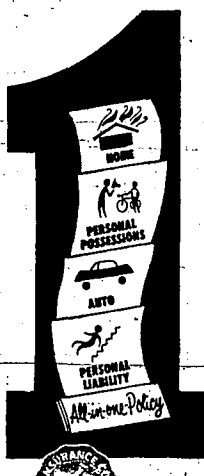

### Preview Given of Safety Film Sponsored by State of Idaho

BOISE, Nov. 27 (AP)—State police put on a preview yesterday of a movie they will show to members of the 1957 legislature in an effort to sell them on a stoppage of a bill of driver education in Idaho high schools.

The 18-minute color film was shown to 184 persons at a series of showings in the statehouse. Witnessing it were representatives of some 33 companies and groups which sponsored its production, plus statehouse employees.

A. E. Perkins, state police superintendent, said four prints of the film have arrived and 52 more are on the way. In addition to being shown to the lawmakers, prints will be distributed throughout the state for public showings, especially to teen-agers.

The film was produced by Public Safety Pictures of Dallas, Tex., and is being distributed here by Gov. Robert E. Smylie, State Law Enforcement Commissioner. Earle Koehler and Perkins.

In between is a staged production of a wild ride by a group of teenagers, ending in the death of one of them and the sentencing of the driver to the penitentiary for involuntary manslaughter.

A group of Coeur d'Alene youths are cast in the teen-age roles. The sequence was shot a few miles north of the town of Coeur d'Alene on a barricaded portion of the U. S. highway 10.

Appearing as the judge in the sentencing scene is District Judge Henry S. Martin, Idaho Falls. Sidney Smith, Coeur d'Alene, is the defense attorney and Pres. Atty. Hugh Maguire of Bannock county is the prosecutor.

The minister told the Foreign Correspondents association that in the nation of nine million persons there are only 76 political prisoners. He said Portugal's comparative immunity from communist doctrine emphasizes as being instinctive.

In an organized nation fully aware of its historic mission, he said, "communism cannot thrive."

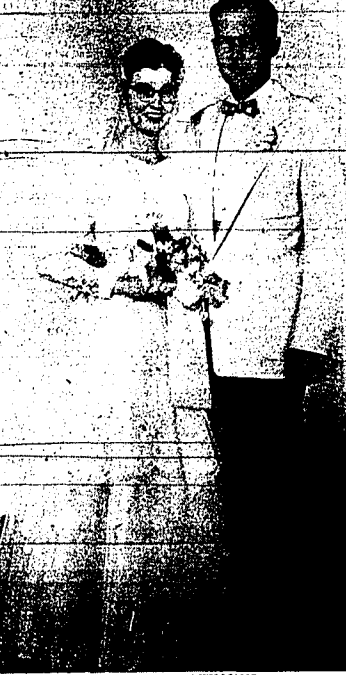

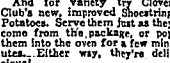

### Service Fight Is Not Settled Despite Roles

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (AP)—Secretary Charles A. Wilson yesterday signed a paper "clarifying" the roles and missions of the armed services. But even before the ink was dry, Wilson had made two exceptions in favor of the army.

Wilson's action pointed up one fact: The battle between the services over roles and missions is not over. Heiter it has turned into a question of interpretation and reading of the small print.

The eight-page memorandum by Wilson was designed to end protracted controversy of staff could not resolve on their own. On most points the air force appears to be victorious and the army the loser. In the missile field, the air force's complete operational control over the intermediate-range (1,500-mile) ballistic missile, the army was limited to control of short-range (200-mile) surface-to-air and 100-mile beyond the front lines.

Although the army "appeared" to have lost on most counts, top army officials said today they believe they can "live" within terms of the memorandum—at least for the next few years. Their acceptance was based on the fact that all the limitations placed on the army have escape clauses which may permit army concepts and tactics to grow with technology.

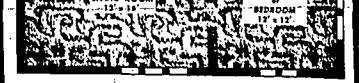

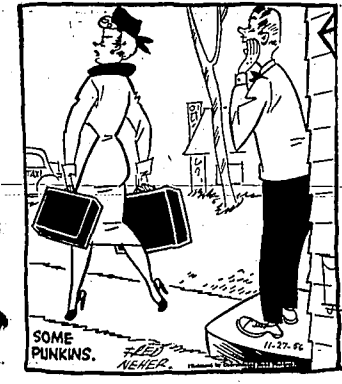

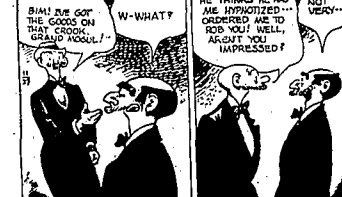

### Quarantine of 100,000 Dogs Still Enforced

DALLAS, Nov. 27.—The total dog population of Dallas estimated at 100,000, is now in the fifth month of quarantine because of a rabies outbreak that has killed 200 persons here this year than in all the rest of the nation.

Every dog in Dallas must be kept inside his owner's home, behind an escape-proof fence or on the end of a metal leash. If a leash is broken it is hauled off to the pound and his owner arrested.

Some 1,200 dog owners were arrested in October alone. They were fined \$10 each. Those with two or three dogs have had to pay \$20 and \$30. This month more than 400 owners have been arrested so far.

Four percent have died of rabies inflicted in dog bites, according to Dr. J. W. Bass, the city health officer. A total of 101 rabid dogs have been killed and Bass terms the situation worse than an epidemic.

If a person is bitten by a rabid dog but warned in time, he can avoid rabies by a course of inoculations. But if he does not take his shots within a short time, he is in a race and he suffers severely until almost certain death.

Packs of dogs used to roam streets and alleys here. The rabies epidemic broke out last spring, and only July 1, the quarantine was clamped on. There was a torrent of complaints, but police and health officers were in no mood for argument.

Last month dog owners decided to test the quarantine and let their dogs stray. One newly-freed dog chased Donald Gene Bullock, 12, who was "delivering newspapers" into a street and a truck hit him.

Health department inspectors and police started making raids, first in one section of the city and then another. The quarantine is now almost completely effective again.

Dr. Bass believes the rabies is going down, but he isn't satisfied. There were eight cases discovered Saturday in October, compared with 28 last June just before the quarantine started.

"We aren't making progress until we get down to four or five a month," Dr. Bass said.
